forces.

In a post on X, the Lieutenant Governor wrote: "Chaired a high-level meeting today at Raj Bhavan Jammu to review the rescue & relief operations, restoration of essential services and preparedness of UT's and concerned central agencies, Army, NDRF, CAPFs to deal with the situation arising out of incessant rain and floods."

The Lieutenant Governor directed the officials for restoration of power, communication and water supply on priority in areas where flood water is receding.

Srinagar/Jammu, Aug 27: Nearly 40 people lost their lives while 75 sheep perished across Jammu and Kashmir due to landslides and other incidents triggered by the heavy rainfall that continued for the third consecutive day on Wednesday.

According to the news agency—Kashmir News Observer (KNO), nearly 35 people have lost their lives in Katra in a massive landslide incident, triggered by the heavy rains near the Vaishno Devi shrine.

For 3rd time in history, J&K to have partial role in VP election

Srinagar, Aug 27: For the third time in history, Jammu & Kashmir will play only a partial role in the Vice-Presidential election, as all four of its Rajya Sabha seats currently remain vacant. The Vice-President of India is elected by an Electoral College comprising members of both the Lok Sabha and the Rajya Sabha.

Officials told news agency— Kashmir News Observer (KNO) that all six Lok Sabha seats of undivided Jammu & Kashmir were lying vacant when the Vice-Presidential election was held



could not be held in 1991 in J&K due to militancy, and the erstwhile state remained without representation in the Lower House until 1996. The Union

Government had promulgated an ordinance to temporarily set aside the constitutional requirement to hold parliamentary polls in J&K in 1991.

According to officials, J&K had no representation in the Rajya Sabha when the 16th Vice-Presidential election was held in 2022. All four Rajya Sabha members had completed their terms in 2021, and their replacements could not be elected due to the absence of an Electoral College, i.e., elected MLAs.

A similar situation exists for the 17th Vice-Presidential election, for which MPs will vote on September 9. | More on P6

Div Com reviews flood preparedness

Visits Hari Niwas to inspect functioning of Emergency Operation Centre

SRINAGAR, AUGUST 27: In view of the inclement weather across Kashmir division, Divisional Commissioner (Div Com) Kashmir, Anshul Garg convened an urgent meeting to assess the readiness of departments & district administrations to respond to any emergency and potential threat of floods in low-lying areas.

The meeting was attended by Deputy Commissioners, Commissioner SMC, CEO ERA, and senior officials from various key departments including ULB, FCS&CA, Education, IMD, Radio Kashmir, Doordarshan, I&FC, KPDCL, MED. UEED, R&B, BSNL, SDRF, NDRF, SRTC, PHE, BEACON and others.

At the outset, Div Com took a detailed district-wise assessment of the flood situation, including the mapping of vulnerable areas and operational status of district-level control rooms. He reviewed the availability of essential supplies, readiness of manpower and machinery, deployment of resource personnel, and evacuation contingency plans.

Garg emphasized the importance of activating communication channels to ensure real-time information dissemination to



both officials and the public. He directed Deputy Commissioners to update contact lists of district and tehsil-level committee members and to formulate backup communication plans in case of telecommu-

nication breakdown. Div Com also instructlogistics and resource data on the official portal and ensure all relevant information is accessible via a centralized dashboard.

To strengthen preparedness, he called for immediate clearance of debris from roads affected by landslides, facilitating the movement ed departments to update of emergency services and

Commissioner of SMC informed the meeting that 49 mobile dewatering pumps had been deployed in waterlogged areas across the city.

Officials from the Mete-orological department informed the gathering that there is currently no imminent flood threat, and the weather is expected to improve later in the evening.

Div Com reiterated that all departments must remain on high alert and work in close coordination to ensure public safety and a prompt response to any emerging situation.

Later, Div Com visited Hari Niwas to inspect the operation and functioning of UT level Emergency Operation Centre (EOC) where he checked the consolidated data of the centre and distress calls received from the general public. He also assessed the time-ly response provided to address the issues.

DC directed for active enforcement to achieve 100% computer billing within the next 1 month.

Status of NDPS cases was also reviewed and Police and Prosecution departments were directed to ensure timely investigations, charge sheeting and trial proceedings in all NDPS cases.

Excise department was

asked to intensify wild cannabis destruction drives across the district. Chief Education Officer (CEO) was directed to conduct drug de-addiction awareness campaigns during morning assemblies, particularly in

Floodwaters enter Kursu Rajbagh

Srinagar, Aug 27: Panic spread across Kursu Rajbagh in Srinagar on Wednesday

as floodwaters from the swollen Jhelum river breached residential pockets, submerging lanes, bylanes, and courtyards before entering several homes.

The situation prompted the deployment of the State Disaster Response Force (SDRF) and Srinagar Police, who rushed boats and personnel to assist residents.

Evewitnesses said that water levels surged sharply during the day, leaving families anxious and forcing many to move essential belongings upstairs.

