

Div Com Kashmir reviews flood plain zoning process along river Jhelum

SRINAGAR, DECEMBER 17: Divisional Commissioner Kashmir, Anshul Garg, on Wednesday chaired a meeting of the Irrigation and Flood Control (I&FC) Department to review the notification status for delineation and demarcation of flood plain/flood basins identified post 2014 floods in the Jhelum basin to regulate land use and human activity for obviating flood threats and minimising flood damages.

The meeting, as per an official statement, was attended by the Assistant Commissioner Central, Chief Engineer I&FC, Deputy Director Planning, Executive Engineers of I&FC, and other concerned officers.

At the outset, I&FC officials gave a detailed presentation on Flood Plain Zoning and the notification of flood basins. The presentation covered the impact of the 2014 floods, inundation statistics of agricultural,



built-up and wasteland areas, loss of floodplain storage due to urbanisation and encroachment. integrated flood management strategies including structural and non-structural measures, and regulation of activities in

flood-prone areas.

Addressing the meeting, the Divisional Commissioner directed I&FC officials to reconcile flood basin expanse areas of six wetlands with the Forest & Wildlife Departments. These flood basins play a critical role in flood moderation and storage of excess floodwaters.

He also directed the circulation of land use classification details, including that of private players, for calling objections from the public at large.

The Div Com stressed the need to have scientific demarcation on the basis of Hrydrologic modelling, be done on left side of River Jhelum from Sangam to Padshahi Bagh which would further pave way for the administration to finalise the related extract revenue records reflecting land use. He further directed the modelling of a once-in-twenty-five-years flood area for the regulatory zone, freezing the boundary of regulatory zone to put the process on fast track.

Assistant Commissioner Central was asked to ensure the availability of revenue records of Anchar and Wullar lakes to the I&FC Department.

NCH resolve more than 24000 complaints in last 3 years

New Delhi, Dec 17: Jammu and Kashmir recorded more than 24,000 consumer complaints through the National Consumer Helpline (NCH) in the last three years, all of which were settled within the stipulated period, the Centre informed Parliament on Wednesday.

While replying to the Lok Sabha, the Ministry of Consum-

er Affairs said that 6,874 complaints were registered from Jammu and Kashmir in 2022. This number swelled to 7,967 complaints in 2023 and further increased to 9,178 complaints in 2024. The Ministry emphasised that 100 per cent disposal was achieved in

each of the three years. The government said that the steady rise in complaints from Jammu and Kashmir reflects the fact that the public has become more aware of their rights and their access to the National Con-

sumer Helpline. The Ministry said NCH has been upgraded to a centralised pre-litigation grievance redressal platform, which offers faster and technology-driven resolution of consumer complaints, including for consumers from Jammu and

The helpline now makes use of AI-based speech recognition, translation systems and an AI-enabled chatbot under the NCH 2.0 initiative. These steps allow consumers to lodge complaints through voice input and multiple digital platforms.

The complaints can now be registered through the web portal, mobile applications, SMS,



WhatsApp and toll-free number 1915, offering wider outreach even in remote areas of Jammu

and Kashmir, said the Ministry. Under the NCH 'Convergence' programme, the Ministry informed that the average resolution time has also come down significantly as complaints are now being resolved swiftly under a time-bound mechanism involving partner companies—(KNO)

Drought-Like Situation In Kashmir Is An Alarm Bell

he stark images of Kashmir's depleted rivers and drying springs this December are a deafening alarm bell for an unfolding climate crisis. Jhelum, the region's lifeline, hits historic lows, and vital springs in Pulwama, Shopian, and Bandipora shrink. We are witnessing the direct consequences of a profound environmental shift. This is a systemic threat to water security, agriculture, public health, and the very ecological

identity of Kashmir. A severe rainfall deficit, the near-absence of Western Disturbances, and receding glaciers, as recalled by Chief Minister Omar Abdullah, point to a disturbing new normal. The implications are immediate and severe: strained drinking water supplies, anxious farmers facing irrigation shortages, heightened forest fire risks, and deteriorating air quality that now rivals polluted plains. As experts from SKUAST-K warn, this is a

direct threat to food security and livelihoods. Expressing concern is no longer enough; it must catalyse urgent, science-based action. A multi-pronged strategy is imperative. First, water conservation must become a state mission. This requires massive investment in micro-irrigation, rainwater harvesting, and the restoration of traditional kuls (water channels) and springs. Second, agriculture must adapt. Promoting drought-resilient crops

and regenerative farming practices is no longer an option but a necessity for survival. Third, we must declare war on pollution. Strict enforcement of waste management laws, a rapid shift to electric public transport, and protecting forests are critical to improving air quality and mitigating climate impacts. Most crucially, this demands a "whole-of-society" approach. The government must lead with policy and investment, but every citizen,

community, and institution must become a water guardian. From fixing leaky taps to adopting sustainable practices, collective responsibility is our only recourse. Kashmir's glaciers and rivers are the foundation of life and the economy. To prevent today's drought from becoming tomorrow's catastrophe, we must act with the urgency this emergency demands. The time for debate is over; the time for decisive action is now.

