New Delhi, Oct 07: In a major relief initiative for farmers affected by recent floods and landslides in Jammu Kashmir, the Minister for Agriculture, Farmers' Welfare, and Rural Development, Shivraj Singh Chouhan, on Monday re-leased the 21st installment of the Pradhan Mantri Kisan Samman Nidhi (PM-KISAN) scheme in advance.

The installment, amounting to Rs 171 crore, according to the news agency—Kashmir News Observer (KNO), was transferred directly to the bank accounts of 8.55 lakh farmers, including 85,418 women beneficiaries, through the Direct Benefit Transfer (DBT) system. MoP allocates over 870 MW winter power for J&K, Ladakh

Srinagar, Oct 07: With the onset of winters, Ministry of Power (MoP) has allocated over 870 Megawatts (MWs) of power for Jammu and Kashmir and Ladakh from the from unallocated quota of Central Generating Stations (CGSs) of northern region.

The official documents reveal that the MoP has ordered the concerned authorities to execute the share of 44 percent (877.42 MWs) un-allocated quota of CGS's to Jammu and Kashmir and Ladakh with effect from October-01.

New Delhi, Oct 07: President Droupadi Murmu on Tuesday said Operation Sindoor dem-onstrated the Indian Armed Forces' coordinated strength and strategic planning by dismantling terrorist infrastructure across the LoC, which she termed as India's consistent balance between peace and war preparedness.

According to the news agency-Kashmir News Observer (KNO), the President was addressing the faculty and course members of the 65th National Defence College Course at

Rashtrapati Bhavan. Referring to the cross-border operation launched in response to the Pahalgam terror attack, Murmu said that a tri-service response was executed in a calibrated manner.

"This operation resulted in the dismantling of terror infrastructure across the Line of Control and further beyond, and showed the impact of working together across military branches," she said, adding that this level of coordination was made possible due to structural changes in defence administration.

The President referred to the creation of the Department of Military Affairs and the appointment of the Chief of Defence Staff as its Secretary as part of the process. The ongoing formation of Integrated Theatre Commands and Integrated Battle Groups, she said, is part of a restructuring plan.

Untimely snowfall: Govt begins crop damage assessment

Growers advised to ensure orchard drainage, avoid packing wet produce

Srinagar, Oct 07: The Horticulture Department, Kashmir, has begun assessing the extent of crop damage following the untimely snowfall and rains that lashed several parts of the Valley over the past few days, officials said on Tuesday.

Deputy Director Horticulture, Kashmir, Javid Ahmad Bhat, told the news agency-Kashmir Observer (KNO) that field officers have been directed to carry out detailed surveys in their respective areas to evaluate the losses suffered by fruit growers, particularly apple cultivators, as harvesting season is still underway in many regions.

"Assessment of crop damages, if any, is currently underway across various districts of Kashmir. Our officers have been instructed to visit affected orchards and compile detailed reports. We are taking every possible measure to ensure accurate estimation of losses," Bhat said.

He said that an advisory had already been issued to orchardists ahead of the recent weather forecast, urging them to pick their fruit before the expected rain and snow to minimise losses. "However, in many areas, apples were still hanging on trees | More on P6

Alarming rise in suicides in J&K; unemployment, family distress major causes

Srinagar, Oct 07: Jammu and Kashmir has witnessed a worrying increase in suicides, recording a 13 per cent rise in one year, according to the latest report from the National

Crime Records Bureau (NCRB). The report, accessed by the news agency-Kashmir News Observer (KNO), reveals that 365 people ended their lives in 2023 compared to 323 in 2022. The data paints a grim picture of social and economic distress in the region, with unemployment emerging as the single

The NCRB report shows that 178 unemployed individuals took their own lives in 2023. which accounts for 48 per cent of all suicides reported that year. Of these, 114 were men and 73 were women. In 2022, the figure was 84, including 58 men and 26 women. This indicates that the number of unemployed people taking their lives has more than doubled

within a year. The data also shows that men are facing greater pressure from joblessness, resulting in a higher suicide rate

Family problems were the second most common reason for suicide, causing 60 deaths in 2023. This includes 34 men and 26 women. Illness was another major factor, leading to 46 suicides, of which 29 were men. Mental health issues also saw a sharp increase, with 37 people taking their lives in 2023 compared to 19 in 2022. Of these, 26 were men.

The report also highlights a growing trend of suicides linked to love affairs. In 2023, people, including 22 men and 18 women, died by



suicide due to failed relationships or emotional distress. In and eight women. This repre-2022, only 15 such cases were

recorded, including seven men

Financial distress continues to be a major contributor. Among the victims, 241 people had annual incomes below one lakh rupees. This included 120 men and 121 women. Another 108 people with incomes between one lakh and five lakh rupees also died by suicide, including 78 men and 30 women. These figures indicate that financial hardship cuts across income levels and remains a

major cause of despair. The NCRB report further reveals that hanging remains the most common method of

suicide, with 174 cases recorded in 2023. The second most frequent method was the consumption of poison, accounting for 120 deaths. The data also mentions the use of sleeping pills and other toxic substances in several cases.

According to experts, men tend to use more fatal methods when attempting suicide, which explains the higher rate of completed suicides among them. Women, on the other hand, attempt suicide more often but are less likely to succeed, they said.

CS reviews functioning of Mining Deptt Stresses on strict enforcement through IMSS

SRINAGAR, OCTOBER 7: Chief Secretary, Atal Dulloo Tuesday chaired a comprehensive review of the functioning of the Mining Department, with a special focus on the implementation and performance of the Integrated Mining Surveillance System (IMSS), a technology-driven platform designed for real-time monitoring of mining operations across Jammu and Kashmir.

The meeting was attended by Principal Secretary, Mining; Chairperson, Pollution Control Committee; Director, Geology & Mining, and other senior officers of the concerned departments.

During the meeting, the Chief Secretary emphasized the importance of leveraging the IMSS for ensuring transparency and curbing illegal mining activities across the UT.

He directed that every trigger or alert generated through the system must be followed up with concrete action on the ground. He stressed on fixing accountability in each case and taking strict legal action against delinquent officers or violators.

He further instructed that Deputy Commissioners be given access to the IMSS



platform to enable them to take prompt and effective action against illegal mining activities within their jurisdictions. He also called upon the Mining Department to regularly monitor field-level responses and furnish periodic performance briefs to his office regarding the outcomes achieved. The Chief Secretary commended the BISAG-N team for developing the IMSS and appreciated the live demonstration presented during the meeting, which showcased the system's capability to detect, locate, and address instances of illegal

mining with high precision. Reviewing the progress on identification and auction of mineral blocks, the Chief Secretary urged the Pollution Control Committee to provide a comprehensive checklist of clearances and requirements

so that all necessary formalities can be completed in one go, rather than in piecemeal fashion, which often causes

unnecessary delays. The meeting also took stock of the exploration and operationalization of both major and minor mineral blocks in J&K. The Chief Secretary underscored the need to expedite the process to enhance revenue generation. He also reviewed the progress of biogas exploration projects being undertaken in collaboration with ONGC across various parts of J&K.

Presenting an overview of departmental performance. Principal Secretary, Mining, Anil Kumar Singh, informed that so far 114 triggers have been generated through the IMSS, providing geo-spatial coordinates and satellite imagery of suspected illegal

mining sites. Of these, 29 triggers were physically verified by field officers, confirming unauthorized mining activities at 16 locations.

He further apprised that all such alerts are simultaneously shared with the Deputy Commissioners (DCs), Senior Superintendents of Police (SSPs), and District Mineral Officers (DMOs) concerned for immediate verification and action. The IMSS portal, he added, is being integrated with the e-Challan and e-Market platforms to improve its operational efficiency. In addition, the department is working to enhance the system with web-based vehicle tracking and on-spot e-challaning capabilities to further strengthen monitoring and enforcement mechanisms.

