JKBOSE declares Class 10 results, 85% qualify exams

Kashmir records 87.63% pass percentage, 77.89% in Jammu

Srinagar, Jan 14: The Jammu and Kashmir Board of School Education (BOSE) announced results of annual regular exams of 10th standard with an overall pass percentage of 85 percent.

JKBOSE officials informed the news agency—Kashmir News Observer (KNO) that 85.03 percent qualified the exams.

The board official also said that the pass percentage of girls is 87.78 percent and 84.30 percent among the male students.

According to JKBOSE, at least



94,845 students were enrolled for the annual regular exams of 10th standard that commenced on November-03 in the Kashmir division.

The board said that 80,650 qualified the exams and 14,147 couldn't qualify.

Pertinently, Jammu and Kashmir Board of School Education (BOSE) had set-up 994 examination centres across the Kashmir region.

BOSE had said that 68,804 students enrolled for the annual regular exams of 10th are from ten districts of Kashmir division and 25,224 students are from eight districts of winter zone areas of Jammu division.

Besides, the board had also informed that at least 660 from Kargil and 95 from Leh district were also enrolled for the examinations.

Srinagar, Jan 14: Cold conditions intensified across Kashmir on Wednesday as minimum temperatures plummeted, while foggy conditions prevailed in Jammu.

According to the details available with the news agency—Kashmir News Observer (KNO) Srinagar recorded a minimum temperature of minus 5.2

degrees Celsius, down from minus 4.9 degrees Celsius on Tuesday. The city airport also saw a further dip, settling at minus 6.0 degrees Celsius compared to minus 5.8 degrees Celsius a day earlier.

South Kashmir districts recorded sharper falls. Pulwama emerged as one of the coldest places in the plains at minus 7.0 degrees Celsius, down from minus 6.6 degrees Celsius on Tuesday, while Shopian recorded minus 7.5 degrees Celsius, compared to minus 6.3 degrees Celsius the previous day.

Teenager's 18-month cancer battle couldn't stop him from scoring 97% marks

Srinagar, Jan 14: Chemotherapy and radiotherapy ward was the classroom of Aakash Ashraf for the past one and a half years. The teenager battling cancer was armed with nothing but self-study and today he sailed through his 10th exams with a splendid 97 percent marks.

As per the news agency—Kashmir News Observer (KNO), like other days Aakash was rushing to his school located in his native village Dadsara area of Tral. Hardly he knew that it would be his last regular day at

his school.

It was June-2024, when he went to school just to attend his last regular class.

The 16-year-old Aakash was in his mid-session of 9th standard when he was diagnosed with cancer.

"For past one and half years, I have been almost bedridden because I was diagnosed with blood cancer in 2024. These months, I never saw or attended my classroom but always found myself wandering from Chemotherapy to radiotherapy wards," he said.

Aakash however didn't budge to the deadly disease

but rather made his dream come true. He has just aced his 10th exams with a stunning 485 out of 500 marks.

"I always wanted to top in my first board exams but Almighty has kept something else in my fate. Despite all odds, I majority of the times was not having enough energy to stand but whenever I got a bit of time, I used to study and compete even without attending a single regular class or any private tuition," Aakash narrated.

However, Aakash has been weakened by the monthly dose of Chemotherapy and the

radiotherapies that he was receiving till April-2025.

"Today, I am not strong enough to attend any regular class but I will not budge. I will continue my studies with medical subjects via offline or distance mode," he said.

Aakash said that doctors have told him that he has to undergo Stem cell bone marrow transplants in the coming 2-3 months.

Before that, Aakash want to get enrolled for 11th standard to study Physics, Chemistry, Biology, English and Physical Education subjects. (KNO)

Chief Secretary stresses universal social protection for vulnerable sections

Reviews progress of Social Welfare schemes in J&K

JAMMU, JANUARY 14: Chief Secretary, Atal Dulloo Wednesday chaired a comprehensive review meeting of the Social Welfare Department, during which the Commissioner Secretary, Social Welfare Department, presented a detailed overview of the Department's performance, implementation of the flagship schemes, financial status, infrastructure development and future priorities of the Department.

The meeting, as per an official statement, was attended by senior officers including Secretaries, Mission Directors of Mission Poshan, Mission Shakti and Mission Vatsalya, Directors of Social Welfare Jammu and Kashmir, Chairpersons of Advisory Boards and other concerned officials.

The review encompassed the functioning of Directorates, Mission Directorates, Advisory Boards, Corporations and statutory bodies under the Social Welfare Department, underscoring sustained efforts towards inclusive development, women empowerment, child welfare, nutrition security and social protection of vulnerable sections.

