Two killed, flood threat looms as nature's fury strikes J&K again

Water bodies cross danger mark, many areas submerged, over 3,000 evacuated; NH, major roads closed, weatherman predicts improvement

Jammu/Srinagar, Sept 03: Nature's fury has once again struck Jammu and Kashmir with the heavy rainfall claiming two more lives in Rajouri and thousands of people were rescued and evacuated to safer places as multiple areas across the region were flooded on Wednesday, amidst the rise in the water levels in all the water bodies.

The heavy rainfall has claimed the lives of a mother-daughter duo in Rajouri district.

A mother-daughter duo was killed after a wall of their house collapsed due to heavy rains in Sunderbani. The deceased have been identified as Sita Devi, wife of Rattan Lal, and her daughter Sonia Rattan Lal—residents of Tanda Kangri. The bodies were recovered by police and rescue teams.

Similarly, a man went missing at Bantalab near the Telephone Exchange in Rajinder Nagar Nallah in Jammu late Tuesday night, following which rescue teams launched operations to locate him.



Heavy Rainfall Continues

It is worth mentioning here that Jammu and Kashmir witnessed heavy rainfall for the last three straight days. Since this morning, Katra has recorded the highest rainfall of 106.3 mm, followed by 60.4 mm in Jammu, the details reveal. Banihal, Batote and Bhaderwah stations have recorded a precipitation of 36.0 mm, 35.8 mm and 15.0 mm, respectively.

In Kashmir, the highest rainfall since today morning was recorded at Qazigund at 29.6 mm, followed by 29.0 mm at Kokernag

and 10.4 mm at Pahalgam. Furthermore, the water bodies across Jammu and Kashmir, including the river Jhelum, swelled following the heavy rainfall

The water bodies in the Kashmir Valley have reached alarming levels following heavy rainfall, with the Jhelum at Sangam, Pampore and Ram Munshi Bagh crossing the danger mark.

The officials said low-lying areas of Srinagar, including Khushipora Telbal, are facing inundation, causing distress among residents. The old Barzulla Srinagar bridge has been closed for traffic movement.

According to the Irrigation & Flood Control Department (I&FC), the latest readings at River Jhelum show: Sangam: 27.29 ft (danger mark: 25 ft); Pampore: 6.30 m (danger mark: 5 m); and Ram Munshi Bagh: 20.98 ft (danger mark: 21 ft).

Other readings include Asham: 10.89 ft (danger mark: 16.5 ft) and Wullar: 1576.54 m (full level: 1578 m).

Jhelum swelling, but situation under control: I&FC appeals for calm

Srinagar, Sep 03: As the Jhelum swelled due to incessant rainfall on Wednesday evening, authorities assured that the situation remains under control and urged both people and journalists to avoid creating panic.

Officials appealed to the journalist fraternity and Facebook page administrators not to spread alarm by posting hourly gauge readings or live minuteto-minute updates.

As per data available with the news agency—Kashmir News Observer (KNO), the latest gauge reading of Jhelum at Sangam stood at 27.60 ft, and at Ram Munshi Bagh it was 21.67 ft. Though slightly above the danger mark, officials said the

levels are well within safe limits. They pointed out that in 2015, when Sangam touched 27.49 ft and Ram Munshi Bagh 21.65 ft, no flooding occurred. "It is safe up to 23 ft at Ram Munshi Bagh, provided there is no breach in embankments. At present, there is no such threat," an official told KNO.

Qazigund, Sept 03: More than 3,000 vehicles, mostly heavy motor vehicles (HMVs), are stranded on the Jammu–Srinagar National Highway, while all major routes in the Union Territory remain closed on Wednesday after fresh rainfall, officials said.

An official told the news agency—Kashmir News Observer (KNO) that landslides and shooting stones triggered



by incessant rains blocked the Jammu-Srinagar National Highway at several locations forcing suspension of vehicular movement on Wednesday.

Incessant rains wreak havoc in south Kashmir

Pulwama/Anantnag, Sept 03: Continuous heavy downpour for the last two days has triggered flood-like situations in most parts of south Kashmir, inundating villages, damaging bridges, and leaving thousands of people stranded.

Standing crops, orchards, and residential structures have suffered extensive damage, while the administration has launched rescue and relief operations on a war footing.

According to the news agency - Kashmir News Observer (KNO), in Pulwama district, the overflowing Romshi Nallah

breached its banks, partially submerging Gundipora, Hassanwani, Uribagh, and Badibagh villages.

Residents said rainwater entered their homes, damaged stored food grains, and destroyed paddy fields and apple orchards, threatening their livelihood.

"We appeal to the administration to restore the original course of Romshi Nallah. Every time it swells during rains, our villages are cut off, and we face huge losses," said Abdul Majid, a resident of Gundipora.

The situation worsened after the approach road of Chandrigam bridge in

Awantipora area caved in, forcing its closure for vehicular movement. The R&B Department, Awantipora, has diverted traffic through the Chandrigam–Amlar–Bargam–Noorpora route until the bridge is repaired.

Meanwhile, the Kaihgam area of Awantipora witnessed massive waterlogging, with streets and houses submerged. "The drainage system has collapsed. We are virtually trapped inside our homes, unable to move out even for essentials," said Rafiqa Begum, a resident.