On the operational front, the meeting was informed that J&K currently has 48 limestone blocks and 235 minor mineral blocks, out of which 207 have been leased out and 98 are operational. with an expected revenue realization of about Rs220 Cr.

It was further revealed that 79 blocks are awaiting Environmental Clearance (EC), while 30 are at the Consent to Operate (CTO) stage.

Apple growers squeezed by logistic challenges, low demand

Srinagar, Oct 07: The sluggish demand for apples has resulted in the early filling of cold storage units across Kashmir, with growers lamenting that they are facing one of the toughest seasons in years due to weak market response, logistical challenges, and unseasonal fruit drop.

Growers said that with low demand for apples across major markets in India, they were forced to store their produce early. However, within just 15 days, most cold storage units in South and North Kashmir have reached nearly full capacity — well before the region's traditional peak season.

"Usually, cold storages start filling in October and it was ending in November as well and peak was remaining around 20 October bwhen the harvest reaches its peak, but this year everything happened early," said Ghulam Nabi Dar, an apple grower from Shopian. "Due to heavy fruit fall and poor demand, people started picking apples in advance to save what



they could. But the highway closure for almost a month made things worse — our fruit couldn't reach outside markets, and demand dropped sharply."

According to growers, the closure of the Jammu-Srinagar National Highway during crucial days of transportation not only delayed shipments but also discouraged traders from placing new orders. Many orchardists, fearing losses, rushed to book cold storage units in September itself much earlier than usual and even hundreds of growers didn't get any space.

Bookings were full even before the season started," said Abdul Rashid Bhat, a grower from Kulgam. "We had no choice but to store our produce, but the rush was unimaginable. Our apples remained in vehicles for more than 24 hours waiting to be unloaded at storage units." Cold storage owners admitted that they were overwhelmed by the unprecedented rush this year. "We tried to accommodate as many growers as possible, even by optimizing space and adjusting batch timings," said Manzoor Ahmad, owner of a cold storage unit in

Lassipora, Pulwama. "But we cannot go beyond our capacity — if we overload, the temperature control system will fail and it could damage the stored produce." He added that as of now, over 90 percent of cold storage space in the Valley has already been occupied, and the remaining will likely be filled within the next two to three days. Industry observers said that early filling of cold storages indicates a worrying trend for the apple economy of Kashmir, which has already been hit by falling prices and rising transportation and packaging costs.

"Farmers who haven't got any space are forced to sell apples at throwaway prices as they can't wait more in the hope of a better market," said Bashir Ahmad another

"The government must step in to stabilize the situation by facilitating market linkages and ensuring smooth transport on the highway.

"Apple is our backbone," "If this continues, thousands of families depending on this industry will be pushed to financial distress."

2 key Pulwama bridges in limbo

Pulwama, Oct 07: Eighteen years after their foundation stones were laid, two vital bridges over the Jhelum River—Dogripora and Reshipora in South Kashmir's Pulwama district remain incomplete, leaving residents of over a dozen villages cut off and frustrated.

The Dogripora Bridge was sanctioned in 2006 and work began in 2008, while the Reshipora Bridge was taken up soon after. However, despite the passage of nearly two decades and multiple assurances from successive governments, both projects remain stuck midway, primarily due to lack of funds and delayed administrative approvals.

Every day, hundreds of locals including schoolchildren are forced to cross the river on risky wooden boats, a daily ordeal that becomes especially dangerous during rains or snow.

Locals fear that a tragedy similar to the Gandbal boat capsize incident could unfold anytime if immediate action is not taken.

Shahid Ahmad, a resident of Dogripora, said that the incomplete bridge has made life miserable for residents of several adjoining villages.

"Many people have been injured while crossing the river. These bridges are lifelines that connect our villages to the national highway and the Panzgam Railway Station," he said. "Once completed, the Dogripora Bridge would drastically reduce travel time between Tral and



Shahoora and bring economic activity to the area.

In Reshipora, villagers said they are compelled to take long detours of nearly 10 kilometres to reach the highway — a distance that would be just 500 metres if the bridge were operational. "It's not just inconvenience but daily suffering. During medical emergencies or bad weather, we feel completely cut off from the world," said Zameer Ahmad, a local from Reshipora.

He added that the absence of public transport in the area worsens the situation. "Children and elderly people take huge risks while crossing the river. We have been pleading for years, but nobody seems to care.

In May this year, the government sanctioned Rs 1529.47 lakh for the completion of

the Dogripora bridge, raising hopes among residents. However, despite the fresh approval, no physical work has resumed so far, leading to growing resentment among locals. "The bridge's foundation was laid during the PDP-Congress regime, and JKPCC started work in 2008. About 70 percent of the structure was completed before work stopped abruptly. Since then, it stands like a monument of broken promises," said Shabir Ahmad Lone, a resident of Dogripora.

A senior official told KNO that both bridges are partially completed and work has been temporarily halted due to lack of funds. "The projects have not been abandoned. Revised Detailed Project Report (DPR) for the remaining work for Rs 1383.01 lakh for Reshipora has been prepared and are under process for revised administrative approval," the official said.

He added that the tendering process will begin once the approval is granted. "We understand the public concern, and efforts are on to restart the work as soon as possible," he said.

Meanwhile, the residents have renewed their appeal to the administration to prioritize completion of these long-pending bridges, which they say will transform healthcare access, education, and economic activity in the region.

"We have waited for 18 years. Our patience is wearing thin. The government must treat these bridges as essential projects, not forgotten files," they

Leprosy In India: The Road To A Disease-Free Future

eprosy, or Hansen's disease, is a chronic infectious disease caused by bacteria Mycobacterium leprae. Infection can lead to involvement of the nerves, respiratory tract, skin, and eyes. Symptoms include discoloured skin patches, lack of ability to feel touch, pressure, pain, heat and cold, muscle weakness, non-healing ulcers, deformities particularly in hands, feet and face and inability to close eyes and poor vision. Leprosy is transmitted through droplets from the nose and mouth during close and frequent contact with untreated cases. The disease is feared because it can lead to deformity; this is also the cause of the social stigma traditionally attached to the disease. Leprosy can be multibacillary or paucibacillary. While multibacillary leprosy shows a high density of bacilli on slit-skin smear examination, paucibacillary leprosy cases show only a few or no bacilli on slit-skin smear examination. The introduction of Multidrug Therapy (MDT) in 1983 in India revolutionized treatment of leprosy. MDT treatment has been provided free of cost to patients through WHO. Early diagnosis and treatment with MDT can prevent disabilities and deformities. Since the introduction of MDT, the incidence and prevalence of the disease has remarkably decreased. (World Health Organization [WHO], 2024).

The Situation in India Since Independence Decennial population census of 1951 reported 13,74,000 and a prevalence rate of 38.1 per 10,000 population. GOI recognized leprosy as a national health problem, and launched the National Leprosy Control Program in 1954-55. The program gained momentum during the Fourth Five Year Plan period (1969-1974) after it was made a centrally sponsored program, thus receiving the necessary priority and funding. The program was expanded to cover additional populations in rural and urban areas at this time. To achieve this increased coverage, the involvement of NGOs was strengthened, and health education programs became a prominent component of the leprosy program. The government also encouraged the involvement of NGOs in SET (Survey Education and Treatment) activities in allotted areas through a scheme introduced in 1983. SET centers were set up in moderate/low endemic areas and urban leprosy centers in urban areas. These centers were staffed with one paramedical worker for a population of 25,000 called a sector, and there was one non-medical supervisor for every five paramedical workers. The paramedical worker conducted a house-to-house search for leprosy patients, "surveying" the entire population in a cycle of two years. Diagnosis followed cumbersome slit smear techniques, with treatment of confirmed cases lasting between 10 years and lifelong treatment.

