Snowfall spurs surge in railway travel across J&K

Srinagar, Dec 22: Inclement weather in Jammu and Kashmir has prompted a surge in passengers at railway stations, with many preferring train travel between Jammu and Srinagar over road transport, officials said on Monday.

An official told the news agency–Kashmir News Observer (KNO) that the recent snowfall in the valley led to a surge of local passengers and tourists, putting additional pressure on railway services. He said the railways have made arrangements to manage passengers amid ongoing snowfall and rainfall across the region, which has disrupted road traffic.

Two Vandai Bharat trains are currently running between Srinagar and Katra in both directions, the official said, adding, "If passenger rush increases in the coming days, we will write to higher authorities for additional trains.

He said the Katra-Srinagar rail service is operating at full capacity to accommodate travellers affected by disrupted road movement.

Jammu, Dec 22: The Jammu Airport has recorded steady growth in air traffic during 2025, handling over 13.5 lakh passengers and nearly 10,972 flight movements till mid-December.

As per the data accessed exclusively by the news agency—Kashmir News Observer (KNO), the airport recorded 5,486 arrivals and 5,486 departures between January 1 and December 15, 2025.

During the same period, total passenger arrivals stood at 6,83,632, while departures were recorded at 6,70,764, reflecting a steady flow of domestic travellers throughout the year.

Cargo and mail operations also continued smoothly. Between January and November 2025, Airport handled 810.32 tonnes of incoming and 247.86 tonnes of outgoing cargo and mail, underscoring its growing logistical importance.

During the meeting, as per an official statement, detailed discussions were held on the functioning of energy-efficient LED street lights, with particular emphasis on improving illumination levels, reducing power consumption, and ensuring uninterrupted lighting in residential areas, commercial hubs, and major traffic corridors. The Commissioner underscored that efficient street lighting is a critical civic service, directly contributing to public safety, pedestrian comfort, night-time mobil-

ity, and overall urban aesthetics.
Reviewing project milestones, the Commissioner stressed the need for strict adherence to quality standards, timely completion of pending works, and robust maintenance mechanisms. He highlighted that prompt repair and replacement of faulty street lights, especially in densely populated and vulnerable areas, must remain a top priority to ensure public convenience and safety. Challenges related



to maintenance, fault reporting, and response time were examined in detail. The Commissioner directed EESL to further strengthen on-ground monitoring and ensure that the Annual Maintenance Contract (AMC) is implemented effectively, with clear accountability of vendors. The importance of coordinated action between SMC field wings and EESL teams was also emphasized to enable faster resolution of issues.

The meeting also discussed the future roadmap for expanding energy-efficient street lighting, including centralized monitoring, and advanced technologies aimed at improving operational efficiency and reducing long-term costs.

It was decided that EESL will submit a detailed progress report along with revised timelines, while SMC will enhance inter-departmental coordination to expedite clearances and facilitate smooth implementation. Joint inspection teams will conduct regular field verifications to ensure optimal performance of installations.

DC Budgam reviews banking performance, calls for faster credit flow

BUDGAM, DECEMBER 22: The 93rd District Level Review Committee cum District Consultative Committee (DLRC/ DCC) meeting of District Budgam was held Monday at the Conference Hall of the DC Office Budgam under the chairmanship of Deputy Commissioner Budgam, Dr. Bilal Mohi-ud-Din Bhat.

The meeting, as per an official statement, undertook a comprehensive review of the performance of banks in the district with regard to deposits, advances and overall credit delivery as on 30 September 2025, including a year-on-year comparison.

The Lead District Manager, Mohammad Muzaffar, presented a detailed overview of the district's banking performance.

It was informed that during the second quarter of FY 2025-26, substantial progress has been achieved under Priority Sector Lending (PSL), reflecting focused efforts towards inclusive credit flow. Against an annual priority sector lending target of Rs. 2263.6 crore, banks have so far achieved Rs.1168 crore, registering an overall achievement of 51.65 percent.

The meeting was further informed that total deposits in Budgam district increased from Rs.5050.13 crore as on 30 September 2024 to Rs. 5138.11 crore as on 30 September 2025, registering a growth of Rs.87.98 crore (1.74%).

Similarly, total advances rose from Rs.5346.98 crore to Rs.5467.82 crore, reflecting an increase of Rs.120.84 crore (2.25%). The overall Credit Deposit (CD) ratio of the district stood at around 106 percent, indicating a robust and healthy flow of credit. At present, 11 banks are operating in Budgam through a network of 101

Senior officials of the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) participated in the meeting through video conferencing and provided valuable guidance on strengthening banking performance, improving credit outreach and enhancing financial inclusion.

Inclement weather disrupts traffic, airways

Srinagar, Dec 22: Fresh snowfall and rain in the Kashmir on Monday disrupted air and vehicular movement, while traffic on the Jammu-Srinagar National Highway (NH-44) remained slow due to single-lane movement at several stretches.

The cold conditions across J&K eased slightly following fresh snowfall in higher reaches and rainfall in the plains, even as the Meteorological Department forecast further precipitation over the next 12 hours.

The Traffic Police said movement on the National Highway has been regulated from 4 pm on December 22 and will continue till 4 pm on December 23 due to the breakdown of two heavy motor vehicles.

weather and a forecast of snowfall and rainfall over the next few days, commuters have been advised to travel only after confirming road conditions through official channels.

Passenger light motor vehicles were advised to prefer daytime travel on the Jammu-Srinagar axis, while heavy motor vehicles were In view of inclement asked to avoid night travel

due to congestion between the Nashri tunnel and NAV-YUG tunnel.

"Subject to fair weather and improved road conditions, two-way traffic of light vehicles and regulated movement of heavy vehicles was planned on NH-44 in coordination with the Traffic Control Unit Ramban," the officials added. Meanwhile, the Kishtroad, Srinagar-Sonamarg-Gumri road and Mughal Road were closed for vehicular movement due to snow accumulation, while security forces convoy movement was allowed after clearance from traffic authorities.

The Gurez-Bandipora road was also closed following snowfall, while several interior roads in north Kashmir were cut off due to snow accumulation, even as the administration initiated snow clearance operations.

Travellers were urged to follow lane discipline and avoid overtaking to prevent congestion.

2 FLIGHTS CANCELLED

IndiGo and SpiceJet airlines had to cancel two flights from Srinagar airport due to low visibility. In a post on X, the airport said. "Passengers are advised to check their flight status with the respective airline for the latest updates and alternate arrangements."—(KNO)

Over 6,500 cat bite cases reported at SMHS

Srinagar, Dec 22: Kashmir is witnessing a sharp and worrying rise in cat bite cases, with over 6,500 incidents reported at the Anti Rabies Clinic (ARC), SMHS Hospital, Srinagar, this year so far, highlighting serious gaps in pet care, vaccination, and awareness among cat owners.