SRINAGAR, SEPTEMBER 03: Minister for Health and Medical Education, Social Welfare and Education Sakeena Itoo along with Advisor to the Chief Minister, Nasir Aslam Wani Wednesday visited the Irrigation and Flood Control Room Ram Munshi Bagh to take stock of the prevailing flood situation and preparedness measures in place.

On the occasion, senior officers of the Flood & Irrigation Department, SDRF, and district administration briefed the Minister and Advisor regarding the current water levels steps being taken to safeguard vulnerable areas and other flood prone areas.

Div Com inspects preventive measures at Barzulla, Gandbal

SRINAGAR, SEPTEMBER 03: In view of inclement weather conditions & rising water level of Jhelum, Divisional Commissioner (Div Com) Kashmir, Anshul Garg on Wednesday visited Barzulla & Gandbal to inspect the protective measures being taken by Irrigation & Flood Control department to clog the vulnerable spots to avoid breaches.

During his visit to the spot of automatic water level recorder near Bone & Joint Hospital, Div Com directed for closure of the gap to avoid any potential threat of breach and flooding. The spot serves as a means for dewatering and out flow of the hospital drainage system.

Div Com instructed the SE, I&FC to find a permanent solution to address the issue and to avoid risk of breach in the left bank of the flood channel near the hospital.

While addressing the media at the spot, Div Com said that currently the water level at Sangam & Ram Munshi Bagh shows rising trend and informed that IMD has reported possibility of receding water level in the later part of the day.

However, he said that the contingency plan has already been put in place by I&FC department to respond to any exigency. Speaking about the reinforcement steps being



taken at B&J hospital, he said that the gap is being filled with sand bags and shall be completed within a couple of hours.

Sharing information about the rescue measures being taken in South Kashmir, he said that District Disaster Management teams are conducting rescue measures in low lying areas and evacuated some families to safer places. Div Com informed that teams of District

Administration Kulgam were on the ground during the night to ensure evacuation of people in nine villages.

'Wherever inundation in low-lying areas in Anantnag & Kulgam has occurred, the administration is following evacuation protocol", he added.

In Srinagar, he said, the teams of district administration are in the field and a contingency plan has been

put in place to immediately respond to any exigency.

"Our emergency control rooms are operational, power supply is up-end, and telecom services are Ok. Hopefully there should be reasonable improvement in couple of hours", he

Anshul Garg said we all need to remain alert and people need to follow advisories issued by district administrations and remain away from water bodies. He said that magistrates have been deployed to monitor the ground situation and alert people.

On the occasion, he also inspected the delivery of critical health care services to the patients by the hospital administration and availability of medical & paramedical staff besides availability of medicines.

Div Com also visited Gandbal where he inspected restoration efforts underway for reinforcement of the river bank near the bridge. On the occasion, he interacted with the locals and assured a permanent solution for strengthening of the bank and execution of the remaining works.

Later, Div Com visited the UT level Emergency Operation Centre at Hari Niwas to take the stock of addressing of distress calls of people and resolution of urgent issues faced by them.

Srinagar, Sep 03: Director of Food, Civil Supplies and Consumer Affairs (FCS&CA), Dr. Owais Ahmed Wednesday oversaw the ration supply situation in flood-affected areas of Kashmir and visited multiple depots to ensure uninterrupted availability of essential commodities.

He said that teams have been traveling to various ration depots since morning, taking stock of supplies. "We are well-equipped with

everything, at least for the next six months, in case of any contingency. Our team is on the ground, constantly monitoring for any issues," Dr. Owais Ahmed told reporters.

SC upholds JKBOPEE decision for PWtD MBBS, **BDS** admissions

Srinagar, Sep 03: The Supreme Court of India has upheld the judgment passed by the Jam-mu & Kashmir High Court in favour of the decision taken by the Jammu and Kashmir Board of Professional Entrance Examinations (JKBOPEE) regarding the eligibility of Persons With temporary Disabilities (PWtD) for MBBS and BDS admissions.

The Supreme Court dismissed the Special Leave Petition (Civil) challenging the High Court's ruling issued last year in W.P. (C) concerning the eligibility of individuals with temporary disabilities for admission to MBBS or BDS courses for the academic session 2024-25 under the Persons with Benchmark Disability (PWD) category, which falls under the Horizontal Reservation.

JKBOPEE Secretary Dr Shabir Hussain Keen said, "Aggrieved by the rejection of temporary dis-ability certificates by JKBOPEE,



the petitioners approached the Division Bench of the Jammu & Kashmir and Ladakh High Court, which set a minimum period of 10 years for a disability to qualify as long-term and eligible for reservation benefits under the PWD category."

He said that out of five peti-tioners, two filed SLPs (Special Leave Petitions) in the Supreme Court. The SLPs were heard extensively on multiple occasions. After considering both sides, the Supreme Court observed that no relief could be granted to the petitioners. While the Court condoned the delay in filing, it ultimately dismissed the petitions, vacated the interim order, and disposed of all pending applications.

Dr Keen added that with this decision, the judgment of the Jammu & Kashmir and Ladakh High Court stands upheld. The matter regarding the rejection of temporary disability certificates (less than 10 years) by JKBOPEE has now attained finality through the Supreme Court's

Challenge to reservation policy...

HC grants 6 weeks' time to file counter affidavit

Srinagar, Sep 03: The High Court of Jammu & Kashmir and Ladakh has granted six weeks' time to the respondents to file a counter affidavit in a case challenging the existing reservation policy.
A division bench comprising Justice Sindhu Sharma and Justice Shahzad Azeem granted six weeks' time to the parties to file their counter affidavits in the case. "Learned counsels for

the parties pray for, and are granted, six weeks' time to file counter affidavit," the HC said in its order dated September 02.