The leprosy program provided free domiciliary treatment in endemic districts through specially trained staff in fixed leprosy control units; and in moderate to low endemic districts, through mobile leprosy treatment units. Cases were treated at monthly leprosy clinics held at a fixed point in the village. This led to improved compliance and provided an opportunity for counselling each patient. Patients were encouraged to come to the clinics with their families, and this helped address the issue of stigma. Educating communities to recognize the early signs and symptoms of leprosy was an integral part of the house-to-house visits made as part of SET activities. This was probably the origin of IEC in the program. India's national leprosy control efforts began in 1955 with the National Leprosy Control Programme (NLCP) which was a vertical programme and relied on dapsone monotherapy as The monotherapy with Dapsone was started as domiciliary treatment for leprosy cases.

In 1982, the definitive cure for leprosy with Multi Drug Therapy (MDT) containing this bactericidal drug Rifampicin and bacteriostatic drug clofazimine besides dapsone was endorsed by WHO as the standard leprosy treatment regimen. In 1983 the introduction of MDT regimens marked the beginning of the National Leprosy Eradication Programme

Reflecting Mahatma Gandhi's commitment to those affected by leprosy, India's public health efforts have focused not just on treatment but also on mainstreaming affected individuals into society. Early detection and free treatment are core strategies, as delayed care can cause permanent disability.

Efforts Toward Elimination

The NLEP is a centrally sponsored scheme under the National Health Mission (NHM). Funds are allocated to states and UTs based on state/UT specific Programme Implementation Plans, with a focus on local needs, priorities, and capacity. Introduction of MDT, strong political commitment, decentralized implementation, and a robust Information. Education, and Communication (IEC) strategy brought about tremendous success in leprosy control. In 1981 the leprosy prevalence rate that was 57.2 /10,000 was reduced to 44.8 by March 1984 and to 2.4 per 10,000 population by March 2004. The rate of Grade II deformity (visible deformities) among new patients in 1981 was 20 percent; and by 2004, it was only 1.5 percent.

The World Bank's support through two projects (1993-2000 and 2001-2004) emphasized community participation and funded IEC innovations. Partnerships with NGOs, WHO, Danida, and media agencies like BBC WST and SOMAC: Lintas enhanced outreach and message quality. Special focus was placed on women, tribal populations, and urban poor, addressing barriers to access and stigma. Integration with the general health system expanded reach, with Auxiliary Nurse Midwives (ANMs) and Anganwadi Workers (AWWs) playing key roles.

In March 2004, 17 states and 250 districts had achieved the goal of leprosy elimination (defined as a prevalence rate of less than one per 10,000 population) and 7 states were close to the goal. With determined campaigns to search for early leprosy cases, there has been a drastic reduction in the number of cases exhibiting these forms of the disease. The goal of bringing the deformity rate down to less than 2 percent by the end of the current World Bank supported project (2001-04) had been achieved. India as a whole achieved the goal of national elimination of leprosy by December 2005. India's leprosy response under NLEP includes:

Free diagnosis, treatment with MDT all patients and post exposure prophylaxis (PEP) with single dose rifampicin (SDR) provided to healthy contacts of patients under NLEP. Triple drug for both Pauci (PB) and Multibacillary (MB) patients introduced in 2025.

Early Case Detection Campaigns-(i) Leprosy Case Detection Campaign (LCDC): Door-to-door surveys, especially in high-en-Targeted survey in villages and urban areas where a case of grade II disability or child case detected (iii) Special Plan for Hard-to-Reach areas and High-risk population (iv) Healthy Contact Examination of newly detected cases (v) Retrospective Contact Tracing and Examination for new cases detected in at least last five years (vi) ABSULE for low endemic area.

Prevention, Rehabilitation (DPMR) and Welfare Support: Services include patient education and counselling for providing Micro Cellular Rubber (MCR) footwear, Self Care Kits, aids and appliances such as splints, crutches etc., effective management of ulcers and leprosy reactions, and reconstructive surgeries with compensa-

tion for loss of wages of 12,000.

Capacity Building: Training of service providers -medical officers, laboratory techniians, physiotherapists, health supervisors, health workers and Accredited Social Health Activists (ASHAs).

Community Awareness to promote voluntary reporting and stop stigma and discrimination: Sparsh leprosy awareness campaign around Anti-Leprosy Day and IEC as part of LCDC campaign are carried out annually to reduce stigma and promote early diagnosis.

Abolishing Discriminatory Laws: NLEP is encouraging States and UTs towards abolishing all existing discriminatory laws against

Enhanced Surveillance and Notification of

(i) Leprosy notification by all health sectors introduced in 2025 - Government, Private, NGOs, medical colleges etc.

(ii) ASHA-Based Surveillance for Leprosy Suspects (ABSULS) has strengthened case finding at the grassroots level.

Digitalization of reporting systems-Digital reporting system Nikusth 2.0 introduced in 2023 for patient records and drug stock

Since 2015, constant efforts under NLEP have contributed to significant prevention of disability through early intervention and expanded surveillance mechanisms.

National Strategic Plan (NSP) and Roadmap for Leprosy 2023-2027

NLEP embarked upon developing a new strategy document to accelerate the efforts towards leprosy control and overcome the impact of the Covid pandemic. This Strategy is aligned with the Global Leprosy Strategy 2021-2030 and the WHO Roadmap for Neglected Tropical Diseases 2021-2030, aiming to achieve interruption of transmission of leprosy by 2030. The Strategy focuses on interruption of transmission and achieving zero indigenous cases by accelerating case detection activities in high endemic districts and sustaining a strong surveillance system in low endemic districts.

Strategies to be adopted are: (i) acceleration of new case detection by targeted approach; (ii) Intensified surveillance systems; iii) digitalization; (iv) introduction of advanced tools and techniques for early diagnosis; (v) provide the immediate chemoprophylaxis to all contacts of cases forthwith; (vi) introduce a potential safe and effective vaccine; (vii) introduction of surveillance of anti-microbial resistance and adverse drug reactions; (viii)post treatment surveillance of treated cases and provide them care after cure; (ix)sustain leprosy expertise and move towards multi-disease service integration; (x) improved treatment outcomes by introduction of new treatment regimes; and (xi) widespread awareness with impactful behavioural change communication methods.

In addition, strengthening existing partnerships, adding more partners and repealing the existing discriminatory laws against leprosy is also required. The implementation of the National Strategic Plan and Roadmap for Leprosy 2023- 2027 for leprosy aims to achieve interruption of transmission at district level evidenced by zero occurrence of new child cases for at least five consecutive years. After achieving interruption of transmission, districts shall move on to achieve elimination of leprosy as a disease with zero new cases reported for at least three consecutive years. A follow up of those districts will be done side by side for verification.

A "whole-of-government" and "whole-ofsociety" approach, along with digital surveillance tools, and strong institutional memory, are being employed for meeting the target. Major Initiatives under NLEP

National Strategic Plan and Roadmap for Leprosy 2023-27: The strategy document and roadman outline the strategic and lay out a clear-cut roadmap to achieve the goal of interruption in transmission of leprosy by 2027.

Contact tracing is done and Post Exposure Prophylaxis (PEP) is administered to the eligible contacts of index case in order to interrupt the chain of transmission.

Leprosy screening has been integrated with the activities of comprehensive primary health care under Ayushman Bharat Yojana for screening of people above 30 years of age.

Leprosy screening has been integrated with Rashtriya Bal Swasthya Karyakram (RBSK) and Rashtriya Kishore Swasthya Karyakram (RKSK) for screening of children (0-18 years).