Official data reveal that over 6500 cat bite cases were reported at ARC SMHS this year, and cat bite cases are more than dog bite cases reported at ARC.

An official at ARC SMHS told KNO that the surge is largely attributed to the increasing trend of keeping cats as pets, especially after the COVID-19 pandemic, without following basic animal healthcare norms.

"Cats do transmit rabies, similar to dogs, but unfortunately, many owners believe cats are harmless and do not require vaccination. We are seeing a consistent rise in cat exposure cases. Now more than half of the animal bite cases



reaching our clinic are due to cats," the official said.

He added that many pet owners fail to vaccinate, deworm, or provide timely medical care to their cats, which significantly increases the risk of zoonotic diseases—illnesses that can spread from animals to humans.

The official said that pet ownership in Kashmir has increased steadily over the past few years, with cats becoming popular companion animals. Unlike livestock that provide economic returns,

pets are kept for companionship and emotional support, making responsible ownership crucial,

"Anyone who intends to keep a pet must be mentally and financially prepared to meet its needs-proper feeding, shelter, healthcare, and behavioural management. There is no point in bringing an animal home if due care is not ensured," the official said.

Surprise security checks held across Srinagar

Srinagar, Dec 22: In a surprise operation, Srinagar Police, assisted by Central Reserve Police Force (CRPF) personnel, intensified security checks across multiple areas of the city on Monday.

An official said that joint teams conducted coordinated frisking drives and vehicle inspections at several busy locations. The operation brought shops, commercial complexes and vehicles under close scrutiny as part of heightened surveillance measures. "The exercise was aimed at maintaining vigilance and ensuring overall public safety," he added.

"The coordinated exercise, a preventive security measure, covered several zones including Magarmal Bagh, Maharaj Bazar, Hari Singh High Street, Sarai Bala, Old Secretariat, Tankipora and

Jehangir Chowk," the official said, adding, "Moreover, teams from Shaheed Gunj, Shergarhi Police Station set up joint checkpoints to inspect vehicles, scanning passenger compartments, and verifying documents.

Parallel checks were also carried out around business establishments and other high pedestrian-footfall areas. Commuters and traders reported increased movement of uniformed personnel through market corridors. with random bag and identity checks being conducted. According to officials,

the operation was part of a broader grid review across central Srinagar, aimed at strengthening the visibility and response readiness of ground units. Similar checks are likely to continue in the coming days depending on the security assessment of different zones—(KNO)

AIMSA seeks PM Modi's help for Police organizes students stranded in Bangladesh

Srinagar, Dec 22: Amid growing concerns over security and well-being of Indian students in Bangladesh, the All India Medical Students' Association (AIM-SA) has written to Prime Minister Narendra Modi seeking his immediate and urgent intervention to ensure their safety and protection.

In its letter to the Prime Minister, AIMSA has expressed deep concern over what it described as "grave and distressing" conditions being faced by Indian students pursuing education in Bangladesh. The association said it has

been receiving alarming messages from students as well as their families in India, highlighting an atmosphere of fear, uncertainty and emotional distress. The medical students' body

emphasized that thousands of Indian students opt to study medicine abroad with implicit trust in the Government of India, believing that the nation will stand firmly by them in times

of crisis. AIMSA noted that the current situation demands swift diplomatic engagement and decisive protective measures to restore confidence and ensure

"Indian medical students pursue education overseas with deep trust in the Government of India. In moments like these, timely intervention becomes not just necessary but morally imperative," the letter reads.

The AIMSA has urged the Prime Minister's Office, in coordination with the Ministry of External Affairs and the concerned Indian missions, to take immediate steps on a priority basis. Specifically, the association has requested the government to ensure the physical safety and protection of all Indian medical students stranded in Bangladesh, strengthen on-ground support through the Indian Embassy and related missions, and establish clear, timely and transparent communication channels with students and their families. The association stressed that lack of clear information has further aggravated anxiety among parents, many of whom are deeply worried about the safety of their children in a for-

eign country. "Given the gravity and urgency of the situation, we humbly request that this matter be taken up on a top-priority and emergency basis," the AIMSA said, adding that continuous communication and visible support from Indian authorities would go a long way in reassuring the affected students.

AIMSA vice President Dr Momin Ahmad Khan exuded hope that under Prime Minister Modi's leadership, prompt and compassionate action will be taken to safeguard the lives, dignity and future of Indian medical students abroad.

The issue has once again brought into focus the vulnerabilities faced by Indian students studying overseas and the need for robust crisis-response mechanisms to ensure their safety during uncertain times—(KNO)

MVD intensifies traffic enforcement drive

419 licences revoked, 469 suspended in last 3 weeks

Jammu, Dec 22: In pursuance to the directions of the Secretary to Government Transport Department Jammu & Kashmir, the Motor Vehicles Department (Enforcement Wing) has launched a special traffic enforcement drive across the Union Territory to curb traffic violations and enhance road safety.

The drive, being conducted in line with the decisions of the Multi-Disciplinary Committee on Traffic Management System in Jammu and Srinagar, focuses particularly on habitual offenders and

serious traffic violators. Enforcement teams have intensified checking at strategic locations and are taking strict action under the Motor Vehicles Act, 1988.

Reiterating a zero-tolerance policy towards traffic violations, the Transport Department stated that such special enforcement drives will continue in the larger interest of public safety. Citizens have been urged to strictly follow traffic rules and cooperate with enforcement agencies to make roads safer.

During the last three weeks of December 2025, a large number of

violators were booked for offences including over-speeding, wrong-side driving, overloading, driving without a helmet or seat belt, illegal halting, juvenile driving and other violations. As a result, 469 driving licences were suspended, while 419 licences were revoked or disqualified. Additionally. 1,024 cancellation notices were issued to driving licence holders involved in NDPS-related cases, habitual traffic violations and other serious offences.

As part of the school transport safety drive, 174 school and college buses were audited, and buses found

deficient were rejected and barred from operation until compliance with safety norms is ensured. Alongside enforcement, the department also intensified road safety

awareness activities, organizing 676

awareness camps, sensitization programmes and public outreach initiatives across the Union Territory. 'The objective of the special enforce-

ment drive is not merely to penalise violators, but to save precious human lives by promoting strict adherence to traffic laws," an official of the Transport Department said.

The Sustainable Harnessing And Advancement Of Nuclear Energy For Transforming India (SHANTI) Bill, 2025

What is Nuclear Energy?

Nuclear energy is the use of controlled atomic reactions to produce power. At its core, it relies on splitting atoms in a process called fission, which releases large amounts of heat. This heat is then used to generate electricity without producing greenhouse gases. Globally, nuclear energy is valued as a clean, dependable source that complements renewable options like solar and wind.