The Court has listed the matter for further hearing on October 14.

In a fresh petition, academician and lawyer Zahoor Ahmad Bhat, along with others, has challenged key provisions of the Jammu & Kashmir Reservation Act, 2004. They have challenged Section 3, Section 4, Section 6, Section 8, and Section 9 of the Jammu & Kashmir

Reservation Act, 2004, as well as several rules under the Jammu & Kashmir Reservation Rules, 2005including Rule 4, Rule 5, Rule 9, Rule 10, Rule 13, Rule 15, and Rule 17. Additionally, they have challenged S.O. 176 dated 15-03-2024, S.O. 127 dated 20-04-2020, S.O. 305 dated 31-05-2024, and SRO 518 dated 02-09-2019.

According to the petitioners, these provisions result in "excessive reservation," cumulatively reserving approximately 70% of posts across various categories, leaving only 30% for open merit/ general category candidates.

The petitioners argue that the existing reservation pattern lacks any basis in quantifiable data and contravenes the mandate of Article 16(4) of the Constitution, which permits the state to make provisions for reservation in appointments or posts in favor of any backward class of citizens who, in the state's opinion, are not adequately represented in public services—(KNO)

Highway Closure Must Not Become Licence For Exploitation

The week-long closure of the Srinagar-Jammu National Highway has exposed a distressing reality: in times of crisis, opportunism often trumps empathy. While landslides and shooting stones blocking the valley's sole surface link are natural challenges, the artificial inflation of prices for essentials like vegetables, poultry, and eggs is a manmade injustice. It is unacceptable that residents are forced to pay nearly double for basic

goods. Collard greens are sold at Rs 90 instead of Rs 50, chicken at Rs 190 per kg, and many other edible items at exorbitant prices, while suppliers cite "shortages" to justify profiteering. This is a moral failure. Vulnerable families, daily wage workers, and fixed-income households bear the brunt of this exploitation. Vendors may argue that limited supplies compel higher prices, but sudden, exorbitant markups, especially on locally grown produce like

Haakh, reveal a blatant disregard for fairness. The administration's response, though wellintentioned, has been inadequate. Forming market checking squads and issuing warnings are reactive steps, not deterrents. What is needed is proactive, visible, and stringent enforcement. The government must act decisively. First, it should immediately cap margins on essential commodities during emergencies and monitor shipments to prevent hoarding.

Second, officials must conduct daily, surprise inspections across all major markets, including Sopore, Baramulla, Srinagar, and beyond. and penalise violators with heavy fines and licence cancellations. Third, the administration should explore airlifting perishables or activating local supply chains to reduce dependency on the highway. Beyond immediate measures, this situation underscores the urgent need for diversifying connectivity, whether through

accelerating the Mughal Road upgrade, exploring tunnel projects, or strengthening air cargo facilities. A single highway cannot dictate survival for millions. In adversity, a society is judged by how it protects its most vulnerable. The administration must demonstrate that exploitation will not be tolerated, not through statements, but through action. The people of Kashmir deserve dignity, not desperation, in difficult times.

Vocal For Local In Food Processing Sector

Pradhan Mantri Formalisation Of Micro Food **Processing Enterprises (PMFME)**

How the PMFME scheme helped a Kerala entrepreneur expand production, increase profits, and showcase the power of government initiatives in nurturing local food businesses

Ruby Fresh Snacks in Ernakulam, Kerala, tells the story of how a small dream became a thriving enterprise. Founded by Mr. P M Jaleel in 2011 with groundnut laddoos, the unit grew with the support of the PM Formalisation of Micro Food Processing Enterprises Scheme. A loan of over 3 lakh rupees in 2021 helped him buy new machines, double production, and expand his product range. Daily profits rose from about 12,000 rupees to nearly 20,000, and his turnover crossed 32 lakh rupees in 2021-22. Today, Ruby Fresh Snacks is not only a source of quality local treats but also a symbol of how government support can transform small entrepreneurs into inspiring success stories.

The Pradhan Mantri Formalisation of Micro Food Processing Enterprises Scheme was launched on 29 June 2020. It is a Centrally Sponsored Scheme that focuses on the growth and formalisation of micro food units across the country. The scheme is part of the Atmanirbhar Bharat Abhiyaan and supports the Vocal for Local vision in the food processing sector. It provides financial, technical and business assistance to entrepreneurs for setting up new units or upgrading existing ones. The scheme runs from 2020-21 to 2025-26 with an outlay of Rs. 10,000 crores. Its goal is to make micro enterprises more competitive, bring them into the organised sector and unlock new

opportunities for growth. The expenditure under the scheme is to be shared in 60:40 ratio between Central and State Governments, in 90:10 ratio with North Eastern and Himalayan States, 60:40 ratio with LITs with legislature and 100% by the Center for other UTs.

The scheme aims to provide direct support to 2 lakh micro food processing units through credit linked subsidies. It also seeks to create common infrastructure and

strengthen institutional support to drive faster growth in the sector.

India's food processing industry has seen a remarkable growth over the past 11 years, shaped by its strong farm base, growing demand, and supportive government policies. The country is set to become a global leader in this sector, with steady growth ahead. Agriculture remains the backbone of food processing, while the sector itself has become vital to the economy through its rising share in GDP, jobs, and exports.

