Delhi court sends Yasir Dar to 11-day judicial custody

New Delhi, Jan 05: A court here on Monday sent Yasir Ahmed Dar, an accused in the Red Fort blast case, to 11-day judicial custody.

Principal District and Sessions Judge Anju Bajaj Chandra sent Dar to the judicial custody till January 16 after he was physically produced in the court.

On December 26 last year, the court had extended Dar's NIA custody for 10 days.

The National Investigating Agency had on December 18 arrested Dar, the ninth accused in the case.

According to NIA, Dar, a resident of Jammu and Kashmir, was a close associate of Umar-un-Nabi, the suicide bomber who was driving | More on P6

EAC to decide on extension of env'l clearance for 850-MW Ratle project

EC granted for 10-year period in 2012

Srinagar, Jan 05: The Expert Appraisal Committee of the Union Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change will consider the Ratle Hydroelectric Power Corporation Limited's request for an extension of its Environmental Clearance for the 850-MW Ratle hydroelectric project in Jammu & Kashmir.

Documents accessed by the news agency—Kashmir News Observer (KNO) lay bare that the panel will decide on the extension of the clearance during its meeting scheduled for the 9th of this month.

The mega project was granted environmental clearance in 2012, and the clearance was transferred to RHPCL in 2021.

As per MoEF&CC norms, the validity of EC for river valley and hydroelectric projects is 10 years. That means the clearance granted in 2012 was valid up to December 2022.

The Ratle hydroelectric project is a run-of-river scheme proposed on the Chenab River in Kishtwar district, with an installed capacity of 850 MW.

Initially, construction of the project was undertaken by the Jammu and Kashmir State Power Development Corporation through M/s GVK Limited. However, work was halted in 2014.

Power Min orders Pakal Dul, Kiru by Dec 2026; Kwar by March 2028

Srinagar, Jan 05: In a significant development, Union Power Minister Manohar Lal on Monday set December 2026 as the deadline for commissioning the 1000-MW Pakal Dul and 624-MW Kiru hydroelectric projects, and March 2028 as the deadline for the 540-MW Kwar project.

The Union Minister, who was on a two-day visit to Jammu & Kashmir, issued directions to ensure timely commissioning of these projects.

As per an official handout with news agency—Kashmir News Observer (KNO), the Minister inspected all three projects of Chenab Valley Power Projects Limited (CVPP)—Pakal Dul (1000 MW), Kiru (624 MW), and Kwar (540 MW)—and held a review



meeting with project heads and contractors.

"The CMD, NHPPC, briefed the Minister in detail on various aspects of the three under-construction projects, following which Shri Manohar Lal issued directions to commission the

Pakal Dul and Kiru projects by December 2026 and the Kwar project by March 2028," the handout stated.

J&K reels under severe low voltage issues

Power demand hovering around 3200 MWs

Srinagar, Jan 05: Amid peak winter, Jammu and Kashmir valley is reeling under 'severe low voltage issues', official said.

The official further said that the heating load is also picking up during early morning and night hours. "The demand may further increase in the coming days."

It also said that the severe voltage in Jammu and Kashmir is in violation of N-1.

N-1 in power systems is a security criterion ensuring that the grid continues to operate reliably without interruption, even if a single critical component like a generator, line, or transformer fails

"As expected, with the increase in winter, demand of J&K control area is on a higher side and it is hovering around 3200MW," reads an official document available with the news agency—Kashmir News Observer (KNO).

It also reads that "It has been observed that the 400kV as well as 220kV Bus voltages at various stations in Kashmir valley are remaining critically low also reaching 347kV and 178kV—well below the Indian Electricity Grid Code (IEGC) band that is 380kV & 198kV respectively due to low hydro generation and heavy

Megavolt-Amperes Reactive (MVAR) drawl from the Inter-State Transmission System (ISTS) nodes."

Delay in trial not trump card for automatic grant of bail under UAPA: SC

New Delhi, Jan 05: The Supreme Court on Monday said the ground of delay in trial would not operate as a trump card for an automatic grant of bail for offences punishable under the stringent Unlawful (Activities) Prevention Act (UAPA).

The top court's observation came while refusing bail to activists Umar Khalid and Sharjeel Imam in the 2020 Delhi riots conspiracy case.

A bench of Justices Aravind Kumar and N V Anjaria said



there cannot be a mechanical invocation of prolonged incarceration as a ground for bail in cases involving serious offences under special enactments.

"In prosecutions alleging offences which implicate the

sovereignty, integrity or security of the State, delay does not operate as a trump card that automatically displaces statutory restraint. Rather, delay serves as a trigger for heightened judicial scrutiny," the bench said.

It said the outcome of such scrutiny must be determined by a proportional and contextual balancing of legally-relevant considerations.

The bench said the considerations include the gravity and statutory character of the offence alleged, the role attributed to the | More on P6

The dormant watchdog of food Supplies

Srinagar, Jan 05: The Enforcement Wing of the Food, Civil Supplies & Consumer Affairs (FCS&CA) Department, once instrumental in conducting market inspections, controlling prices and preventing black-marketing, appears largely dormant, with no major enforcement activity reported in recent years, even as the government completes a year in office.

In March last year, following directives from Chief Minister Omar Abdullah, the department announced the "reactivation" of its Enforcement Wing and the formation of market-check teams across the Valley to ensure the display of official price lists and curb overpricing of essential commodities.

The then Director FCS&CA had said,

"Nobody will be spared. We will take legal action against those involved in overpricing and violating the norms."

The reactivation came in response to rising consumer complaints about erratic pricing and lack of market discipline. A public notice issued by the FCS&CA Department had urged all retail shop owners to clearly display prices and warned that failure to do so would be treated as an unfair trade practice, inviting legal action.

However, on-ground activity has been sparse, with few market checks conducted beyond sporadic operations.

During Ramadan, Diwali and other festive periods, a few inspections were reported in select districts, but residents say these were neither sustained nor comprehensive across the Valley.

The government has repeatedly



assured consumers of continued enforcement efforts. In a statement issued over three months ago,

"zero-tolerance policy towards food adulteration" and assured that the enforcement campaign would continue.

Yet, residents and consumer activists argue that these assurances have not translated into consistent action.

A recent report also highlighted adulterated food and lax checks underscored public anxiety over weak enforcement, with local civil society groups decrying the lapse.

Repeated attempts by KNO to obtain an updated official comment on the current status of the Enforcement Wing, ongoing market checks, or steps being taken to strengthen enforcement went unanswered. Officials from the FCS&CA Department remained unresponsive to multiple calls and messages.

Residents said the Enforcement

Wing's limited activity and lack of strong punitive powers have allowed price manipulation and quality compromises to persist. "Earlier, we used to see officials visiting markets, checking weights and prices, but now nobody comes. Shopkeepers fix rates as they please, and common people have nowhere to complain," said Bilal Ahmad, a resident of Nowhatta, Srinagar.

Another resident, Mubashir, said they only hear about fines or inspections in the news, but see no difference on the ground. "Vegetables, chicken and mutton rates change from shop to shop without any control," he said.

With government statements stressing intent but little visible enforcement on the ground, consumers say they are left waiting for meaningful action—(KNO)

State vs UT governance poles apart: Sakina Itoo

Udhampur, Jan 05: Stating that the difference between functioning in a State and a UT is "like the difference between earth and sky," Minister for Health and Medical Education, Education and Social Welfare, Sakina Itoo, on Monday said that despite administrative limitations the elected government is making every possible effort to streamline governance across departments.

Department, Itoo recalled the pivotal role of former Chief Minister Dr Farooq Abdullah, stating that it was during his tenure in 1996 that Integrated Child Development Services (ICDS) projects were introduced in Jammu and Kashmir.

"From 2008 to 2014, I personally worked to get hundreds of posts sanctioned in the Social Welfare Department. Unfortunately, from 2015 onwards, almost nothing was done in this sector until last year," she said.