At a time when India is reimagining the future of its energy landscape, a new legislative step has emerged to guide the country toward a more advanced and resilient nuclear ecosystem. The Sustainable Harnessing and Advancement of Nuclear Energy for Transforming India (SHANTI) Bill, 2025, reflects the government's effort to modernize the laws governing the nuclear sector. It brings together various elements of nuclear development under a single, comprehensive structure, aiming to create a more streamlined and future-ready system. The Bill focuses on a forward-looking approach and its role in shaping India's long-term energy pathway. As a significant piece of legislation, it marks an important moment in the country's broader journey toward building a secure and sustainable energy future.

Evolution of India's Nuclear Laws India's nuclear power journey has been guided by a series of landmark legislations that ensured the peaceful use of atomic energy while safeguarding national interests. Each step reflected the country's growing confidence and maturity in managing nucle-

ar technology responsibly. Ø The Atomic Energy Act, 1962, replaced the earlier 1948 law and laid down the foundation for India's nuclear programme. It empowered the government to regulate atomic energy for peaceful purposes, ensuring strict control over research, development, and use of nuclear materials.

Ø Amendments in 1986, 1987, and 2015 in the Atomic Energy Act of 1962 gradually opened the sector beyond the Central Government, allowing government companies and joint ventures to participate in nuclear power generation. The amendments reflected India's intent to expand capacity

while keeping strategic oversight intact. Ø The Civil Liability for Nuclear Damage Act, 2010, introduced a no-fault liability regime, ensuring compensation in case of nuclear incidents. This law provided clarity on

responsibility and built public trust by prioritizing safety and accountability in nuclear

Rationale Behind The Bill

At this stage of India's energy transition, the country is revisiting the foundations of its nuclear framework to match presentday needs and future ambitions. Over the decades, India's nuclear programme has matured, its technological capabilities have strengthened, and its clean-energy goals have expanded. These developments have created the need for a modern, comprehensive legislation that reflects today's realities and tomorrow's requirements.

India's nuclear energy programme has maintained a steady role in the country's electricity mix and is now poised for signifi-

cant expansion. Stable Contribution: Nuclear power has consistently accounted for around 3% of total electricity generation, with a share of 3.1% in

Installed Capacity: The present nuclear capacity stands at 8.78 GW.

Planned Expansion: With the indigenous 700 MW and 1000 MW reactors being developed through international cooperation, the capacity is projected to rise to 22.38 GW by

Nuclear Energy Mission

Why India Needs to Scale Nuclear Power India's growing energy demands and clean energy commitments make a strong case for expanding nuclear capacity. Round-the-clock

electricity is vital for emerging needs such as data centres and advanced industries, yet existing laws do not provide the flexibility or speed required for such growth. To meet the national target of 100 GW nuclear capacity by 2047 and advance long-term decarbonisation by 2070, a modern legal framework is essential, which enables wider participation, leverages indigenous resources, and integrates innovation with safety.

Taken together, these developments highlight the need for progressive legislation that can repeal the 1962 Act and the 2010 liability law. A unified legislation allows India to expand the role of nuclear energy in its overall energy mix, encourage innovation, support non-power applications, and continue to uphold the highest standards of safety, security, safeguards, and liability. In this way, the bill serves as a natural progression of India's evolving nuclear journey and provides a foundation for the sector's future growth.

Defining Elements of the Legislation As India moves toward a more modern and future-ready nuclear energy structure, the Sustainable Harnessing and Advancement of Nuclear Energy for Transforming India (SHANTI) Bill, 2025, lays down a set of focused provisions to strengthen governance, safety, and institutional mechanisms. Its key objectives can be understood through the following major elements:

Private Sector Integration: The Bill permits private companies to participate in India's nuclear sector, enabling them to undertake plant operations, power generation, equipment manufacturing, and selected activities such as the fabrication of nuclear fuel including conversion, refining and enrichment of uranium-235 up to such threshold value, or production, use, processing or disposal of other prescribed substances. In addition, all activities that involve radiation exposure must obtain prior safety authorisation from the regulatory authority.

Activities Under Exclusive Central Government Purview: Under the Bill, certain sensitive nuclear fuel-cycle activities are reserved exclusively for the Central Government or its wholly owned institutions. These include enrichment or isotopic separation of prescribed or radioactive substances (unless otherwise notified), management of spent fuel such as reprocessing, recycling, radionuclide separation, and high-level waste handling, production and upgradation of heavy water, and any other facilities or activities specifically notified by the Government.

Licensing and Safety Oversight: Establishes a structured system for granting, suspending, or cancelling licences and safety authorisations for nuclear energy production and use.

Graded Liability Structure: In contrast to existing laws that impose a single statutory cap on operator liability, the SHANTI Bill establishes a graded liability framework. Under this framework, the limits on operator liability are detailed in the Second Schedule of the bill and vary according to the type and characteristics of the nuclear installation.

Regulation of Non-Power Applications: Provides a regulatory framework for the use of nuclear and radiation technologies in health care, agriculture, industry, research, and other peaceful applications.

Exemption for Certain Activities: Allows exemption from a license for limited activities like research, development, and innovation-related work.

Civil Liability Framework: Introduces a practical and balanced civil liability regime for addressing nuclear damage.

Statutory Body: Grants formal statutory recognition to the Atomic Energy Regulatory Board (AERB) to strengthen regulatory independence and authority.

Enhanced Safety, Security, and Safeguards: Improves systems for security, safeguards, quality assurance, and coordinated emergency preparedness and response.

Central Government Acquisition Rights: Vests exclusive acquisition rights with the Central Government in specific cases related to nuclear activities.

Dispute Redressal Mechanism: Establishes an Atomic Energy Redressal Advisory Council to facilitate the redressal of disputes.

Appellate Tribunal Provision: The Appellate Tribunal for Electricity, set up under the Electricity Act, 2003, will serve as the appellate authority, empowered to hear appeals under provisions of the bill and any additional matters as notified by the Central Government.

Claims Commissioner Appointment: Empowers the Central Government to appoint Claims Commissioners for adjudicating compensation claims related to nuclear

Ø Nuclear Damage Claims Commission: Provides for a dedicated Commission to hanand ensure timely adjudication.