As of July 2025, for FY 2024-25, agriculture and processed food exports reached approximately USD 49.4 billion with processed food exports constituting around 20.4%, positioning India as a rising global leader in food processing. A Detailed Project Report (DPR) is required for proposals. It should include project details such as product profile, strategy, quality control, aggregation of produce, packaging and branding, pricing, promotion, storage, and marketing channels. Plans for sales growth must also be outlined.

Financial support of up to Rs 5 lakh is available from the State Nodal Agency (SNA) for preparing DPRs related to marketing and branding.

The DPR should also carry a flow chart showing activities from raw material procurement to marketing. It must highlight quality control points and present a fiveyear plan covering promotional work, expansion of producer participation, and turnover growth.

As part of the scheme, the Ministry provides Guidelines (Model DPR's) for the preparation of Branding and Marketing DPRs. This helps entrepreneurs, FPOs, SHGs, cooperatives, or SPVs develop well-structured proposals with templates, technical terms of reference, and formats required to apply for branding and marketing support. Support for Common Infrastructure

The following common infrastructure are being funded under the Scheme:

Facilities for assaying agricultural produce, sorting, grading, warehousing, and cold storage at the farm gate.

Common processing units for ODOP produce.

Incubation centres with one or more product lines, available to smaller units on hire. Incubation centres may also be used partly for training. All incubation centres to be run on a commercial basis.

Under the PMFME Scheme, the total number of approved units till 30th June 2025, across different components, are as follows: For the Credit Linked Subsidy component, 1,44,517 applications have been sanctioned, amounting to Rs 11501.79 crore. For the Seed Capital component, 3,48,907 applications have been approved, with a sanctioned amount of Rs 1182.48 crore. The Common Infrastructure component has 93 applications sanctioned, totaling Rs 187.20 crore. Lastly, the Branding & Marketing component has 27 applications approved, with a sanctioned amount of Rs 82.82 crore. Capacity Building & Research

Capacity building and training form an essential part of upgrading technology and bringing micro food processing units into the formal system. At the national level National Institute for Food Technology Entrepreneurship and Management (NIFTEM) and Indian Institute of Food Processing Technology (IIFPT) lead capacity building and research, with financial

support provided for these activities. In collaboration with State-level technical institutes, they offer training and research support to selected enterprises, groups, and clusters. Specialised institutions under ICAR, CSIR, and premier institutes like Defence Food Research Laboratory (DFRL) and Central Food Technological Research Institute (CFTRI) also partner in delivering product-specific training and research across the country.

ODOP focus

The scheme follows the One District One Product (ODOP) approach to scale up procurement, services, and marketing. States identify products, with priority on perishables such as fruits, vegetables, spices, fisheries, and traditional foods like honey and turmeric. Support is focused on processing, storage, branding, and reducing wastage. Capital investment is prioritised for ODOP units, while new enterprises are eligible only for ODOP products. The approach complements cluster-based initiatives under the Agriculture Export Policy and Agriculture Ministry, ensuring stronger value chains and common facilities.

Conclusion

The PMFME Scheme marks a major step in strengthening micro food enterprises and unlocking the potential of local produce. Through its ODOP focus, common infrastructure, skill training, and access to credit, it provides small entrepreneurs with the tools to grow and compete. By reducing wastage, improving value addition, and promoting branding, the scheme not only boosts farm ers' and producers' incomes but also creates jobs and supports rural development. It stands as a bridge between tradition and modern markets, driving sustainable and inclusive growth in the food processing sector.

India's Growth Shows Resilience

Country's resilient economy and demographic dividend signal long-term growth confidence

growing workforce with rising incomes provides not just near-term support for consumption but also long-term confidence in India's demographic dividend

The month of August has delivered a resounding message from India — one that stands out amid the turbulence of the global economy. The recently released GDP data for the first quarter of FY 2025-26 confirms what many had intuited but few expected to see so strongly: India's economy is resilient, reformoriented, and ready for renewed growth.

Data from MOSPI shows that India's real GDP grew at 7.8 per cent in April–June 2025, far exceeding analyst expectations and marking a five-quarter high. This performance makes India not only the fastestgrowing major economy but also one that is steadily widening its lead over peers.

The numbers are encouraging not merely for their scale but for what they signify about the underlying health of the economy. Supply-side drivers — manufacturing, construction, and services - recorded strong expansion, reflecting broad-based momentum.

On the demand side, robust private consumption and investment provided the bedrock of growth. Private Final Consumption Expenditure (PFCE) grew by 7 per cent, pushing its share of GDP to 60.3 per cent the highest first-quarter level in 15 years.

Several recent policy steps have buoyed household sentiment: Income tax reliefs



announced in the Union Budget, a 100 basis point cut in the repo rate, and healthy progress in Kharif sowing, each of which has amplified disposable incomes and eased financial conditions.Meanwhile, Gross Fixed Capital Formation (GFCF) grew by 7.8 per cent, underpinned by a surge in both public and private investments. The Government's capital expenditure in Q1 was 30.1 per cent higher than the average for the same quarter in the past three years, reflecting its continued focus on infrastructure.

The private sector, too, showed renewed confidence, with new investment announcements rising 3.3 times year-on-year. With RBI data showing that capacity utilisation has risen both sequentially and year-on-year, the manufacturing sector appears poised for further expansion.