The Minister said that after the formation of the present dispensation, efforts were renewed to address stagnation in the department.

"Since last year, we have once again worked to streamline the Social Welfare Department. Pending posts have now been advertised, and corrective measures are being taken to strengthen service delivery," she added.

Itoo said, "Our aim is to deliver to the people despite limited powers. We are accountable to the people who elected us, and we will continue to raise public issues and work for development."—(KNO)

Fare confusion rides on

Srinagar, Jan 05: Confusion over passenger fare revisions in Jammu and Kashmir continues, with commuters reporting higher fares even as the government maintains that "no official order" has been issued.

Last week, it was stated that an 18 per cent hike in passenger fares had been "approved" following deliberations by the Fare Revision Committee (FRC), chaired by Principal Secretary Finance Santosh D. Vaidya, with rates reportedly set to take effect from January 1, 2026. However, no formal notification has been issued so far, leaving both transporters and passengers in a state of uncertainty. While some commuters report paying more on Srinagar and south Kashmir routes, transporters from the Kashmir valley say they have not yet implemented the hike officially.

"Meetings with the Jammu wing are scheduled for the next two days to decide the next steps, as we are approaching the government and Transport Minister," a senior transporter said.

The transporters said they had planned to implement the hike earlier, but due to holidays last week, meetings could not take place.

GMC Jammu issues advisory on cold-weather risks

Jammu, Jan 05: In view of the intensifying winter conditions across Jammu and Kashmir, Government Medical College (GMC) Jammu has issued a detailed public advisory warning about the serious health and safety risks associated with extreme cold and outlining preparedness and preventive measures for individuals, families and communities.

The advisory highlights that prolonged exposure to low temperatures can lead to life-threatening conditions such as hypothermia, frostbite, and carbon monoxide poisoning. It added that cold-related

disruptions like power outages, frozen water pipes, and dead vehicle batteries can further endanger lives.

Major Health Risks Identified

According to GMC Jammu, hypothermia—a condition in which the body temperature drops below 95°F (35°C)—is among the most dangerous consequences of extreme cold and can prove fatal if not addressed promptly. The advisory notes that frostbite, which causes damage to body tissues due to freezing, can occur rapidly, especially in exposed body parts like fingers, toes, ears and the nose.

Pattan gridlock worsens, commuters suffer

Baramulla, Jan 05: The vital Pattan stretch on Srinagar-Baramulla highway has become synonymous with daily traffic chaos, with commuters, traders and residents enduring long tailbacks amid slow progress on the key 11-kilometre bypass project.

Commuters said that they often get stuck for 30 to 45 minutes in the gridlock. They said patients, students and office-goers travelling on the vital Srinagar-Baramulla corridor are the most affected.

They said a town-to-town journey that should take minutes often stretches close to an hour.

Authorities said the Rs 432 crore 11-km Pattan bypass project from Pattan to Tapper is under execution and will eventually decongest the township. They said earth-filling

and formation work on major portions of the alignment are almost complete, while bottlenecks have already been cleared to keep the project on track.

Officials indicated that if the current pace is maintained, the bypass is expected to be completed around July, giving commuters an alternative corridor and easing pressure on the town centre. Earlier, the project was scheduled to be completed in 2025.

Amid mounting public anger, Baramulla MP Engineer Abdul Rashid has formally taken up the issue of delayed Pattan bypass works with Union Road Transport and Highways Minister Nitin Gadkari.

In his representation, the MP flagged "slow execution" and its impact on commuters, traders, patients and students, terming the bypass and associated works lifelines for North Kashmir.

However, in a written reply, the minister has acknowledged the concerns and assured that the matter is being "looked into for action," raising hopes that the work speed will now be increased.

It is noteworthy that the traffic snarls peak during morning office rush and evenings, stranding ambulances and office-goers for 30-45 minutes in what locals call a routine nightmare, even as police remain stretched, manually clearing gridlocks.

Social media overflows with videos of massive jams, calling Pattan town a "Jammagar", amplifying calls for a dedicated traffic plan, more personnel and coordination with local bodies until the bypass opens. "Police try hard, but without road space and bypass, jams are inevitable—speed up the real solutions," a commuter said—(KNO)

Tactile Triumphs: Braille, Rights And Inclusion In India

Observed every year on 4th January, World Braille Day foregrounds Braille not merely as a reading system, but as a gateway to education, dignity and equal participation for persons with visual disabilities. This significance is mirrored in India's efforts to adopt and standardise Braille for inclusive learning. The Braille script was introduced in India in 1887. But, in 1951, a single national standard, Bharati Braille, was adopted with the common codes for Indian languages. According to the 2011 Census, there are 50,32,463 persons with visual impairment in India who face significant barriers in accessing healthcare, education, and employment. Recognising the needs of this population, Braille in India is embedded in a rights-based ecosystem anchored in initiatives, acts and policies like the Rights of Persons with Disabilities Act, 2016, and the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 and others. These efforts position Braille as both a literacy tool and a public accessibility norm.

What is Braille and How Does It Work?

Braille is a tactile writing and reading system used by people who are blind or have low vision. It is based on a six-dot cell, arranged in two columns of three dots each. Different combinations of raised dots represent letters, numerals, punctuation marks and symbols, enabling users to read through touch.

Braille (named after its inventor in 19th century France, Louis Braille) is not a language but a code that allows multiple languages to be read and written in tactile form.

Significance of Braille

Braille plays a vital role in ensuring literacy, independence, and empowerment for persons with visual impairment. It is central to inclusive education and equal participation in social and economic life.

India, as a State Party to the UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (UNCRPD), is committed to ensuring access to information and education in accessible formats, including Braille.

Government of India: Policy and Programme Ecosystem Supporting Braille

The Government of India has established a comprehensive ecosystem to promote the development, dissemination, and use of Braille as a vital tool for inclusion and empowerment of persons with visual impairment. Rooted in constitutional commitments to equality, dignity, and social justice, these initiatives span education, social welfare, skill development, and digital accessibility.

1) Legal foundation: Rights of Persons with Disabilities Act, 2016 (RPwD Act)

India's Braille ecosystem is anchored in a rights-based legal framework through the Rights of Persons with Disabilities Act, 2016. The Act mandates inclusive education for persons with disabilities, making Braille access and literacy a core requirement.

Inclusive education as a duty of educational institutions: The Act requires educational institutions funded/recognised by government to ensure inclusive education and accessible infrastructure (buildings/campus/facilities), reasonable accommodation, and appropriate support.

Braille and communication modes in schooling: For students who are blind (or deafblind), the Act stresses education in the most appropriate languages and modes/means of communication and explicitly supports Braille and related formats.

Free learning material and assistive devices (up to 18 years): The Act includes measures such as providing books/learning materials and assistive devices free of cost for students with benchmark disabilities.

2) Bharati Braille: India's Standardised Braille Script

The Government of India recognises Bharati Braille as the unified script for multiple Indian languages. Under the aegis of the Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities and the National Institute for Empowerment of Persons with Visual Disabilities (NIEPVD), a Standard Bharati Braille Code (with Unicode mapping) has been published on 04 January 2025 with official adoption of a consistent Braille system across Indian languages for education and accessibility. The same has been adopted after public consultation on the draft, which was published on 03 December 2024.

How Bharati Braille Works

1. Unified Braille System for Indian Languages

Bharati Braille is the standardised tactile writing system used for most Indian languages.

It was developed to harmonise multiple disparate Braille scripts that existed across languages into a single, consistent code.



This ensures that visually impaired readers can learn and use a common Braille system across multiple Indian languages

It employs the standard six-dot Braille cell.

2. Standardisation and Unicode Mapping

The Government (through NIEPVD/DEPwD) has released the Standard Bharati Braille Codes that includes Unicode mappings, enabling digital compatibility.