'The lanes and bylanes are already under water. It has now entered our courtyards and some houses. People are frightened and on edge," said Ghulam Ahmad, a resident of Raibagh. He said the water started entering the area at around 10 or 11 a.m.

Another local said the most vulnerable are suffering the most. "Children and the

elderly are the worst affected. Everyone here fears a repeat of the 2014 floods," he said.

Locals also accused the authorities of being slow to respond. "Despite repeated requests, no visible preventive measures were taken before the water entered our area," a group of residents said.

By afternoon, SDRF and police teams arrived with boats, helping people from inundated spots and providing immediate relief. SDRF officials said teams were actively assisting residents. "We have deployed personnel with boats in Rajbagh and nearby areas. Our men are rescuing

stranded families and moving them to safety. More reinforcements are on standby," one official said.

Officials from the Irrigation and Flood Control Department stated they were maintaining a strict vigil at vulnerable embankments. "The situation is being monitored round-theclock. People should remain cautious and adhere to advisories," an official said.

As evening set in, anxious residents watched water levels closely, while joint efforts by the SDRF, police, and flood control officials continued to prevent any major

J&K's Deluge Demands Action, Not Excuses

he tragic loss of 31 lives in Jammu and Kashmir's devastating floods and landslides is a stark indictment of systemic failure and neglected preparedness. While torrential rains triggered the crisis, it was the absence of preventive measures, timely infrastructure upgrades, and robust disaster management that turned it into a catastrophe. As pilgrims lie buried under landslides, homes are swept away, and highways collapse, the

authorities must answer: Why were lessons from the 2014 floods not learned? The scale of devastation, with bridges washed away, rivers breaching danger marks, and communities cut off, reveals a terrifying truth: J&K remains dangerously vulnerable to climate-induced disasters. Despite advance meteorological warnings, the response relied on reactive measures like school closures and pilgrim suspensions rather than addressing core vulnerabilities:

choked flood channels, illegal encroachments on riverbanks, and inadequate drainage systems. The fact that the Tawi River surged four feet above its 2014 flood level underscores the utter lack of progress in flood mitigation over the past decade. The government must now prioritise a three-fold approach: The first is immediate relief. The authorities must expedite rescue operations, provide adequate compensation to affected families, and ensure

medical aid and shelter for the displaced. The second is rehabilitation. The government should rebuild infrastructure with climateresilient designs, restore connectivity, and support livelihoods shattered by the deluge. The third is prevention. It needs to implement long-pending measures like dredging rivers, clearing encroachments, and installing earlywarning systems. A transparent, time-bound action plan must be published and monitored

publicly. This tragedy must serve as a turning point. The J&K administration and the Central government must move beyond rhetoric and invest in sustainable flood management. Climate change will intensify such events, and without urgent action, more lives will be lost. The people of J&K deserve not just sympathy but security, a promise that their safety will never again be compromised by bureaucratic apathy. The time for accountability is now.

The Government of India envisions a dignified village life, where the people of Bharat's rural communities can access growth and opportunity within their own ecosystems. This vision is being realized through the Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Act (MGNREGA), 2005, a flagship programme aimed at enhancing livelihood security by providing at least 100 days of guaranteed wage employment in a financial year to every rural household whose adult members are willing to undertake unskilled manual work.

In Assam, during 2020, farmers faced severe challenges in carrying out agricultural activities due to lack of irrigation water, which significantly affected crop yields. Responding to the needs of the local community, a distributor canal was constructed under the MGNREGA scheme.

The brick-lined canal, built using registered skilled and semi-skilled labour, helped channel rainwater effectively. Upon completion, it provided adequate irrigation to nearby fields, improved livelihoods, and generated a total of 1,134 man-days of local employment.

With a focus on social inclusion, the scheme actively supports SCs, STs, womenheaded households, and other vulnerable groups. This scheme emphasizes sustainable development and environmental conservation by encouraging projects that promote ecological restoration and strengthen rural infrastructure. Through initiatives such as water conservation, afforestation, and soil health improvement, MGNREGA is laying the foundation for a greener, more resilient rural India.

In FY 2013-14, the budget allocation for MGNREGA was Rs 33,000 crore.

On the other hand for FY 2025-26 (BE), the government has retained a high allocation of Rs86,000 crore—the highest since

the scheme's inception. In order to upgrade the skill base of Mahatma Gandhi NREGS workers, the Government of India launched "Project UNNATI" in December 2019. The project aims to enhance the livelihood opportunities of these workers by equipping them with skills that enable a transition from partial employment to full employment, either through self-employment or wage employment. Project UNNATI targets the skill development of 2 lakh MGNREGS workers, thereby promoting sustainable income generation and economic self-reliance.The total achievement till 31st March 2025 was 90,894 candidates.