Equally heartening is the macroeconomic stability accompanying this growth. Consumer Price Index (CPI) inflation eased to an eight-year low in July 2025, giving households greater spending power and businesses more predictable cost structures. The Union government's fiscal deficit-to-GDP ratio is expected to moderate further to 4.4 per cent in 2025–26, showing steady consolidation from the pandemic-fuelled high reached in FY 2020-21. The labour market is showing encouraging signs. Formal

sector job creation in Q1 FY26 was 1.6 times higher than a year ago. Urban unemployment remains well below pre-pandemic levels, while hiring activity has stayed buoyant the Naukri JobSpeak index points to continued recruitment momentum.

A growing workforce with rising incomes provides not just near-term support for consumption but also long-term confidence in India's demographic dividend.

Concerns about the deflator being low are also unfounded. Converting nominal GDP (valued at current prices) into real GDP (valued at constant prices) by applying an inflation indicator is a longstanding and globally accepted practice. A small gap between real and nominal GDP growth is simply a statistical reflection of the prevailing low-inflation environment, not a data anomaly.

The GDP deflator covers the full spectrum of goods and services in the economy, unlike CPI (limited to household consumption) or WPI (which excludes services). One of the former Chief Statisticians has even noted that the GDP deflator is "possibly the most accurate measure of inflation." If inflation is low, the deflator will naturally also be low. This is precisely the case in Q1 FY 2025–26.

Beyond the numbers, August brought a symbolic milestone. S&P upgraded India's long-term sovereign credit rating to 'BBB' from 'BBB', the first upgrade in 18 years. The recognition was underpinned by strong economic growth, enhanced monetary policy credibility, and a clear government

commitment to fiscal consolidation.

For India, this upgrade holds real economic consequences. Lower borrowing costs, higher investor confidence, and increased foreign capital inflows are likely to follow.Of course, India is not immune to global headwinds. The imposition of fresh US tariffs has unsettled exporters, and the external environment remains fraught with geopolitical uncertainty and shifting trade alignments.

Yet, the government and industry appear to be preparing themselves for the brace, with reports of constant engagement between them. Growth may moderate in the quarters ahead as the base effect wanes, but the baseline is now higher.

With reforms deepening, investment gathering pace, and macroeconomic stability intact, India looks to sustain growth well above global averages. India's Q1 FY26 print is, however, not a finish line. The recovery is broadening, but sustaining higher growth will depend on further reforms, keeping inflation expectations anchored, and raising productivity.

With the GST Council due this week, locking in GST rationalisation with a stable, lower-rate structure becomes important. If both steady macro anchors from the Centre and a competitive reform push from all the states move in lockstep, India can convert resilience into a higher, more stable growth path. Safety of public government's foremost priority: Sakeena

Itoo, Nasir visit Anantnag, take stock of flood situation

SEPTEMBER ANANTNAG, 03: Minister for Health and Medical Education, Social and Education, Sakeena Itoo along with Advisor to the Chief Minister, Nasir Aslam Wani Wednesday visited Anantnag and took first hand appraisal of the prevailing flood situation in the

During the visit, the Minister and Advisor visited flood gauge station Sangam and assessed the current water levels. They reviewed the latest readings recorded at the gauge station and interacted with the officials of the Irrigation & Flood Control Department.

Officers of Irrigation and Flood Control department briefed the Minister and Advisor about the prevailing discharge levels, forecast trends, and precautionary measures being undertaken to ensure timely response in case of further rise.

On the occasion, the Minister emphasized that safeguarding public health and safety remains the government's foremost priority. She directed the concerned officers to maintain close vigil, ensure round-the-clock monitoring of river levels and remain fully prepared with emergency response plans.


Nodal Officers sensitized about NTCP

Govt announces next-generation GST reforms to make life easier for citizens, boost economy

New Delhi, Sept 03: In a landmark announcement from the Red Fort on Independence Day 2025, Prime Minister Narendra Modi revealed a series of transformative GST reforms designed to benefit every citizen and stimulate economic growth. The reforms focus on simplifying the tax structure, reducing costs on daily essentials, and making insurance and healthcare more affordable. With a strategic multi-sectoral approach, these changes aim to improve quality of life, promote ease of doing business, and support vital sectors such as agriculture, health, and small industries.

Next-generation GST reforms, as announced by Prime Minister Narendra Modi from the ramparts of Red Fort on 15th August 2025, represent a strategic, principled, and citizen-centric evolution of a landmark tax framework, which will enhance the quality of life of every last

GST Council approves reforms with a multi-sectoral and multi-thematic focus on improving

the lives of all citizens and ensuring ease of doing business for all, including small traders and businessmen

GST Council approves rate rationalisation with a focus on Common-man, Labourintensive Industries, Farmers and Agriculture, Health, Key Drivers of the economy

Exemption of GST on all individual life insurance policies whether term life, ULIP or endowment policies and reinsurance thereof to make insurance affordable for the common man and increase the insurance coverage in the country.

Exemption of GST on all individual health insurance policies (including family floater policies and policies for senior citizens) and reinsurance thereof to make insurance affordable for the common man and increase the insurance coverage in the country

Rationalisation of the current 4-tiered tax rate structure into a citizen-friendly 'Simple Tax' - a 2 rate structure with a Standard Rate of 18% and a Merit Rate of 5%; a special de-merit rate of 40% for a select few goods and

Many Areas Submerged

Meanwhile, in Khushipora Telbal, eyewitnesses told KNO that water levels in the area are rising, with sudden inundation of houses, lanes and the main road.