Amrit Bharat Station Scheme targets redevelopment of 1,337 stations, 4 in J&K

New Delhi, December 17: The Ministry of Railways has launched the Amrit Bharat Station Scheme (ABSS) with a long-term vision for redevelopment and modernization of railway stations across the country through implementation of comprehensive master plans. This was stated by the Union Minister of Railways, Information & Broadcasting Electronics Information

Technology, Shri Ashwini Vaishnaw, in a reply to a question in the Lok Under the scheme, as

per a PIB statement, a total of 1,337 railway stations have been identified so far for redevelopment. Of these, four stations are located in Jammu & Kashmir, namely Budgam, Jammu Martyr Captain Tushar Mahajan and Shri Mata Vaishno Devi Katra. In Jharkhand, 57 stations have been selected, while 80 stations have been identified in Madhya Pradesh, including stations falling under Shahdol and Sidhi Lok Sabha Constituencies.

The Amrit Bharat Station Scheme focuses on preparing station-specific master plans and executing them in phases to improve passenger amenities and overall station infrastructure.

formed that the planned interventions include improvement of station access and circulating areas, integration of stations with both sides of cities, enhancement of station buildings, waiting halls, toilets, seating arrangements and drinking water facilities, provision of wider foot overbridges or air concourses based on passenger traffic, installation of lifts, escalators and ramps, improved platform surfaces and shelters, kiosks for local products under initiatives such as 'One Station One Product', parking and multimodal integration, amenities for Divyangjans, passenger

The scheme also envisages sustainable and environment-friendly solutions and development of stations as city centres in the long term to promote economic activities around station areas

So far, works have been Minister incompleted at 160 stations across Indian Railways, while substantial progress has been achieved at several others. In Jammu & Kashmir, significant works have been completed at Budgam, Jammu Tawi and Martyr Captain Tushar Mahajan stations, with additional facilities currently under execution. In Jharkhand, stations such as Muri Junction, Orga, Bano and Gangaghat have seen completion of major components, with finishing and allied works underway. In the Shahdol Lok Sabha Constituency, stations including Anuppur, Bijuri, Shahdol and Umaria have recorded notable improved progress, while works information have also commenced at systems, executive lounges Bargawan station in Sidhi and landscaping. Lok Sabha Constituency,

The Minister informed

that further development, redevelopment, upgradation and modernization of railway stations is a continuous process and is undertaken based on inter-se priorities, category of stations and availability of funds. Master planning under the scheme is an iterative process, and timelines for completion cannot be indicated at this stage due to the complexity of works, statutory clearances and operational challenges associated with brownfield projects.

Redevelopment of stations under the Amrit Bharat Station Scheme is generally funded under Plan Head-53 'Customer Amenities'. For the financial year 2025-26, a fund allocation of crore has been made under this plan head, against which an expenditure of

7,253 crore has been incurred up to October 2025, the Union Minister concluded.

Health Secy reviews winter preparedness; calls for seamless patient-care

Srinagar, Dec 17: Secretary Health & Medical Education Department, Dr. Syed Abid Rasheed Shah, on Wednesday conducted a comprehensive review of department's winter preparedness plan to ensure uninterrupted healthcare delivery across Jammu & Kashmir, particularly in snow-bound and hard-to-reach areas.

Emphasising that healthcare delivery in difficult terrains during

winter remains a top priority, Dr. Abid Rasheed issued a series of clear and time-bound directives aimed at safeguarding the public health during the forthcoming winter months.

The Secretary directed the Managing Director, Jammu & Kashmir Medical Supplies Corporation Limited (JKMSCL), to continuously monitor the DVDMS portal. He asked them to ensure adequate stocking and timely distribution of the Essential Drug List (EDL), with special focus on highaltitude and snow-bound areas. He

stressed that all possibilities of drug shortages during winter must be completely ruled out and a proactive approach is maintained to ensure an uninterrupted medicine supply chain.

Calling for immediate measures to strengthen the healthcare manpower, Dr. Abid directed for augmentation of staff through NHM in these districts. The Managing Director, National Health Mission (NHM) was instructed to rationalise the staff to critical locations, ensuring 24×7 functioning of all health institutions.