As part of this mission, the FAME India Scheme (Faster Adoption and Manufacturing of Hybrid and Electric Vehicles) was implemented from 2015 till 2019 to encourage the adoption



of electric and hybrid vehicles. FAME-I not only focused on increasing EV uptake but also on building essential charging infrastructure. Around 520 charging stations were approved under the scheme with a total allocation of 43 crore to support this infrastructure.

Building on the momentum of the previous phase, FAME-II shifted the gears, injecting bold investments for the transition to electric mobility. Launched in April 2019, FAME India Phase-II came with a budget of

11,500 crore. The scheme focuses on increasing EV adoption, expanding the e-bus network, and strengthening the charging infrastructure.

To back this, the Ministry of Heavy ndustries (MHI) approved in March 2023 for three oil companies— Indian Oil Corporation Ltd. (IOCL), Bharat Petroleum Corporation Ltd. (BPCL), and Hindustan Petroleum Corporation Ltd. (HPCL) to set up 7,432 public charging stations (PCS) at their fuel outlets across India. In March 2024, an additional 73.50 crore was sanctioned to upgrade 980 charging stations, with 400 more sanctioned through Expressions of Interest in various states.

A total of 912.50 crore has been sanctioned for the installation of 9,332 EV PCS, out of which 8,885 EV PCS have been installed, as on 30th June, 2025, marking a major step towards empowering the nation's electric mobility infrastructure.

Additionally, 2,000 crore is allocated for establishing EV public charging stations across highways and urban areas, while

780 crore is set aside for upgrading EV testing infrastructure. These measures aim to remove barriers to EV adoption, strengthen India's electric vehicle ecosystem, support domestic manufacturing, and reduce pollution, aligning with the country's commitment to sustainable, green mobility.

Scheme for Promotion of Manufacturing of Electric Passenger Cars in India (SPMEPCI)

India's goal to become a global hub for electric car manufacturing has been brought into motion with the SPMEPCI, notified in March 2024. Applicants must commit to an investment of at least 4,150 crore, achieve 25% domestic value addition (DVA) within three years and ramp up to 50% DVA by the end of five years. The application portal for SPMEPCI has been launched on 24th June 2025 and it's open until 21st October 2025. To draw global automakers to invest, the scheme grants approved applicants a five-year window to import Completely Built-in Units (CBUs) of electric four-wheelers (e-4W) valued at a minimum CIF (Cost, Insurance, and Freight) of USD 35,000 at a significantly reduced customs duty of 15%, starting from their application approval date. The scheme blends incentives with localization to drive clean-mobility growth along with the 'Make in India' and 'Aatmanirbhar

Bharat' initiatives. PM-eBus Sewa Scheme

Taking a giant leap towards cleaner urban travel, the PM eBus Sewa scheme is set to reshape public transport by putting thousands of electric buses on India's roads, bringing comfort, connectivity, and sustainability to every ride. The Government launched this scheme in August 2023 to boost public transport in cities. With a budget of 20,000 crore for deploying 10,000 electric buses under the Public-Private Partnership (PPP) model, the scheme focuses on making urban travel cleaner and more efficient. Eligible cities include those with a population between 3 and 40 lakh, as well as State and UT capitals with fewer than 3 lakh residents as per Census 2011. As of August 2025, 7,293 electric buses have been approved across 14 States and 4 Union Territories. To support this expansion, 1,062.74 crore has been sanctioned for depot and power infrastructure in 12 states and 3 UTs, with 475.44 crore already disbursed to 9

states/UTs for creating key facilities. PM e-Bus Sewa-Payment Security

Mechanism (PSM) Scheme

Keeping the electric wheels rolling, the PM-eBus Sewa-PSM Scheme, a 3,435.33 crore initiative approved in

October 2024, aims to support deployment over 38,000 electric buses across India between FY 2024–25 and FY 2028–29, with operations supported for up to 12 years from their date of deployment. The scheme aims to act as a financial safety shield for e-bus operators, offering a payment security mechanism in case of default by Public Transport Authorities (PTAs). The PM e-Bus Sewa scheme continues to drive India's urban mobility into the future by enabling scalable electric bus deployment and addressing operational risks through payment security.

India Electric Mobility Index (IEMI)
In a major step towards shaping India's clean transport future, NITI Aayog unveiled the India Electric Mobility Index (IEMI) in August 2025, a pioneering tool designed to track, measure, and compare how States and Union Territories are progressing on their electric mobility ambitions. This firstof-its-kind framework not only benchmarks achievements but also provides a clear picture of where each region stands on the road to an electrified, sustainable transport ecosystem. The IEMI score is calculated by assessing performance across 16 indicators under three core themes — Transport Electrification Progress, Charging infra-structure readiness, and EV Research and Innovation Status. A higher score signals a stronger, more advanced electric mobility landscape. Based on these results, regions are ranked as frontrunners with thriving ecosystems, performers steadily progressing, and aspirants that need targeted support to accelerate their journey. Delhi, Maharashtra and Chandigarh are leading as 'Frontrunners' in the recent IEMI score.

n January, the Central Drugs Standard Control Organisation Lanned the import of pre-owned and refurbished medical devices into

Even though governments are unable to provide the bare minimum of medical products and devices to their populations, formal and informal efforts on the part of individuals and organisations to send expired, recycled and reconditioned devices as donations have been entirely stopped. The putative reason for the CDSCO's recent ban was the fear of infections from recycled devices in response to an anecdotal mishap that was widely reported and blown out of proportion.