Residents rushed to move their belongings to the upper storeys. "Water entered our homes within minutes. We could do little except protect children and elderly members," said a local.

Some parts of Mehjoor Nagar and Telbal are also waterlogged. Many households reported damage to goods stored on ground floors, while movement in the areas remains severely restricted.

In the Jammu division, the rivers like Tawi, Chenab, Basantar, Ujh, and Ravi, along with their tributaries, are flowing at or above danger levels, exacerbating flood risks in low-lying areas.

The Tawi River in Jammu was recorded at 15 feet, one foot above the danger mark, while the Chenab River in Akhnoor was flowing four feet above the evacuation level of 42 feet.

Rescue Operation Launched, Over 300 Evacuated

The flooding has left around 40 people trapped in a village in Akhnoor. The Border Security Force (BSF) evacuated 47 civilians from Village Fattu Kotli using two helicopters. Jammu Police carried out evacuations in Akhnoor, Khour, Belicharana, Miran Sahib, and other affected areas.

In Anantnag district, police rescued 25 nomadic families stranded under a bridge after water levels rose due to heavy rains.

Deputy Commissioner (DC) Doda, Harvinder Singh, said that continuous rainfall from early yesterday morning until the evening caused significant disruption across the district. The heavy downpour resulted in extensive damage, with approximately 60 to 70 houses destroyed, around 150 severely damaged, and another 350 to 400 partially affected. In addition to residential losses, the district's roads, schools, power infrastructure, and water supply systems suffered considerable impact. Restoration and repair work is currently underway to address these damages, he said.

Divisional Commissioner Kashmir, Anshul Garg, said that around 2,500 people were rescued from flood-affected areas of Kulgam.

In the Mahore subdivision of Reasi district, 86 houses were affected, and 100 families were shifted to safer locations. The official said rescue teams continue operations, and food and essential supplies have been provided to all displaced families.

Åmid the prevailing situation, the authorities have urged residents to follow advisories and remain alert while rescue teams continue relief operations across the region.

Weatherman Predicts Improvement

Meanwhile, the weatherman has predicted an improvement in the weather conditions from tomorrow, but stated that a brief spell of rain and thunder at a few places with moderate showers over a few places of Jammu division cannot be ruled out for the next few days till September 07.

Director Meteorological department (MeT), Dr Mukhtar Ahmad, said that from September 08 to 11, a spell of moderate rain is expected over a few districts of Jammu division during 8th late night and 9th morning and improvement thereafter till 11th evening.

The MeT has also issued an advisory, advising people to stay away from water bodies, Nallas, river embankments and loose structures etc

Nonetheless, the heavy rainfall has triggered multiple landslides and mudslides, leading to the closure of several vital roads and highways across the division

across the division.

Jammu-Srinagar National Highway remains closed for the second consecutive day due to landslides and land subsidence at Thard in Udhampur, with additional

blockages reported at Chanderkote, Kela Morh, and Battery Cheshma in Ramban.

The traffic on Jammu-Pathankot Highway also remained disturbed due to being blocked near Vijaypur in Samba district following the damage of a pillar of the Devak River bridge.

The Bani-Basohli road (blocked at Sukha Nallah), Basohli-Mabanru road (at Dhani), Mahappur-Kathua road (at Peddy Nallah), and Qiala Chak-Ramkote road (near Kali Mata Mandir in Galak) remain closed. The Mughal Road and Jammu-Kishtwar National Highway are also shut due to landslides and shooting stones.

A massive landslide has also blocked the Doda-Pul Doda road on the Batote-Kishtwar stretch following continuous rainfall in the district, and authorities have advised people to avoid travel in the affected area until clearance work is completed.

The Jammu–Rajouri road between Tanda and Kalidhar Mandir is also closed, while the 4th Tawi Bridge has collapsed amid rising river levels, suspending traffic movement.

Also, the Jammu–Rajouri–Poonch National Highway has remained closed since last night at Chowki Choura near Kandi Tunnel, leaving many vehicles stranded due to the disintegrated road surface. Officials have called for the immediate restoration of the highways to reconnect Rajouri with Jammu.

The closure of these roads has severely hit connectivity, affecting both essential supplies and passenger movement. Fruit-laden trucks from Kashmir, meant for markets outside the Union Territory, have also been left stranded.

"We have been prioritising fruit trucks for the past several days as the highway has not been fully restored since August 26. A 20-km stretch between Udhampur and Chenani, particularly a 10-km patch between Bani Nullah and Samroli, is badly damaged. The worst-hit points include Tharad Bridge, Balli Nullah, and both carriageways at Samroli," the official said.

He said that if the weather stabilises, twolane traffic could be restored soon. "Our men and machinery are at work, we just need a window of clear weather to speed up restoration," he said

Meanwhile, Kulgam Police on Wednesday organised a langar (community kitchen) at Qazigund for drivers and commuters stranded due to traffic disruptions on the highway.

The initiative was led by SSP Kulgam, Sahil Sarangal (IPS), along with Additional SP (Highway) Qazigund, SDPO Qazigund, and other police officials. Adequate arrangements of wholesome meals and drinking water were made on the spot, providing much-needed relief to those in distress.