Safeguards and Strategic Oversight: At the core of the bill lies a strong emphasis on maintaining India's strategic control over its nuclear ecosystem. Even as the

Does Telling The Truth Make You More Attractive?

interpersonal attraction comes in many forms, from personal appearance to body language, at-Ltire to behavior. It also includes chemistry formed through character and conversation. Yet in today's world, where anyone can "dress the part" or "talk the talk," we wonder how we somehow gravitate to-wards some people over others, even at first impression. Research reveals some cues about the personal traits that cause us to be attracted to certain people

The Appeal of Authenticity

Leanne ten Brinke et al. (2025) studied the impact of truth-telling on attraction.[i] They began by noting the reality that despite the frequency of deception within interpersonal interaction, we rarely doubt the sincerity of others. Yet indirect evaluations of honesty versus dishonesty may differ even without suspicion about veracity. They showed across three studies that target individuals were perceived as more attractive when they were telling the truth as opposed to when they were lying, a result they also found was mediated by the target individual's openness and warmth. They found the "truth attraction effect" was stronger



for female targets than male, but unaffected by the gender of the judge. As a practical matter, ten Brinke et al. state that their findings suggest that we may be more likely to approach people who are honest, even when we are not actively judging their veracity. Attraction, Approach, and Authenticity

In addition, regarding the ebb and flow of conversation, ten Brinke et al. found that participants were less attracted to deceptive targets during critical questions (the "truth/lie moment") as compared to baseline questions, where all targets were honest. They also found that when targets told both truths and lies, they were perceived as more attractive when telling the truth than when lying about the

Regarding gender differences, they found that the truth attraction effect appeared to be stronger for female targets, and that impressions of openness and warmth may mediate these effects. Regarding a possible explanation, they note that being unpleasant, uncooperative, and providing little detail are behavioral predictors of deception.

The Social Costs of Deception Versus Disclosure

Because at least to some extent, social life is impacted by attraction and attractiveness, ten Brinke et al. note that their findings that people may be motivated to approach truth-tellers rather than liars indicate the potential costs of deception in everyday life. This observation could arguably impact the ways in which people seek to be more honest in their daily interactions, both personal and professional.

Considering the contemporary value of truth through transparency, many people already share much of their lives both on and offline, sometimes withholding private details to ensure the safety of self and family. Yet as a best practice when sharing appropriately, both publicly and privately, from genuine compliments to describing background and work experience, honesty is apparently the best policy in more ways than one.

High imports, low generation: J&K's power crisis deepens in 2025

Srinagar, Dec 22: As the year 2025 nears its end, the power sector in Jammu and Kashmir experienced cycles of increased dependency on imports, seasonal uncertainty in generation, and "decaying infrastructure" - causing an unreliable power supply and public

However, the government has made an effort to reduce outages and improve the financial position of the power sector through different developments including the installation of smart meters and upgrading the

Previously, the authorities had promised of doubling the hydro electricity generation by 2026 that had provided a glimmer of hope for a future of an unrestricted power supply but the stories of 2025 provide a more realistic view of how long and difficult it will be to achieve that future.

In 2025, the news agency-Kashmir News Observer (KNO) published a series of stories, highlighting issues and developments that took place this year.

Power import dependency

Till the 3rd week of December-2025, Jammu and Kashmir was importing more than 95 percent of its electricity—a stark dependency that leaves the region vulnerable as it grapples with an 800 MW power deficit.

The officials had informed that the region was importing electricity ranging from 2900 MWs to 3100 MWs during the peak hours.

It also said that during the other hours, the region is importing electricity ranging from 2400 MWs to 2800 MWs.

Another official said that the actual power demand for Kashmir region is around 2400-2500 MWs and in case of Jammu division, it varies from 1400-1500 MWs.

"As of now Jammu and Kashmir has a power deficiency of nearly 800 MWs. The total power availability as of now is 3100-3200 MWs," the official said.

'85% reliability on coal, solar power'

On February-20, KNO reported that Jammu and Kashmir was relying on more than 85 percent of coal and solar power amid acute deficit of hydro power generation.

Officials of Power Development claim that local hydro power generation from the local power plants have reduced by nearly 90

A top official of PDD in the month had informed that "At present Jammu and Kashmir is 85-90 percent dependent on coal and solar energy that is being procured from the other states because as of now we don't have a lo-

Procuring of nearly electricity from

In August-2025, with the minimal power generation availability, Jammu and Kashmir was procuring approximately 40-50 percent of electricity from the imported power markets during lean season.

The news agency KNO quoting the official documents had reported that "From the total imported power, it is seen that the power procurement by Jammu and Kashmir from the market is approximately 40-50 percent during lean season.'

The documents further said that due to non-availability of internal generation during winter months, Jammu and Kashmir imports power from the interstate network

Power deficiency projections

In the last week of September, KNO reported that Jammu and Kashmir and Ladakh are likely to witness an energy deficit ranging from more than 4,200 Megawatts (MWs) to 10,000 MWs in the next ten years.

"J&K and Ladakh is likely to witness energy deficit ranging from 4293 MUs to 9929 MUs in di erent years from 2024-25 to 2034-35 with the existing and planned capacity addition," the official documents had revealed.

The official documents further reveal that a study was carried out considering existing capacity and planned capacity. "It was observed that the total unserved energy in the year 2034-35 is about 8730 MU," it reads.

20% surcharges ToD proposal

The Power Development Department (PDD) had proposed an extra 20 percent charge on electricity consumption during morning and evening hours in the Valley.

The Kashmir Power Development Corporation Limited (KPDCL) has sought approval from Joint Electricity Regulatory Commission (JERC) to impose a 20 percent surcharge on all categories of consumers except for the agriculture sector during peak hours, when demand is at its highest due to the

bone-chilling cold in the Valley. According to a petition filed before the JERC for J&K and Ladakh, KPDCL has proposed the surcharge for different consumer categories, including domestic households. The JERC, a quasi-judicial body, is empowered to approve or reject tariff proposals.

Additional 4600 MW power requirement

On September-30, KNO reported that amid 'unserved energy' predictions in coming years, Jammu and Kashmir is likely to require more than 4600 Megawatts (MWs) of power other than the planned capacities to meet electricity demands.

The official figures had revealed that Jammu and Kashmir will likely require 4625 MWs of power in the coming nine years amid the predictions of 'unserved energy'.

"As J&K is likely to have unserved energy in coming years there is a need to contract nonfossil capacities for meeting energy requirements other than the planned capacities. The additional quantum of capacities required (other than already planned) to be contracted is about 2438 MW from Coal, 1200 MW from solar, 987 MW of DRE till 2034-35."

50% surge in power demand likely

KNO in the 3rd week of November reported Jammu and Kashmir is likely to witness growth in power demand by nearly 50 percent in a decade.

The official documents in this regard had stated that the authorities have projected that Jammu and Kashmir will likely have an extra power demand by 49.42 percent by the year 2034-35.

The official further clarified that the peak demand will be more than the average growth saying that the region may likely witness an increase in power demand by 6 percent each year from 2025-26 to 2034-2035.

'Persistent unsatisfactory reporting '

In 2025, Northern Regional Power Committee (NRPC) had found persistent unsatisfactory reporting status of Renewable energy (RE) from Jammu and Kashmir.

NRPC in a meeting had said that Northern Regional Load Despatch Center (NRLDC) representative has informed, "On the basis of status of July month, it is evident that reporting status of some of the constituents that is Renewable energy (RE) stations, SLDC-HR, SLDCPS, SLDC-J&K, SLDC-HP, SLDC-Delhi, NTPC, NHPC and RAPS are not satisfactory and need improvement."