Commissioner Secretary, Social Welfare Department, Sarmad Hafeez informed that the Department is working to uplift underserved sections through its Directorates, three Mission Directorates, Advisory Boards for Scheduled Castes, Other Backward Classes and Pahari-speaking people, and dedicated corporations including the J&K Women Development Corporation and J&K SC/ST & BC Development



Corporation.

Reviewing the implementation of Mission Poshan and strengthening of Nutrition and Early Childhood Care and Education (ECCE), MD, Sajad Hussain Ganai informed that 99 per cent Anganwadi Centres have functional infrastructure with essential amenities.

He further gave out that the Saksham Anganwadis equipped with modern facilities are being operationalised across the UT, while more than 24,933 Anganwadi Workers have been trained under Poshan Bhi Padhai Bhi. It was added that the Community-driven initiatives such as Poshan Melas, Tithi Bhoj, Village Health and Nutrition Days and Poshan on Wheels have significantly enhanced grassroots participation, alongside the introduction of VIDYARAMBH certificates to facilitate smooth transition of children to formal schooling. With respect to implementation of the Pradhan Mantri Matru Vandana Yojana (PMMVY), the meeting was apprised that the strong enrolment and disbursement were

reported, with over 68,790 beneficiaries paid during FY 2025-26. It was noted that he integration of Aadhaar, NPCI and face recognition has streamlined beneficiary authentication.

The meeting was briefed that the scheme for Adolescent Girls under Poshan 2.0 is being effectively implemented in aspirational districts of Baramulla and Kupwara, covering over 24,900 girls with near-universal Aadhaar verification and optimal fund utilisation. With regard to the implementation of Mission Shakti, the MD, Mohammad Akber highlighted that the Mission continues to play a pivotal role in women empowerment and safety. Over 2,500 awareness workshops have been conducted through District Hubs for Empowerment of Women, while 11 new Shakti Sadans and five Sakhi Niwas (Working Women Hostels) have been approved and are nearing operationalisation.

Moreover the One Stop Centres have assisted 2,727 women, Women Helpline-181 has handled more than

22,000 calls during FY 2025-26, and Nari Adalats have been operationalised in 50 Panchayats to resolve disputes at the grassroots level, the meeting was informed. Reviewing Mission Vatsalya, the MD, Nazim Zia Khan informed that significant progress has been achieved in child protection and rehabilitation. Twenty-three Child Care Institutions including observation homes, special adoption agencies and open shelters have been established or approved.

He also informed that as many as 904 children have been rescued from child labour and begging, Child Helplines and Help Desks have been expanded, 111 adoptions have been facilitated since November 2022, and the Vatsalya Sadan at Jammu is complete and ready for inauguration.

On social security and pension schemes, it was stated that under the Integrated Social Security Scheme (ISSS) and NSAP, pensions are being provided to over 8.8 lakh beneficiaries including old-age persons, widows,

persons with disabilities and transgender persons, with payments cleared up to November 2025.

Regarding flagship schemes such as Ladli Beti, Marriage Assistance Scheme, SAKSHAM for COVID-affected families, Atal Vayo Abhyuday Yojana, SMILE Scheme and Grant-in-Aid to NGOs it was acknowledged that these continue to extend vital financial and social support. Since inception, the Marriage Assistance Scheme has benefited over 1.58 lakh women with cumulative expenditure exceeding ₹757 Cr, as was given out during this meeting. The Department has also undertaken extensive infrastructure development of old-age homes, hostels, composite homes, disability institutions and rehabilitation facilities. For FY 2025-26, ₹6,731 lakh has been approved under CAPEX, with works progressing across districts. Achievements of statutory bodies were also reviewed, including issuance of over 2.24 lakh UDID cards by the J&K Commission for Persons with Disabilities, strengthening of SC/ST protection mechanisms, implementation of the NAMASTE Scheme for sanitation workers, and focused interventions by OBC and Pahari Advisory Boards.

Emphasising the future roadmap, the Chief Secretary stressed whole-of-government convergence, digital welfare governance, livelihood-linked assistance and universal social protection, with special focus on mother-and-child care, aspirational Anganwadis, skill development, self-employment and institutional strengthening to realise the goal of Viksit Bharat @2047.

DC Srinagar inspects ST PG boys hostel, reviews tribal girls hostel proposal

SRINAGAR JANUARY 14: Deputy Commissioner (DC) Srinagar, Akshay Labroo on Wednesday conducted an inspection of the ongoing construction works of the ST PG Boys Hostel at Tulsibagh and also carried out an on-site inspection of the proposed site for construction of a Tribal Girls Hostel at Chattabal area of the district.