Various services are being provided under the programme for Disability Prevention and Medical Rehabilitation (DPMR) i.e., reaction management, provision of Microcellular Rubber (MCR) footwear, Aids & Appliances,

Nikusth 2.0: A revamped web-based ICT portal for data recording, reporting, and monitoring of leprosy activities for further strengthening services related to diagnosis, treatment, and follow-up of leprosy patients was launched on 30th January 2023 (National Anti-Leprosy Day) by Hon'ble Union Health Minister.

Anti-Microbial Resistance National Surveillance for Leprosy Guidelines were launched during National Anti-Leprosy Day 2023 for strengthening the surveillance of resistant leprosy cases.

National Framework for Integration of Mental Health Services for Leprosy patients and their families.

Revised classification of Leprosy & treatment regimen for PB & MB Cases in India as adopted by MoHFW, GOI is introduced by Central Leprosy Division on 17th January 2024 & shall be implemented in all States/UTs from 1st April 2025. This treatment Regimen for leprosy patients will mark significant step forward in our collective efforts to eradicate leprosy in India by 2027.

Implementation of tagging system for PVTGs within Nikusth 2.0 Portal for total of 17 states, as listed in Tribal Cell, which have been identified as having Particularly Vulnerable Tribal Groups (PVTGs) within their states under PM-JANMAN.

Issued directions from Ministry to all states and UTs on Notification of Leprosy.

Special monitoring framework for 121 Districts having Prevalence rate more than 1 per 10,000 population

Focused strategies for Districts having PR >1, High child and Disabilities.

Key Achievements and Program Outcomes

under NLEP India achieved elimination status in March 2005 at the national level which means Prevalence Rate<1/10,000 population and sustained this till date. Since then, the programme is working towards achieving this goal at the sub national level.

As of March 2025, 31 States and 638 districts have achieved Prevalence Rate <1 per 10,000 population.

Over the years, India's leprosy prevalence rate has reduced from 57.2 per 10,000 in 1981 and 0.69 per 10,000 in 2014-15 to 0.57 in

The new case detection rate has also dropped from 9.73 per 100,000 in 2014–15 to 7.0 per 100,000 in 2024–25.

Percentage of Child cases among new cases detected has gradually reduced from 9.04% in 2014-15 to 4.68% in 2024-25 indicating the programme efforts in reducing active transmission of leprosy in the community.

Grade 2 disability per million population has also shown a decline from 4.68 case per million population in 2014-15 to 1.88 cases in 2024-25 reflecting case finding efforts among potential hidden cases.

Preventive measure of Post Exposure Prophylaxis with single dose rifampicin (PEP-SDR) is administered to healthy contacts of leprosy cases. The percentage of eligible contacts administered has also increased from 71% in 2019-20 to 92% in 2024-25 in order to interrupt the chain of transmission.

Intensified case search activities like LCDC have been conducted two times a year in high endemic states to facilitate identification of cases at an early stage. In F.Y. 2024-25, a total of 27,428 new cases were confirmed through LCDC.

Enhanced integration with Rashtriya Bal Swasthya Karyakram (RBSK), Rashtriya Kishor Swasthya Karyakram (RKSK), and Ayushman Bharat ensures screening across all age groups.

State-wise NLEP Prevalence Rates 10000 population as on March 2025

As of March 2025, the state-wise NLEP prevalence rates per 10,000 population vary across India. Andhra Pradesh has a prevalence rate of 0.46, while Nagaland has a lower rate of 0.11. Arunachal Pradesh reports a rate of 0.15, and Odisha's rate is higher at 1.37. Assam has a prevalence rate of 0.26, Punjab is at 0.14, and Bihar has a rate of 0.85. Chhattisgarh shows a higher prevalence at 1.80, whereas Sikkim's rate is 0.17. Goa has a prevalence rate of 0.45, Tamil Nadu reports 0.26, and Gujarat has 0.38. Telangana's prevalence is 0.46, Haryana's is 0.13, and Tripura's is notably low at 0.02. Himachal Pradesh has a rate of 0.14, Uttar Pradesh 0.37, and Jharkhand stands at 1.46. Uttarakhand reports a prevalence of 0.22, Jammu & Kashmir 0.07, and West Bengal 0.46. Karnataka has a rate of 0.27, while the A & N Islands are at 0.19. Kerala's prevalence is 0.11, Chandigarh has a significantly higher rate of 1.35, Madhya Pradesh reports 0.82, and Daman and Diu & Dadar Nagar Haveli (DD & DNH) have a rate of 0.63. Maharashtra's prevalence rate is 1.12, Delhi reports 0.71, and Manipur has a very low rate of 0.05. Lakshadweep's rate is 0.14, Meghalaya's is 0.03, Ladakh's is 0.33, Mizoram's is 0.10, and Puducherry's is 0.11.

International Recognition & Partnerships India has collaborated with WHO for supply of free MDT drugs, technical support, independent programme evaluation, capacity building and programme monitoring and supervision. In the World Health Assembly Commitment (1991), India committed to the World Health Assembly's goal of eliminating leprosy as a public health problem by the year 2000. Although the national goal was extended to 2005, India made significant progress, with 17 states and 250 districts achieving elimination by 2004.

WHO supported India's Modified Leprosy Elimination Campaigns (MLECs), diagnostic protocol shifts, and Special Action Projects for hard-to-reach populations. It also piloted the COMBI (Communication for Behavioural Impact) strategy in Bihar.

India has actively participated in developing Global Leprosy Strategies and global technical guidance documents. India has been part of the The Global Appeal since 2006 sharing an annual message to raise awareness and call for an end to the unjust discrimination that persons affected by leprosy continue to face. In the WHO India Country Co-operation Strategy under the umbrella of NTD control and elimination, leprosy remains a priority area for WHO's technical support in India. This includes strengthening surveillance and case detection, supporting postexposure prophylaxis (PEP), reducing stigma and discrimination and enhancing access to treatment and rehabilitation. In the Weekly Epidemiological Report of Global leprosy situation, 2006, India was dropped from the list of countries that had not achieved elimination of leprosy as a public health problem.

In 2023, the World Health Organization (WHO) acknowledged India's 2005 milestone of eliminating leprosy as a public health problem, underscoring the country's progress in disease control. Additionally, ndia continues to collaborate actively with global partners, including the WHO, the International Federation of Anti-Leprosy Associations (ILEP), and various non-governmental organizations (NGOs), which offer both technical expertise and financial assistance to strengthen India's leprosy elimination initiatives. ILEP and other partner NGOs: NLEP has also collaborated with ILEP organizations, Sasakawa Health Foundation, The World Bank, Global Partnership for Zero Leprosy (GPZL), Hind Kushth Nivaran Sangh and other NGO partners such as ALERT India, IAL, IADVL, BLP, Schieffelin Institute Karigiri, International Leprosy Union etc. in improving community awareness and quality diagnostic, therapeutic and rehabilitative services. India's efforts in combating leprosy have received significant international recognition and support.

Conclusion

India's journey with leprosy control is a remarkable story of successful disease control. From a prevalence rate of 57.2 per 10,000 population and 39.19 lakh patients on treatment, India in 2025 has a prevalence rate of 0.57 and 0.82 lakh patients on treatment. This depicts a drop in prevalence rate of 99% and 98% drop in cases under treatment over a span of 44 years. There has been a decline of 37% in new case detection since March 2006 when the annual report confirmed a prevalence rate of less than 1 per 10,000 (0

NLEP Programme demonstrates a public health success rooted in political will, commitment, sustained efforts for new case detection, free of cost and uninterrupted supply of MDT drugs, partner support, transition from a vertical to integrated service delivery strategy, timely adoption of global guidance, timely introduction of revised treatment regimens, post exposure prophylaxis, innovations, and expanding community engagement. However, elimination as a public health problem is not eradication. New cases of leprosy will continue to occur and the aim is to detect cases so early that development of disabilities is prevented and chain of transmission is interrupted leading to no new infections and no leprosy in children.