"Further, persistent unsatisfactory reporting status of Punjab and J&K was also highghted," reads the NRPC document

The NRPC has further anticipated that Jammu and Kashmir and Ladakh may face a shortfall of 2 percent of electricity in the ongoing month as per the revised peak demand.

The committee however said that the representative of J&K SLDC informed them that the shortfall in J&K would be met through Real time exchanges.

'Shortage' of power in 2034-35

In October this year, KNO published a story stating that with the present and other planned Power Purchase Agreements (PPAs) or a Transmission Service Agreement (TSA), Jammu and Kashmir will likely be unable to meet and cater the power demands of consumers in the upcoming nine

A study by the Government of India (GoI) reads, "The study has analyzed the daily and monthly pattern of unserved energy in the year 2034-35, it can be seen that contracted capacity (present and planned) is unable to meet the demand."

"It can be seen that during the high demand of winter months, the proportion of unserved energy is high," reads the study.

Besides, the report further reveals that the surplus capacity is available with states due to RE availability, demand variation etc.

'The pattern of surplus capacities for J&K and Ladakh has been observed as below. This capacity can be shared with other states which might result in reduced fixed cost burden on the utilities resulting in further reduction in the cost for consumers, it reads.

The report further suggests that



to September in the range of 230-740 MW for 2027-28 as shown below which can be shared with other states.

'29% un-served annual energy by 2034-35' In an awful revelation, authorities in 2025 had said that Jammu and Kashmir may face 29 percent of 'forced load shedding' of annual power in the year 2034-35.

Besides, the authorities have further projected that in the coming ten years, the Compound Annual Growth Rate (CAGR) of power demand is likely to increase by more than four percent in Jammu and Kashmir and Ladakh.

Authorities in a report have projected that "Electrical energy demand for the UT of J&K and Ladakh is increasing with a CAGR of 4.2 percent from 2024-25 to 2034-35 as fore-casted by 20th Electric Power Survey (EPS) of India."

It has further said that the projections of J&K also indicate that electrical energy demand may increase with a CAGR of 4.07 percent from 2024-25 to 2034-35.

"For satisfying resource adequacy that is meeting the electricity demand reliably and at affordable cost, the UT needs to methodically plan its capacity expansion either by investing or by procuring power," it reads.

4-hour power cuts in high-loss areas

The government in the last week of October had informed the Legislative Assembly that PDD was imposing a curtailment of four hours in those areas having highest technical and commercial losses on local feeders.

The department also said that there were no power outages and unscheduled cuts were imposed in Kashmir valley during the last winter.

"No unscheduled cuts were imposed in Kashmir valley during the last winter despite substantial increase in power demand on account of heating load at a time when the power availability from own generation sources remains limited," the government

About the power curtailment, PDD had informed that that detailed schedules of power curtailment indicating, feeder-wise, the maximum curtailment daily depending upon the loss level of the feeders were formulated and except for addressing urgent and accidental system requirements, no unscheduled distress curtailment was allowed

'Unhealthy power factor'

In Kashmir valley, there is no power capacitor available for the local DISCOM to improve the quality in electrical systems by compensating for reactive power and im-

The official revealed that the Ministry of Power for Government of India (GoI) has provided the capacitors to industrial consumers to keep healthy power factor.

"In the meeting, it was informed from the J&K side that presently no capacitors are available in Kashmir DISCOM although capacitors have been provided by industrial consumers to keep healthy power factor," reads the documents of (MoP)

The documents further states that it was also discussed that TCC and NRPC had recently accorded approval from forum for installation of capacitors by Rajasthan, Uttarakhand DISCOMs.

"The proposals were then submitted by respective states to PSDF and PSDF also had positive views of providing funds for installation of capacitor banks. PSDF funds were frozen for some time but now PSDF has started approval for some of the schemes," it reads.

'Persistent low voltage

Amid increasing power demand, Jammu and Kashmir in 2025 on contrary reeled under persistent low voltage issues, reveals the report. The report reveals that "Low

voltage related issues of J&K and Ladakh (UT) have been regularly shared by NRLDC with CEA and CTUIL in Grid-India's quarterly operational feedback

report as well.' 'The issue has been continuously raised in NRPC as well as OCC meetings, still the issues of low voltage persist in I&K especially

Kashmir valley," it reads.

Besides, the report further states that power is being imported by J&K

from 400KV Moga-Kishenpur D/C lines and 400KV Jalandhar-Samba

"It is being noticed that heavy power is being drawn by 400kV lines from Moga to Kishenpur during winter months whereas the power flow on 400kV Jalandhar-Samba is not that high," it reads.

The Ministry of Power for Government of India (GoI) in the report further said that it has been discussed and suggested on numerous occasions earlier to J&K to plan and expedite commissioning of reactive power devices especially capacitors at lower voltage level to improve the voltage profile in valley area and also avoid large sums payable as reactive energy charges.

'34% power deficit' likely'

persistent Amid temperatures, Jammu and Kashmir and Ladakh are likely to witness a power deficit of more than 34 percent in the month of December.

The officials had said that in the anticipated power supply position in the northern region for December-2025, Jammu and Kashmir and Ladakh is likely to have a power shortage of 34.2 percent.

The official figures reveal that there is an availability of just 2460 Megawatts (MWs) against a requirement of 3737 MWs in Jammu and Kashmir and Ladakh. It also reveals that there is a shortage of 1277 MWs.

Variation of 700 MWs power during day time

In the last week of July, KNO reported that in the backdrop of low voltage issues during the day time, 'Jammu and Kashmir is facing a variation of nearly 700 Megawatts (MWs) of power' in comparison to other hours.

The official documents had revealed that in view of low voltage during the day hours from 9Am to 2Pm, Jammu and Kashmir State Power Development Corporation Limited has a Available Transfer Capability (ATC) and Total Transfer Capability (TTC) of 2700/2800 MWs of power.

However, during the other hours except for 9Am to 2Pm, there is an ATC and TTC capacity of 3400/3500 MWs of power-highlighting the need of improving the grid and other mathe voltage during the day hours.

'500 MW' power deficit in December

The Power Development Department (PDD) in the first week of December was facing a 'shortage of nearly 500 Megawatts (MWs) to meet the actual power demand' in Kashmir valley- plunging residents into extended blackouts.

An official had informed that in the first week of December, "The actual peak power demand in Kashmir is at least 2400 MWs but the local Discom (Kashmir Power Distribution Corporation Limited (KPDCL) this year so far has been able to cater only 1900 MWs."

About the unscheduled power cuts, the official had said that "The power outages are primarily because of the unauthorised use of power. People mostly in the flat rate areas are not using power judiciously and that is one of the main reasons for the power tripping. "As of now 60 percent of the areas in Kashmir are flat rated."