The gesture evoked wide appreciation from commuters and locals alike, who lauded the police's commitment to public welfare beyond conventional policing. Police said the endeavour reaffirms their resolve to stand shoulder to shoulder with the community in every circumstance.

Similarly, Udhampur Police provided food, water and other basic items to stranded people and ensured their safety till the road is restored. "Due to heavy rains and landslides, the highway remained closed, leaving many passengers and drivers stranded. "Field teams, including revenue officers, magistrates, police, and SDRF personnel, are actively monitoring water levels and assisting citizens to move to safer locations," he added.

Garg noted that while water levels had receded in some areas during the day, continuous rises have been observed at Sangam and Ram Munshi Bagh. Field teams are closely monitoring these locations to prevent any risk to life and property.

He further stated that more than 300 relief shelters have been identified across districts, equipped with blankets, ration materials, power and water supply to support people in need. Citizens relocating to higher grounds or relatives' homes are being guided by administration teams.

"Mughal Road restoration work is ongoing, essential supplies are being replenished, and our health systems remain fully functional," Garg said. He stressed that emergency help desk at the UT level and district-level Emergency Operation Centres are operational and residents can also contact the widely publicized emergency number 112 for assistance.

The Divisional Commissioner cautioned that while the overall situation is under control, extreme vigilance is required. "The next few hours will be critical. I urge all citizens to remain alert, cooperate with field teams, and follow district advisories throughout the night," he said. (KNO)

Incessant rains

Brengi Nallah has inundated several low-lying areas. The water entered important institutions, including the BDO office, Anantnag, Soutul-Awliya Darul Uloom, and Idhara Tehqiqat, many residential areas and offices, forcing closure of official and educational activities.

Farmers in the area fear large-scale devastation if the rains continue. "Paddy fields and orchards are under the water. If the water does not recede soon, the damage will be irreversible," said Ghulam Hassan, a farmer from Pulwama.

Similar situations were witnessed in south Kashmir's Kulgam, especially in Khudwani-Qaimoh, where water entered residential areas. Authorities said rescue teams, along with men and machinery, have been deployed at vulnerable points to strengthen embankments and restore connectivity.

At many places, including SIDCO Lassipora, the electricity line has suffered damage, due to which power supply has remained cut off to many areas, they said, adding that efforts are on to restore supply in the affected areas.

District officials confirmed that thousands of people have already been shifted to safer places in both Pulwama, Kulgam and Anantnag and even parts of Shopian.

The water level in most of the water bodies continues to rise, due to which there is fear among the people, while the administration is already on high alert. (KNO)

Moreover, departments such as SMC, KPDCL, PHE, Food & Civil Supplies, and R&B have also been roped in for smooth coordination.

Officials, as per KNO, said the initiative is a proactive safety measure aimed at minimizing risks and ensuring that Srinagar is fully equipped to respond swiftly in the event of floods or other emergencies. (KNO)

MHA team arrives

The visit comes in the wake of unprecedented rainfall across Jammu and Kashmir, which has caused extensive damage to property and infrastructure.

Since early August, over 150 people have lost their lives in rain-related incidents in the Union Territory, including a significant number of casualties among pilgrims. Rescue operations are ongoing in several districts.

On September 1, the Union Ministry of Home Affairs announced the formation of Inter-Ministerial Central Teams (IMCTs) to evaluate damage caused by heavy rains, flash floods, landslides, and cloudbursts in Jammu and Kashmir, Himachal Pradesh, Uttarakhand, and Punjab. Each team is led by an officer of Joint

Secretary rank from the MHA or the National Disaster Management Authority (NDMA) and includes members from the departments of expenditure, agriculture and farmers' welfare, Jal Shakti, power, road transport and highways, and rural development.

According to officials, the IMCTs will conduct field visits to affected districts, examine relief measures already implemented by state and Union Territory administrations, and prepare detailed assessments that will guide further central assistance.

The initiative follows a mechanism introduced by Home Minister Amit Shah in 2019, under which multi-ministerial teams are dispatched immediately after a major disaster, rather than waiting for detailed reports from the states. The officials said the IMCT's findings from Jammu and other affected states will form the basis for further central intervention, ensuring that resources are directed efficiently for relief, rehabilitation, and long-term mitigation efforts. India kills us with tariffs: Trump

Claims Delhi now offers 'no tariffs' to America

New York/Washington, Sept 03: India kills the US with tariffs and the country has now offered "no tariffs" to America, President Donald Trump has said, amid New Delhi's escalating tensions with Washington over his administration's policies on trade and tariffs.

They have tariffs against us. China, which kills us with tariffs. India kills us with tariffs. Brazil kills us" with tariffs, Trump said in a telephone interview with The Scott Jennings Radio Show on Tuesday.

Trump added that he understands tariffs better than other countries.

'I understood tariffs better than any human being in the world. And now with my tariffs, they were all dropping them. India was the most highly tariffed nation... And you know what, they've offered me no tariffs in India anymore. No tariffs," Trump said.

"If Î didn't have tariffs, they would never make that offer. They would never make that offer. So you have to have tariffs. We're going to be economically strong," he added.

With a federal appeals court ruling that most of Trump's tariffs imposed on countries



around the world are illegal, Trump said that the court case is sponsored by other nations because they're taking advantage of us.

