
Op Sindoor proof of Bharat's will to respond strongly Art-370 abrogation ensured J&K's integration into country's mainstream

Srinagar, Dec 02: The Power Development Department (PDD) is facing a 'shortage of nearly 500 Megawatts (MWs) to meet the actual power demand' in Kashmir valleyplunging residents facing into extended blackouts.

An official informed the news agency-Kashmir News Observer (KNO) that "The actual peak power demand in Kashmir is at least 2400 MWs but the local Discom (Kashmir Power Distribution Corporation Limited (KPDCL)

this year so far has been able to cater only 1900 MWs."

The official further said that "On Sunday we were able to cater the season's highest load at least 1906 Megawatts (MWs). We will be able to cater a maximum of 2000 MWs."

On asking about the new power curtailment schedule, the official said, "As such there are no plans for any new power curtailment schedule. Our target is to provide a better and uninterrupted power supply."
He said, "We are expecting

some receiving stations for north and south Kashmir, we are hopeful that they will be commissioned soon so that some of the bottlenecks are resolved and we will be in a position to provide better power supply."

About the unscheduled power cuts, the official added that "The power outages are primarily because of the unauthorised use of power. People mostly in the flat rate areas are not using power judiciously | More on P6

The CSC, headed by Minister or Social Welfare Sakina Ittoo. is understood to have recommended a 10 percent reduction

in the Economically Weaker Sections (EWS) and Reserved Backward Area (RBA) quotas.

The cabinet panel has recommended against tinkering with the Scheduled Tribe-I, Scheduled Tribe-II, Scheduled Castes, Other Backward Classes, and Actual Line of Control and International Border categories. All eyes will be on the cabi-

net's decision on the CSC report, given that the rationalization of reservation has become a major demand in Kashmir since 2024.

Centre highlights J&K's afforestation work under GIM

New Delhi, Dec 02: The Union government on Tuesday said Jammu and Kashmir continues to be one of the implementing regions of the country under the National Mission for a Green India (GIM) with afforestation and ecosystem restoration activities undertaken in selected landscapes during the last five years.

In a written reply to Lok Sabha, Minister of State for Environment, Forest and Climate Change Kirti Vardhan Singh said GIM, operational since 2015-16, aims to protect, restore and enhance forest and tree cover while contributing to climate change mitigation and adaptation.

As per the state-wise Annual Plans of Operation (APO) approved in the last five years, Jammu and Kashmir recorded 7,571 hectares under advance work, 5,423 hectares under creation and 3,652 hectares under maintenance, with the total cost of approved APOs at Rs 84.61 crore.

The Mission is one of the eight under the National Action Plan on Climate Change (NAPCC) and is currently implemented in 17 states and



one Union Territory, including Jammu and Kashmir.

According to the government, funds are released subject to the submission of utilisation certificates, progress reports and compliance with Single Nodal Agency guidelines by the concerned state government. For Jammu and Kashmir, the funds allocated or released stood at rupees 36.72 crore, of which rupees 33.50 crore has been utilised, covering a total eco-restoration area of 1,778 hectares.

The reply did not provide district-wise details for J&K. It said

overall state-wise data on the areas taken up for eco-restoration is annexed for reference.

The Minister stated that delays or variations in approvals or fund disbursements depend on compliance by states with the Ministry of Finance procedures, including financial reporting and document submission.

Responding to a query on steps to ensure adequate funding for the Mission and livelihood benefits for forest-dependent communities, the government said the Ministry is prioritising vulnerable and degraded landscapes and strengthening convergence with ongoing schemes.

It also highlighted awareness and public participation activities through mass plantation drives during events such as World Environment Day, International Day of Forests and Van Mahotsav.

The reply reiterated that forest conservation and management are primarily the responsibility of state governments and UT administrations under legal frameworks, including the Indian Forest Act, 1927, the Van (Sanrakshan Evam Samvardhan) Adhiniyam, 1980, and relevant state laws—(KNO)

Lieutenant General Mishra was accompanied by the General Officer Commanding of the Ace of Spades Division.



12 km of Zojila **Tunnel** excavated

Ganderbal, Dec 02: The construction of the strategically gressing rapidly and remains on schedule for completion by 2028, officials said on Tuesday.

Retired Colonel Shiv Kumar, General Manager at MEIL - the company executing the project, informed that the work that began in late 2020 initially faced delays due to harsh winter conditions. However, once the weather improved in 2021, the pace picked up. Excavation started simultaneously from the Baltal side in Kashmir and the Minamarg side in Ladakh,

Kumar said that out of the 13 km main tunnel, only 1.25 km of excavation is left, while 2.25 km of concrete lining has already been completed. "The work is moving smoothly, and our target is 2028," he added. The Zojila project is divided

into two parts. Part 1, which includes a 17 km approach road, two short tunnels, seven cut-and-cover structures, a snow gallery, four bridges, a junction and an avalanche-protection dam, has been fully completed.

Part 2 involves the construction of the main tunnel, where excavation is nearing its final

Calling the tunnel a "lifeline for Ladakh", the General Manager said it will ensure year-round connectivity across the Zojila Pass, which remains closed for months every winter due to heavy snowfall. "Once completed, vehicles will be able to move even during peak winter. This will boost tourism, improve livelihoods and strengthen the

regional economy," he said. Kumar added that 78 per cent of the project workforce is local, generating much-needed employment in nearby communities. The total project cost is around 4,500 crore, with emphasis on sustainability by reusing locally available stone.

Last week, Ladakh Chief Secretary Dr Pawan Kotwal visited the eastern portal of the tunnel to review progress. He was accompanied by SDM Drass Vishal Atri and officers from NHIDCL and MEIL, including Project Manager Col. A.K. Shiv Kumar. Officials briefed him that around 12 km of the tunnel has been completed, with about 1,200 meters still the tunnel breakthrough is expected by April next year.

Engineers also explained various technical aspects, including the tunnel's ventilation and safety systems. They said daily excavation progress varies based on rock strata but averages 2.5 to 3 metres.

Dr Kotwal praised the dedication of engineers and workers, noting that the Zojila Tunnel is among the longest and most challenging in the region. He said an early breakthrough would provide major relief, especially during medical emergencies involving critical patients from Ladakh.

The Chief Secretary also inspected alignment works and reviewed advanced surveying machines being used to maintain precision between the eastern and western portals. He described the visit as productive and appreciated the efforts of all teams involved in the crucial national project—(KNO)

Medical college controversy reaches BJP head

Jammu, Dec 02: A delegation of Jammu and Kashmir Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) leaders on Tuesday met Union Health Minister JP Nadda and urged a review of the controversial admission of 42 Muslim candidates in the first MBBS batch at Shri Mata Vaishno Devi Institute of Medical Excellence (SM-VDIME), Katra.