During the visit, the DC, as per an official statement, was accompanied by Additional Deputy Commissioner Srinagar, Mir Imtiaz Ul Aziz; Superintending Engineer, R&B, Shabir Ahmad; SDM West, Irfan Bahadur; Executive Engineer R&B Division Rajbagh, Khalid Mehmood; Executive Engineer, R&B Karan Nagar, Abdul Qayoom; Deputy Director, Tribal Affairs, Tehsildar South, Tehsildar Central Shalteng, Warden Gujjar & Bakerwal Hostel and other concerned.

At the ST PG Boys Hostel, Tulsibagh, the DC reviewed the pace and quality of the construction works completed so far. He directed the R&B Department to submit a plan immediately for the remaining works so that the hostel building

is completed in all respects under phase-I and made functional for utilisation. He also instructed the department to prepare a plan for Phase-II of the hostel project to enhance the accommodation capacity.

The DC emphasized the importance of timely completion of the project to ensure adequate residential facilities for students belonging to the Scheduled Tribes. He instructed the executing agencies to strictly adhere to quality standards and prescribed timelines while ensuring that all required amenities are provided as per norms.

Earlier, the DC inspected the proposed site for the Tribal Girls Hostel at Chattabal area of the district and reviewed the feasibility and planning aspects of the project. He directed the R&B Department to prepare a detailed Project Report (DPR) for the construction of the Girls Hostel and stressed the need to provide safe and well-equipped accommodation for tribal girls.

During the visit, the DC emphasized the importance of effective inter-departmental coordination to ensure smooth and timely execution of both the developmental projects.

DC Pulwama chairs DLTC meet, revises scale of finance for crops

PULWAMA, JANUARY 14: Deputy Commissioner Pulwama, Dr Basharat Qayoom, Wednesday chaired a meeting of the District Level Technical Committee (DLTC) at the District Administrative Complex, Pulwama, to revise the Scale of Finance (SoF) for various crops and allied sectors for the year 2026-27.

During the meeting, as per an official statement, threadbare discussions were held on revising crop-wise financial norms in view of prevailing input costs and other agricultural requirements.

The Deputy Commissioner sought detailed inputs from concerned officers regarding increases in costs related to fertilisers, fodder, manure, labour, and other essential inputs impacting agricultural and allied



activities.

While reviewing the sector-wise proposed Scale of Finance, the Deputy Commissioner stressed that the revised SoF must be realistic and farmer-centric, so that it effectively supports credit planning and

benefits cultivators across the district.

Officers representing Agriculture, Horticulture, Animal Husbandry, Sheep Husbandry, Sericulture, Fisheries, along with representatives from NABARD, banking institutions, and

other allied departments participated in the meeting and presented sector-wise assessments for rationalisation of the proposed Scale of Finance.

Subsequently, the committee finalised the proposed Scale of Finance for sectors including Agriculture, Horticulture, Animal Husbandry, Sheep Husbandry, Fisheries, Sericulture, and Floriculture, which will be forwarded to the State Level Technical Committee (SLTC) for further consideration and approval.

The meeting was attended by Chief Planning Officer Pulwama, Aashiq Hussain Khanday; Chief Agriculture Officer; Chief Animal Husbandry Officer; General Manager, ACCB Anantnag; District Development Manager, NABARD Pulwama, and other members of the committee.

Ariz Ashraf from Government Boys Higher Secondary School Baramulla, secured 6th position valley-wide. Hejab Bhat from Government Higher Secondary School Hadipora Sopore, Mohammad Fouq Lone from Government Boys Higher Secondary School Baramulla, Seerat Majeed from Government Girls Higher Secondary School Sopore.

Several others tied at 7th position, including Aayat Yousuf Bhat, Abkar Nazeef, Iqra Hassan, Muhammad Hazim Bhat

and Mushfiq Nazir, followed by multiple 8th and 9th positions and ties at 10th.

In Arts, government institutions continued their strong showing with Gursewak Kour from Government Girls Higher Secondary School Baramulla at 5th, Bushra Huda from Government Girls Higher Secondary School Uri and Syed Shafayat Hussain from Government Higher Secondary School Boniyar at 6th, Arwa Nazir from Government Girls Higher Secondary School Sopore at 7th—again, no private school positions.

Home Science results featured Aliya Manzoor from Government Girls Higher Secondary School, Baramulla, at 7th, and Ronak Akbar from the same school at 9th.

Meanwhile, the Chief Education Officer (CEO) Baramulla, Abdul Rashid, attributed the success to sustained efforts, noting district results neared 85 per cent in grade 10, while 81 per cent in grade 12.