This means each Braille cell pattern is mapped to a specific Unicode code point, facilitating digital reading-writing, screen reader support, Braille displays and software applications.

Unicode mapping is vital for accessible digital content in Bharati Braille.

3. Consistent Representation Across Languages

The Standard Bharati Braille Codes provide rules to represent vowels, consonants, numerals and punctuation in different Indian scripts such as Hindi, Marathi, Bengali, Telugu, Kannada, Malayalam, etc., using a common tactile framework.

This helps learners with visual impairment transition between languages while reading Braille without having to relearn different Braille codes.

4. Basis for Teaching, Publishing and Digital Accessibility

Bharati Braille serves as the foundation for Braille education, transcription, publishing and accessible material production in India.

The standards are used by publishers, Braille presses, and accessibility implementers to produce textbooks, learning materials and digital Braille content that are consistent and reliable.

The standard supports national initiatives for inclusive education and literacy.

Recent Initiatives: The National Institute for the Empowerment of Persons with Visual Disabilities (NIEPVD) has conducted a Project on Validation of the revised Bharati Braille for technological integration and prepared the Draft Bharati Braille 2.1 after validating Liblouis tables. This draft has been developed through validation workshops and consultations through focal group discussions conducted across different regions of the country. The draft is being uploaded on the NIEPVD website on 04 January 2026 (World Braille Day) for a period of 15 days, inviting comments and feedback from all stakeholders, including educators, Braille experts, persons with visual disabilities, publishers, researchers, and technology developers.

NIEPVD is also conducting training on Bharati Braille in the regional language. Recently, the Institute has organised training on Tamil, Malayalam and Odia Braille.

3) Accessible India Campaign: Strengthening Inclusive Access in Infrastructure, Mobility, and Information and Communication Technologies

The Accessible India Campaign (Sugamya Bharat

Abhiyan) is India's national initiative, launched in 2015, by the Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (DEPwD), to create a barrier-free, inclusive environment for Persons with Disabilities (PwDs), including persons with visual impairment. The campaign adopts a holistic approach to accessibility by addressing the built environments (buildings, transport), the information & communication ecosystem (websites, media), and transportation systems universally accessible. It focuses on retrofitting buildings and public spaces with Braille signage (covering 2,000+ railway stations), improving infrastructure at railways, metro stations and airports, and implementing national website accessibility guidelines.

4) NEP 2020's Braille integration

The National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 explicitly recognises that inclusion needs practical learning supports—assistive devices and accessible teaching-learning materials, including Braille.

NEP prioritises participation of children with disabilities, and states that language-appropriate teaching and learning materials—including textbooks in accessible formats such as large print and Braille—should be made available to support integration into classrooms.

The NCERT develops school curricula and textbooks aligned with NEP 2020, and is responsible for producing and enabling Braille and accessible-format textbooks for school education.

5) Higher education and institutional accessibility to Braille

As students with visual disabilities move into higher education, Braille and other accessible formats need to be integrated into mainstream academic systems. Government-supported digital libraries and institutional mandates are enabling universities to shift from ad-hoc accommodations to structured, campus-wide accessibility practices. The DALM Project supports the students with visual impairment pursuing higher education through provision of free Braille Books through its implementing agencies.

Sugamya Pustakalya

It is a comprehensive digital library for persons with visual and other print disabilities, with accessible books in multiple languages and links to global sources. It was initiated as a collaborative effort of NIEPVD (National Institute for Empowerment of Persons with Visual Disabilities), along with Tata Consultancy Services and a non-profit organisation called the Daisy Forum of India. The portal offers availability of books and learning materials in digital Braille format. Institutions involved are required to:

- Search for accessible-format books
- Convert if not available
- Upload to Sugamya Pustakalya to avoid duplication
- Provide memberships to students/faculty with print disabilities

This is significant because it embeds "Braille/accessible formats" into institutional workflows, not just disability offices.

6) Programmes that fund and operationalise Braille learning materials

The Government of India has created dedicated funding mechanisms to translate Braille access into real, scalable learning materials. These programmes focus on mass production, free distribution and institutional capacity-building to ensure that students with visual disabilities are not excluded due to lack of accessible content.

DALM (Project on Financial Support for Development of Accessible Learning Materials)

The DALM Project (earlier known as the "Braille Press Project"), implemented under the SIPDA (Scheme for Implementation of the Persons with Disabilities Act), provides free Braille textbooks and course materials to persons with visual impairment across India, covering both school and higher education. Since its inception in 2014, the project has distributed accessible-format school textbooks and other learning materials to 1,69,782 students.

7) Capacity building that sustains Braille (training, special education)

Government bodies and statutory regulators play a critical role in standardising training, accrediting institutions and maintaining professional quality across the country. NIEPVD, Dehradun, is conducting various training programmes for the promotion of Braille literacy and Braille development activities.

Rehabilitation Council of India

The Rehabilitation Council of India (RCI) is a statutory body of the Government of India established under the Rehabilitation Council of India Act, 1992. It came into existence on 22 June 1993 when the Act was enacted by Parliament. An amendment in 2000 broadened its scope. Its objectives are:

Regulate and standardise rehabilitation education and training for professionals working with persons with disabilities across India.

Prescribe and enforce minimum educational and training standards to ensure quality and uniformity in rehabilitation services.

Recognise and monitor institutions and courses, including domestic and foreign qualifications, in the field of rehabilitation and special education.

Maintain the Central Rehabilitation Register (CRR) for registration and regulation of qualified rehabilitation professionals and personnel.

Promote research, data collection, and continuing professional development in rehabilitation and special education.

Core Institutions and Delivery Ecosystems

Braille Library Service, Delhi Public Library – Provides Braille books and periodicals.

Operates under the Delhi Public Library (DPL), an autonomous organisation of the Ministry of Culture, Government of India.

Provides Braille books, magazines and periodicals for persons with visual disabilities.

Functions as a national-level public Braille library service, supporting reading, education and lifelong learning.

Braille Resource Centre, Bangalore University – Academic Braille resource support.

Functions as an academic support centre offering:

Braille transcription support

Accessible study materials

Academic assistance for visually impaired students

Supports inclusive higher education in line with UGC accessibility guidelines.

Braille presses and resource centres

Strengthen manpower development by recognising and registering vocational, national and apex disability institutions and their personnel under the Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment.

Conclusion: Toward a Barrier-Free Future

World Braille Day underscores a simple but powerful truth: access to information determines access to opportunity. India's evolving Braille ecosystem is rooted in law, strengthened by institutional mechanisms and aligned with the United Nations' rights-based vision. By standardising Braille and investing in accessible learning materials, India is further strengthening the foundations of inclusive education. Integrating tactile information across public services and building professional capacity are further helping transform constitutional principles into meaningful, lived accessibility. As these efforts further expand, Braille is increasingly recognised not just as a niche accommodation, but as a vital bridge to equality, participation and dignity for persons with visual disabilities.

Catalyzing India's Semiconductor Design Ecosystem

India is rapidly advancing its semiconductor ambitions, recognizing semiconductor chips as critical enablers of healthcare, transport, communications, defence, space, and emerging digital infrastructure. With accelerating digitalization and automation, global demand for semiconductor chips is rising sharply. In response, the Government of India, through the Semicon India Programme and the India Semiconductor Mission (ISM), is strengthening the domestic semiconductor ecosystem and supply chain. However, semiconductor manufacturing remains concentrated in a limited number of geographies, making global supply chains highly fragile and vulnerable to disruptions. This underscores the urgent need to diversify the global manufacturing base, with India increasingly emerging as a strategic and reliable player in the global semiconductor landscape.

Did You Know: Fabless chip design is the key enabler of semiconductor value chain.