The institute, run by the Shri Mata Vaishno Devi Shrine Board (SMVDSB), has a total of

The controversy erupted after over 40 Muslim students gained admission to the Shri Mata Vaishno Devi Institute of Medical Excellence (SMVDIME) through NEET merit. BJP and other Hindu leaders have protested, claiming some seats should be reserved for Hindus, noting that the institution is funded by contributions from Hindu devotees.

The BJP delegation, led by J&K BJP President and Rajya Sabha MP Sat Sharma, included Union Minister in PMO Dr Jitendra Singh, Leader of Opposition Sunil Sharma, MPs Jugal Kishore Sharma and Ghulam Ali Khatana, and several MLAs, including Dr Devinder Manyal, Sham Lal Sharma, and RS Pathania.

The delegation expressed concern over the composition of the first batch, highlighting that 42 of the 50 seats have gone to non-Hindu candidates, the party said.

The party said the development had sparked resentment among devotees of Mata Vaishno Devi and groups that have contributed financially to the shrine.

The leaders said various social and religious organisations were holding protests demanding greater transparency in the admission

They warned that if the issue was not addressed promptly, it could trigger largescale agitations, potentially affecting the peaceful environment in the region.

Emphasising respect for merit-based medical admissions and constitutional provisions, the delegation urged the Health Minister to consider the sentiments of millions of devotees associated with SMVD institutions.

They requested a thorough review of the admission process, measures for transparency, and mechanisms to reassure devotees about their representation in the institute.

Nadda listened to the delegation and assured them that the Ministry would examine the matter seriously, according to the statement. He said all aspects of the issue would be reviewed, while maintaining compliance with national norms governing medical education—(KNO)

Sanatnagar flyover opens after CM's push

Flyover opening completes 'trio of NH-44 flyovers'

Srinagar, Dec 02: The government on Tuesday evening opened the Sanat Nagar flyover for public movement, completing the trio of flyovers along the 3.23-km NH-44 decongestion corridor between Bemina and Nowgam.

A senior official from the Roads & Buildings (R&B) Department said that the opening followed "urgent directions" from Chief Minister Omar Abdullah and Deputy Chief Minister Surinder Choudhary to end the daily traffic chaos at the junction.

"The flyover is traffic-ready. Minor works will continue, but public movement has been allowed," the official said.

With this, Bemina, Nowgam and Sanat Nagar flyovers are now all operational, creating Srinagar's 'first 3.23-km NH-44 decongestion uninterrupted tri-flyover corridor' aimed at easing pressure on one of the busiest stretches of the city.

The official added that the Sanat Nagar segment had faced delays earlier due to technical issues and utility-shifting work, including power, drainage and telecom lines, but is now completed and open. "Those hurdles slowed us down, but the corridor is fully functional

Commuters welcomed the development. "This junction troubled people for years. Opening it will finally bring some relief," said Javid Ahmad, a commuter from Hyderpora. Another commuter from Rawalpora said, "Traffic would choke here every evening. This was long overdue."—(KNO)

A New Blueprint For Jammu & Kashmir's Tourism

hief Minister Omar Abdullah's announcement to develop nine new sustainable tourism destinations marks a pivotal and welcome shift in Jammu and Kashmir's tourism strategy. By anchoring this "mega project" in environmental responsibility and local community benefit, the government is finally aligning its vision with global best practices and, more importantly, with the long-term welfare of its people. His stark assertion that "tourism, or any

industry that does not benefit locals, will not survive", should be the foundational principle guiding every policy from here on. For too long, the narrative around Kashmir's tourism has been one of fragile dependency, on seasons, on snowfall, and on geopolitical calm. While the Chief Minister rightly pins hopes on December snow to revive a challenging year, this climatic uncertainty precisely underscores the need for the diversification he now proposes. Relying

solely on seasonal peaks is an unsustainable economic model. The new plan to develop yearround, sustainable destinations can create a more resilient sector, providing stable livelihoods beyond the traditional summer and winter peaks. The concurrent launch of the Kashmir chapter of SKAL International, a global tourism network, is a strategic masterstroke. It signals a confident re-entry onto the world stage, moving beyond mere promotion to forging professional

bonds that facilitate "business with friends." This network can be instrumental in marketing these new destinations, attracting conscientious investment, and embedding Kashmir within a global circuit of quality, sustainable travel. However, the vision's success hinges entirely on execution. "Sustainability" and "community benefit" must be tangible, not just rhetorical Development must prioritise ecological carrying capacity, use local materials and labour, ensure

fair revenue-sharing models, and celebrate indigenous culture. It must avoid creating exclusive enclaves that bypass local economies. The goal should be to make residents not just employees, but stakeholders and guardians of their heritage. As winter's darkness gives way to spring, as the CM poetically noted, this initiative promises a longer, more enduring spring for Kashmir's economy. India's Vision for an Inclusive and **Accessible Nation**

In India, where diversity thrives as the cornerstone of national identity, a strong movement for disability rights is growing, driven by the government's commitment towards true inclusivity and self-reliance for everyone.

According to Census 2011, there are 2.68 crore persons with disabilities in India which constitute 2.21 percent of the total population. Out of these, approximately 1.50 crore are male and 1.18 crore, are female. According to The Rights of Persons with Disabilities Act, 2016, a "person with disability" is someone who has a long-term physical, mental, intellectual or sensory impairment which, in interaction with barriers, hinders their full and effective participation in society equally with others.

Backed by forward-thinking policies and dynamic programmes, the Government ensures that no one is deprived on account of their disability, and creates pathways to opportunity and active societal involvement for every individual.

India's Legal and Policy Framework for **Disability Rights**

India's legal and policy framework for disability rights is dynamic and shapes a landscape where accessibility, education, and empowerment are not just ideals but realities for Persons with Disabilities (PwDs).

The Rights of Persons with Disabilities

This Act was enacted in 2016 and came into effect on April 19, 2017, replacing the Persons with Disabilities Act of 1995. It recognises 21 categories of disability, mandates reservation in education and employment and places a legal duty on governments to ensure accessibility, non-discrimination and full participation for persons with disabilities. It also introduces a centralised certification regime and strengthens rights to inclusive education, employment and com-

The National Trust for the Welfare of Persons with Autism, Cerebral Palsy, Mental Retardation and Multiple Disabilities Act, 1999

The Act establishes a national body dedicated to the welfare of individuals with Autism, Cerebral Palsy, Mental Retardation, and Multiple Disabilities, along with related matters and incidental provisions.