The Secretary further underscored the need for a robust and well-coordinated patient evacuation plan, with special attention to pregnant women and other highrisk patients. He directed to ensure that ASHA workers and Female Multipurpose Health Workers (FMPHWs) of the Family Welfare Department undertake Expected Date of Delivery (EDD)-based priority line listing of expecting mothers to facilitate timely referrals and evacuations.

organise these activities, we have no problem. However, it must be done safely. What often happens is that people without proper knowledge or experience bring equipment and start conducting rock climbing. As you may have seen recently in Uttarakhand, during a bungee-jumping incident, the rope was not properly secured and the person fell to the ground. We do not want such incidents here, where lives are at risk. Therefore, we will introduce such activities only with proper safety and security measures."

'OPEN EXISTING AND VISIBLE TOURIST DESTINATIONS'
On opening hidden tourist destinations CM

On opening hidden tourist destinations, CM Omar said existing and visible destinations should be prioritized first.

"First, open the destinations that are right in front of us. Many places are still closed. On one hand, we talk about promoting tourism, and on the other hand, these areas remain inaccessible. For example, in Gulmarg, the left side of the Gondola is closed; Doodhpathri is completely closed; Drang is not accessible; Ferozpora Nallah was also closed earlier. These places should be opened first," he said.

'J&K INHERITED FINANCIAL CONSTRAINTS' Responding to Union Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman's remarks on fiscal discipline, CM Omar said Jammu and Kashmir continues to function under inherited financial constraints.

"We are running the system with what we have inherited. J&K is not financially self-reliant and remains heavily dependent on the Government of India. Earlier, as a state, we received a share of central taxes, but after becoming a Union Territory, that share stopped, increasing pressure on our budget," he said.

However, CM Omar asserted that his government has maintained "financial discipline." "Despite these challenges, over the past 15–16 months, there has been no financial negligence. If anyone can point out even a single instance where public money has been misused, I am ready to be held accountable," he added.

PDD DIRECTED TO MINIMIZE POWER CUTS On electricity shortages in far-flung areas, CM Omar said it would be incorrect to claim that there is no electricity.

"You cannot say there is no electricity, no water, no snow, no rain, or no water in rivers. There have been slightly more power cuts, but the department has been instructed to minimise unscheduled cuts as much as possible. I also make a humble appeal to the people to use electricity judiciously," he said. (KNO)

Taj, who previously served as a cabinet minister in the PDP-Congress government and the NC-Congress government, was elected as a DDC member after defeating the Peoples Conference candidate.

"Yes, I didn't attend any meeting," Taj confirmed to news agency—Kashmir News Observer (KNO). When asked why, he said: "I didn't have any specific reason to do so."

Although he skipped all council meetings, Taj did turn up to cast his vote in the election for DDC chairperson and vice-chairperson on February 13, 2021.

Taj, a two-term MLA from Uri, served as a cabinet minister in the PDP-Congress government from 2002 to 2008 and in the NC-Congress regime from 2009 to 2014. He lost the 2024 Assembly election from Uri to NC's Sajad Shafi Uri when he contested as an independent backed by Altaf Bukhari's Apni Party. Recently, Taj returned to the Congress.

His absence from all council meetings for the past four years and ten months has raised serious questions about the rationale and wisdom behind his decision to contest the election

behind his decision to contest the election.

"Why should anyone contest an election if he or she is not willing to shoulder the responsibility that follows? It is baffling that a sitting DDC member has not attended any meeting of the council for nearly five years. The council is the only appropriate forum where a DDC member can represent his constituents," said a politician, wishing not to be named.

As per the Jammu & Kashmir Panchayati Raj Act, the chairperson is required to convene at least four meetings of the DDC in a financial year, one in each quarter. The Act also provides that failure to attend three consecutive meetings of the council by the chairperson or vice-chairperson can be grounds for moving a no-confidence motion against them.

While the Act specifies action against the chairperson or vice-chairperson for failing to attend meetings, it does not explicitly mention removal of ordinary members for absenteeism.

Jammu Airport 9.4°C against 6.9°C, Udhampur 3.3°C against 4.0°C, Ramban 5.6°C against 4.6°C, Samba 4.1°C against 3.5°C, Rajouri 1.8°C against 1.0°C, Kishtwar 7.6°C against 8.3°C, Reasi 7.4°C against 6.5°C, and Doda data was not available today.

In Ladakh, Leh recorded minus 6.3°C against minus 4.8°C yesterday, Kargil minus 5.8°C against minus 4.2°C, and Nubra Valley minus 5.0°C against minus 1.9°C.