"There's not a single

government school with very poor or zero per cent results, as seen in the past. The lowest this time is one school at 64 per cent," the CEO told KNO.

Addressing parental preference for private schools, the CEO stressed performance over perception. "This is what parents should look at. What matters is the results", he said, adding, "Whatever learning gaps exist, they will identify and fulfil them. In the future, results will be even better."

Baseema Aijaz, Vice Chairperson of the renowned institution of Valley, SRM Welkin Sopore, celebrated her institution's Science stream dominance, securing eight top positions, including two at the 3rd valley-wide.

"By the grace of Almighty Allah, the school performed well this year, too. Marks are not the only criterion to judge a child's capability. It's the hard work and joint efforts of student, parent and teacher that pay off," she said, crediting the trio.

Baseema consoled parents whose children fell short, stating, "There's nothing to regret, there's always a next time. Marks aren't everything."—(KNO)

Kashmiri families seek student evacuation from Iran

Srinagar, Jan 14: Just two days after a Kashmiri student in Tehran sparked a moment of relief among families with reports of their children's safety, fears have resurfaced as the situation in Iran worsens. The fragile calm has given way to panic as parents desperately seek urgent evacuation for their children stranded in Iranian cities.

On Wednesday, dozens of distressed parents gathered at the Press Colony in Srinagar, urging the Government of India to act swiftly. They appealed to Prime Minister Narendra Modi, External Affairs Minister Dr S. Jaishankar, and the J&K administration to prioritise the evacuation of their children amid the rapidly escalating situation in Iran.

"We are not sleeping at night. Every hour feels like a day," lamented one father, whose daughter studies at Iran University of Medical Sciences in Tehran.

He added, "We don't know what is happening there. Internet is gone, the money channels are blocked, and even calls don't go through. My child just said, 'Baba, please get us out of here.' How do I answer her?"

Another parent said, "We trust our government's capability. They rescued students from Ukraine before. But asking our children to manage their

evacuation alone is unrealistic. They have no money, no flights, and no communication network."

The Indian Embassy in Tehran, in its latest advisory issued on January 14 and accessed by KNO, urged all Indian nationals, including students, pilgrims, businesspersons, and tourists, to "leave Iran by available means of transport, including commercial flights", citing the "evolving situation" in the country.

This advisory has intensified families' fears, leaving them feeling "helpless but hopeful". "We are not blaming anyone," said another parent. "We know the government can act swiftly. But please, act before it's too late. If even one student is harmed, who will take responsibility?"

Parents said that earlier reassurance came from messages circulated among small parent networks, confirming their children's safety inside university hostels. "But since the weekend, even those updates have stopped. The embassy says leave on your own, but how can they? It's chaos there," said a father from Pulwama, whose son studies in Shiraz.

The Jammu and Kashmir Students Association (JKSA) has again appealed to the Government of India to facilitate evacuation if the situation worsens.

Apple demand picks up as prices rise further

Srinagar, Jan 14: After months of uncertainty, low demand, and depressed prices during the main harvesting season, apple growers in Kashmir are finally witnessing a turnaround. The demand for the fruit in cold storage units has picked up further in wholesale markets, leading to an increase in rates and comparatively better returns for orchardists.

Growers said that the late-season improvement has come as a much-needed relief after one of the toughest apple seasons in recent years, marked by high input costs, erratic weather, and sluggish market movement during peak arrivals.

According to growers and traders, the demand for stored apples—particularly A-grade Delicious, Kullu Delicious, and premium varieties—has improved in mandis across Delhi, Mumbai, Bengaluru, and other major markets, pushing prices upward over the past few weeks.

"During the main season, we were selling apples at throwaway prices. Boxes that cost us Rs 500–800 to produce were selling for barely Rs 600," said Abdul Rashid, an apple grower from Shopian. "Now the rates have improved, and rates have gone to Rs 1100–1800, and at least we are able to cover our costs and earn something for our labour."

Growers recall that the peak harvesting period, especially between September and October, remained extremely challenging. Oversupply,



reduced buying by traders, high transportation costs, and competition from imported apples and other fruits severely impacted prices, they said.

"Trucks remained stranded on the highway and mandis, payments were delayed, and demand was very weak," said Ghulam Mohammad Dar, a grower from Sopore, one of Asia's largest apple trade hubs. "Many farmers were forced to sell at distress rates because they had no storage facilities."

Experts say that limited access to controlled atmosphere (CA) storage and cold storage units kept small and marginal farmers at a disadvantage, forcing them to sell immediately after harvest when prices are lowest.