Over 41% AT&C losses

Jammu and Kashmir Power Development Department this year was reeling under high Aggregate Technical and Commercial Losses (AT&C) with the figures suggesting the loss of more than 41 percent till the financial year

Among the both DISCOMs, Kashmir Power Development Corporation Limited (KPDCL) till March-2025 was facing extra 21 percent AT&C in comparison to

> Corporation Limited (JPDCL). In the year 2020-21, JPDCL was facing 30 percent of AT&C while the KPDCL was reeling under 65 percent of losses. Similarly, in the financial year 2021-22, there were 37.5 percent AT&C losses

The official figures further reveal that in the year 2022-23, JPDCL was grappled with 35.4 percent of AT&C losses and KPDCL with 59.59 percent.

Likewise, in the previous fiscal there was a total of 41 percent AT&C losses across the DISCOMs with 31 percent in JPDCL and 51.98 percent in KPDCL.

250% increase in revenue generation

The Jammu and Kashmir Power Development Department (PDD) has recorded nearly 250 percent increase in revenue generation in the past five financial years.

Since 2019-20 till previous fiscal, PDD has collected Rs 16,974 Crore revenue from its consumers. From the total revenue generated, the

Kashmir Power Development Corporation Limited (KPDCL) sees 176 percent increase. The official figures further reveal that

Jammu Power Development Corporation Limited (JPDCL) 73.58 percent increase in revenue generation in past five financial years It reveals that JPDCL has collected Rs 8906.31

Crores since 2019-20 till previous fiscal year while KPDCL has collected Rs 8068 Crores.

Non-tax power tariff revenue increases

In Jammu and Kashmir, power tariff share in non-tax revenue has increased by 11 percent in four years. An official had informed KNO that "Power

tariff's share in non-tax revenue grew from 56 percent to 67 percent since Financial Year-22." It further states that the power is a critical driver of economic development in Jammu and Kashmir, with the government focusing on optimizing power generation and enhanc-

ing infrastructure to ensure a reliable, 24

hours supply at affordable rates. "Key initiatives include expanding hydel power plants, promoting rooftop solar panels for households, encouraging solar energy in agriculture, and upgrading transmission networks to support uninterrupted supply and export surplus power to other states for revenue generation," the official said.

The official further said that the major contributors to own revenue resources are GST, power tariff, excise, sales tax, water user charges and taxes on vehicles.


"The proportion of these six revenue resources has increased from 86 percent in FY-22 to 93 percent in FY-25," the official said.

3.60% annual increase in electric power purchases

In the past nine years, Jammu and Kashmir has witnessed an average annual increase of 3.60 percent in electric power purchases while the growth stands at only 2.45 percent.

An official had said, "Over the past years from 2016-17 to 2024-25, Jammu and Kashmir has experienced an average annual increase of 3.60 percent in electric power purchases, as per extrapolated data.'

"When considered on a per capita basis, the growth rate stands at 2.45 percent per year, reflecting the region's increasing energy demand. This growth is also in line with the region's population increase, which has been growing at an annual rate of 2.14 percent during the same period," the official said .-(KNO)

FTA with New Zealand to significantly deepen bilateral economic engagement: Govt

New Delhi, Dec 22: The free trade agreement (FTA) with New Zealand will significantly deepen bilateral economic engagement, enhance market access and promote investment flows, India said in a statement on Monday.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi and his New Zealand counterpart Christopher Luxon on Monday announced the firming up of a "historic" FTA between the two countries.

The two prime ministers held a phone conversation, following which the announcement on the FTA was made.

The two leaders jointly announced the successful conclusion of the historic, ambitious and mutually beneficial India-New Zealand free trade agreement," the statement issued by the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) said.

It said the two leaders agreed that the conclusion of the FTA



in a record time of nine months reflects the shared ambition and political will to further deepen ties between the two countries.

"The FTA would significantly deepen bilateral economic engagement, enhance market access, promote investment flows, strengthen strategic cooperation between the two countries, and also open up new opportunities for innovators, entrepreneurs, farmers, MSMEs, students and vouths of both countries across various

sectors," the MEA said.

It said both leaders expressed confidence in doubling bilateral trade over the next five years as well as an investment of USD 20 billion in India from New Zealand over the next 15 years.

"The leaders also welcomed the progress achieved in other areas of bilateral cooperation such as sports, education, and people-to-people ties, and reaffirmed their commitment towards further strengthening of the India-New Zealand partnership," the MEA said.

Resilience in economy due to coordinated fiscal, monetary policies: RBI bulletin

Mumbai, Dec 22: Coordinated fiscal, monetary and regulatory policies have helped build resilience in the economy, which is not fully immune to the external sector headwinds, said a Reserve Bank bulletin released on Monday.

Continued focus on macroeconomic fundamentals and economic reforms should help unlock efficiencies and productivity gains to firmly keep the economy on the high-growth trajectory amidst a fast-changing global environment, said an article published in the RBI's December Bulletin.

The year 2025 brought about an unprecedented shift in global trade policies, marked by a move towards bilateral renegotiations on tariffs and terms of trade, it said.

Its ripple effects on global trade flows and supply chains are still unfolding. This has led to heightened global uncertainties and concerns about the prospects for global growth, said the article on state of the economy.

'The Indian economy was not fully immune to the external sector headwinds. Coordinated fiscal, monetary and regulatory policies have helped to build resilience over the year," it said. The article said the Indian



economy, supported by resilient domestic demand in Q2:2025-26, grew at its fastest pace in the last six quarters.

High-frequency indicators for

November suggest that overall economic activity has held up with demand conditions remaining robust. Headline CPI inflation edged up but continued

to remain below the lower tolerance level.

Further, financial conditions remained benign, and the flow of financial resources to the commercial sector remained robust, the article said.

India's current account deficit moderated in Q2:2025-26 over the same period last year, supported by a lower merchandise trade deficit, robust services exports, and strong remittance receipts.

"Bolstered by strong domestic demand, the economic growth has been robust. Benign inflation outlook provided adequate space for monetary policy to support growth," the article said

The article also said that

during April-October 2025, FDI remained higher than last year both in gross and net terms.

Gross inward FDI remained steady in October with Singapore, Mauritius and the US accounting for more than 70 per cent of total FDI inflows.

However, net FDI was negative in October, mainly due to high repatriation and outward FDI.

On the other hand, during 2025-26 so far (up to December 18), net FPI registered outflows, driven by equity segment.

FPI flows turned negative in December following inflows in the previous two months.

"The uncertainty surrounding the India-US trade deal and investors' caution around high domestic valuations kept net FPI flows to India muted in recent months," the article said.

Also, the Indian rupee (INR) depreciated against the US dollar in November, pressured by the strengthening of the US dollar, muted foreign portfolio flows, and uncertainty surrounding the India-US trade deal.