The Chief Minister began his address on a personal note, recalling the rock piece from Mount Everest presented to him at the event and said it would remain one of the most memorable gifts he had ever received. "I touched the summit of Mount Everest sitting comfortably in this hall," he quipped, drawing laughter from the audience.

Omar thanked ATOAI President, Ajit Bajaj, for his persistence and passion in bringing the ATOAI convention to Jammu and Kashmir. "Files in government sometimes stop moving entirely," he said, "but Bajaj's determination ensured we made it here. I'd say 95% of the credit goes to him and his team."

Pivoting to his core message, the Chief Minister underscored the urgent threat of climate change to Kashmir's adventure tourism. "Jammu and Kashmir is ideally placed as a destination for adventure tourism. We were skiing in Gulmarg before independence, when the British installed our first ski lift. But today, the reality of climate change can no longer be ignored," he said.

While snow remains central to Kashmir's allure, Omar said the state must diversify adventure offerings, from paragliding and trekking to whitewater rafting, mountaineering and ballooning, to make Jammu and Kashmir a "yearround adventure destination".

"We recently trained a batch of paragliding instructors and pilots. Hot air ballooning has started modestly, but we hope to expand. Adventure tourism can take people into areas that wouldn't otherwise see regular tourist traffic," he added.

The CM said that while leisure and MICE tourism remain important, "adventure tourism opens doors to unexplored geographies, creating local livelihoods and connecting communities."

Stressing the balance between thrill and safety, Abdullah said, "Adventure tourism is not another word for organised suicide. It's about excitement done responsibly, sustainably and repeatably. There must be adrenaline, yes, but not recklessness."

He lauded ATOAl's efforts in developing national safety guidelines for adventure tourism,

promising the government's full cooperation.
"Those who entrust their lives to us must be

returned safely to their families, maybe with a little more heartbeat, but nothing more harmful than that," he shared, drawing laughter from the audience.

The CM reiterated the government's commitment to supporting operators, improving safety protocols and ensuring that Kashmir remains a trusted, innovative destination for adventure seekers.

Omar said the future of tourism in Jammu and Kashmir depends on sustainable action, not slogans. "We must protect the very land-scapes that people come to experience. "If Gulmarg were a private ski destination rather than government-supported, it might have ceased to exist today," Omar said. "We barely get snow for a month or a month and a half now, whereas we used to ski from December till March."

To counter this, the CM said the government is actively considering the use of "artificial snow-making systems" to extend ski seasons. "We have sub-zero temperatures but lack precipitation. That's where new technology can help," he added, urging industry stakeholders to innovate for survival.

Abdullah said the shrinking snow cover poses a challenge to J&K's traditional winter calendar and called for diversifying adventure offerings beyond skiing, including paragliding, whitewater rafting, mountaineering, trekking and hot air ballooning to position Jammu and Kashmir as a year-round adventure destination.

He said the government has already trained a new batch of paragliding pilots and instructors and plans to expand aerial adventure activities in the near future. "Adventure tourism opens doors to unexplored geographies, creating livelihoods and connecting communities," he said.

The Chief Minister further stressed the need for responsible and safe adventure tourism, remarking that "adventure tourism is not another word for organised suicide. It's about excitement done responsibly, sustainably, and repeatably."

India, Ethiopia natural partners in regional peace, security, connectivity: PM Modi

Addis Ababa, Dec 17: India and Ethiopia are "natural partners" in regional peace, security and connectivity, Prime Minister Narendra Modi said on Wednesday in his address to the Ethiopian Parliament.

Modi, who arrived in Ethiopia on Tuesday on his maiden bilateral visit, addressed a joint session of the East African nation's parliament.

This was the 18th parliament in the world that Prime Minister Modi has addressed.

"Ethiopia sits at a crossroads of Africa. India stands at the heart of the Indian Ocean. We are natural partners in regional peace, security and connectivity," the prime minister said.

"Our commitment to mutual security became stronger with the signing of a defence cooperation agreement earlier this year. This arrangement focuses on closer military cooperation," he said.

Asserting that India and Ethiopia share "warmth in climate as well as in spirit", Modi said that the ancestors of the two nations exchanged ideas and way of life, and not just goods.

He said that both nations understand that democracy is a way of life and a journey. "It is shaped sometimes by debate, sometimes by disagreement, but always by belief in the rule of law." The prime minister said that when the wheel of the state moves in harmony with the people, the wheel of progress moves forward with hope and purpose.

Speaking about the Global South, Modi said the region is writing its own destiny, and India and Ethiopia share a vision for it. "Our vision is of



a world where the Global South rises not against anyone, but for everyone,"

We stand together and work for a world which is more just, equal and peaceful, he said, adding that the world cannot move forward if its systems remain locked in the past.