Rehabilitation Council of India (RCI) Act, 1992

The Rehabilitation Council of India (RCI) was initially established as a registered society in 1986 and later became a statutory body under an Act of Parliament in 1993. The RCI Act, 1992, amended in 2000, mandates the Council to regulate and monitor training programmes for rehabilitation professionals, standardise syllabi, and maintain the Central Rehabilitation Register of qualified personnel in the fields of rehabilitation and special education.

Scheme for Implementation of Rights of Persons with Disabilities Act 2016 (SIPDA)

The Scheme for Implementation of the Rights of Persons with Disabilities Act, 2016 (SIPDA) is an umbrella programme of the Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (DEPwD). It provides financial and technical support to Central Ministries, States, and UTs for implementing the RPwD Act through projects that promote accessibility, inclusion, awareness, and skill development for persons with disabilities.

Key Government Initiatives and Schemes

The government has adopted a wide range of initiatives and schemes to ensure accessibility and inclusion for persons with

Sugamya Bharat Abhiyan (Accessible India Campaign)

Launched on 3 December 2015, the

Sugamya Bharat Abhiyan or Accessible India Campaign marks a significant step towards building an inclusive and accessible nation. Guided by the vision of "Sabka Saath, Sabka Vikas, Sabka Vishwas," the campaign addresses long-standing barriers faced by persons with disabilities. It focuses on achieving universal accessibility across three key domains — built infrastructure, transport systems and information and communication technology (ICT) — ensuring equal access and participation for all.

India, as a signatory to the UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (UNCRPD), is committed to building an accessible and inclusive society.

In a significant stride towards building a digitally inclusive India, the Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (DEPwD) has launched the revamped Sugamya Bharat Appat the International Purple Fest 2025.

The upgraded app, designed with a userfirst and accessibility-first approach, serves as India's digital accessibility hub, providing persons with disabilities easy access to information, government schemes, and essential services.

It features an accessibility mapping tool that enables users to locate and rate public spaces, encouraging community-driven accessibility data.

The app also offers a comprehensive directory of schemes, scholarships, employment opportunities, and educational re-

sources curated for persons with disabilities. Equipped with a grievance redressal module, the app allows users to report inaccessible infrastructure directly, promoting transparency and accountability. It is compatible with assistive technologies, supports multiple Indian languages, and is available on both Android and iOS platforms.

Assistance to Disabled Persons for Purchase/Fitting of Aids/Appliances (ADIP)

The ADIP Scheme, launched in 1981, aims to help persons with disabilities (PwDs) get durable, scientifically manufactured, and modern aids and appliances that support their physical, social, and economic rehabilitation.

These devices are provided to help PwDs live more independently, reduce the impact of their disabilities, and prevent further complications. All aids and appliances given under the scheme must be properly certified for quality and safety. The scheme also provides for corrective surgeries, when needed, before fitting assistive devices.

A Sound of Hope — Kritika's Journey to

Three-year-old Kritika from Nagpur was diagnosed with bilateral severe-to-profound sensorineural hearing loss, which made it difficult for her to hear or speak. On February 6, 2024, she underwent a cochlear implant surgery under the ADIP (Assistance to Disabled Persons) Scheme, supported by the Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (DEPwD).

Post-surgery, Kritika attended regular therapy sessions at the Digital Diagnostic Clinic, Nagpur, an empanelled centre under the ADIP Cochlear Implant Programme. Now, 11 months after implantation, she has made remarkable progress — she can comprehend sounds, speak familiar words clearly, and follow verbal commands.

She is now enrolled at an Anganwadi in a Marathi Medium Government School in Nagpur. Her parents express immense happiness and gratitude, proud to witness their daughter's steady progress and newfound ability to experience the world through sound.

Deendayal Divyangjan Rehabilitation Scheme (DDRS)

This Central Sector Scheme of the Government of India provides financial assistance to voluntary organisations engaged in the education, training, and rehabilitation of persons with disabilities

Initially launched in 1999 and revised and renamed in 2003, the scheme aims to create an enabling environment that ensures equal opportunities, equity, social justice, and empowerment for persons with disabilities. It also promotes voluntary participation to strengthen the effective implementation of the Rights of Persons with Disabilities Act,

National Divyangjan Finance and Development Corporation (NDFDC)

The National Divyangjan Finance and Development Corporation (NDFDC) is a public sector organisation under DEPwD. Established in 1997 as a not-for-profit company, NDFDC works to promote the economic empowerment of persons with disabilities (PwDs).

It provides financial support for self-employment and income-generating activities through State Channelising Agencies (SCAs) and partner banks such as public sector and regional rural banks.

NDFDC operates two main loan schemes: Divyangjan Swavalamban Yojana (DSY): Provides concessional loans to individual

Vishesh Microfinance Yojana (VMY): Supports self-help groups and joint liability groups for the welfare and rehabilitation of Persons with Disabilities in the country.

Artificial Limbs Manufacturing Corporation of India (ALIMCO)

Limbs Manufacturing Corporation of India (ALIMCO) is a Schedule 'C' Miniratna Category II Central Public Sector Enterprises, registered under Section 8 (Not for Profit motive) of the Companies Act 2013, (corresponding to Section 25 of the Companies Act, 1956) is functioning under the Administrative Control of Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities. It is 100% owned Govt. of India Central Public Sector Enterprises with an objective of benefiting the persons with disability to the maximum extent possible by manufacturing Rehabilitation Aids for persons with disabilities and by promoting, encouraging and developing the availability, use, supply and distribution of Artificial Limbs and other Rehabilitation Aids to the disabled persons of the country. Profitability is not the motive of the operations of the Corporation and its main thrust is in providing better quality of Aids & Appliances to larger number of disabled persons at reasonable price.

In endeavour to enhance outreach of benefits of ADIP scheme by providing aids and assistive devices to Persons with Disabilities across the country, ALIMCO has started the opening of Pradhanmantri Divyasha Kendra (PMDK) at National Institutes (NIs) and Satellite/ Regional Centers working under DEPwD, Govt. of India on PAN India basis.

ALIMCO is the only manufacturing company producing various types of assistive devices under one roof to serve all types of disabilities across the country.

Unique ID for Persons with Disabilities (UDID)

The Unique ID for Persons with Disabilities project is being implemented to create a national database of Persons with Disabilities (PwDs) and issue a Unique Disability Identity Card (UDID) to each individual. This initiative ensures transparency, efficiency, and ease in delivering government benefits to PwDs while maintaining uniformity across regions. It also aids in tracking the physical and financial progress of beneficiaries across various administrative levels.