Data, however, tell a different story. In 2024, an international randomised trial of 298 patients - 'My Heart Your Heart' – conducted by researchers from the University of Michigan found that reconditioned



pacemakers "provide a noninferior, more affordable alternative to new implants with respect to infection risk." Unfortunately, the World Health Organization and human rights organisations have issued statements pointing to the moral and the ethical grounds against recycling.

However, they do not give sufficient weight to the consequences of this approach. With no hope what-soever of any government-funded costly devices, like pacemakers, such a policy direction robs the socio-economically disadvantaged communities of the hope of recovery and care.

Until and unless we can assure universal access to unused products and devices at affordable prices, a ban on recycling can unwittingly become a death sentence.

In the developed world, reticence to recycling is understandable given the wide availability of devices and the prohibitive cost of human labour necessary for recycling that pushes up prices. Fear of medico-legal litigations and resultant punitive compensations have further deterred the practice in those countries. However, in India, the cost of labour and, thus, recycling is relatively low. If the safety concern, especially the infection potential of these devices, is addressed through proper guidelines and specifications issued by regulatory bodies and professional associations, the medico-legal risks can also be carefully managed. The environmental imperatives weigh in favour of recycling commonly used medical hardware as well.

It would be naïve, however, to

ignore the factors at play. Globally, recycling is at cross purposes with the powerful medical device industry that thrives on the 'use and throw' paradigm. Endemic corruption in regulatory bodies also means that corporate lobbies find political accomplices at the cost of unsuspecting patients. In the European context, the infamous Implant Files report by the International Consortium of Investigative Journalists found that top European Union politicians and officials across 36 countries were won over by misleading claims from implant industry lobby groups. In India, the CDSCO ban was unsurprisingly supported by medical manufacturers. We must also be wary of the argument that a regulated import regime would turn India into a dumping ground of 'unsafe' medical equipment. In a market as large and underserved as India, regulated imports will be unsafe not for patients but for

corporate bottom lines.

A scientifically driven policy that regulates recycling is the need of the hour. We would be well-advised to devise innovative ways of recycling to clearly enunciate what kind of products can be recycled and reused and to issue recommendations and guidelines for protocolised recycling of medical devices and so-called 'disposables', with penal provisions for unscrupulous actors and regulatory oversight to ensure that financial benefits accrue to patients as much as to hospitals. This would also require us to revisit the Medical Devices Rules, 2017 and a reversal of the CDSCO ban. Alongside, we need to raise awareness amongst patients to counter social taboos against the usage of reconditioned devices.

Team of senior doctors briefed the Lieutenant Governor on the health condition of the injured and the medical procedures being followed. The Lieutenant Governor directed the doctors and Hospital Administration for ensuring the best possible treatment for the speedy recovery of the injured. It was informed that 13 people are presently under-going treatment at SMVD Narayana Superspeciality Hospital, Katra and their condition is stable.

The Lieutenant Governor expressed his gratitude to emergency responders, Shri Mata Vaishno Devi Shrine Board employees and citizens for their exemplary interventions which saved many lives.

Interacting with the media persons, the Lieutenant Governor said, "Yatra was suspended yesterday due to bad weather. Cloudburst occurred and devotees at Ardhkuwari were caught in it. It was a heart-wrenching natural calamity, in which we have lost precious lives. We are providing all possible assistance to bereaved families.

The Lieutenant Governor also announced exgratia relief to the families of the deceased. He said the Shrine Board and the administration are extending all the necessary assistance to the affected families.

SITUATION IMPROVES IN JAMMU With the improvement in the weather conditions, the flood threat in Jammu has slightly reduced while in Kashmir, the water level has crossed the danger mark in river Jhelum and other streams on Wednesday, prompting the authorities to take immediate measures including strengthening the river embankments

According to the news agency-Kashmir News Observer (KNO), Jammu witnessed the highest-ever water level in the rivers here after the intermittent but heavy rainfall for the past couple of days. Many bridges, as well as the roads were closed as a precautionary measure.

However, all these roads and bridges in Jammu city were reopened for vehicular movement except the one in Baghwati Nagar, which suffered a huge damage due to the recent flood-like situation.