Recognizing this, the Government has been proactively addressing residual challenges through sustained surveillance, renewed awareness initiatives, and enhanced community outreach. Efforts are underway to revitalize training programs and improve early detection, especially in rural, tribal and underserved populations, ensuring that no case goes unreported or untreated.

With ongoing efforts to strengthen surveillance systems, expand community engagement, and integrate leprosy care into general health services, India is reinforcing its commitment to a leprosy-free future. Technological tools like Nikusth 2.0, combined with strong policy support, post exposure prophylaxis and increased community participation and self-reporting. NSP and Roadmap for Leprosy provides a comprehensive framework aligned with global goals to achieve interruption of transmission by 2030 through accelerated case detection, digital surveillance, improved treatment, preventive strategies, and strong partnerships, aiming ultimately for elimination of leprosy in India. As India approaches its goal of zero transmission, continued political will, adequate funding, and active public involvement will be key. With these in place, the country is well-positioned to achieve not just a medical milestone but a lasting humanitarian achievement.

Chief Secy for fast-tracking modernization of transport sector

Srinagar, Oct 07: Chief Secretary Atal Dulloo on Tuesday chaired a high-level review meeting of the Transport Department to assess its overall functioning, modernization initiatives, and measures aimed at enhancing road safety across Jammu and Kashmir.

The meeting was attended by Secretary, Transport Department, Transport Lavasa; Commissioner; Managing Director, J&K RTC; Director, Motor Garages; RTOs of Kashmir and Jammu, besides other senior officers of the department.

During the meeting, the Chief Secretary laid strong empha-sis on the early completion and operationalization of key infrastructure projects, including the Institute of Driver Training & Research (IDTR), Jammu, and the Inspection & Certification Centre (ICC), Samba, terming them as critical to modernizing transport services in the Union Territory.

He directed all implementing agencies to ensure missionmode execution and time-bound completion of projects so as to improve public service delivery and efficiency.

Underscoring road safety as one of the department's top priorities, the Chief Secretary called for a comprehensive action plan to curb traffic violations and reduce road accidents. He reviewed enforcement measures such as



the cancellation of driving licences and Registration Certificates (RCs) and the seizure of vehicles belonging to repeat offenders.

He also took stock of the incidence of road accidents, fatalities, and the relief extended to victims under the Road Safety Fund, besides reviewing the pace of dispatch of driving licences to applicants, including clearance of pending backlogs.

Presenting a detailed overview of the department's initiatives, Secretary, Transport Department, Avny Lavasa, gave a comprehensive briefing on key projects and strategic reforms aimed at transforming J&K's transport infrastructure and governance.

It was informed that two major facilities like IDTR, Jammu and ICC, Samba are nearing completion. The IDTR has completed its academic, hostel, and workshop blocks along with all six state-of-the-art driving tracks. Maruti Suzuki India Limited has installed all automation equipment, and driving licence trials commenced on January 14, 2025, with overall completion expected by October 30, 2025.

At ICC, Samba, civil and electrical works have been completed, while the inspection report from ICAD is expected by October 15, 2025. The Ministry of Road Transport & Highways (MoRTH) is in the process of tendering for the appointment of an operator for a two-year term, the meeting was informed.

It was further apprised that the work on two Automated Testing Stations (ATS) through J&K RTC is expected to commence by October 15, while a privately developed ATS is awaiting official notification.

As part of the department's technology-driven reforms, a Detailed Project Report (DPR) has identified 92 locations across highways for the installation of electronic enforcement devices. The DPR will be forwarded to the IT Department for vetting by October 15, with tenders expected to be floated by November 10.

On the Vehicle Scrapping Policy, it was revealed that Scrapping Facility Policy is in its final stage of formulation. Once notified, it will operationalize a

10 crore incentive fund on a First-Come, First-Served basis, facilitating the scrapping of around 3,500 government vehicles, potentially generating 170 crore in incentives within the government transport sector alone.

Reviewing the efforts to revive Inland Waterways (NW-49) on the River Jhelum, the Chief Secretary directed the department to adhere to firm timelines. Work on seven floating concrete jetties is scheduled to commence by October 15, 2025, while the installation of navigational aids and onshore development are to begin by October 31, with overall completion targeted for December 2025.

It was further given out that the department is going to float a Request for Proposal (RFP) for a Public-Private Partnership (PPP) model to operate a 20-passenger hybrid electric cruise/boat on a revenue-sharing basis with the government, as part of its broader initiative to promote sustainable mobility and tourism.

The meeting also reviewed progress on SRTC digitization and revenue enhancement, where the Corporation is projecting a sharp rise in gross revenue from 114 crore (2021-2024) to an estimated 240 crore for FY 2024-25, following fleet expansion and service upgrades.

The official further advised growers to exercise caution while resuming harvesting. "They should wait for weather improvement and allow the fruit and trees to dry properly. Packing wet apples can lead to spoilage during storage or transportation, resulting in economic losses," he

Highlighting the importance of orchard management after rains, Bhat said growers must ensure proper drainage in their fields to prevent water stagnation, which can harm trees and lead to disease outbreaks. "Standing water can cause root rot and other fungal infections. Farmers must keep their drainage channels clear to avoid such problems," he advised.

He also said that the department has been raising awareness among farmers about postsnowfall precautions and providing them with technical guidance to reduce potential losses. 'Our focus is on helping them recover from the impact of this unseasonal weather and safeguard the remaining crop," Bhat added.

The untimely snowfall occurred at a critical time when apple harvesting was in full swing, has left growers worried across parts of Shopian, Pulwama, and Kupwara, wher were yet to be fully picked.

Meanwhile, officials assured that comprehensive loss reports will be shared with the administration soon to facilitate appropriate measures for affected growers. (KNO)

NIA chargesheets

Simranjit Singh, Australia-based Tanveer Singh Bedi and Ankush Kapoor, other accused persons named in the chargesheet are Pakistani national Tariq @ Bhaijaan, Gagandeep Singh Arora and three other accused persons-Tamanna Gupta, Sukhbir Singh @ Happy and Anwar Masiĥ," the spokesman said, adding, 'The case relates to smuggling of 500 kilograms of heroin from Pakistan into Gujarat via the sea route and further transportation to Punjab. The proceeds from the sale of the drugs were used to fund the activities of LeT, the proscribed terrorist

organization." 'NIA's investigations have revealed that the narco-terror conspiracy was spread across many Indian states, including Gujarat, Delhi, Punjab and Chandigarh, with a footprint spanning several countries including Italy, Australia, UAE,

Pakistan, Iran and Thailand," he said. "As per the investigations, Ankush Kapoor was a key mastermind in India and responsible for managing the on-ground activities of the narcoterror syndicate in Punjab. He coordinated logistics, storage and local distribution of the contraband, and actively facilitated funding to accused persons based both in India and abroad. Simranjit was the mastermind of the narco terror syndicate and responsible for organizing the illegal transportation, storage, processing of the illegal drug's and the terror funding," the spokesman added.

"The investigations further revealed that Tariq @ Bhaijaan played a pivotal role in coordinating the smuggling of heroin through sea route from Pakistan to India, overseeing its transportation, facilitating its distribution in Punjab, and channelising the proceeds for financing LeT operatives.