The UDID project aims to build a comprehensive end-to-end system for issuing Universal IDs and Disability Certificates. This system includes:

Nationwide availability of PwD data through a centralised web application Online application submission for Disability Certificate/UDID card (offline submissions are also allowed and digitised later)

The Divyangjan Card, also known as the E-Ticketing Photo Identity Card (EPICS), is a railway identity card for people with disabilities (Divyangjan) that allows them to get concessions on train travel. Applicants may apply or renew the card through the Indian Railways Divyangjan portal or the central government services portal. The card is issued on the basis of a valid disability/concession certificate (UDID is accepted for some categories).

PM-DAKSH DEPwD is the digital platform created by the Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (DEPwD). It is intended as a one-stop hub connecting persons with disabilities, training institutes, employers, and job aggregators under the national skill & employment ecosystem.

The portal features two key modules: Divyangjan Kaushal Vikas: Implements the National Action Plan for Skill Development of Persons with Disabilities (NAP-SDP), offering Unique Disability Identity (UDID)based registration, over 250 skill courses, online learning resources, and details on training partners, study materials, and trainers.

Divyangjan Rozgar Setu: A dedicated platform bridging PwDs and employers, offering geo-tagged job vacancies (over 3,000 across various disabilities) with private sector details. MoUs with companies like Amazon, Youth4Jobs, and Godrej Properties boost employment prospects.

National Institutes and Composite Regional Centres (CRCs)

9 national institutes, namely National Institute for Empowerment of Persons with Visual Disabilities (NIEPVD), Dehradun, Ali Yavar Jung National Institute for Speech & Hearing Disabilities (AYJNISHD) National Institute for Empowerment of Persons with Intellectual Disabilities (NIEPID), Secunderabad National Institute Empowerment of Persons with Multiple (NIEPMD), Chennai, Disabilities Deendayal Upadhyaya National Institute for the Physically Handicapped (PDUNIPPD), Delhi, Swami Vivekanand National Institute of Rehabilitation Training and Research (SVNIRTAR), Cuttack, National Institute for Locomotor Disabilities (NILD), Kolkata, Indian Sign Language Research & Training Centre (ISLRTC), National Institute of Mental Health and Rehabilitation (NIMHR), Sehore, and Atal Bihari Vajpayee Disabled Sports Training Centre – Gwalior focus on helping

people with hearing and speech disabilities. Additionally, 30 Composite Regional Centres (CRCs) have been approved in various States/UTs as outreach centres providing rehabilitation services, training professionals, and creating awareness about the needs and rights of PwDs.

In 2025, the Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (DEPwD) and the National Divyangjan Finance and Development Corporation (NDFDC) organised multiple editions of the Divya Kala Mela across India, celebrating entrepreneurship, creativity, and inclusion among Divyangjan. The fair aligns with the "Vocal for Local" initiative, providing a platform for economic empowerment, skill-showcase and cultural celebration of persons with disabilities.

The 26th Divya Kala Mela took place from August 23 - 31, 2025 in Patna, Bihar Approximately 100 Divyang artisans and entrepreneurs representing around 20 states and UTs participated. 75 stalls displayed handicrafts, handlooms, embroidery, packaged food, eco-friendly items, toys, stationery and accessories from across India.

The event also featured special zones for assistive devices, a job fair, cultural performances and accessibility-friendly infrastructure to ensure inclusivity for all attendees.

The 23rd and 24th editions of the Divya Kala Mela were held in Vadodara and Jammu respectively in early 2025. The fairs featured assistive technology showcases, cultural performances, skill linkages, and job opportunities, highlighting inclusion through art, enterprise, and empowerment.

The festival brings together Divyangjan, innovators, educators, and policymakers from across India to showcase best practices, assistive technologies, and cultural performances that promote inclusion.

At this year's Purple Fest organised in Goa, the government unveiled major digital and educational initiatives aimed at deep-

Promotion of Indian Sign Language (ISL)

The Indian Sign Language Research and der DEPwD, serves as the nodal institution for advancing ISL across India. In December 2024, the Government launched PM e-vidya Channel 31 on DTH, exclusively dedicated to ISL training for hearing-impaired students, special educators, and interpreters.

On Sign Language Day 2025, ISLRTC unveiled the world's largest ISL digital repository, featuring 3,189 e-content videos— now accessible to teachers, learners, and the Deaf community.

The Indian Sign Language Dictionary

has now expanded to include over 10,000 terms, while the digital repository features a rich collection of academic videos, fingerspelling resources, and more than 2,200 glossary videos across subjects such as history, geography, economics, and sociology. Indian Sign Language has also evolved as an academic discipline, supported by over 1,000 instructional videos designed to enhance teaching and learning.

Complementing these efforts, PRASHAST App facilitates early identification and screening of disabilities in schools, ensuring timely intervention and personalised learning support. To date, more than 92 lakh students have been screened at the preliminary level through the app.

In 2020, the Indian Sign Language Research and Training Centre (ISLRTC) even signed an MoU with the National Council of **Educational Research and Training (NCERT)** to translate textbooks for classes I-XII and other teaching materials into ISL. This process is expected to be completed by 2026.

The evolution of disability affairs in India reflects a growing recognition of the rights and potential of persons with disabilities. The establishment of dedicated departments and initiatives exemplify a commitment to fostering inclusivity, creativity, and resilience within the community. Delhi's air turns hazardous again

Multiple stations breach 'severe' mark

New Delhi, Dec 02: Air quality in Delhi deteriorated further on Tuesday evening, reaching an AQI of 372 and edging closer to the 'severe' mark, with more than 15 locations already in that category.

The 24-hour average AQI on Tuesday at 4 pm stood at 372, compared to 304 on Monday and 279 on Sunday, according to the Central Pollution Control Board

Out of 39 monitoring stations, 16 recorded AQI in the 'severe' category with readings above 400 - a level known to seriously impact health — according to CPCB's Sameer app.

Stations in the 'severe' range included Burari, Anand Vihar, Mundka, Bawana, Vivek Vihar,



Rohini, Sonia Vihar, Ashok Vihar, Punjabi Bagh and others.

As per CPCB standards, an AQI between 0-50 is considered good', 51–100 'satisfactory', 101–200 'moderate', 201–300 'poor', 301–400 'very poor', and 401-500 'severe'.

According to the Air Quality Early Warning System for Delhi, the city's AQI is likely to remain in the 'very poor' category over the next few days. The forecast also predicts mist/haze during the night.

Surface winds are likely to blow from the southwest at calm to light speeds, gradually increasing to below 5 kmph in the afternoon. Wind speed is expected to rise to about 10 kmph from the north during the evening and night.