"...they're not going to take advantage anymore," he added. Later, speaking at the White

House, Trump said that America gets along with India very well, but the relationship was one-sided for many years since Delhi was charging Washington "tremendous tariffs". "No, we get along with India very well," Trump said in response to a question on whether he is

considering taking away some

of the tariffs imposed on India. He said that for many years, the relationship between India and the US was "one-sided" and that changed when he assumed

"India was charging us tremendous tariffs, about the highest in the world," Trump said, adding that the US was therefore not doing much business with India.

"But they were doing business with us because we weren't charging them, foolishly, we weren't charging them," he said, adding that India was pouring its products into the US.

They'd send it in, pour it into our country. Therefore, it wouldn't be made here, which is a negative, but we would not send in anything because they were charging us 100 per cent

tariffs," Trump said. The US president cited the example of Harley Davidson motorcycles, saying the company couldn't sell into India because there was a 200 per cent tariff on a motorcycle.

"So what happens? Harley Davidson went to India and built a motorcycle plant, and now they don't have to pay tariffs, same thing as us," he said.

On Monday, Trump claimed that India has now "offered" to cut its tariffs to nothing, "but it's getting late", as he said that India buys most of its oil and military products from Russia and very little from the US.

The Trump administration has imposed 25 per cent reciprocal tariffs on India and an additional 25 per cent levies for Delhi's purchases of Russian oil, bringing the total duties imposed on India to 50 per cent, with effect

from August 27.
Prime Minister Narendra Modi has asserted he can't compromise on the interests of farmers, cattle-rearers, smallscale industries, cautioning "pressure on us may increase, but we will bear it".

India has called the tariffs imposed by the US "unjustified and unreasonable'

New Delhi said that, like any major economy, it will take all necessary measures to safeguard its national interests and economic security.

In 2024-25, the bilateral trade in goods between the two countries stood at USD 131.8 billion (USD 86.5 billion exports and USD 45.3 billion imports).

Speaking at an event recently in Delhi, External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar said India has certain "red lines" in its negotiations for a trade deal with the US and it will stand firm in protecting the interests of farmers and small producers.

Jaishankar also sounded critical of the US for targeting New Delhi's energy ties with Moscow and wondered why the same yardstick has not been applied to China and the European Union, the largest importer of Russian crude oil and Russian LNG, respectively.

BSF launches drone warfare school to train troops for future battles

New Delhi, Sept 03: The BSF, which guards India's borders with Pakistan and Bangladesh, is training special units of "drone commandos" and "drone warriors" for modern warfare involving remote-controlled aerial platforms, with plans to deploy them in missions such as Operation Sindoor.

A 'School of Drone Warfare' was inaugurated by Border Security Force (BSF) director general Daljit Singh Chawdhary at the officers' training academy of the force in Tekanpur, Madhya Pradesh, on Tuesday. PTI had reported in July that the about 2.65 lakh personnel strong force was raising its maiden "drone squadron" following the lessons learnt after Operation Sindoor. "The School of Drone Warfare will provide special training to the border guarding troops of the force in combating modern strategic challenges," a force spokesperson said.

"The institute will prepare drone commandos and drone warriors through five special courses that include unmanned aerial vehicle (UAV) operations, anti-drone warfare and surveillance and intelligence gathering,"

The school has simulators and

live drone flying zones, facilities for payload integration in the UAVs and night operations, tools for radio frequency (RF) jammers and kinetic interceptors, apart from linked hardware and Artificial Intelligence (AI) tools.

The BSF DG, after the inauguration of the school, addressed the trainee officers and spoke about the ongoing three-year-long Russia-Ukraine war, where drones have played an important role apart from some other battles and the strategic takeaways from Operation Sindoor conducted by India against Pakistan in response to the Pahalgam terrorist attack, a senior officer said.

Chawdhary also spoke about the role of AI and machine learning (ML) in combat, proactive and weaponised drone use for decisive outcomes, the importance of FPV (first person view related to remote piloting of Kamikaze drones) and strategic changes in national policies, the official said.

Eighteen BSF troops, during the Independence Day in August, were awarded gallantry medals for displaying "conspicuous bravery" and "unmatched valour" during Operation Sindoor. These included two personnel who were decorated with the military-issued Vir Chakra posthumously.

Pawan Khera's wife also has 2 voter IDs: BJP

Says Rahul can't extricate himself from 'criminality' in his ranks

New Delhi, Sept 03: The BJP on Wednesday alleged that Congress leader Pawan Khera's wife also has two active voter ID cards, and said party leader Rahul Gandhi cannot extricate himself from such "acts of criminality within his own ranks".

This comes a day after the ruling BJP alleged that Khera had two voter IDs and Gandhi was running a campaign against voter-roll revision in Bihar to "protect and hide" his party's theft of votes.

There was no immediate response from the Congress, Khera or his wife Kota Neelima, who is also a party leader in Telangana, to the BJP charge. "Kota Neelima, another Congress leader, candidate from the Khairatabad (60) Assembly segment in Telangana, and wife of Pawan Khera, also holds two active EPICs (Electors Photo Identity Cards) - one registered in Khairatabad (Assembly constituency in Telangana) and



another in New Delhi," BJP IT department head Amit Malviya said on X.

"It is now quite obvious that Congress leaders hold multiple EPIC numbers and are registered voters in more than one place. This is no

"Those indulging in 'Vote Chori' are the very ones maligning common citizens for exercising their democratic rights and weakening our institutions," he charged.



Pomegranates also promote better blood flow and good heart health, which benefits kidney function. So, include pomegranates in your diet regularly and have them as seeds or (unsweetened) juice.