In the electronics value chain, fabless semiconductor companies hold the highest strategic value because they design the chips that drive product intelligence, efficiency, and security. While fabs manufacture silicon and EMS firms assemble devices, more than half of a semiconductor's value comes from design and IP, not physical production. Fabless semiconductor design models generate high value addition with relatively modest capital expenditure, as design and IP contribute disproportionately to product economic value.

Without strong fabless capability, a nation remains dependent on imported core technologies even if electronics are manufactured locally. Building a robust fabless ecosystem therefore enables India to own the most critical layer of the value chain, retain intellectual property, reduce imports, attract manufacturing, and establish long-term technological leadership.

DLI Scheme

The Design Linked Incentive (DLI) Scheme is a key instrument in advancing India's ambition to develop a strong fabless capability. The scheme is implemented by the Ministry of Electronics and Information Technology (MeitY) under the Semicon India Programme to catalyze a strong, self-reliant chip design ecosystem by providing financial incentives and access to advanced design infrastructure for domestic startups and MSMEs.

ELIGIBILITY UNDER THE DLI SCHEME

Start-ups and MSMEs are eligible for financial incentives and design infrastructure support for semiconductor product design & deployment and other domestic companies are eligible for financial incentives for deploying semiconductor designs.

MSMEs: Defined according to the Ministry of Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises notification, 1 June 2020.

Startups: Defined as per the Department for Promotion of Industry and Internal Trade (DPIIT) notification, 19 February 2019.

Domestic companies: Defined as those which are owned by resident Indian citizens, as per the Foreign Direct Investment

(FDI) Policy Circular, 2017 or extant norms.

The DLI Scheme supports semiconductor design across the full lifecycle—from design and development to deployment—covering Integrated Circuits (ICs), chipsets, Systems-on-Chip (SoCs), systems and IP cores. By promoting indigenous semiconductor content and intellectual property in electronic products, the scheme aims to reduce import dependence, strengthen supply chain resilience, and enhance domestic value addition.

The reimbursement is capped at 15 crore per application.

The support is available to entities involved in semiconductor design for: Integrated Circuits (ICs) Chipsets Systems on Chips (SoCs) Systems & IP Cores Semiconductor-linked designs.

Incentives of 6% to 4% of net sales turnover are provided for five years.

The incentive is capped at 30 crore per application.

The minimum cumulative net sales required over Years 1-5 is 1 crore for startups/ MSMEs and 5 crore for other domestic companies.

The design must be successfully deployed in electronic products.

DESIGN INFRASTRUCTURE SUPPORT

C-DAC has established the ChipIN Centre under the DLI Scheme to facilitate the design infrastructure support to approved companies.

National EDA (Electronic Design Automation) Tool Grid: Remote access to the centralized facility of advance EDA tools for chip design activities will be provided to start-ups and MSMEs.

IP Core repository: Flexible access to the repository of IP Cores for SoC design activities.

MPW Prototyping support: Fiscal support for fabricating the design in MPW manner at semiconductor foundries.

Post-silicon validation support: Fiscal support for testing and validation of the fabricated ASIC and silicon bring-up activities.

Programme Highlights & Key Achievements of DLI

Since its launch in December 2021, the Design Linked Incentive (DLI) Scheme has been instrumental in shaping a stronger and more self-reliant semiconductor design ecosystem in India. By extending financial incentives, access to advanced design tools, and prototyping support to companies, startups, and academic institutions, the scheme enables innovators to progress seamlessly from ideas to actual silicon chips. This ecosystem-driven approach has been anchored by the creation of shared national infrastructure for chip design.

A key pillar of this infrastructure is the ChipIN Centre, which has democratized access to advanced EDA tools for chip design for about 1 lakh engineers and students across 400 organizations nationwide—making it the world's largest user base of

a centralized chip design facility. This includes support to around 305 academic institutions under the Chips to Start-up (C2S) Programme and 95 startups under the DLI Scheme, significantly reducing entry barriers for early-stage innovators.

Complementing this effort, India's shared EDA Grid—a national platform of offering high-end chip design software—has recorded 54,03,005 hours of cumulative usage by 95 supported start-ups as of 2nd January 2026, reflecting strong adoption by startups, MSMEs, and researchers across all States.

These enabling measures have translated into tangible outcomes for the domestic startup ecosystem. Supported companies under the DLI Scheme have moved from innovation to execution, with ten patents filed, 16 chip-design tape-outs completed, and six semiconductor chips successfully fabricated—marking critical milestones from concept to silicon. In parallel, over 1,000 specialised engineers have been trained or engaged through DLI-supported projects, strengthening India's design talent base. Beneficiaries have also developed more than 140 reusable semiconductor IP cores, which serve as critical enablers for advanced chip development.

Building on these successes, the DLI Scheme is now driving the transition from design validation to productization, enabling start-ups and MSMEs to move toward volume manufacturing, system integration, and market deployment. This evolving ecosystem not only strengthens India's domestic semiconductor capabilities but also positions the country as a credible player in global chip design and innovation.

Key Institutional Frameworks for Semiconductor Design

India's semiconductor ecosystem is being strengthened through a coordinated institutional framework that combines policy leadership, investment support, capacity building, and indigenous technology development. Key programmes and agencies provide end-to-end backing—from incentivizing chip design and manufacturing to developing skilled talent and fostering open-source microprocessor architectures—ensuring India's progression toward a self-reliant and globally competitive semiconductor design ecosystem.

Ministry of Electronics and Information Technology (MeitY): MeitY leads national semiconductor initiatives, provides policy direction, and anchors schemes. It also coordinates institutional and industry partnerships to strengthen India's chip design and manufacturing ecosystem.

MeitY has announced the Design Linked Incentive (DLI) Scheme; aims to offset the existing disabilities in India's domestic semiconductor design industry. It seeks to help Indian companies move up the semiconductor value chain.

Semicon India Programme (SIM): With an outlay of 76,000 crore, the programme supports investments in semiconductor and display manufacturing as well as the design ecosystem. The DLI Scheme operates under this programme, ensuring end-to-end backing for design, fabrication and

productisation. C-DAC, a premier R&D organization of the MeitY, is responsible for implementation of the DLI Scheme as Nodal Agency.

Chips to Startup (C2S) Programme: C2S is an umbrella capacity building programme initiated at academic organizations spread across the country to generate 85 thousand number of industry-ready manpower at B.Tech, M.Tech, and PhD levels specialized in semiconductor chip design.

Microprocessor Development Programme: The Microprocessor Development Programme, initiated at C-DAC, IIT Madras and IIT Bombay has resulted into design, development and fabrication of open-source architecture-based family of microprocessors viz. VEGA12, SHAKTI13 and AJIT microprocessors as a step towards self-reliance.

Together, these institutional initiatives create a robust foundation for India's semiconductor ambitions, enabling startups, MSMEs, and academic institutions to innovate and scale. By bridging the gap from research to productization, they are driving self-reliance, enhancing global competitiveness, and positioning India as a strategic player in the global semiconductor landscape.

Success Stories of India's Design Linked Incentive (DLI) Scheme

Under the DLI scheme, 24 chip-design projects have been sanctioned across areas such as video surveillance, drone detection, energy meters, microprocessors, satellite communications, and broadband and IoT SoCs. Additionally, 95 companies have received access to industry-grade EDA tools, significantly reducing design and infrastructure costs for Indian chip design startups. Among the beneficiaries, following companies stands out as leading examples of how the DLI Scheme is nurturing world-class semiconductor innovation:

Vervesemi Microelectronics: With a strong portfolio of 110+ semiconductor IPs, 25 integrated circuit (IC) product variants, 10 granted patents, and 5 trade secrets is developing motor-control chips for a wide range of applications, including consumer appliances such as fans, coolers, mixer grinders, air conditioners, washing machines, and drones, as well as automotive applications like e-scooters and e-rickshaws. These chips support a unique class of BLDC motors. Vervesemi has completed pilot-lot sampling for two chips, with a third chip expected from the foundry later this year and has several global customers already engaged in product development using the existing chips.