Meanwhile, the transport sector accounted for 18.4 per cent of Delhi's pollution on Tuesday, the highest among local contributors, followed by peripheral industries at 9.2 per cent, and emissions from neighbouring cities: Noida (8.2 per cent), Ghaziabad (4.6 per cent), Baghpat (6.2 per cent), Panipat (3.3 per cent) and Gurugram (2.9 per cent).

Transport emissions are forecast to contribute 15.6 per cent on Wednesday.

On the weather front, Delhi recorded a maximum temperature of 25.8 degrees Celsius, 0.5 degrees above normal, while the minimum settled at 9.6 degrees Celsius, 0.1 degree above normal, the IMD said.

For Wednesday, the department has forecast fog, with maximum and minimum temperatures expected to be around 24 and 8 degrees Celsius, respectively.

'Putin's India visit aims to secure energy, defence supplies, trade flows'

New Delhi, Dec 02: Russian President Vladimir Putin's visit to India this week aims to secure energy supplies, stabilise defence deliveries and ensure bilateral trade continues smoothly despite strong Western sanctions, GTRI said on Tuesday.

Putin will land in New Delhi on December 4 for the 23rd India-Russia Annual Summit.

"It is a high-stakes working visit shaped by necessity to lock in energy security, stabilise defence supply lines and keep bilateral trade functioning under the weight of Western sanctions," Global Trade Research Initiative (GTRI) founder Ajay Srivastava

India's current engagement

with Russia rests on three pillars -- energy, defence and diplomacy, he noted.

Russia has become India's largest crude oil supplier, accounting for 30-35 per cent of total oil imports, turning discounted crude into the foundation of the partnership, he added.

Defence forms the second pillar as Russia continues to supply and service a majority of India's frontline platforms, fighter jets, submarines, tanks and air defence systems, and talks will continue on maintenance support and future acquisitions, Srivastava said.

The two countries may formalise a new payment framework, using dirham or integrate Russia's SPFS system with India's RuPay network,



After Russia was partially removed from SWIFT, payments shifted to a multi-currency system, the UAE's dirham (60-65 per cent), rupee (25-30 per cent), and Chinese yuan (5-10 per cent).

India's merchandise trade with Russia remains sharply imbalanced, with modest export growth alongside

persistently high energy-driven imports.

Exports rose from USD 4.3 billion in FY24 to USD 4.9 billion in FY25, with shipments of USD 2.25 billion in April-September 2025.

The export basket is narrow and skewed toward a few industrial and chemical items -machinery (USD 367.8 million), pharmaceuticals (USD 246 million) and organic chemicals (USD 165.8 million) -- together account for most of the value in the first half of FY26.

Consumer-oriented high-visibility categories remain marginal -- smartphones (USD 75.9 million), Vannamei shrimp (USD 75.7 million), meat (USD 63 million) and garments at just USD 20.94 million -- underscore India's limited penetration in Russia's retail markets and electronics value chains despite geopolitical churn, think tank GTRI said.

On the import side, it said dependence on Russian energy and commodities continues unabated.

India's imports stood at USD 63.2 billion in FY24 and inched up to USD 63.8 billion

in FY25; in April-September 2025 alone, imports were USD 31.2 billion.

Petroleum dominates overwhelmingly, led by crude oil (USD 23.1 billion) and petroleum products (ÚSD 2.5 billion), followed by coal (USD 1.9 billion).

Strategic inputs such as fertilisers (USD 1.3 billion) and food oils -- sunflower seed oil (USD 633 million) -- remain significant, while diamonds (USD 202 million) add to the non-energy bill.

"The result is a structurally asymmetric relationship as India relies on Russia for energy security and inputs, while struggling to scale value-added exports, leaving the bilateral trade equation lopsided and vulnerable to shocks in global commodity prices," GTRI added.

He called for strengthening the institutional and legal frameworks required for the smooth adoption of these codes in the UT. Stressing the importance of stakeholder outreach, he directed the Labour & Employment Department to roll out a sustained IEC campaign and undertake comprehensive capacity-building programmes for employers, workers and implementing agencies.

The Chief Secretary also emphasised the need to ensure full integration with the National Labour Portal so that the reforms are implemented uniformly and transparently. The Chief Secretary further instructed the department to expedite amendments in rules and issue all essential notifications to ensure that compliance under the new regime becomes faster, easier and less cumbersome for all

stakeholders. On this occasion Secretary, Labour & Employment, Kumar Rajeev Ranjan, explained that 44 Central labour laws have now been subsumed into four comprehensive codes, creating a unified and modern regulatory framework.

He informed that the Code on Wages, 2019 streamlines legislation relating to minimum wages, wage payment, bonus and equal remuneration, ensuring a statutory minimum wage for every worker and introducing a national floor wage to bring uniformity across sectors. The code also eliminates gender-based discrimination, explicitly protecting transgender workers, and shifts minor offences from criminal to monetary penalties to prevent

harassment. Regarding the Industrial Relations Code. 2020 it was revealed that the same integrates laws governing trade unions, standing orders and industrial disputes, providing a single

framework for industrial relations. It introduces fixed-term employment with benefits at par with permanent staff, raises the applicability threshold for Standing Orders from establishments with 100 to 300 workers and provides for two-member Industrial Tribunals to expedite dispute resolution. It also mandates a 14-day notice period for strikes and lockouts and lays down clearer criteria for

recognising trade unions. The Secretary further explained that the Social Security Code, 2020 consolidates nine major social security laws related to EPF, ESI, gratuity, maternity benefits, employment exchanges and welfare boards. It extends social security to gig workers, platform workers and other unorganised sector workers, who are formally recognised for the first time.

The code also establishes a dedicated Social Security Fund for unorganised workers, reduces EPF appeal deposits to ease employer burden and expands the definition of dependents to include grandparents and in-laws for female employees.

Likewise, the Occupational Safety, Health & Working Conditions (OSH&WC) Code, 2020 merges 13 laws on workplace safety and working conditions, enabling single electronic registration for establishments with 10 or more workers, ensuring uniform safety standards across industries and simplifying licensing procedures through a consolidated framework. It also strengthens protections for contract labour and interstate migrant workers.

India's third indigenous nuclear submarine to be commissioned soon: Navy Chief

New Delhi, Dec 02: India is strengthening the naval component of its nuclear triad with Navy Chief Admiral Dinesh K Tripathi on Tuesday saying that the third indigenous nuclear-powered submarine 'Aridaman' will be commissioned soon and that his force is focusing on boosting its overall combat prowess.

Thunder

Addressing a press conference ahead of the Navy Day, Admiral Tripathi said the process to seal the proposed acquisition of six stealth submarines under Project 75 India (P75-I) is nearing completion.