The volatility of INR, as measured by the coefficient of variation, moderated in November from a month ago and remained relatively lower than most major currencies. In December so far (up to 19), the INR depreciated by 0.8 per cent over its end-November level.

Jammu airport

Airport witnessed steady passenger movement and consistent flight operations during 2025, reflecting the growing demand for air travel in the region.

"Despite operational challenges, including weather-related disruptions, coordinated efforts by all stakeholders ensured safe, efficient and passenger-friendly operations. With the new terminal building progressing steadily, 2026 is expected to be a transformative year, significantly improving capacity, infrastructure and the overall passenger experience," he said.

Officials also said that despite occasional weather-related disruptions, flight operations remained largely smooth throughout the year.

The airport currently operates flights to Srinagar, Leh, Delhi, Ahmedabad, Indore, Mumbai, Hyderabad and Bengaluru, with efforts underway to add more routes in 2026.

One of the year's key milestones, officials said, has been the construction of the new terminal building at Belicharana, which is about 45 percent complete. They said the terminal is expected to be a major infrastructural boost once completed next year.

They added that the upcoming terminal will be capable of handling 4.5 million passengers annually, with a peak-hour capacity of 2,000 passengers. Spread over 56,693 square metres, the facility will feature 13 aircraft parking stands, along with parking for 250

four-wheelers and 200 two-wheelers. (KNO)

Rain, snow ease

The snowfall was keenly awaited by skiers, Christmas and New Year revellers, and stakeholders associated with the tourism sector.

Although cold conditions showed some improvement, minimum temperatures across the region remained below normal, with several towns in the Kashmir Valley recording sub-zero readings.

South Kashmir's Pulwama district recorded the coldest minimum at -3.2°C, followed by Shopian at -2.9°C and Awantipora at -2.2°C.

Central Kashmir's Srinagar district registered -0.4°C, Qazigund and Pahalgam -1.0°C each, while Gulmarg and Kulgam recorded 2.0°C and 1.2°C respectively.

In Jammu division, Katra recorded the lowest at 10.0°C, Jammu Airport 11.0°C, while Banihal and Bhaderwah registered 3.8°C and 4.4°C, respectively.

In Ladakh, Leh recorded a minimum of -4.2°C. Some stations, including Zojila Pass, Kargil, Doda, and Zethan Rafiabad, did not report data. The figures were compiled by Kashmir Weather. The Meteorological Department has forecast

further precipitation during the next 12 hours till Monday night. From December 23 onwards, the weather across Jammu and Kashmir is expected to remain partly cloudy until December

It has forecast the possibility of light rain or snowfall over higher reaches at isolated places from December 30 to January 1, while January 2 and 3 are likely to be partly cloudy.

It advised travellers and transporters to follow traffic and administrative advisories. Moderate to dense fog is expected to persist over the plains of Jammu division during the next seven days.

Meanwhile, the rainfall and snowfall had a positive impact on air quality across the Valley. The Meteorological Department said the Air Quality Index (AQI) showed significant improvement following the rain. "There has been a clear improvement in air

quality due to the rainfall. After this spell, the weather is expected to remain dry and cold from December 23 to December 30," another An advisory issued by the department

warned that higher reaches of Kupwara, Bandipora and Ganderbal districts could receive moderate to heavy snowfall, especially during the night.

Travellers and transporters were advised to plan their journeys carefully and follow official advisories. (KNO)

Despite the lack of proper playgrounds, coaching facilities or equipment, their love for cricket remains undeterred. "Our children play wherever they can—fields, roads, even near streams," said a local resident. "They watch matches on mobile phones and dream

The delegation raised a range of issues pertaining to environmental degradation and urged the government to adopt robust conservation and preservation measures across Jammu and Kashmir.

Acknowledging the concerns raised, Rana said that while environmental challenges are being faced

globally, Jammu and Kashmir is no exception. "Our ecosystem is under stress and there is an urgent need for collective and coordinated efforts to address the environmental challenges confronting our region," he said.

"We must identify areas where the government, civil society and communities can work together to improve the overall environmental health of Jammu and Kashmir." The Minister assured that the issues and suggestions put forth by GCC would be considered for better management of environmental issues. Expressing concern over the deteriorating condition of wetlands in Kashmir. the delegation underlined the urgent need for their protection. They noted that wetlands act as natural sponges that help prevent floods and must be safeguarded against encroachment and other forms of environmental degradation.

The GCC members brought to the Minister's notice the recurring incidents of tree felling saying that the elements of nature are deeply interconnected, with disturbances in one area having far-reaching consequences for human survival.

They also emphasised that Environmental Impact Assessments (EIAs) should be made mandatory for all developmental projects in Jammu and Kashmir prior to their execution.

Other key issues raised included regeneration of forest cover, rejuvenation of degraded forests, compensatory afforestation, protection of wetlands and revival and restoration of springs.

The delegation also highlighted the concerns related to the Jal Shakti Department, calling for continuous monitoring of water quality. They pointed out that turbidity in piped water often increases during rainfall near source areas and stressed the need for timely intervention.

Additionally, the GCC discussed flood protection measures for the Jhelum and Tawi rivers and urged the government to ensure urgent execution of flood mitigation plans to protect vulnerable areas from future flood events.

Pope offers gentle critique of Vatican culture in Christmas greeting reminiscent of past

Rome, Dec 22: Pope Leo XIV urged Vatican cardinals on Monday to put their ambitions of power and personal interests aside, as he followed in Pope Francis' footsteps and used a Christmas greeting to gently criticise his closest collaborators.

"Is it possible to be friends in the Roman Curia?" Leo asked the cardinals and bishops who make up the Curia, as the Holy See bureaucracy is known. "To have relationships of genuine fraternal friendship?'

The fact that Leo asked the question suggests that the American pope knows well that the Curia remains a difficult and sometimes toxic workplace, one that Francis would often eviscerate in his annual Christmas

Leo didn't repeat Francis's more biting critique — that Vati-can clergy sometimes suffer from "spiritual Alzheimer's," the "cancer" of cliques, the "corruption" of ambition and "self-absorbed" idle gossip - and his tone was far more gentle and constructive.

But the underlying message remained. Leo, who was very close to Francis and worked in the Vatican for two years before



his election, didn't shy away from Francis' tradition of using the Christmas occasion to urge Vatican bureaucrats to examine their consciences and change their ways for the good of the

church.
"At times this bitterness finds its way among us as well, when, after many years of service in the Curia, we observe with disappointment that certain dynamics – linked to the exercise of power, the desire to prevail, or the pursuit of personal interests — are slow to change," Leo said.

"Amid daily toil, it is a grace to find trustworthy friends, where masks fall away, no one is used or sidelined, genuine support is offered, and each person's worth and competence are respected, preventing resentment and dissatisfaction."