InCore Semiconductors: Is focused on the design and development of indigenous RISC-V microprocessor IPs and SoC design automation tools, with the ultimate goal of building India's most powerful embedded processor, Dolomite, targeted at entry-level smartphones and edge-AI applications. InCore's portfolio of processor IP cores is silicon-proven across multiple customer chips, fabricated at technology nodes ranging from 180 nm to 16 nm, and aims to reduce India's dependence on imported CPU IP while enabling strategic and commercial applications.

Netrasemi: Is focused on designing AI-capable SoCs for CCTV secure surveillance, smart sensors, robotics and drones, and mobility applications. The company has successfully taped out India's first indigenously designed AI SoC in an advanced 12 nm process node, integrating in-house AI/ML accelerators, vision processing, and video engines. Netrasemi is also backed by the largest private venture capital funding to date for an Indian semiconductor company and has a series of design tape-outs lined up next year, ranging from low-end to high-complexity surveillance SoCs.

Heesa Digital Innovations: Is developing Vihaar, an indigenous fiber-broadband solution used to connect homes and businesses to high-speed fiber networks. Vihaar is built around an indigenous VEGA processor-based Gigabit Passive Optical Network (GPON) Optical Network Terminal (ONT) and Network SoC, which integrates fiber termination, data processing, and network management functions into a single chip. This enables reliable, secure, and cost-effective broadband connectivity. They are on track to introduce reference platforms for customer exploration in 2026.

AAGYAVISION: Is designing advanced radar-on-chip that operate reliably in all weather conditions, driving advancements in safety, security, smart infrastructure, edge computing, and emerging 6G sensor networks as well as critical application like drone detection.

The success stories illustrate how the DLI Scheme is converting indigenous chip design capabilities into silicon-proven, market-ready products. By supporting advanced design prototyping, and commercialization, the scheme is strengthening India's technological self-reliance and its position in the global semiconductor design ecosystem.

The Design Linked Incentive (DLI) Scheme is critical to anchoring India in the most strategic and value-intensive segment of the global semiconductor value chain—chip design. By reducing dependence on imported semiconductor IPs and chips, strengthening resilience against geopolitical and supply-chain disruptions, and ensuring assured access to critical technologies for defence, telecom, AI and mobility, DLI lays the foundation for strategic autonomy and long-term economic growth. The scheme also enables high-value growth by translating deep-tech innovation into globally competitive products, fostering startups and MSMEs, and building a highly skilled engineering workforce.

The Trump Doctrine In Venezuela

The US military operation to arrest Nicolás Maduro underscores President Donald Trump's view of the Western Hemisphere as a region where US interests take precedence. Russia and China will welcome this as a sign that Trump shares their vision of a world divided into spheres of influence.

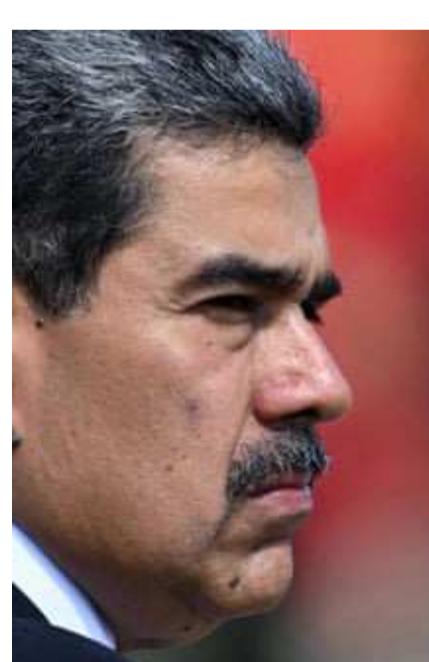
Nicolás Maduro is now the former president of Venezuela, a prisoner in US custody. His ouster at the hands of US Special Forces is, however, best understood as the end of the beginning rather than the beginning of the end.

To be sure, few in Venezuela, or anywhere, will mourn Maduro's removal. He was an autocrat who stole an election, repressed his people, ran his country's economy into the ground despite possessing enormous oil reserves, and trafficked in narcotics.

But that does not mean that this military operation was either warranted or wise. In fact, it was of questionable legality. It was also of questionable strategic value: Maduro hardly posed an imminent threat to the United States. Make no mistake: this was a military operation of choice, not of necessity.

There are some superficial similarities between this operation and the one launched by President George H.W. Bush in 1989 to remove Panamanian强人 Manuel Noriega from power. But there was a stronger legal case against Noriega, one involving not just drugs but also the killing of a US serviceman. And there were legitimate concerns about the threat to other US military personnel stationed in Panama and the security of the Panama Canal itself.

The choice to target Venezuela is revealing of President Donald Trump's motive. The main priority, Trump suggested during his press conference after the operation, was American access to Venezuela's oil reserves,



the world's largest. Secondary objectives included ending Venezuela's involvement in the drug trade, helping those who left the country to return home, and tightening the squeeze on Cuba, which is heavily dependent on subsidized Venezuelan oil to bolster its struggling, sanctioned economy.

But it would be premature in the extreme to declare the operation a success. It is one thing to remove an individual from power. It is another, fundamentally different and more

difficult task, to remove a regime and replace it with something more benign and enduring. With regard to Venezuela, former Secretary of State Colin Powell's "Pottery Barn rule" applies: we broke it, so now we own it.

Trump has declared that the US would "run Venezuela." Details are scarce, and whether this will require an occupying army is unclear. One thing is clear, at least for now: the Trump administration prefers to work with remnants of the existing regime (it seems

to have reached an understanding with Maduro's vice president, who is now heading up the government) rather than empower the opposition. This aligns with a policy motivated by the prospect of commercial gain, not by a desire to promote democracy and safeguard human rights.

One can assume away all potential problems, but the main one—a breakdown in order—should be forthrightly acknowledged. Pro-regime elements will be active, and the opposition is anything but united and may well resist being shut out. Such unknowns could raise difficult policy choices for the US in terms of what it would be prepared to do to shape developments if they were to spin out of control.

The operation captures the essence of Trump's foreign policy. It was unilateral to its core. It paid little heed to legality or international opinion. It emphasized the Western Hemisphere rather than Europe, the Indo-Pacific, or the Middle East. The goal was commercial benefit, in this case access to oil reserves, and to strengthen homeland security, reflecting concerns over drugs and immigration. Military force was used, but in bounded ways.

The biggest downside of the Venezuela operation could be the precedent it sets, affirming the right of great powers to intervene in their backyards against leaders they deem to be illegitimate or a threat. One can only imagine Russian President Vladimir Putin, who is calling for the "de-Nazification" of Ukraine and the removal of President Volodymyr Zelensky, nodding in agreement. Trump's military operation in Venezuela makes a negotiated end to the Russia-Ukraine war even

more remote than it already was.

A similar reaction is likely in China, which views Taiwan as a breakaway province and its government as illegitimate. This is not to say that President Xi Jinping will suddenly act on his ambitions for Taiwan, but events in Venezuela could increase his confidence that he would succeed if he were to invade, besiege, or otherwise coerce the island.

The operation to oust Maduro makes clear that the recently released US National Security Strategy should be taken seriously, and that the Trump administration sees the Western Hemisphere as a region where US interests take precedence. Russia and China will welcome this as a sign that Trump shares their vision of a world divided into spheres of influence, where the governments in Moscow and Beijing have the upper hand in Europe and the Indo-Pacific, respectively. A global order that has endured for 80 years is on the verge of being replaced by three regional orders that are likely to be anything but orderly—or free.