124 NDRF PERSONNEL AIRLIFTED TO JAMMU Amid the critical situation, sources said that a total of 124 personnel and a 22-ton load of NDRF were airlifted from Hindan to Jammu with the IAF using transport aircraft C-130 and

"Six Mi-17 and one Chinook have also been pressed into relief operations," they said, adding that at least 90 persons have been rescued from various flooded locations till 05:00 PM

today.

"Relief material like drinking water and food packets is being airdropped to cut-off locations. Operations are going on in close coordination with local authorities and NDMA. IAF stands ready and resolute in providing succour and support to the affected population," the official sources said.

Flood Relief in Jammu & Pathankot Region The Indian Army has deployed 13 flood relief and rescue columns in HADR operations in response to the massive floods in Jammu and Pathankot regions. Demonstrating swift and coordinated effort, the columns are tirelessly working in inclement weather conditions to

save lives. The dedicated efforts of the HADR columns in coordination with civil administration have resulted in the successful evacuation of 635 citizens, including 12 BSF and 22 CRPF personnel.

safety of all citizens in this time of crisis. FLOOD THREAT LOOMS IN KASHMIR

While the situation eases in Jammu, the valley is at the brink of floods once again, resembling the 2014-like situation when the basic services including the cellular services were not accessible.

Similarly, Kashmir Valley had no access to the call and internet services as according to the officials, the heavy rainfall and cloudbursts had resulted in the disconnection of the services. The services were restored this afternoon, but were shortly snapped again and restored in

Besides, the selling of river Jhelum created panic across Kashmir with people fearing a decade ago situation once again. The water level has increased and crossed the danger mark in river Jhelum across the Valley.

As per the details, Jhelum was flowing above flood declaration mark at Sangam. It was 23.35ft in the area where the danger mark is 25 ft according to the officials. However, the water level was receding at Sangam when the report was last filed

At Ram Munshi Bagh here, the river Jhelum was flowing above the danger mark (21.07ft). The danger mark is, however, 21 ft and the level was persistently increasing at 08:00 PM.

Similarly in Asham, the water level was increasing and was flowing at 11.58 ft, which was below flood declaration mark. Meanwhile, the rise in water level in differ-

ent streams has however caused damage at multiple places including at Pahalgam's selfie

The water has also entered into the residential houses at multiple places including at Kursu Rajbagh, Soura and other places.

DRY WEATHER EXPECTED FOR NEXT 3 DAYS As the light rains continued across Jammu and Kashmir parts today, Director, Meteorological department (MeT), Dr Mukhtar Ahmad said that there is a forecast of mainly dry weather conditions for the next three days.

"Partly to generally cloudy weather is expected with mainly dry weather at many places during the next 3 hours," Director MeT said.

In its advisory, the MeT has said that there is a possibility of landslides, mudslides and shooting stones at few vulnerable places.

The people have been advised to stay away from water bodies, river embankments, Nallas. Streams and loose structures.

SCHOOLS, COLLEGES CLOSED The government has decided to close all the educational institutions across Jammu and Kashmir tomorrow (Thursday).

to tackle any eventuality," the official said. Regarding the rescue operations in Anantnag, the official said that on August 26, SDRF Anantnag carried out a major rescue at Trail Srigufwara Bijbehara, where 11 civilians trapped in the swollen tributary of River Lidder were evacuated safely.

He added that on August 27, multiple operations were carried out. In Karshangam Ashmuqam, 22 nomads trapped in heavy water flow were rescued. At Sofigund (Qoimoi jurisdiction), a house submerged in floods, six family members were rescued and shifted to safety.

He further said that at Dangarpora Anantnag, six families stranded in inundated houses were rescued, and at Court Complex Anantnag, the Sessions Judge and staff were evacuated after the premises and roads were submerged.

He added that at the Mehndi Kadal-Lal Chowk route, SDRF provided safe passage to 250 persons, including elderly and ailing residents, enabling them to reach their destinations.

About statewide preparedness, the officials said SDRF Kashmir has deployed district and sub-district level units, Water Quick Response Teams (QRTs), motor boats, manual boats, and other rescue equipment.

"On the directions of the Divisional Administration, 20 SDRF Rescue Teams were earmarked with boats and equipment. Of these, eight teams were deputed to the most affected areas, including Rajbagh, Bemina, Pantha Chowk, Kral Khud, Chanapora, and

Mehjoor Nagar," the official said.
They said that additionally, one team each at Dal Lake, Zero Bridge (Jhelum), Nigeen, and Hazratbal has been kept in full readiness with boats and allied gear.