Tanveer Bedi, the Australia based wanted accused was actively involved in both the smuggling and transfer of drug proceeds through international hawala channels to fund LeT's terror activities in India. The other accused Tamanna. Sukhbir Singh and Anwar Masih have been charged for their deliberate roles in the terror funding conspiracy. Further, one Gagandeep Singh Arora, a hawala operator who is currently absconding, has been chargesheeted for facilitating money laundering of huge amounts and illegal fund transfers to terror operatives," he said.

'The ATS Gujarat had filed the original chargesheet and NIA had filed seven supplementary chargesheets earlier. A total of 26 accused have been arrested in the case so far while eight accused persons are absconding. NIA is continuing with its investigation to track the absconders and destroy the syndicate as part of its efforts to eliminate the nexus between narcotics trafficking and terrorism," the spokesman added. Earlier, Principal Secretary, Finance, Santosh D. Vaidya gave a detailed presentation providing a comprehensive financial and developmental overview of Jammu and Kashmir as of October 7, 2025. He presented an evaluation of expenditure progress under the Union Territory (UT) and District CAPEX Budgets, sectoral allocations, revenue trends, fiscal challenges, and ongoing reform initiatives under Centrally Sponsored Schemes (CSS) and the guidelines for execution of works and funds to be expended under Special Assistance for Capital Investment (SASCI)

Chief Minister directed departments to ensure that funds available in Single Nodal Accounts are utilized well before the deadline as departments shift to SNA-Sparsh financial management system.

Concluding the review, the Chief Minister called for strict monitoring, accountability, and coordinated action among departments to ensure that developmental works translate into tangible improvements on the ground. He reiterated that timely execution, financial prudence, and effective reform implementation remain central to the government's developmental agenda.

India sourced military hardware worth Rs 1.20 lakh crore in 2024-25: Rajnath

New Delhi, Oct 07: India procured military hardware and weapons worth Rs 1,20,000 crore from domestic sources by end of 2024-25 as it is increasingly focusing on boosting self-reliance to confront national security challenges, Defence Minister Rajnath Singh said on Tuesday.

In an address at an event, Singh said the government is fully aware of the changing dynamics of battle field, especially the importance of non-contact warfare such as use of drones, and preparing for it accordingly.

In this context, he underlined the importance of enhancing India's own defence industries to meet myriad security challenges.

"In 2021-22, our capital acquisition from domestic sources was around Rs 74,000 crore, but by the end of 2024-25, the capital acquisition from domestic sources has increased to approximately Rs 1,20,000 crore," he said.

This change is not just about data, but also about mindset," he said. The defence minister said the Modi government has taken several policy initiatives in the last 10 years to encourage indigenous design, development, and manufacturing of



defence equipment in the country. Under these initiatives, the highest priority is now being given to domestic sourcing in procurement of military hardware, he noted.

"The government of India is fully aware of the changing nature of modern warfare. Today's warfare has become completely technology-oriented. We have seen a demonstration of this in Operation Sindoor as well," he said.

"In this, we observed that the importance of non-contact warfare, such as drones, anti-drone warfare, and air-defense systems,

has significantly increased," he said. Singh also listed goals in the defence sector to realise India's overall aim to become a developed country by 2047.

"First is that we must achieve a high degree of self-reliance in the critical defence capabilities. Second, we must become a prominent global exporter in the defence sector," he said.

"Third, to take India forward in cutting-edge technology sectors, we must achieve advancements in some new niche technologies,"

Cough syrup deaths

PIL in SC seeks CBI probe, nationwide safety review

New Delhi, Oct 07: A PIL has been filed in the Supreme Court seeking inquiry and systemic reform in drug safety mechanisms in the wake of deaths of children in Madhya Pradesh and Rajasthan allegedly due to consumption of toxic cough syrups. The PIL, filed by advocate Vishal Tiwari, seeks a court-monitored probe into the incident and urges the constitution of a National Judicial Commission or Expert Committee headed by a retired Supreme Court judge.

The PIL requests that all pending FIRs and investigations concerning the deaths of children caused by toxic cough syrups across states be transferred to the CBI. It seeks a probe under the supervision of a retired Supreme Court judge to ensure fairness and uniformity.

The petition contends that separate state-level investigations have led to fragmented accountability, enabling repeated lapses that allow hazardous formulations to reach the market. The petition comes amid reports from Madhya Pradesh and Rajasthan, where several children allegedly died after consuming a particular kind of cough syrup.

The plea seeks court's direction to the Central government to constitute a national-level judicial or expert body to identify the regulatory failures that allowed substandard medicines to reach the market. It also urged the court to mandate toxicological testing of all suspect products through NABL-accredited laboratories before any further sale or export is permitted.

Punjab govt bans sale of Coldrif syrup after death of 14 children in MP



n order issued by the Food and Drugs Administration (FDA), Punjab government, on Monday said it has come to the notice of this office that Coldrif syrup has been declared as not of standard quality by the government analyst, drugs testing laboratory, and FDA, Madhya Pradesh.

Chandigarh, Oct 07: The Punjab government has banned the sale, distribution and use of Coldrif cough syrup in the wake of 14 children dying in Madhya Pradesh, reportedly due to the consumption of

the contaminated medicine. An order issued by the Food and Drugs Administration (FDA), Punjab government, on Monday said it has come to the notice of this office that Coldrif syrup has been declared as not of standard quality by the government analyst, drugs testing laboratory, and FDA, Madhya Pradesh.

The drug's batch number is SR-13, manufactured by Sresan Pharmaceutical, Bangalore Highways, Sunguvarchatram (Mathura), Kancheepuram district, Tamil Nadu. The aforementioned drug formulation is reported to be adulterated, as it contains Diethylene Glycol (46.28 per cent w/v), which makes it injurious to health," the order said.

Considering the seriousness of the matter, as the said product has been observed to be linked to the recent deaths of children in the Chhindwara district, Madhya Pradesh, the

above-mentioned product is hereby completely prohibited for sale, distribution and utilisation in the state of Punjab with immediate effect in public interest," the Punjab FDA order said.

It also said that all retailers, distributors, registered medical practitioners and hospitals and healthcare institutions, etc., in Punjab shall not purchase, sell or utilise the said product.

If any stock of the drug is available in the state, the information may be provided to the FDA (drugs wing), the order said.

The deaths of children due to suspected renal failure were reported from Chhindwara in Madhya Pradesh in a month. The cough syrup, manufactured in Tamil Nadu, was found to be dangerously adulterated with Diethylene Glycol (DEG), a highly poisonous substance.

The tragic deaths triggered a national health alert, leading to suspensions of officials in Madhya Pradesh, arrests, nationwide stock confiscations, and immediate, stringent changes to drug prescription guidelines in states like Kerala and

FM flags weaponisation of tech, bats for using it for global good

Mumbai, Oct 07: Union Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman on Tuesday pitched for using technology for public good, while expressing her disappointment at "weaponising" the advancements at the global level.

The Finance Minister asserted India is a global fintech leader, which has set benchmarks in innovation, scale and inclusion. "...the simple motive is that it (technology) should be for the public good. And at no point of time it gets weaponised," she said, while speaking at the annual Global Fintech Fest in Mumbai.

"It is important to constantly remind ourselves that technology cannot be in that sense truly mastered, but having obtained certain propriety, rights over some part of it, we should refrain from weaponising it," she added.

Ms. Sitharaman said "constantly" seen instances of inward looking attitudes along with technology advancements. The idea of "global progress itself gets questioned because of weaponising it", the FM added. She, however, did not elaborate further or offer any specific instances that led her make the remarks.

The comments come at a time when several countries have taken measures, resulting into restrictions in trade and innovations. The U.S., the world's largest economy and also a technology powerhouse, has made major



shifts in its trade policies.

At present, India is negotiating a trade agreement with the US, which has chosen to slap high tariffs on Indian goods and also steeply hiked fees for H1B visa. A bulk of the H1B visas are secured by Indian tech workers.