'Act of terror' under UAPA not confined only to final execution: SC

New Delhi, Jan 05: The Supreme Court on Monday ruled that an "act of terror" under the Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act is not confined only to the final execution but extends to those who contribute to the commission of such acts through planning, coordination, mobilisation or other forms of concerted action.

Section 15 of the UAPA defines a terrorist act as an act done "with intent to threaten or likely to threaten the unity, integrity, security, economic security or sovereignty of India or with intent to strike terror or likely to strike terror in the people or any section of the people in India."

However, the provision qualifies that striking terror is by use of "bombs, dynamite or other explosive substances or

inflammable substances or firearms or any other means."

While refusing bail to Umar Khalid and Sharjeel Imam, a bench of Justices Aravind Kumar and NV Anjaria, in its judgment spanning 142 pages, referred to Section 15(1)(a) of the 1967 Act to note the residuary phrase of "by another means".

The top court said the statutory intent was not to limit the definition of terror to the use of weapons, asserting that emphasis is not solely on the instrumentality but the design, intent and effect of the act.

"Confining Section 15 to only conventional modes of violence will be to unduly narrow its ambit contrary to plain language," it said.

"The means by which such acts may be committed or not confined to the use of bombs, explosives, firearms, or other



conventional weapons alone.

"Parliament has consciously

nature" which expression cannot be rendered otiose. The statutory emphasis is thus not solely on the instrumentality employed but the design, intent and effect of the act," the court said.

The apex court said a 'terrorist act' under the UAPA extended to the disruption of essential supplies leading to economic insecurity and destabilisation of civic life even if violence was not committed in the process.

Criminal liability is not confined only to the final execution, but extends to those who contribute to the commission of such acts through planning, coordination, mobilisation, or other forms of concerted action, the court said.

"The prosecution case, as placed before this Court, does not proceed on the footing that the protests merely inconvenienced commuters or strained

policing resources. It proceeds on the footing that a deliberate method of agitation was conceived and executed, namely sustained and replicated 'chakka jams' at strategically selected arterial locations, with the object of choking movement across the National Capital, disrupting essential services, and overwhelming the administrative capacity of the State," it said.

The top court said offences covered under the UAPA go beyond the ordinary offences and affect the security and integrity of the nation.

A terrorist act is not an isolated, solitary and final act; it was the culmination of "organised, sustained and conspiratorial activities unfolding over time", it added.

The apex court said not every disruption of traffic, not every blockade, and not every

law-and-order incident engages the statutory framework of the UAPA.

"The statute is attracted only where the conduct alleged, taken cumulatively, is capable of being understood as threatening the unity, integrity, security, or sovereignty of the nation, or as creating a climate of fear and paralysis transcending ordinary disorder," it said.

The February 2020 riots in northeast Delhi left 53 people dead and more than 700 injured.

The violence erupted during widespread protests against the Citizenship (Amendment) Act and the National Register of Citizens.

The accused moved the apex court, challenging the Delhi High Court's September 2, 2025, order denying them bail in the larger conspiracy case of the riots.

US expands list of countries whose citizens must pay up to USD 15,000 bonds to apply for visas

Washington, Jan 05: The Trump administration has added seven countries, including five in Africa, to the list of nations whose passport holders are required to post bonds of up to USD 15,000 to apply to enter the United States.

Thirteen countries, all but two of them in Africa, are now on the list, which makes the process of obtaining a US visa unaffordable for many.

The State Department last week quietly added Bhutan, Botswana, the Central African Republic, Guinea, Guinea-Bissau, Namibia and Turkmenistan to the list. Those designations took effect on January 1, according to a notice posted on the travel.state.gov website.

It's the latest effort by the Trump administration to tighten requirements for entry to the US, including requiring citizens from all countries that require visas to sit for in-person interviews and disclose years of social media histories as well as detailed accounts of their and their families'



previous travel and living arrangements.

US officials have defended the bonds, which can range from USD 5,000 up to USD 15,000, maintaining they are effective in ensuring that citizens of targeted countries do not overstay their visas.

Payment of the bond does not guarantee a visa will be granted, but the amount will be

Delay in trial not

accused within the alleged design or conspiracy, the strength of the prima facie case as it emerges at the limited threshold contemplated under the special statute and the extent to which continued incarceration has become demonstrably disproportionate so as to offend the guarantee of personal liberty under Article 21 of the Constitution.

The court said a delay in the trial cannot be the sole factor to grant bail in UAPA offences and "claims to liberty must be examined in the totality of circumstances, particularly where allegations implicate organised criminality or matters of public interest".

It rejected the petitioners' submission referring to the K A Najeeb case while seeking bail.

In the Najeeb case, the top court granted bail to an accused under the Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act (UAPA), 1967, due to prolonged incarceration.

"To read Najeeb as mandating bail solely on account of prolonged incarceration, irrespective of the statutory context or the nature of the allegations, would be to attribute to the decision a consequence it neither intended nor supports."

With Op Sindoor, armed forces demonstrated India's resoluteness to world: VP at NCC Camp

New Delhi, Jan 05: Vice President C P Radhakrishnan on Monday said the armed forces made India proud with Operation Sindoor as they demonstrated to the world the country's resoluteness while successfully carrying out the military action.

Trai imposes penalty worth Rs 150 cr on telecom operators for failure to curb spam calls, messages

New Delhi, Jan 05: The telecom regulator Trai has imposed a penalty of Rs 150 crore on telecom operators for their failure to curb spam calls and messages, according to an official source.

The Rs 150 crore penalty imposed for three years beginning 2020, however, has been challenged by telecom operators.

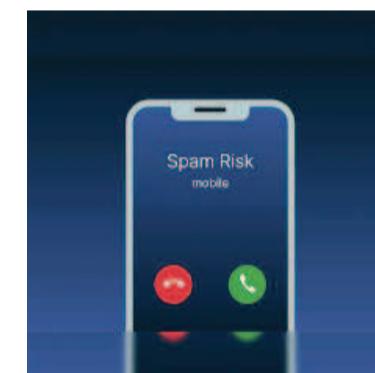
"Financial disincentives of more than Rs 150 crore have been imposed on the telecom service providers for wrong closure of customer complaints and not taking action on telecom connections of spammers in accordance with regulations," the source said.

The Telecom Regulatory Authority of India (Trai) imposes penalties on telecom operators who fail to comply with regulations that impose financial disincentives.

The regulations provide for a financial disincentive of up to Rs 50 lakh per month per licensed Service Area for a telecom operator.

"It is important to note that the financial disincentives are imposed on TSPs (telecom service providers) not because someone has sent through their network, but because they fail to take appropriate action, in accordance with the Regulations, on the telecom resources of spammers."

"While action on the consumer complaints is the key to controlling spam, during audit of complaints, Trai has observed many cases of wrong closures of customer complaints by the TSPs," the source said.



Trai has disconnected over 21 lakh spammers and blacklisted more than 1 lakh entities in the last year.

About 18.8 lakh spammers' connections were disconnected, and more than 1,150 entities were blacklisted in September 2024, consequent to the direction issued by Trai on August 13, 2024.

Although the regulatory framework provides for taking action against unregistered senders by the telecom service providers, which ranges from suspension of connections to disconnection of all the connections for one year and complete blacklisting of the sender across all telecom service providers in the country, the trigger for action comes from customer complaints only, the source said.

Trai has rolled out a DND app, which enables users to register complaints in just 4-6 clicks.

"While registered telemarketers have been subject to strict regulations, the majority of spam now

originates from unregistered individuals using 10-digit mobile numbers.

"Consumer complaints are the key mechanism to trigger action against spam since a sender is identified as a spammer on the basis of the number of complaints received against them in a given time. Blocking numbers on phones alone does not stop spam, as spammers frequently change their numbers. Complaints enable action across all operators," the source said.

Trai has tightened rules to curb pesky calls and sms. Consumers can make complaints against unregistered senders without registering their DND preferences.