Speaking about the operations, a senior SDRF official told KNO their men are working with both urgency and compassion. "The mission is clear—every single life matters, and no effort will be spared to rescue those in danger,"

About the deployment of SDRF manpower, the official told KNO that the SDRF 1st Battalion, Srinagar, has deployed teams across all districts and sub-divisions of Kashmir: Khanabal Anantnag - 41 personnel; at Qazigund - 16; at Kulgam - 22; at Shopian - 27; at Pulwama – 36; at Awantipora – 9; at Budgam – 26; at Ganderbal – 16; at Mansbal Lake Ganderbal (Water QRT) – 7; at Police Station Gund – 8; at Baramulla – 25; at Uri (Civil Defence) – 7; at Bandipora – 19; at Kupwara – 34; and at Sopore

They also shared that at Zero Bridge Jhelum (Water QRT) – 12 personnel; at Dal Lake Nehru Park (Water QRT) – 12; at RCDCC Srinagar – 18; at Nigeen Lake (Water QRT) - 7; at Hazratbal (Water QRT) – 7; at SDRF Campus Bemina Srinagar – 22; at EOC Humhama – 3; and at ICCC – 2. Over 17 rescue teams are on standby at Battalion HQs Srinagar – 85 personnel.

Additionally, authorities said SDRF rescue teams are kept under the direct supervision of respective Deputy Commissioners to ensure a coordinated response and immediate relief operations in case of emergencies. "Rescue teams are on high alert. Our prima-

ry focus is to save lives, shift stranded families, and ensure that relief reaches the most vulnerable sections at the earliest," the senior official

Meanwhile, the Srinagar Commandant of SDRF, SSP Masroor, speaking about the rescue operations, said, "The greatest victory in a disaster is not in saving possessions, but in saving

He added, "It is our duty, and with your cooperation, we will not fail." (KNO)

Over 5000 people

Jammu recorded 380 mm of rainfall in the past 24 hours, making this the highest rainfall ever recorded in Jammu in a 24-hour period since 1910, when the observatory was established.

"More than 5,000 people were evacuated from low-lying flooded areas to safety. The Army, NDRF and SDRF are working in coordination with the Divisional Commissioner's office," Lieutenant Governor Manoj Sinha said on

He added, "We are ensuring that there is an adequate supply of relief materials and all possible assistance is being given to those

Sinha said he spoke to Divisional Commissioner, Jammu, Ramesh Kumar and other senior officials and took stock of the flood situation and rescue and relief operations.

The LG directed officials to ensure restoration of power, communication and water supply on priority in areas where flood water is receding.

Deputy Commissioner, Jammu, Rakesh Minhas said on X that more than 3,500 persons were rescued in Jammu district alone on Tuesday.

"The district administration, police, Army, NDRF and SDRF are in non-stop relief operations. Restoration of roads, essential supplies and other services is being ensured on priority and war footing," he said.

Around 20 to 30 low-lying localities in Jammu and Samba are said to have been inundated by flash floods triggered by heavy rains continuing for the past 38 hours.

A large number of people from Peerkho, Gujjar Nagar, R S Pura, Nikki Tawi, Beli Charan, Gurkhanagar, Qasim Nagar, Rajiv Nagar, Shere-Kashmir University, Akhnoor and Pargwal. Besides, most of the banks of the swollen Tawi river in Jammu district were evacuated, officials said

Union minister Jitendra Singh, in a post on X, said Divisional Commissioner Kumar is in constant touch with him and is currently convening a meeting of officers from different departments.

The entire Jammu division, barring Poonch and Rajouri districts, is still receiving rain, though of lesser intensity, according to the divisional commissioner. The water levels of Tawi river has receded, but Chenab continues to flow close to the danger mark, the official

"The immediate priority is restoration of electricity, water supply and mobile services, for which authorities have been working continuously overnight. The SDRF, NDRF, paramilitary, Army and Air Force authorities are closely coordinating with the civil administration," a note by his office said.

Schools and colleges have been ordered to remain closed, and the general public has been advised to refrain from non-essential movement for their safety, it added.

The historic Madhopur bridge, among other structures, have been damaged due to the floods. "Movement of traffic on this bridge on the Iammu-Pathankot highway has been stopped since around 3 am this morning.'

The Union minister appealed to the public to cooperate with the authorities without panic. Singh said the prime minister is keeping tabs on the flood situation in the region.

The administration has also released helpline numbers for each district.

Srinagar-Jammu

The Mughal Road, which serves as a vital alternative route, has also been closed because of

the landslides and falling debris.

Given the widespread impact of adverse weather on road connectivity, the public is advised to confirm the status of roads before embarking on any journey.

"Travellers may contact the respective Traffic Control Units in Jammu, Srinagar, Ramban, Udhampur, Kishtwar and Kargil through the helpline numbers provided by the authorities," the J&K Traffic Police Headquarters said.

Meanwhile, the Meteorological Centre Srinagar has issued a fresh advisory for Jammu and Kashmir, warning of continued rainfall activity and possible weather-related disruptions across several parts of the region.

"Over the past 24 hours, extremely heavy rainfall has been recorded at several stations in the Jammu division, while south Kashmir also witnessed heavy showers, leading to waterlogging and potential hazards in vulnerable areas," the MeT said.