He also said that the Navy will get the first four of the 26 Rafale-M fighter jets in 2028. India had inked the Rs 64,000 crore deal with France in April to procure the jets.

The Navy Chief highlighted his force's role during Operation Sindoor and said its aggressive posturing forced the Pakistan Navy to remain close to their ports.

The Admiral said the Indian Navy maintained a high operational readiness, including in the Western Arabian Sea, in the last seven-eight months following the hostilities with Pakistan.

The Navy Chief, without elaborating, said Operation Sindoor "remains

in progress". "The aggressive posturing and immediate action during Operation Sindoor, including deployment of the carrier battle group, forced the Pakistan Navy to remain close to their ports or near the Makran coast," he said. The Navy Chief said that



Operation Sindoor has put financial strain on Pakistan as a significant number of merchant ships avoided travelling to that country following the hostilities.

The cost of insurance for the vessels to travel to Pakistan had also gone up, he said.

To a question on the nuclear-powered submarines, the Navy Chief said India is set to commission the third indigenous nuclear-powered submarine soon.

INS Aridaman is in the final stages of trials and will be commissioned soon, he said while responding to a question. India's nuclear-powered ballistic missile submarine (SSBN) programme is a closely guarded project. INS Arihant was the first vessel under the SSBN project, followed by INS Arighat.

The SSBN programme is a key element of India's nuclear deterrence capability.

While India has proven air and land-launched nuclear capabilities, it is now focusing on boosting its underwater nuclear prowess.

INS Arihant is India's first homemade nuclear submarine. It was launched in July 2009 and was quietly commissioned in 2016.

India is among a select group of countries having nuclear-powered submarines. The countries that have such assets are: the US, Russia, the UK, France and China.

India has been a leading voice in pitching for universal nuclear disarmament aimed at complete elimination of atomic weapons.

In 1998, India conducted Pokhran-II nuclear tests, triggering strong reactions from many countries. Following the tests, India maintained that it carried out the tests to have 'credible minimum deterrence' and it will follow the approach of "no

In 2003, India officially came out with its nuclear doctrine that clearly elaborated on the 'no first use'

Apple to discuss Sanchar Saathi app order with govt, may not follow in its current form



New Delhi, Dec 02: Apple and Samsung will discuss Sanchar Saathi app order with the government and try to find a middle path on the directive for its pre-installation on mobile phones, sources said.

In an order dated November 28, 2025, the Department of Telecom has directed manufacturers and importers of mobile handsets to ensure that its fraud reporting app, Sanchar Saathi, is pre-installed on all new devices and installed via a software update on existing handsets.

"Apple will discuss the order on Sanchar Saathi app installation and work out a middle path with them. The company may not be able to implement the order in the cur-

rent form," an industry source told PTI.

According to the direction, all mobile phones that will be manufactured in India or imported after 90 days from the date of issuing of the order will need to have the app. All mobile phone companies are required to report compliance to the DoT within 120 days.

Source shared that Samsung is reviewing the order and may also discuss it with the government before implementation.

Emails sent to Apple and Samsung seeking their comments elicited no response. Former CMD, BSNL, and Independ-

ent Director, Lava International, Anupam Shrivastava, said that the mandate to pre-install the Sanchar Saathi app is a strong and right move to combat mobile handset fraud and enhance national telecom cybersecurity.

'Even when it imposes a significant compliance burden on handset manufacturers. However, it is also extremely critical that DOT should clarify the app's exact data access and usage policies. This would mitigate users' concerns about their digital and personal privacy," Shrivastava said.

Lava International did not immediately share any comment on the matter.

Delhi on high alert ahead of Putin's India visit

New Delhi, Dec 02: Ahead of Russian President Vladimir Putin's visit to India, multiple security agencies have been placed on high alert with authorities preparing an ex-tensive security grid covering his route and engagements in the national capital, official sources said

Putin is scheduled to arrive in Delhi on December 4 for two-day visi

Though the Russian president's detailed itinerary has been finalised the exact details of his stay, including the location where he will be lodged, have been withheld due to stringent security requirements.

The police sources said all agencies involved in the security arrangements have been instructed to maintain continuous surveillance throughout the high-profile visit.

"From the time of his arrival till his departure, every movement will be monitored by multiple security agencies. We are coordinating minute-to-minute movement details in real time," a source said.

The source also said that top-ranking officers of Delhi Police will oversee the security arrangement -- from traffic management to the sanitisation of areas that the Russian president may visit during



his stay.

"According to the prepared route plan, all locations on the movement map will be secured and sanitized well in advance. Advisories will also be issued about restrictions to minimise inconvenience to commuters," he added.

The sources also said more than 50 personnel from Russia's advance security and protocol teams will be in the capital soon and they will conduct detail inspections of planned routes, potential stopovers, venues to be visited and the overall security architecture.

"During the two days, Delhi will witness a multi-layered security ring involving the Delhi Police,

central agencies and Putin's personal security team. Specialised units. including SWAT teams, anti-terror squads and quick reaction teams, will be stationed at strategic points across the capital. Drone monitoring, CCTV surveillance and technical intelligence systems will also be deployed to ensure real-time situational awareness," said the source.

Opp shedding crocodile tears on Manipur, indulging in drama: FM in RS

New Delhi, Dec 02: Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman on Tuesday accused the Opposition of shedding crocodile tears on Manipur and indulging in 'drama' over the grievances of people of the state.

Her attack came during her reply to a discussion in the Rajya Sabha on the Manipur Goods and Services Tax (Second Amendment) Bill, 2025, extending GST benefits to the state through a bill.

Sitharaman accused the Opposition of not participating in the discussion on the bill that sought to replace an Ordinance in this regard. The Opposition had earlier staged

ADB approves USD 650 mn loan to accelerate rooftop solar adoption in India

New Delhi, Dec 02: Multilateral development bank ADB has approved a USD 650 million (about Rs 5,780 crore) policy-based loan to help the Government of India accelerate rooftop solar adoption and expand access to clean, affordable energy for 10 million

The financing under Subprogram 1 of the Accelerating Affordable and Inclusive Rooftop Solar Systems Development Program will support the government's flagship initiative Pradhan Mantri Surya Ghar:

Muft Bijli Yojana (PMSGMBY) which aims to make rooftop solar systems widely accessible nationwide, ADB said in a statement on Tuesday.

The programme is accelerating India's clean energy transition by removing long-standing barriers to rooftop solar adoption, including financing constraints and regulatory gaps, ADB Country Director for India Mio Oka said.

It is making rooftop solar affordable and accessible for millions of households while creating green jobs, empowering women, and strengthening the financial health of the power sector, she said.