The regulator also has a complaint window extended from 3 to 7 days, meaning a subscriber can register a complaint against pesky callers within 7 days of receiving a call or SMS.

Trai has also tightened the criteria for taking action against spammers. Now, five complaints against the sender in the last 10 days are sufficient to trigger action against them.

The regulator has mandated the use of 1,600 series numbers as a prefix by entities in the banking, financial services, and insurance sectors for transactional and service calls, and by government entities for calls to citizens.

The rule mandates sending promotional SMS with the suffix P, transactional SMS with the suffix T, service SMS with the suffix S, and government messages with the suffix G.

No promotional calls allowed from regular 10-digit mobile numbers, the source said.

Nehru, Leftist historians distorted history by portraying Ghazni as 'mere plunderer': BJP

New Delhi, Jan 05: The BJP on Monday attacked the Congress on 1,000 years of Somnath temple's first destruction by Mahmud of Ghazni, saying this day is important to "remember and understand" how Jawaharlal Nehru and Leftist historians distorted history by portraying the Muslim invader as a "mere plunderer" and that he was not a "religious fanatic".

BJP national spokesperson Sudhanshu Trivedi said that priests of the temple and the king of that time had pleaded Mahmud of Ghazni to spare the "Shivling" in lieu of lakhs of gold coins but he rejected the offer and broke it, saying he wanted to be known as a "murtibhanjak (iconoclast)" instead of a "despicable person" who engaged in trade with "idol worshippers".

A historian, who had accompanied Mahmud of Ghazni, has mentioned this episode in his writings. This demolishes all the theories that the Leftist historians and others gave, distorting the history," the BJP Rajya Sabha MP told a press conference at the party headquarters here.

They projected Mahmud of Ghazni as the person who was not a religious fanatic and that he came to India



with the sole objective of "making money", he charged.

"In our history, it is taught that whatever Mahmud of Ghazni did at Somnath temple was only for earning wealth and that he had nothing to do with his religious feelings," he charged.

Trivedi alleged that the book, 'The Discovery of India', authored by the first prime minister Jawaharlal Nehru, is the source of all the distortions made in the history relating to Mahmud of Ghazni's invasion and attack on the Somnath temple.

"Nehru stated in his book that Mahmud of Ghazni was far more a warrior than a man of faith. Like many other conquerors, he used to exploit the name of religion for his conquest. India was to him just a place from where he could earn treasures and materials," he said, reading from the first prime minister's book. "Nehru also

leadership of Prime Minister Narendra Modi today, we are moving towards its completion with India becoming the fourth largest economy in the world, fourth biggest stock exchange, third biggest automobile manufacturer, second biggest mobile handset manufacturer and the number one country in the world in digital transactions," he said.

Underlining that India is the fastest-growing economy in the world for the last two years, Trivedi hit out at the Congress and other opposition parties for attacking the Modi government over US President Donald Trump's remarks after Operation Sindoor.

"Trump had also said that the conflict between India and Pakistan is 1,000 years old and that Kashmir is linked to that. It's indeed a 1,000-year-old fight. Pakistan's missiles are named after Ghazni, Babar and Ghori. But did they ask why?" he said. "For those intellectual sons of Macaulay and Marx whose minds are completely filled with 'M-factor', the meaning of which I am confident you can figure out with your intelligence... So, the answer to that too is an 'M-factor', which means Modi," Trivedi added.

The BJP leader said that the Somnath temple was reconstructed due to the efforts taken by Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel despite Nehru's "vehement opposition" to the move. At the Somnath temple's inaugural ceremony, India's first president Rajendra Prasad had said that its reconstruction will be complete on the day when India will progress on the path of development and prosperity, he recalled. Gold rises Rs 960 to Rs 1.4 lakh/10g amid strong global trends

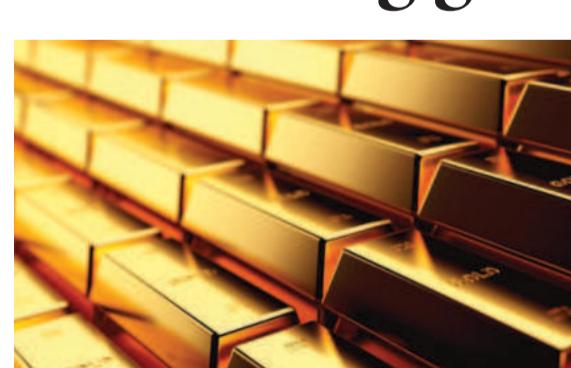
New Delhi, Jan 05: Gold prices climbed Rs 960 to Rs 1,40,400 per 10 grams in the national capital on Monday, tracking strong global trends amid heightened geopolitical tensions, according to the All India Sarafha Association.

The precious yellow metal of 99.9 per cent purity had closed at Rs 1,39,440 per 10 grams on Friday.

Silver prices also extended their sharp rally, climbing by Rs 2,600 to Rs 24,400 per kilogram (inclusive of all taxes) from Friday's close of Rs 24,100 per kg.

Traders said both gold and silver were driven by safe-haven demand as geopolitical risks have intensified.

"Gold and



silver advanced on Monday, buoyed by geopolitical risks that continue to underpin safe-haven demand and act as a tailwind for bullion, particularly following heightened US actions against Venezuela," Samuel Gandhi, Senior Analyst - Commodities at HDFC Securities, said.

He noted that US President Donald Trump's confrontational rhetoric

as the US captured and removed the Venezuelan President Nicolas Maduro," Praveen Singh, Head of Commodities, Mirae Asset ShareKhan, said.

Spot silver also increased by USD 2.35, or 3.24 per cent, to USD 75.02 per ounce. "Silver prices are trading higher due to strong industrial and investment demand, ongoing supply concerns, and global geopolitical tensions," Satish Dondapati, VP & Fund Manager, Kotak Mutual Fund, said.

Dondapati added that recent price swings in the white metal were mainly caused by higher margin requirements announced by the CME group and China's silver export restrictions that came into effect from January 1.

Renisha Chainani, Head - Research at Aug-

mont, said silver's ascent has been structurally supported by governmental measures across the global supply chain.

In November, the US designated silver as a key mineral due to its extensive use in electrical circuits, batteries, solar cells, and anti-bacterial medical tools.

Washington's move to include silver on its critical minerals list has enhanced its strategic relevance, encouraging long-term investment and policy-backed demand, she said.

Chainani noted that silver prices rallied from around USD 45 per ounce in October to a peak of USD 82.7 in December 2025, and added that the uptrend could extend further towards USD 88.60, USD 99 and USD 107 in the coming few months of 2026.

AIIMS study finds underweight, obese people experience moderate to severe body image concerns

New Delhi, Jan 05: A study found that nearly half of the underweight and obese individuals among the 1,000 young adults surveyed for body weight issues experienced moderate to severe concerns, including feeling self-consciousness and lacking confidence.

Over a third of the participants (37.5 per cent) felt judged by others, while around a fourth (24.5 per cent) often experienced anxiety related to their weight, researchers from the All India Institute of Medical Sciences (AIIMS), New Delhi, said.

The findings published in the Journal of Education and Health Promotion also indicated that feeling self-conscious was significantly associated with obesity, while lack of confidence was most severe among

the underweight participants. "Nearly half of the underweight (47.1 per cent) and obese (49.6 per cent) young adults experienced moderate to severe body image concerns, compared to their normal weight (35.8 per cent) and overweight (35.5 per cent) counterparts, who predominantly reported mild levels of concern," the authors wrote. They said body weight is a well-established factor influencing psychological well-being in young adults, and the study offers a more nuanced perspective by identifying aspects affected by body image concerns. The impact of body image concerns on psychological well-being of the participants varied across the weight categories studied -- underweight, normal, overweight and obese -- with self-consciousness noted among participants with obesity and low confidence among those who were underweight.