He also thanked Ethiopia for its solidarity in strengthening the global fight against terrorism.

Underscoring the civilisational ties between India and Ethiopia, Modi said that both the countries combine ancient wisdom with modern

"Our emotions for our motherland also reflect our shared perspectives. India's national song, 'Vande Mataram', and the Ethiopian national anthem both refer to our land as the mother." They inspire us to take pride in the heritage, culture, beauty, and protect the motherland, he said.

As developing countries, India and Ethiopia have a lot to learn from and offer to each other, Modi said.

"Indian companies are among the largest investors in Ethiopia. They have invested more than USD 5 billion across diverse sectors and generated more than 75,000 jobs. We have decided to elevate India-Ethiopia bilateral relationship to a strategic partnership."

The two countries elevated their historical ties to the level of 'Strategic Partnership' on Tuesday, and several MoUs were also exchanged after Modi's wide-ranging talks with his Ethiopian counterpart, Abiy Ahmed Ali.

In his address, Modi said that India's Digital Public Infrastructure has "transformed the way we deliver services and how people access them." He said that India sent medicines and vaccines to more than 150 countries during the COVID-19 pandemic, and it was India's "proud privilege" to supply Ethiopia with over 4 million vaccine doses. Calling

Ethiopia one of the oldest civilisations in human history, Modi said, "Ethiopia stands tall because its roots are deep... the past is honoured, the present is full of purpose, and the future is welcomed with open heart."

At the conclusion of his speech,

Modi received a long standing ovation from the members of Parliament. In an X post, Modi said it was a "great honour and privilege" to

address the Ethiopian Parliament. "Ethiopia's rich history, culture and spirit inspire deep respect and admiration. I conveyed India's commitment to further strengthening our partnership, guided by shared values, mutual trust and a common vision for peace, development and cooperation," he said.

In his speech, Modi said that it was "wonderful" to be in Ethiopia, the land of lions, he said, adding, "I feel very much at home because my home state, Gujarat in India, is also home to lions."

"Yesterday, I was also honoured to receive 'Great Honour Nishan of Ethiopia'. I accept this award with folded hands and humility on behalf of the people of India," he said.

Modi is the first global head of state to receive Ethiopia's highest award.

Earlier in the day, Modi laid a wreath at the Adwa Victory Monu-"The monument stands as a powerful symbol of Ethiopia's courage, unity and unwavering spirit. It reminds the world of a proud nation that protected itself with determination and resolve," he said in an X post.

Modi is on a four-day, three-nation visit. He arrived here on Tuesday from Jordan and will depart for Oman from here.

SC asks Centre, SCBA to suggest measures to prevent incidents like shoe hurl at CJI

New Delhi, Dec 17: The Supreme Court on Wednesday asked the Centre and the Supreme Court Bar Association to suggest measures to prevent recurrence of incidents like the shoe-hurl attempt targeting former CJI B R Gavai in the courtroom.

The court also asked for a standard operating procedure for the media to report on

A bench comprising Chief Justice Surya Kant and Justice Joymalya Bagchi asked Solicitor General Tushar Mehta, appearing for the Centre, and senior advocate and SCBA President Vikas Singh, to submit suggestions to it for issuing the guidelines to deal with the issue.

"The solicitor general, Tushar Mehta, and senior advocate and SCBA president jointly state that they will put up joint suggestions recommending preventive measures for these kinds of occurrences, and the protocol to be observed for reporting and publicising such incidents in future," the CJI said.

The top court waived off the procedural formality of issuing a notice to the Centre and said that the issue was non-adversarial in nature and hence, a common suggestion may be submitted.

Earlier, the bench expressed its reluctance in initiating criminal contempt proceedings against 71-year-old lawyer Rakesh Kishore, who attempted to throw a shoe at the then CJI and said the court



would look into whatever needs to be done. It asked the SCBA to give their suggestions as the court would look to formulate pan-India preventive guidelines.

"Just think of giving three-four suggestions on how to prevent such incidents in places like court premises and bar rooms, etc. All of you, please give suggestions.

"Whatever requires to be done, we will see on the next date. We will request the attorney general also to give his suggestions in this regard," Justice Kant said on November 12. The bench was hearing a plea of the SCBA seeking contempt action

against advocate Kishore, who attempted to hurl a shoe towards ex-CJI Gavai on October 6 during court proceedings

Kishore's act prompted the Bar Council of India (BCI) to suspend his licence with immediate effect. Gavai, who remained unfazed during and after the unprecedented incident, asked the court officials and the security personnel present inside the courtroom to "just ignore" it and to let off the errant lawyer with a warning.