PMSGMBY will provide financial assistance to residential consumers for installing rooftop solar systems of up to 3 kilowatts (kW), with a 60 per cent subsidy for systems up to 2 kW and a 40 per cent subsidy for additional capacity between 2 kW and 3 kW.

Key reform areas under the programme include developing uniform operational guidelines and quality standards for residential rooftop solar systems and facilitating mass adoption among low- and middle-income households through collateral-free, low-interest loans, it said.

Aligned with India's Nationally Determined Contribution targets, the programme will enhance the skills and capacity of at least 5,000 personnel, including 1,500 women. It will also support the development of utility-led aggregation models and model solar villages, and foster a robust vendor ecosystem, it said. ADB's intervention is expected to significantly contribute to the nationwide objective of installing 30 gigawatts of rooftop solar capacity, achieving annual reductions of 28.8 million tonnes of CO2 emissions, and delivering affordable solar energy to millions of households, it said.

Human trials of beetroot juice reported lower early postprandial glycaemia and insulinaemia, which can blunt reactive hunger later. Sweet potatoes Sweet potatoes combine sol-

uble fiber with slowly digested starches and a low-moderate glycemic load, so they release energy gradually and keep hunger at bay. Satiety indexing studies and trials with purple/ varietal sweet potatoes show that tuber-based foods often score higher on fullnessthan refined cereals of equal calories. Broccoli

Broccoli's fiber and dense texture slow digestion, add true bulk with few calories, and blunt the post-meal glucose rise when eaten with carbs. A study published in Nutrients showed that adding a large broccoli portion to a rice meal reduced postprandial glycemic excursions, a metabolic effect that helps tame hunger later. Broccoli also keeps you chewing, which raises satiety independently of nutrients; it's one of the easiest vegetables to use as a volume-boost in stirfries, salads or preloads.

Kale is high in insoluble fiber and water, the combination increases fecal bulk and speeds transit for many people, which correlates with reduced appetite signals and fewer between-meal snacks. A randomized pilot trial in Frontiers in Nutrition found kale intake increased stool frequency and altered gut microbes linked to

Beirut, Dec 02: Pope Leo bade farewell to Lebanon on Tuesday with a fervent appeal to leaders across the Middle East to listen to their people's cries for peace and to change course away from the "horror of war."

The first US pope wrapped up his first overseas trip as Catholic leader by addressing 150,000 people at a Mass on Beirut's historic waterfront, where he pleaded for Lebanon to address years of conflict, political crises and economic misery.

Leo said the region as a whole needed new approaches to overcome political, social and religious divisions.

"The path of mutual hostility and destruction in the horror of war has been traveled too long, with the deplorable results that are before everyone's eyes," Leo said. "We need to change course. We need to educate our hearts for

MAY THE ATTACKS CEASE

Leo has been visiting Lebanon for three days on the second leg of an overseas trip that started in Turkiye, in which he has pleaded for peace in the Middle East and warned that humanity's future was at risk from the world's



proliferating conflicts.

The pope, a relative unknown on the world stage before his election to the papacy in May, has been closely watched as he made his first speeches overseas and interacted for the first time with people outside mainly Catholic Italy.

In Lebanon, he urged the heads of religious sects to unite to heal the country and pressed political leaders to persevere with peace efforts after last year's devastating war between Israel and Iran-backed Hezbollah, and continued Israeli strikes.

He also asked the international

Lebanese President Joseph Aoun asked Leo to keep Lebanon in his prayers, saying: "We have heard your message. And we will continue to embody it."

PAIN AFTER PAIN

Crowds had gathered at the waterfront hours before the start of Tuesday's Mass. They waved Vatican and Lebanese flags as Leo toured in an enclosed popemobile, offering blessings as some in the crowd used umbrellas to guard against a strong Mediterranean sun.

Maroun Al-Mallah, a 21-yearold student of landscape engineering, arrived at the site of Leo's Mass before dawn to volunteer and said the visit could be a reset for Lebanon.

"It was lovely to know there was a sign of hope coming back to Lebanon," Mallah told Reuters.

"Even in university, we just think what could come next. It's just pain after pain after pain ... especially after the third biggest explosion happened" at the port,

Earlier on Tuesday, Leo visited a psychiatric hospital run by Franciscan nuns and prayed near rubble at the Beirut port, where a 2020 chemical explosion shredded parts of Beirut. The blast

killed more than 200 people and caused billions of dollars in damage, but an investigation into the cause has been stymied and no one has been held to account.

Leo laid a wreath of flowers at a memorial there and greeted about 60 blast survivors and relatives of the victims from different religions holding photos of their lost loved ones.

He gave each a rosary in a pouch bearing his coat of arms. One woman sobbed as she greeted Leo and asked if she could give him a hug. He nodded, and they embraced.

Cecile Roukoz, who lost her brother in the blast, said Leo 'will raise his voice for justice, and we need justice for all the victims.'

Lebanon, which has the largest proportion of Christians in the Middle East, has been rocked by the spillover of the Gaza con-flict as Israel and Lebanese armed group Hezbollah went to war, culminating in a devastating Israeli offensive.

The country, which hosts 1 million Syrian and Palestinian refugees, is also struggling to overcome a severe economic crisis after decades of profligate spending sent the economy into a tailspin in late 2019.

AI's impact could worsen gaps between world's rich and poor, UN report says



Bangkok, Dec 02: Behind the hoopla over the promise of artificial intelligence lay difficult realities, including how such technology might affect people already disadvantaged in a data-driven world.

A new report by the United Nations Development Program notes most of the gains from AI are likely to be reaped by wealthy nations unless steps are taken to use its power to help close gaps in access to basic needs, as well as such advanced know-how.

The report released Tuesday likens the situation to the "Great Divergence" of the industrial revolution, when many Western countries saw rapid modernization while others fell behind.

Questions over how companies and other institutions will use AI are a near universal concern given its potential to change or replace some jobs done by people with computers and robots.

But while much of the attention devoted to AI focuses on productivity, competitiveness and growth, the more important question is what it will mean for human lives, the authors note.

"We tend to overemphasize the role of technology," said Michael Muthukrishna of the London School of Economics, the report's main author, told reporters. "We need to ensure it's not technology first, but it's people first," he said, speaking by video at the report's launch in Bangkok. The risk of exclusion is an issue for communities where most people are still struggling to access skills, electric power and internet connectivity, for older people, for people displaced by war, civil conflict and climate disasters. At the same time, such people may be "invisible" in data that will not take them into account, the report said. "As a general-purpose technology, AI can lift productivity, spark new industries, and help latecomers catch up," the report says. Better advice on farming, analysis of X-rays within seconds and faster medical diagnoses. more effective weather forecasts and damage assessments hold promise for rural communities and areas prone to natural disasters.