Foreign currency settlement system launched

At the event Mo launched the foreign currency settlement system in GIFT IFSC, which will facilitate seamless transactions on real-time basis, enhance liquidity management, and ensure compliance.

Currently foreign currency transactions usually get settled with a lag of 36 to 48 hours. Ms. Sitharaman said with the operationalisation of the foreign currency settlement system, GIFT City joins a select list of financial centres that include Hong Kong, Tokyo, Manila, and some other centres which have the infrastructure to settle foreign currency transactions locally. Mr. Sitharaman further said fintech has democratised finance in India.

"India ranks third in fintech companies and does half of world's real-time digital transactions," she said, adding that the government's policy has been to play a role to nurture the fintech sector through a balanced approach. She emphasised the government's enabling approach towards business, technology and

"We'd like to remain in the fringes and watch. We like to remain in the fringes and help... we have to enable businesses and not interrupt in their progress," Ms. Sitharaman added. Ms. Sitharaman said, "Fintech in India has not merely digitised payments but has also democratised finance, empowering millions to save, invest, borrow and insure with transparency."

Cabinet approves 4 railway projects covering 18 districts in four states Narendra Modiji's Vision of a New

New Delhi, Oct 07: The Cabinet Committee on Economic Affairs, chaired by the Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi, on Tuesday approved four projects of Ministry of Railways with total cost of Rs 24,634 crore (approximately). These projects include:

Wardha - Bhusawal - 3rd & 4th line - 314 kms (Maharashtra) Gondia - Dongargarh - 4th line - 84 kms (Maharashtra &

Chhattisgarh) Vadodara - Ratlam - 3rd & 4th line - 259 kms (Gujarat & Madhya

Itarsi - Bhopal - Bina 4th line -237 kms. (Madhya Pradesh)

The four projects covering 18 Districts across the states of Maharashtra, Madhya Pradesh, Gujarat, and Chhattisgarh will increase the existing network of Indian Railways by about 894 Kms. The approved multi-tracking project will enhance connectivity to approx. 3,633 villages, which are having a population of about 85.84 lakh and two Aspirational Districts (Vidisha and

Rajnandgaon). The increased line capacity will significantly enhance mobility, resulting in improved operational efficiency and service reliability for Indian Railways. These multi-tracking proposals are poised to streamline operations and alleviate congestion. The projects are in line with the Prime Minister Shri India which will make people of the region "Atmanirbhar" by way of comprehensive development in the area which will enhance their employment/ self-employment opportunities.

The projects are planned on PM-Gati Shakti National Master Plan with focus on enhancing multi-modal connectivity & logistic efficiency through integrated planning and stakeholder consultations. These projects will provide seamless connectivity for movement of people, goods, and services.

Delhi hospital corrects elderly woman's heart rhythm disorder with capsule-size pacemaker

New Delhi, Oct 07: A 66-year-old woman underwent a minimally invasive procedure in which a capsule-sized, wireless device was implanted in her heart to correct a cardiac rhythm disorder, with the hospital claiming it to be India's first such procedure for the

The woman visited the Indraprastha Apollo Hospital after experiencing palpitations and imbalance for several

She was recently diagnosed with Sick Sinus Syndrome, a condition where the heart's natural pacemaker (sinus node) fails to maintain a regular rhythm, the hospital said in a statement.

She was advised to undergo pacemaker implantation, but was hesitant about conventional surgery and having a visible device. Dr Vanita Arora, Clinical Lead, Cardiac Electrophysiology, at the Indraprastha Apollo Hospital, offered her a pioneering, transcathter alternative -- the Atrial Aveir Leadless Pacemaker, a capsule-sized device which can be implanted in the right upper chamber of the heart without surgery.

The procedure was performed without any complications on Sunday, Dr Arora said. The patient has recovered well and



discharged on Tuesday, she said.

The technology offers new hope to patients who require pacing support in the upper chamber for SND but are apprehensive about traditional surgery or carrying a visible device, Dr Arora said.

By eliminating leads and surgical pockets, it provides a safer, trans catheter minimally invasive solution that preserves the natural motion of the heart. Our patient, who had been distressed with palpitations and dizziness for months, responded beautifully to the procedure and was able to walk within hours," she said.

'This marks India's first successful case of Atrial Aveir Leadless Pacemaker implantation, a breakthrough in transcatheter minimally invasive cardiac rhythm management," the statement

India-US in continuous dialogue for trade pact, says Goyal

New Delhi, Oct 07: India and the US are in continuous dialogue on the proposed bilateral trade agreement, and all possibilities are there to meet the November deadline for concluding the talks, Commerce and Industry Minister Piyush Goyal

said on Tuesday.
On the possibility of the next round of trade negotiations in a physical mode, he said that every possibility exists, but with the US government currently in shutdown mode, it remains to be seen how, where, and when the next round of talks

can take place. "Aap sub jante hain ki USA me aaj-kal government shut down mode me hai, toh uske maddenazar dekhna padega ki kaise baat-cheet ho sakti hai, kahan ho sakti hai, aur kab ho sakti hai (As you all know, the US government is currently in shutdown mode. So, keeping that in mind, we'll have to see how, where, and when the discussions can take place),' he told reporters here. The US government has stopped



working since midnight on October 1 as Congress failed to pass a funding bill. Theoretically, this means many government workers will not be paid for now, and services centres are closed. However, important operations, such as in the field of defence and social work, will continue to

Goyal is here for a one-day official visit. He is leading a business delegation and discussing ways to boost trade and investment ties between

the two countries.

"We are in constant dialogue with the USA (on the trade pact), and talks are on at various levels. We will give more information on this soon on how we are thinking to take it forward," he said. When asked if the two sides

are sticking to the November deadline to conclude the negotiations, he said: "There is every possibility" Last month, the minister

led an official delegation to New York for trade talks. After that meeting, India and the US decided to continue negotiations for an early conclusion of a mutually beneficial bilateral trade agreement.




From OpenAI to Meta, firms channel billions into AI infrastructure as demand booms

New Delhi, Oct 07: AMD has agreed to supply artificial intelligence chips to OpenAI in a multi-year deal that would also give the ChatGPT creator the option to buy up to roughly 10% of the chipmaker, the latest in a $dozen \ such \ investments \ and \ partnerships.$

Larger chip rival Nvidia has also announced a plan to invest up to \$100 billion in OpenAI, as appetite for systems powering AI surge on expectations that enterprises will integrate the technology into their products and services. Here is a list of multi-billion dollar AI, cloud and chip deals signed recently:

Nvidia and OpenAI: Nvidia is set to invest up to \$100 billion in OpenAI and supply it with data center chips, in a deal giving the chipmaker a financial stake in OpenAI. OpenAI is already an important customer for Nvidia. Meta and CoreWeave: Core-Weave has signed a \$14 billion agreement with Meta to supply computing power to the Facebook parent.

Nvidia and Intel: Nvidia will invest \$5 billion in Intel, giving it roughly 4% of the



company after new shares are issued. Oracle and Meta: Oracle is in talks with Meta for a multi-year cloud computing deal worth about \$20 billion, underscoring the

social media giant's drive to secure faster

access to computing power.

Oracle and OpenAI: Oracle is reported to have signed one of the biggest cloud deals ever with OpenAI, under which the ChatGPT maker is expected to buy \$300 billion in computing power from the company for

CoreWeave and Nvidia: CoreWeave signed a \$6.3 billion initial order with backer Nyidia, a deal that guarantees that the AI chipmaker will purchase any cloud capacity not sold to

Nebius Group and Microsoft: Nebius Group will provide Microsoft with GPU infrastructure capacity in a deal worth \$17.4 billion over a five-year term.