The incident sparked widespread condemnation, including from Prime Minister Narendra Modi, who also spoke to Gavai.

India aspires for 25 pc contribution in global trade: FM

New Delhi, Dec 17: India is working towards securing 25 per cent of global trade in the coming years by building on its strong macroeconomic foundations, resilient growth trajectory and rapidly expanding entrepreneurecosystem, said Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman.

The Finance Minister was addressing the India Economic Conclave in Delhi on Wednesday.

She said the global economic landscape is undergoing a major shift, with trade increasingly getting weaponised through tariff restrictions and strategic barriers. These developments, she noted, pose fresh geo-economic challenges for emerging and developed economies alike. However, the Finance Minister said that India remains prepared to engage with the changing global trade environment through dialogue and negotiation.

India will negotiate firmly but constructively to protect its interests while ensuring that global trade remains fair and rules-based, Sitharaman said. She underlined that India believes in engagement rather than



with global partners to address distortions in trade. Despite these challenges, Sitharaman said India is confident of converting global uncertainties into opportunities by leveraging its domestic strengths. She emphasised that India's growth has been steady and people-driven, and not dependent on short-term policy measures. "The resilience of India is the

real story," she said, adding that this resilience has been built consistently over decades. From the post-Independence period to the present, India has repeatedly adapted to changing global and domestic conditions while responding to the

aspirations of its people. Referring to the past ten years, the Finance Minister said India has entered a decisive phase of transformation. She pointed to the rapid expansion of financial inclusion, which has brought millions of citizens into the formal banking system and improved access to savings, credit and insurance.

She said sustained efforts have also been made in social development, including childcare support, policies aimed at increasing women's participation in the workforce, and large-scale delivery of affordable housing. These measures, she said, have strengthened economic participation and social security.

National Herald case

Congress misleading public, matter still in court: BJP

New Delhi, Dec 17: The BJP on Wednesday accused the Congress of running misleading propaganda over the trial court's decision in the National Herald case and said the court refused to take cognisance of the complaint but did not set aside the case.

The case is still pending trial in the Delhi High Court, and the trial court in its order on Tuesday said that the Enforcement Directorate (ED) can continue its investigation, BJP national spokesperson Gaurav Bhatia asserted.

"The court yesterday (Tuesday) said that since it is a private complaint and no FIR has been lodged, it will not take cognizance of it. It's a technical matter. The court also said that ED can continue its investigation further. The court did not set it aside," Bhatia told a press conference at the BJP headquarters here

"Its trial is still going on. Sonia Gandhi is still Accused Number-1 and Rahul Gandhi Accused Number-2," the BJP spokesperson said, alleging, "The Gandhi family thrives on deceit, deception, and propaganda."

How dementia quietly takes shape in the brain: Doctor explains changes we don't see

New Delhi, Dec 17: A new Lancet study has sparked a lot of conversation and concern around dementia, one of the most talked-about health issues today. According to the study, certain depressive symptoms that begin in midlife may increase the risk of developing dementia later on.

The researchers identified six specific symptoms: losing confidence, feeling unable to face problems, not experiencing warmth or affection, feeling nervous, persistent dissatisfaction, and difficulty concentrating. On their own, these feelings can seem very relatable - something many people experience during stressful phases of life. But the study suggests that when these symptoms



linger or intensify during midlife, they could be more than just emotional ups and downs.

That's what makes the findings unsettling. Emotions we often brush aside as "normal stress" or "just a bad phase" may be

quietly linked to long-term brain health. It doesn't mean everyone who feels this way will develop dementia, but it does highlight the importance of paying attention to mental well-being early.

To understand what this

really means and how worried we should be, we spoke to Dr. Aditya Gupta, Director – Neurosurgery & Cyberknife at Artemis Hospital, Gurugram. He explains what dementia actually is, how mental health and brain health are connected, and why recognising these signs early can make a meaningful difference in the long run.

When you say dementia can start decades earlier, what's actually happening inside the brain during those "silent" years?

Dr. Aditya Gupta: Harmful changes happen over the years after someone has lost their ability to speak. During this time, proteins build up in their brains without any indication that something is wrong, such as beta-amyloid or tau proteins, as well as damage done to nerve connections. Chronic inflammation occurs, as does a decrease in blood flow to certain areas of the brain. The body's compensatory mechanisms hide the symptoms of brain problems for many years, until the damage to the brain becomes too severe to live with. Which everyday habits damage

brain health the most over time, even if they seem harmless in the short term?