After Francis's sometimes tumultuous 12-year pontificate, in which the Argentine Jesuit at times alienated conservatives and some in the Vatican bureaucracy, Leo has generally sought to be more of a peacemaker, prizing unity.

He called on Monday for Vatican bureaucrats to work to forge communion within the church and beyond.

"In a world wounded by discord, violence and conflict, where we also witness a growth in aggression and anger, often exploited by both the digital sphere and politics, Christmas invites everyone to work for peace and universal fraternity," he said.

China to impose up to 42.7% provisional tariffs on EU dairy products

Beijing, Dec 22: China will impose up to 42.7% of provisional tariffs on dairy products including milk and cheese imported from the European Union, its Commerce Ministry said Monday.
The elevated duties, which take effect

Tuesday, were based on preliminary results from an investigation opened by China's Commerce Ministry in August 2024 as tensions between Beijing and Brussels flared. Beijing reviewed subsidies provided by EU countries for their dairy and other farm products.

Beijing's probe was launched as part of tit-for-tat measures as the EU investigated Chinese subsidies on electric vehicles, and later imposed tariffs as high as 45.3% on China-made EVs.

China had initiated other probes into European brandy and pork imports as counter measures for the EU's tariffs on Chinese EVs. It had also urged the EU to scrap its EV tariffs.

The temporary duties on EU dairy imports will range from 21.9% to 42.7%, according to the Commerce Ministry, and will cover a basket of dairy products, including fresh and processed cheese, blue cheese, milk, and cream with a fat content exceeding 10% by weight. The ministry said preliminary findings from its investigation determined that subsidies provided by the EU and EU member states for their dairy products had damaged China's dairy industry. Beijing's probe into EU dairy

products covered subsidies given under the EU's Common Agricultural Policy and subsidies offered to farmers by EU countries including Italy, Ireland and Finland, the Commerce Ministry said in August

China's relationship with the EU is fractious, with the Chinese trade surplus with the EU recently coming into the spotlight. The EU runs a significant trade deficit with China, at more than 300 billion euros (\$352 billion) last year.

Last week, Beijing announced it was imposing up to 19.8% tariffs on EU pork



imports -- significantly lower than preliminary tariffs of up to 62.4%.

It accused the EU of dumping pork and pig by-products in the country, selling them at cheap prices which in turn harmed its domestic pork industry.

In July, Beijing also announced up to 34.9% tariffs on brandy imported from the EU -including cognac from France -- although several major brandy brands had received

Delhi: Over 2.12 lakh **PUC certificates issued** in four days as GRAP-IV enforcement intensifies

New Delhi, Dec 22: More than 2.12 lakh new PUC certificates were issued following the strict implementation of GRAP-IV measures over the past four days, Delhi Environment Minister Manjinder Singh Sirsa said on Monday.

The minister also warned of stringent action against polluting industries and private offices flouting work-from-home

Speaking at a press conference, Sirsa noted that weather conditions are expected to improve by Tuesday as the impact of a western disturbance recedes.

He said 2,12,332 new Pollution Under Control (PUC) certificates were issued by late night on December 16. During the same period, approximately 10,000 vehicles failed the mandatory emission tests.

Sirsa announced an intensified enforcement drive across the capital, saying polluting factories and industries will now be sealed without further notice. "Action will also be taken against industries that have not applied for the mandatory Online Consent Management (OCM)," he added.

The minister warned private companies to comply with the 50 per cent staff capacity and work-from-home norms. He said such offices would face strict penalties, while polluting industrial units would be shut down.

Gold jumps to record high of Rs 1.38 lakh/10g

Silver hits new peak of Rs 2,14,500 per kg

New Delhi, Dec 22: Gold prices rose to a fresh lifetime high of Rs 1,38,200 per 10 grams, gaining Rs 1,685, in the national capital on Monday following the precious metal scaling record highs in the global markets, according to the All India Sarafa Association.

Silver prices also raced to hit an alltime high of Rs 2,14,500 per kilogramme (inclusive of all taxes) in the capital, up by Rs 10,400 per kg.

'Bullish momentum extended in bullion, with gold and silver surging to another fresh record high on Monday," Saumil Gandhi, Senior Analyst - Commod-

ities at HDFC Securities, said. In the international markets, spot gold increased by USD 80.85, or 1.86 per cent, to hit a record of USD 4,420.35 per ounce.

"Investor interest in silver and gold has grown considerably as interest rates are going down in the US, fiscal concerns are growing, and the American economy is

becoming more uncertain," Gandhi said. He added that this has led to a shift towards the safe-haven asset. In addition, the demand for safe haven also increased, due to the escalating geopolitical tensions.

Spot silver appreciated by USD 2.31, or 3.44 per cent, to hit a lifetime high of USD 69.45 per ounce in the overseas markets.

Rohit says he considered retirement after 2023 World Cup final defeat

New Delhi, Dec 22: In a stunning revelation, former India captain Rohit Sharma on Sunday (December 21, 2025) said he contemplated retirement after the heartbreaking loss to Australia in the 2023 ODI World Cup final as he "felt that the sport had taken everything out of me.

Under the captaincy of Rohit, the Indian team enjoyed a dream run in that tournament at home and marched into the final with nine consecutive wins. However, Australia dashed their hopes in the game that mattered the most, with Travis Head scoring a match-winning hundred. From Wankhede to The

final, I was completed distraught and felt like I didn't want to play this sport anymore because it had taken everything out of me and I felt I had nothing left," Rohit said during a Masters Union event.

"It took some time and I kept reminding myself that this is something



right in front of me, and I couldn't let it go so easy. Slowly, I found my way back, regaining the energy and getting myself moving again on the field.

'Everybody was extremely disappointed, and we just couldn't believe what had happened. It was a very tough time for me personally because I had put everything into that World Cup not just two or three months before it, but ever since I took over the cap-

taincy in 2022," he added. Rohit, who has retired from T20Is and Tests and was removed from ODI

captaincy earlier this year, continues to play the 50-over format and would like to end his career with one final attempt at the 2027 World Cup.

"My only goal was to win the World Cup, whether it was the T20 World Cup or the 2023 World Cup. So when it didn't happen, I was completely devastated. There was no energy left in my body. It took me a couple of months to recover and bring myself back," said

Less than a year after that loss to Australia in Ahmedabad, Rohit led the Indian team to the

T20 World Cup title in the Americas, but overcoming the pain of the defeat in November 2023 was extremely difficult.

"I guess when you invest so much into something and don't achieve the result, it's a very natural reaction. That's exactly what happened with me. But I also knew that life doesn't end there.

"It was a big lesson for me how to deal with disappointment, reset, and start fresh. I knew that something else was coming the 2024 T20 World Cup in the USA and West Indies and I had to shift all my focus towards that.