"AI systems that analyze poverty, health, and disaster risks enable faster, fairer, and more transparent decisions, turning data into continuous learning and public value," it says.

Still, even in wealthy nations like the United States, the potential for data centers to devour too large a share of electricity and water has raised concerns. Ramping up power generation to meet higher demand may hinder progress in limiting the emissions of carbon from burning fossil fuels that contribute to global warming, while also causing health hazards.

The technology raises ethical, privacy and cybersecurity concerns: researchers have found hackers using AI to automate portions of cyberattacks. There also is the problem of deepfakes that can misinform or facilitate criminal activity.

Asian nations including China, Japan, South Korea and Singapore are well placed to take advantage of AI tools, the report notes, while places like Afghanistan, the Maldives and Myanmar lack skills, reliable power and other resources needed to tap into the computing potential of AI. Inequalities between regions within countries mean some places even in advanced economies are prone to be left behind.

About a quarter of the Asia-Pacific region lacks online access, the report says.

If such gaps are not closed, many millions may be excluded from the kinds of devices, digital payment systems, digital IDs and education and skills that are required to participate fully in the global economy, falling further behind, said Philip Schellekens, the UNDP's chief economist for the Asia Pacific.

Other risks include misinformation and disinformation, surveillance that violates rights to privacy and systems that can act as "black boxes," reinforcing biases against minorities or other groups.

IND vs SA, 2nd ODI

Facing India with Kohli and Rohit nothing new, but it does bolster them, says Bavuma

Raipur, Dec 02: South Africa captain Temba Bavuma feels facing an Indian side with Virat Kohli and Rohit Sharma is nothing new, but it does bolster the host.

Kohli's 52nd ODI ton and Rohit's 57 set up a 17-run victory for India in the opening ODI, giving it a 1-0 lead in the three-match series, with the second match to be played in Raipur on Wednesday.

"The inclusion of those two guys that does bolster the team. Like we said at the start of the series, these are two guys who have a lot of experience and a lot of skill and that can only benefit the team.

"It is not something that we are not aware of," Bavuma told the media ahead of South Africa's training session at the Shaheed Veer Narayan Stadium. Underlining their experience in international cricket, Bavuma recalled watching a young Rohit in the 2007 T20 World Cup, which India won as a school student.

"We played against Rohit...



I think it was in 2007, the T20 World Cup. I was still in school then. I mean, these guys have been around, so there is nothing new. These are world-class

players," he said. "(Coming up against them is) nothing new, we have come across it. We have been on the bad end of it. But we have also had good times against them. It all just makes the series a lot more exciting," he said.

Bavuma, meanwhile, said there was nothing for him to clarify on the use of the word "grovel" made by South Africa head coach Shukri Conrad during the fourth day's play in the second Test. "No, I don't think

it is distracting (and) no it's not for me to clarify," said Bavuma, who missed the opening ODI.

Bavuma heaped praise on Marco Jansen, whose 39-ball 70 took South Africa to the brink of a victory in the first

"From an all-rounder point of view, I don't know where the rankings sit (but) I am sure the formats, will definitely be in a top 10. His contributions, with bat (or) with the ball (and) sometimes even both, they have been immense to our success," he said.

"He is still a young guy, but he has had a lot of international

cricket that is under his belt. He is only growing into his own and becoming a lot more comfortable under his skin."

Bavuma did not read much into South Africa's loss in the first ODI. "We were 15 runs (17) short of them. The gap between the batting performances wasn't a big one. India played well; their two stalwarts stood up, but we were not too far off.

Bavuma, who has led South Africa to 11 Test wins in his 12 matches as skipper so far, said it was up to those in "suits" in Cricket South Africa to ensure there are more Test matches against top countries.

"All of us have been crying for more cricket, especially against the top nations,' he said. "The Test series (against India) now, as much series, a lot of us would have wanted to see it going to a three or four-match series. When it's a side like India, they would have raised the standard, which would have forced us to raise our standards as well.

I'm hoping South Africa lifts first World Cup soon: Shamsi

Dubai, Dec 02: South African leftarm wrist-spinner Tabraiz Shamsi felt that their recent wave of success in international cricket, which included an away Test series win over India recently, is a sign of Proteas' landing their maiden ICC World Cup sooner than later.

South Africa reached the 2023 ODI World Cup semifinals, finished runners-up in the 2024 T20 World Cup and then clinched the World Test Championship title in June this year before whitewashing India 2-0 in the recently-concluded away Test series.

Touching base with PTI on the sidelines of the fourth season of the ILT20, Shamsi, who is set to make his debut in the tournament for the Adani Sportsline-owned Gulf Giants, said the progress has been gradual yet encouraging. "You can see, probably since 2021-22, we started performing better and better in knockout games. We got to the semifinals of the 2023 World Cup, then the final of the T20 World Cup in 2024, and then won the World Test Championship against Australia. As South African cricket, we've been trending upwards, and I'm really hoping that we lift our first World Cup very soon," said Shamsi. South Africa outplayed India on their own conditions with off-spinner Simon Harmer emerging as the top wicket-taker with 17 scalps and was adjudged player-of-the-series.



have also done well in the recent past when SA held Pakistan 1-1 in another away series. Shamsi was delighted to see the rise of spin in the pace bowling heartland. "Oh, unbelievable. It's been so many years of pain, especially for our Test team visiting India and being beaten quite comprehensively in the past. To see that the South African team has gone there and done so well, and especially seeing our spinners doing so well, that gives me a lot of joy because in past series the Indian spinners have given our batters a tough time.

"So for our spin bowlers to give the Indian batters a tough time... That was really nice to see. Of course, they have to be (the best in the world right now). Indian batters are very good at playing spin,

Left-arm spin duo of Keshav in my personal experience, and for Maharaj and Senuran Muthuswamy our boys to trouble them so much our boys to trouble them so much in their home conditions, of course they have to be the best trio." Shamsi, whose joy knew no bounds after SA etched a series win in India after 25 years, found the variety in the spin department a matter of pride. ''I'd add Aiden Markram as a fourth. We've got left-armers, right-armers, off-spin and left-arm orthodox-so we've got to back them in any condition," added Shamsi. He opted out of a CSA central con-

tract in 2024 to explore franchise opportunities but remained availale for national selection.

"Obviously, every time you're part of the South African team, it's the best thing you can do for yourself as a player. Nothing gets bigger than playing for your country," said the 35-year-old who has played 55 ODIs and 70 T20Is.