Dr. Aditya Gupta: The brain is affected negatively by chronic poor sleep, prolonged stress, lack of physical activity, poor dietary habits (i.e., a high intake of processed foods and sugars), smoking, and excess alcohol. Being sedentary for long periods (especially in front of a computer) and being socially isolated will reduce cognitive stimulation.

Millions pledged to Syrian Australian man who stopped gunman, became national hero

Wellington, Dec 17: Like many Australians strolling at Bondi Beach on long, warm summer evenings, Ahmed al Ahmed just wanted a cup of coffee with a friend. Around him, a bloody massacre erupted as two gunmen targeted Jews during Hanukkah festivities at a park close to the shore.

Soon al Ahmed was creeping, bent over, between two parked cars, before barreling directly toward one of the unsuspecting shooters. In footage that has been viewed millions of times around the world, the 44-year-old father can be seen tackling one of the gunmen, wrestling the man's shotgun from his grip and turning it on the attacker.

The story of the Syrian-Australian Muslim shop owner who put an end to the rampage of one of the shooters on Sunday has been seized upon by a country desperately seeking comfort after one of its darkest hours: the slaying of 15 people as they celebrated their Jewish faith.

Millions have been raised for Bondi hero "At a moment where we have seen evil perpetrated, he shines out as an example of the strength of humanity," Prime Minister Anthony Albanese said Tuesday, as he left a Sydney hospital where al Ahmed is being treated for gunshot wounds. "We are a brave country. Ahmed al Ahmed represents the best of our country." A fundraising page established by Australians who had never met al Ahmed had attracted by Tuesday night donations by some 40,000 people,



who gave 2.3 million Australian dollars (\$1.5 million). Among the supporters was the billionaire hedge fund manager William Ackman, who pledged AU\$99,000.

Father of two faces a long recovery

Al Ahmed, who is married with two young daughters, faces a long struggle ahead, those who have spoken to him since Sunday's massacre say. He was shot multiple times in the left arm, apparently by the second gunman in the attack as the man fired indiscriminately from a footbridge. He has already undergone surgery and more operations are scheduled, said Lubaba alhmidi Alkahil, a spokesperson for the Australians for Syria Association, who visited al Ahmed in a hospital late Monday. The "quiet and humble" man was conscious but frail and faced at least six months of recovery, Alkahil said.

A prime minister and a president are fans In the days since the attack, a pile of floral tributes and notes of thanks has grown outside the small tobacco store al Ahmed owns opposite a train station in suburban Sydney.

hospital from Australia's leaders, apparently telling Chris Minns, the premier of New South Wales state, that he'd take the same action again. He has been hailed as a hero by world leaders including US President Donald Trump and Australia's Governor General, who is the representative of Britain's King Charles in the country. Minns said al Ahmed saved "countless" lives in what the premier said was "the most unbelievable scene I've

Al Ahmed was once a police officer Al Ahmed lived in the town of Nayrab in Syria's Idlib region before he arrived in Australia, his cousin Mohammad al Ahmed told

The Associated Press. He left Syria in 2006 after finishing his studies, before the 2011 mass protests against the government of then-President Bashar Assad that were met with a brutal crackdown and spiraled into a

nearly 14-year civil war. Nayrab was heavily bombed by Assad's forces with most of the town's houses flattened and reduced to rubble. On Tuesday, al Ahmed was the talk of the town.

"Ahmed did really a heroic job," his cousin, Mohammad al Ahmed told The Associated Press. "Without any hesitation, he tackled the terrorist and disarmed him just to save innocent people." Ahmed al Ahmed's parents, who came to Sydney this year to reunite with their son, told Australian Broadcasting Corp. that their son had served with the police and in the central security forces in Syria. Father Mohamed Fateh al compelled him to act on Sunday.

"I feel pride and honor because my son is a hero of Australia," the father said.

Tale of heroism gives hope amid tragedy In the aftermath of the mass killing, a country roiling from one of the worst hate-fueled attacks ever on its soil - allegedly committed by an Australian resident who arrived from India in 1998 and his Australian-born son — looked for hope amid their grief. Stories of heroism have started to emerge. They included the tale of a married couple, Boris and Sofia Gurman, who were both killed while trying to stop one of the shooters as he climbed from his car and began the massacre, their family has told Australian news outlets.

Reuven Morrison, 62, was also killed while trying to stop the horror, according to his daughter, Sheina Gutnick. After al Ahmed wrestled the gun from one shooter, a person Gutnick identified as Morrison is seen throwing objects at the gunman — before he was shot by the second man.