According to the latest forecast, the weather on August 27 will remain generally cloudy with intermittent light to moderate rainfall expected at many places, especially in Jammu Division and South & Central Kashmir.

However, brief dry spells with cloudy skies

may be observed between rainfall intervals. Moreover, the weather is expected to improve slightly on August 28 and 29, with the possibility of brief spells of rain or thundershowers at isolated locations.

"However, a fresh spell of active weather is likely from August 30 to September 1, during which moderate to heavy rain and thundershowers are expected in the Jammu division. The period from September 2 to 5 may again witness scattered showers or thunder activity across the region," the MeT said.

How US tariffs could wipe out India's gains from Russian oil imports

President Trump's decision to impose additional tariffs of up to 50% on Indian imports could slash exports by more than 40%, or nearly \$37 billion, this April-March fiscal year alone, according to New Delhi think-tank Global Trade Research Initiative (GTRI)

REUTERS: India saved billions of dollars by stepping up imports of discounted Russian oil in the wake of the war in Ukraine, but punitive tariffs imposed by the Û.S. that came into effect on Wednesday will quickly undo the gains, with no easy solutions in sight.

Analysts estimate India has saved at least \$17 billion by increasing oil imports from Russia since early 2022. U.S. President Donald Trump's decision to impose additional tariffs of up to 50% on Indian imports could slash exports by more than 40%, or nearly \$37 billion, this April-March fiscal year alone, according to New Delhi think-tank Global Trade Research Initiative (GTRI).

The fallout from the tariffs will be lingering, and could be politically debilitating for Prime Minister Narendra Modi, with thousands of jobs at risk in labour-intensive sectors such as textiles, gems, and jewellery. India's response in the coming weeks could reshape its decades-old partnership with Russia and recalibrate its increasingly complex ties with the U.S., a relationship Washington sees as vital to countering China's growing influence in the Indo-Pacific, analysts said.

"India needs Russia for defence equipment for several more years, cheap oil when available, geopolitical support in the continental space and political backing on sensitive matters," said Happymon Jacob, the founder of Delhi's Council for Strategic and Defence Research. "That makes Russia an invaluable partner for India."

But he added: "Despite the difficulties between Delhi and Washington under Trump, the



United States continues to be India's most important strategic partner. India simply doesn't have the luxury of choosing one over the other, at least not yet.'

Two Indian government sources said New Delhi wants to repair ties with Washington and is open to increasing purchases of U.S. energy but is reluctant to fully halt Russian oil imports. Discussions with the U.S. are ongoing, India's foreign secretary told reporters on Tuesday, with officials from both countries holding virtual talks on trade, energy security including nuclear cooperation, and critical minerals exploration.

Crude at \$200/BBL? Russian crude now accounts for nearly 40% of India's total oil purchases from nearly nothing before the war, and analysts say any immediate stoppage would not only signal capitulation under pressure but also be economically unfeasible. Indian purchases are led by billionaire Mukesh Ambani's Reliance Industries, which operates the world's largest refining complex in Modi's home state of Gujarat.

Global crude prices could more than triple to around \$200 a barrel India, the world's third-largest oil consumer and importer, stops buying oil from Russia, according to internal Indian government estimates reviewed by Reuters. It would also lose the up to 7% discount Russian oil offers compared to global benchmarks. In an unusually sharp statement this month, India accused the U.S. of double standards in singling it out for Russian oil imports while itself continuing to buy Russian uranium hexafluoride, palladium and fertiliser. New Delhi says other countries that have stepped up purchases of Russian oil, like China, have not been penalised. U.S. Treasury Secretary Scott Bessent has accused India of profiteering from its sharply increased pur-chases of Russian oil and called it unacceptable. He told CNBC n an interview last week that unlike India's surge in Russian oil imports after the start of the war in Ukraine, China's purchases had increased to 16% from 13%. India's foreign ministry has said its crude imports from Russia are "meant to ensure predictable and affordable energy costs to the Indian consum-er. They are a necessity compelled by the global market situation".

New Delhi warns that halting Russian oil imports, which is currently around 2 million barrels per day, would disrupt its entire supply chain and send domestic fuel prices soaring. It has said the previous U.S. administration under be Biden had backed its purchases of Russian oil to keep global prices stable. Russia has said it expects India to keep buying oil from it.

Modi has not directly commented on the tariffs but has repeatedly pledged support for India's farmers - seen as a veiled response to Trump's demands to open up India's vast agricultural sector.

Farmers are a key voting bloc, and Modi faces a tough election in the rural state of Bihar later this year. He has also pledged major cuts in a goods and services tax by October to lift domestic demand.

Trilateral ties In a flurry of diplomatic activity aimed at multipolarity, senior ndian officials have travelled to Russia in recent days, while Modi is set to visit China this month for the first time in over seven years. India-China relations began thawing about a year ago, following a deadly border clash in 2020. Modi is expected to meet both Chinese President Xi Jinping and Russian President Vladimir Putin at a summit meeting starting on Sunday of the Shanghai Cooperation Organisation, a regional security bloc. But the sources said India is still very cautious in its relations with China and not yet considering a trilateral summit between the three leaders, as hoped by Russia.