US strike on Venezuela to embolden China's territorial claims, Taiwan attack unlikely, analysts say

Shanghai/Beijing, Jan 05: The US attack on Venezuela will embolden China to strengthen its territorial claims over areas such as Taiwan and parts of the South China Sea but will not hasten any potential invasion of Taiwan, analysts said.

Chinese President Xi Jinping's considerations about Taiwan and his timeline are separate from the situation in Latin America, influenced more by China's domestic situation than by US actions, they said.

Still, analysts said, President Donald Trump's audacious attack on Saturday, capturing Venezuelan leader Nicolas Maduro, hands China an unexpected opportunity that Beijing will likely use in the near term to amplify criticism of Washington and bolster its own standing on the international stage.

Further out, Beijing could leverage Trump's move to defend its stance against the US on territorial issues including Taiwan, Tibet and islands in the East and South China seas.

"CHEAP AMMUNITION" FOR A CHINA PUSHBACK

"Washington's consistent, long-standing arguments are always that the Chinese actions are violating international law but they are now damaging that," said William Yang, an analyst at International Crisis Group, a Brussels-based NGO.

"It's really creating a lot of openings and cheap ammunition for the Chinese to push back against the US in the future."

China claims democratically governed Taiwan as its own province — an assertion the island's



government rejects — and claims almost all of the South China Sea, a position that puts it at odds with several Southeast Asian nations that also claim parts of the vital trade route.

China's foreign ministry and Taiwan Affairs Office, and Taiwan's presidential office did not immediately respond to requests for comment.

Beijing condemned Trump's strike on Venezuela, saying it violated international law and threatened peace and security in Latin America. It has demanded the US release Maduro and his wife, who are being detained in New York awaiting trial.

Hours before his capture, Maduro met with high-level Chinese delegation in Caracas, according to photos he posted on his Instagram page.

The Chinese foreign ministry did not immediately respond to a request for comment on the whereabouts of the delegation, which included China's special representative for Latin American and Caribbean affairs, Qiu Xiaoxi.

On Sunday China's official Xinhua news agency called the US attack "naked hegemonic

behavior." "The US invasion has made everyone see more and more the fact that the so-called 'rules-based international order' in the mouth of the United States is actually just a 'predatory order based on US interests,'" state-run Xinhua news agency said.

'CHINA ISN'T THE US, TAIWAN ISN'T VENEZUELA'

Taiwan, in particular, has been facing growing pressure from Beijing. China last week encircled the island in its most extensive war games to date, showcasing Beijing's ability to cut off the island from outside support in a conflict.

But analysts said they did not expect China to capitalize on the Venezuelan situation to escalate that into an attack anytime soon.

"Taking over Taiwan depends on China's developing but still insufficient capability rather than what Trump did in a distant continent," said Shi Yinhong, professor of international relations at Renmin University in Beijing.

Neil Thomas, a fellow on Chinese politics at the Asia Society, said China sees Taiwan as an internal affair and so was unlikely

to cite US actions against Venezuela as precedent for any cross-strait military strikes.

"Beijing will want a clear contrast with Washington to trumpet its claims to stand for peace, development and moral leadership," Thomas said. "Xi does not care about Venezuela more than he cares about China. He'll be hoping that it turns into a quagmire for the United States."

Wang Ting-yu, a senior lawmaker from Taiwan's ruling party who sits on the parliament's foreign affairs and defense committee, rejected the idea that China might follow the US example and strike Taiwan.

"China has never lacked hostility toward Taiwan, but it genuinely lacks the feasible means," Wang posted on Facebook. "China is not the United States, and Taiwan is certainly not Venezuela. If China could actually pull it off, it would have done so long ago!"

Still, the situation amplifies risks for Taiwan and could press Taipei to seek more favor from the Trump administration, some observers said.

On China's Weibo social media platform, discussions of the US attack trended heavily on Sunday, with several users saying Beijing should learn from what Trump did. Lev Nachman, a political science professor at National Taiwan University, said he expected Taiwan's government to express lightly worded support for American action on Venezuela. Taiwan has not yet made any statement.

"What I do think Trump's actions could do is to help Xi Jinping's narrative in the future to create more justification for action against Taiwan," he said.

Bangladesh bans IPL broadcast in another retaliatory move

Dhaka, Jan 05: Bangladesh on Monday banned the broadcast of IPL's upcoming season to protest pacer Mustafizur Rahaman's ouster from the world's biggest T20 league on BCCI instructions amid a steady deterioration of the country's diplomatic ties with India.

A statement from the information and broadcast ministry of Muhammad Yunus' interim government here stated that no "logical reason" was given by the BCCI while instructing IPL franchise Kolkata Knight Riders to release Rahman from its 2026 roster.

The IPL is due to start on March 26. The



move to ban IPL broadcast came a day after Bangladesh refused to travel to India for next month's T20 World Cup and requested the

International Cricket Council to shift all its league games to Sri Lanka, the co-host of the tournament.

"No logical reason for such a decision (Rahman's release) by the BCCI is known, and such a decision has saddened, hurt, and aggrieved the people of Bangladesh," read the government notification.

"In this situation, until further notice, it is requested by order to stop the broadcasting/telecasting of all matches and programs of the Indian Premier League (IPL)."

"This order is issued with the approval of the proper authority and in the public interest," said the signed by assistant secretary Feroz Khan.

Spectacular switch: Indian racer Atiqa Mir secures landmark top-5 finish on junior class debut

Abu Dhabi, Jan 05: The 11-year-old racing prodigy Atiqa Mir made a spectacular switch from mini to the much tougher junior S125 category as she became the first Indian to secure a top five finish globally on debut during round seven of the FIA Formula 1 UAE Karting Championship at the fabled Yas Marina Circuit.

Atiqa, the first Indian to be supported by Formula 1 Academy, could have spent another season dominating championships in the mini category (age 8-12) but she has been thrown in at deep end with the move up to the junior S125 category (age 12-14) in the new year.

The karts are 30kg heavier (115kg in mini to 145kg in junior) and have three times the horse power (10 bhp with top speed 105 kmph to 29bhp with top speed of 126 kmph). In a clear sign of her rare talent, the

Academy GP backed Atiqa thrived in the unfamiliar territory rather than getting overawed by the occasion. By finishing fifth out of 35 drivers in a male dominated grid, Atiqa also became the first female to register a top five finish in the history of FIA Formula 1 UAE Championship on debut.

"With only a few days of testing to get used to the junior kart, Atiqa once again proved that her fitness and dedication are second to none in a grueling 21-lap race at the historic Formula 1 Circuit here.

She qualified 18th due to an issue with her kart but that didn't deter her in the races.

In the heat race, she climbed up six places, and in the pre-final she went up eight places to finish fourth, displaying mature race craft and overtaking drivers with much more experience (in the category as well as age).

Starting the final fourth and on the trickier outside lane,

Atiqa held her ground and got in the mix of the leading group. She put in some stunning lap times to keep up with the leading pack.

The pace in front was so fast that they came up to lap the back markers but one of them blocked Atiqa and she lost time due to that. If that was not the case, she could have finished two places higher and on the podium. In the end, she lost out on the podium by only four tenths of a second.

"That was a good debut weekend in Junior, it went better than I expected. The karts are so fast compared to the Mini and I absolutely love it. My race could have been much better if the backmarkers had not come in the way," said Atiqa, who aims to reach Formula 1 one day.

"But nonetheless I'm happy with my speed this weekend. I hope to keep learning and improving myself in this new category," Atiqa's father Asif Mir said the decision to fast-track her daughter to the junior category was vindicated with the performance over the weekend.

"We decided to move Atiqa up to Juniors in a late call in December. I felt she could learn more in the higher category and improve her skill even though she is barely eligible being so young and going up against drivers who are 2-3 years older than her," said Asif, who is also India's first national karting champion.