Acts of courage like these were cited by many on social media and in news outlets as examples of what being Australian should mean. "When he did what he did, he wasn't thinking at all about the background of the people he's saving, the people dying in the street," Mohamed Fateh al Ahmed said of his son. "He doesn't discriminate between one nationality and another, especially here in Australia there's no difference between one citizen and another."

Australian police charge alleged Bondi killer with terrorism, 15 murder counts



Dec 17: Police charged alleged Bondi gunman Naveed Akram with terrorism, 15 counts of murder and a litany of other crimes on Wednesday after Australia's deadliest mass shooting in decades. "Police will allege in court the man engaged in conduct that caused death, serious injury and endangered life to advance a religious cause and cause fear in the community," New South

Wales state police said. "Early indications point to a terrorist attack inspired by Daesh, a listed terrorist organization in Australia," they said in a statement, using another name for the Daesh group. Authorities say Naveed and his father Sajid Akram opened fire on a Jewish festival at Sydney's famed Bondi Beach on Sunday evening, killing 15 people and wounding dozens more. Among the victims were a 10-year-old girl, two Holocaust survivors and a married couple shot dead as they tried to thwart

Naveed was critically wounded by police during the shooting, and local media reported he woke from a coma on Tuesday night. Sajid Akram was killed in a shootout with police.

Ancient cures and AI: WHO seeks evidence for traditional medicine

New Delhi, Dec 17: The World Health Organization opens a major conference on traditional medicine on Wednesday, arguing that new technologies, including artificial intelligence, can bring scientific scrutiny to centuries-old healing practices.

The meeting in New Delhi will examine how governments can regulate traditional medicine while using emerging scientific tools to validate safe and effective treatments.

The UN body hopes this push will help make ancestral practices more compatible with modern health care systems.

"Traditional medicine is not a thing of the past," WHO chief Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus said in a video released ahead of the three-day conference.

"There is a growing demand for traditional medicine across countries, communities, and cultures."

Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi, in his own message, said the summit would "intensify efforts to harness" the



potential of traditional medicine.

Modi is a longtime advocate of yoga and traditional health practices and has backed the WHO Global Center for Traditional Medicine, launched in 2022 in his home state of Gujarat.

Shyama Kurvilla, the head center, said reliance on traditional remedies was "a global reality," noting that 40-90 percent of populations in 90 percent of WHO member states used them.

"With half the world's population lacking access to essential health services,

traditional medicine is often the closest or only care — available for many people," she told AFP in New Delhi. 'Evidence-informed'

The UN agency defines traditional medicines as the accumulated knowledge, skills and practices used over time to maintain health and prevent, diagnose and treat physical and mental illness.

But many lack proven scientific value, while conservationists warn that demand for certain products drives trafficking in endangered wildlife, including tigers, rhinos and pangolins.

"WHO's role, therefore, is to help countries ensure that, as with any other medicine, traditional medicine is safe, evidence-informed, and equitably integrated in systems," Kurvilla added.

Kurvilla, who studied at the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine, and taught global health policy at Boston University, said that "40 percent or more of biomedical Western medicine, pharmaceuticals, derive from natural products."

While MI exited the bidding, KKR and LSG took the price to Rs 2.80 crore before CSK entered the fray.

I hope football has bright future in India: Messi after 'amazing' tour

New Delhi, Dec 17: Lionel Messi hoped that football has a "bright future" in India and expressed gratitude for the "generous hospitality" that he got here during a whirlwind three-day tour, which had thousands of fans jostling to catch a glimpse of the Argentine genius in four different cities. Messi, after extending

his stay by a day to visit the Anant Ambani-founded Vantara wildlife rescue, rehabilitation and conservation centre in Jamnagar, left for his base in Miami on Wednesday. Taking to Instagram,

the 38-year-old posted a one-minute highlights clip of the tour, featuring his interactions with Indian cricket icon Sachin Tendulkar, Bollywood actor Kareena Kapoor Khan and several young footballers.

"What amazing visits to Delhi, Mumbai, Hyderabad, and Kolkata. Thank you for the warm reception, generous hospitality, and all the feelings of love with which you surrounded me throughout my tour. "I hope that football has a bright future in India," he



wrote underneath the video. His good wishes come at a time when Indian football finds itself at its lowest ebb. The domestic season has been brought to a halt for the want of a commercial partner and the national team's fortunes have been in a free-fall following a string of poor results.

prompting Messi to be whisked away sooner than the originally planned time. However, his visits to Hyderabad, Mumbai and Delhi passed off smoothly as he charmed fans by posing for pictures and showcasing some of his warm-up routines besides playing briefly with young players.
"...we carry all this love

with us, and we will definitely return, hopefully one day to play a match or on another occasion, but we will definitely return to visit India." he said after the final leg of