Other countries could take their cue from how India reacts to the U.S. tariffs, experts said.


"The key takeaway for other countries is that if India - an emerging major economic and military power - is under immense pressure from the U.S., they might have even less capacity to withstand American pressure," said Jacob, the analyst.

"Additionally, some might interpret the current dynamics as indicating that China could potentially serve as a counterbalance, especially given Trump's unpredictable and aggressive geopolitical moves." International relations experts say Trump's recent moves have plunged the U.S.-India relationship back to possibly its worst phase since the U.S. imposed sanctions on India for nuclear weapons tests in 1998. Besides trade, the row could affect other areas like work visas for Indian tech professionals and offshoring of services.

And even if India is able to eventually get some of the tariffs reversed, several consequences will linger, especially in trade.

"Competitors like China, Vietnam, Mexico, Turkey, and even Pakistan, Nepal, Guatemala, and Kenya stand to gain, potentially locking India out of key markets even after tariffs are rolled back," said GTRI founder Ajay Srivastava, a former Indian trade official.

Dissonance over planned tri-services commands will be resolved with openness: CDS



Mhow, Aug 27: The "dissonance" in the military on setting up of tri-services commands will be addressed keeping in mind the best interest of the nation, Chief of Defence Staff Gen Anil Chauhan said on Wednesday after divergent views emerged on the theaterisation drive.

Gen Chauhan's remarks at the concluding session of the two-day Ran Samwad came after Air Chief Marshal Singh and Navy Chief Admiral Dinesh Tripathi spoke on the theaterisation move that made it clear that the two forces have divergent views on the plan.

In his comments at the conclave, the Chief of Air Staff on Tuesday said the armed forces shouldn't come under any pressure to roll out theatre commands.

The Navy Chief, on the other hand, said on Wednesday that his force is committed to synergise its command and control, communications and combat capability with the Army and the Air Force in line with the goal of theaterisation drive. "As a CDS, I actually set out to promote jointness among the three services. And today, I can say with some kind of pleasure and confidence that we can speak about our differences in a very conducive environment, and with openness to different views without temperatures being risen," Gen Chauhan said.

"There could be a diference among the three services, but yet we are able to listen to that point. I think that thing is very important," he said

The government had announced the theaterisation plan in 2019 to ensure greater synergy among the three services. However, no visible forward movement has been made to implement it. The Chief of Defence Staff also referred to different views of the veterans on the theaterisation plan.

'They actually hold even a larger desire to protect turfs. I think it is a very good sign. So if you have sensed some kind of dissonance, let me assure you that we will resolve it in the best interest of the nation," Gen Chauhan said.

The Chief of Defence Staff said best efforts are underway to address the issues.

"There were some questions about integration levels and the need to progress things faster and take it to a higher level. Be assured that we are doing our best," he said.

The top military officer said that the plan for setting up integrated commands should have been attempted around 10 years back.

"We are slightly late, but we need to close that particular gap faster," he said.

Under the theaterisation model, the government seeks to integrate the capabilities of the army, air force and navy and optimally utilise their resources for wars and operations.

As per the theaterisation plan, each of the theatre commands will have units of the Army, the Navy and the Air Force, and all of them will work as a single entity looking after securigeographical territory.

At present, the Army, Navy and the Air Force have separate commands.

Vitamin C deficiency can increase risk of stomach, oesophagus, lung cancers; check symptoms

Vitamin C deficiency and oe-

sophageal cancer risk The oesophagus is the tube that connects your throat to your stomach. Research shows that people who consume more vitamin C have a lower chance of developing oesophageal cancer, which affects this vital passageway. Vitamin C seems to help by acting as an antioxidant, reducing inflammation, and preventing the formation and growth of precancerous lesions in the stomach



lining. Ensuring enough vitamin C may therefore slow down or even block processes that can lead to cancer in this organ.

The link between vitamin C and lung cancer

Lung cancer continues to be one of the most common and deadly cancers worldwide. A detailed analysis of 21 studies involving nearly 9,000 lung cancer patients found that higher intake of vitamin C was associated with a 17% lower risk of lung cancer overall. It also suggested that for every additional 100 mg of vitamin C eaten per day, the lung cancer risk drops by about 7%. This effect was especially prominent in men and people living in the United States. Vitamin C's antioxidant properties likely help protect lung tissue from oxidative damage caused by pollutants, smoking, and other environmental toxins, reducing the chance that cancerous changes will develop.

Symptoms of Vitamin C

Deficiency Vitamin C deficiency, also known as scurvy in severe cases, can manifest through several noticeable symptoms. Early signs include fatigue, weakness, and irritability.