Meta and Google: Google struck a six-year cloud computing deal with Meta Platforms worth more than \$10 billion, Reuters had

Intel and Softbank Group: Intel is getting a \$2 billion capital injection from SoftBank Group, making the Japanese tech investor one of the top-10 shareholders of the troubled U.S. chipmaker.

Tesla and Samsung: Tesla signed a \$16.5 billion deal to source chips from Samsung Electronics, with the EV maker's CEO Elon Musk, saying that the South Korean tech giant's new chip factory in Texas would make Tesla's next-generation AI6 chip.

Meta and Scale AI: Meta took a 49% stake for about \$14.3 billion in Scale AI and brought in its 28-year-old CEO, Alexandr Wang, to play a prominent role in the tech giant's artificial intelligence strategy.

Google and Windsurf: Google hired several key staff members from AI code generation startup Windsurf and will pay \$2.4 billion in license fees as part of the deal to use some of Windsurf's technology under non-exclusive terms.

CoreWeave and OpenAI: CoreWeave signed a five-year contract worth \$11.9 billion with OpenAI in March, before the Nvidia-backed

Stargate Data Centre Project: Stargate is a joint venture between SoftBank, OpenAI and Oracle to build data centers. The project was announced in January by U.S. President Donald Trump, who said that the companies would invest up to \$500 billion to fund infrastructure for artificial intelligence.

Amazon and Anthropic: Amazon.com pumped \$4 billion into OpenAI competitor Anthropic, doubling its investment in the firm known for its GenAI chatbot Claude.

Mike Atherton demands end to 'neatly arranged' Indo-Pak clashes in ICC events

London, Oct 07: Alleging that draws have been "neatly arranged" to ensure India-Pakistan clashes in ICC tournaments for "economic needs" former England captain Michael Atherton has called for a complete halt to cricket between the two bitter rivals as sport has become a "proxy for broader tensions and propaganda".

In a scathing column, Atherton cited the recent "antics" at the Asia Cup where the Indian team refused to shake hands with Pakistani players and the Asian Cricket Council's Pakistani head Mohsin Naqvi walked away with the winner's trophy after the Indians refused to accept it from him.

"India and Pakistan have played each other in the group stage of every ICC event since 2013, which includes three 50-over World Cups, five T20 World Cups and three Champions Trophy," Atherton said.

"That is regardless of whether the initial stage has been a single round robin - part of the motivation for which is the inevitability of an India versus Pakistan fixture have been neatly arranged to ensure the fixture goes ahead," he added. The tensions between the two countries are at an all-time high after the Pahalgam terror



attack in which 26 Indians were gunned down by Pakistan-backed terrorists leading to military action by India in May.

"Despite its scarcity (maybe, in part, because of its scarcity) it is a fixture that carries huge economic clout, one of the main reasons why the broadcast rights for ICC tournaments are worth so much -roughly USD 3 billion for the most recent rights cycle 2023-27," Atherton wrote in The Times, London.

"Due to the relative decline in the value of bilateral matches, ICC events have grown in frequency and importance, and so the India and Pakistan fixture is crucial to the balance sheets of those who would not otherwise have any skin in the game," he said.

Atherton said time is now right

to end the "tacitly supported arrangement" of ensuring that the two arch-foes clash at least once in ICC events. At the recent Asia Cup, the draw and schedule was such that the two sides faced each

other every Sunday of the three-

week tournament. "If cricket was once the vehicle for diplomacy, it is now, clearly, a proxy for broader tensions and for propaganda. There is little justification, in any case, for a serious sport to arrange tournament fixtures to suit its economic needs and now that the rivalry is being exploited in other ways, there is even less iustification for it.

"For the next broadcast rights cycle, the fixture draw before ICC events should be transparent and if the two teams do not

meet every time, so be it," Ather-

India and Pakistan do not engage bilaterally since the 2008 Mumbai terror attack. The Indian government, days before Asia Cup, came out with a policy to place a blanket ban on bilateral sports between the two countries even at neutral venues but exempted multi-lateral events to ensure that the country adheres to the Olympic Charter.

Atherton said the two countries are being deliberately drawn with each other to cash in on the tension that pulls in the crowd and viewership numbers crucial for good advertising revenue.

"This 'arrangement' has been tacitly supported within the game for a number of reasons. The most obvious is the inability of both teams, because of political tensions, to meet outside ICC events.

"Cricket on each other's territory was once the avenue through which both countries might talk, but gradually silence has descended. "ICC events are the only occasions, at present, when the fixture can go ahead and now this must be on neutral territory too – the cause of much debate in the most recent Champions Trophy, when India parked themselves in Dubai for an entire tournament nominally hosted by Pakistan," he pointed out.

Pope Leo to visit Turkiye, Lebanon in Nov in first trip abroad

Vatican City, Oct 07: Pope Leo will travel to Turkiye and Lebanon in late November, the Vatican announced on Tuesday, in the first visit outside Italy by the new leader of the 1.4-billion-member global Catholic Church.

Leo, the first US pope, will visit Turkiye from November 27-30 before heading to Lebanon from November 30 to December 2, where he is expected to speak about the plight of Christians in the Middle East and to make appeals for peace across the region.

Leo was elected by the world's Catholic cardinals on May 8 to replace the late Pope Francis, who had planned to visit both countries but was unable to go because of health issues

The pope is expected to meet in Turkiye with Patriarch Bartholomew, spiritual leader of the world's 260 million Orthodox Christians, for celebrations of the 1,700th anniversary of a major early Church council, which took place in Nicaea, now called Iznik.

"It is profoundly symbolica that Pope Leo ... will visit (the patriarch) on his first official journey," Rev. John Chryssavgis, an adviser to Bartholomew, told Reuters. "Pope Leo is doubtless



seeking to express and affirm his identity as a Christian in a world of many different creeds, where all people, regardless of religion and race, are called to live together in mutual understanding," said the priest. Traveling abroad has become a major part of the modern meet local Catholics, spread the faith, and conduct international diplomacy.

A new pope's first travels are usually seen as an indication of

the issues the pontiff wants to highlight during his reign. Leo had been expected for

months to travel to Turkiye for his first trip abroad, but the additional visit to Lebanon only emerged in discussions in

Vatican officials say the pontiff wants to make appeals for peace and commemorate the 2020 chemical explosion at the Beirut port that killed 200 people and caused billions of dollars worth of damage.

Russia says intercepted 209 **Ukrainian drones** overnight

Moscow, Oct 07: Ukraine launched a major drone attack on Russia for the second day in a row, Moscow said Tuesday, reporting that it had intercepted 209 drones overnight and in the morning. The attack is Kyiv's second consecutive barrage on Russia as it steps up retaliatory strikes.

Most of the drones were shot down over the regions of Kursk, Nizhny Novgorod and Belgorod, Russia's defense ministry said in a statement.

The strikes hit an unidentified industry enterprise in the Nizhny Novgorod region, Governor Gleb Nikitin said.

Russian authorities did not report

any injuries or deaths on Tuesday. On Monday, Ukraine launched 251 drones toward Russia, and two people died in a rocket strike on the city of Belgorod around 30 kilometers (19 miles) from the Ukrainian border.

"One thousand people in four settlements remain without electricity," according to Belgorod's governor Vyacheslav Gladkov, adding that repair works were ongoing after the barrage. Kyiv is ramping up strikes on Russia's energy and oil infrastructure, in what it sees as a legitimate response to Moscow's daily attacks on Ukrainian cities, which have at times left millions without heating and power. Ukraine said Russia had launched 154 drones and missiles overnight Monday-Tuesday, around

half of which were intercepted.
An unmanned aircraft hit railway and energy infrastructure in Ukraine's Poltava and Sumy regions, leaving more than 1,000 people without electricity.