Mehraj Ahmad, a fruit grower from Pulwama, said that Kashmiri apples are now witnessing better demand, which has led to the early opening of

cold storage units and currently rates are picking up with each passing day.

"Rates have gone up by Rs 500–Rs 1000 per box compared to the peak season," said Farooq Ahmad, an orchardist from Pulwama. "If this demand had come earlier, growers would not have suffered any losses."

They said that cold storage units have been opened recently, and there is much produce in cold storage units as of now, and growers are hopeful of continuous better returns

Apple cultivation remains the backbone of Kashmir's rural economy, supporting nearly seven lakh families directly or indirectly. While the current rise in demand has brought relief, growers say long-term sustainability of the sector depends on policy support, better market access, and protection from volatile price swings—(KNO)

Police arrest 2 peddlers

Srinagar, Jan 14: As part of its ongoing enforcement against narcotic offences, police have arrested two drug peddlers in Pulwama and Sopore and recovered contraband substances from their possession. According to a statement, in Pulwama, a police team from Police Post Newa during naka checking at Newa intercepted a suspicious person. During search, 70.5 grams of charas powder-like substance was recovered from his possession. He has been identified as Samir Ahmad Wagay son of Bashir Ahmad Wagay resident of Wahibug. Similarly in Sopore, during naka checking at Parray Mohallah Hygam, a police party intercepted a suspicious person who tried to flee from the spot but was apprehended tactfully. During search, charas-like substance was recovered from his possession. He has been identified as Musair Bashir son of Bashir Ahmad Reshi resident of Veer Colony Aliebagh. Both the accused have been arrested and shifted to police station where they remain in custody. Accordingly, cases under relevant sections of law have been registered at respective police stations and further investigation have been initiated.

Chadoora bridge closure leaves residents wading through river channel

Srinagar, Jan 14: Two months after the vital Chadoora bridge in central Kashmir's Budgam district was closed for repairs, residents continue to face severe hardships and are now forced to wade through a river channel daily to commute.

The bridge, which connects Chadoora with Charar-i-Sharif, Yousmarg and Pulwama, was declared unsafe in late November following damage caused by floods.

However, what was meant to be a week-long repair has stretched into months, leaving thousands of commuters stranded and angry.

Fresh visuals show vehicles and motorcyclists crossing the cold, shallow riverbed as an improvised

route, risking accidents each day. Though the water level has receded, the path remains muddy, rocky and dangerous.

"We are forced to move through this river because there's no alternative," said local resident Sofi Arshid. "If we avoid this route, we have to walk long distances and take another road, which adds several kilometres. Nobody from the administration has come here to see our problems."

Locals say the delay has turned a temporary inconvenience into a daily struggle, especially for patients, students and traders who rely on the bridge for regular movement.

"Authorities had said the bridge would reopen in a week. It has been two months now, and they have disappeared after fencing it off," another commuter told

KNO.

Officials earlier maintained that the bridge would be reopened only after clearance from competent authorities post-repair, but locals allege no visible work has been carried out since November.

In November, authorities ordered the closure of the Chadoora bridge in central Kashmir's Budgam district for traffic movement after experts declared it unsafe due to damage caused by recent floods.

The bridge had been shut down in the interest of public safety following an inspection by experts from the DIQC, Srinagar.

The floods had dislocated the base of one of the bridge pillars, making the structure unsafe for vehicular movement and requiring immediate repair—(KNO)

Winter vacations extended for Jammu schools

Jammu, Jan 14: Amid ongoing bone-chilling weather conditions, the Directorate of School Education Jammu (DSEJ) has further extended winter vacations for all government and private schools in the Summer Zone of Jammu Division until January 17, 2026. The extension applies to both students and teaching staff, as per the official order

issued today. However, board examinations for Classes 10th, 11th, and 12th, if already scheduled, will proceed strictly according to the previously notified dates, with no changes.

As per the order, to help minimise academic disruption during this period, schools have been advised to consider conducting online classes for students from Class 6th onwards, wherever possible and feasible.

Meanwhile, preparations for Republic Day

2026 will continue uninterrupted as per the schedules already notified by the competent authorities.

This decision aims to prioritise the safety and well-being of students and staff amid the persistent harsh weather, officials said.

Schools are expected to resume regular operations from January 19, 2026, subject to any further updates from the DSEJ—(KNO)

Leaders Must Read Youth Pulse, Address Concerns

The findings of the World Economic Forum's Youth Pulse 2026 survey present a stark portrait of a generation standing at a crossroads of profound anxiety and remarkable resolve. With over half of young people worldwide citing financial stress as a top concern and naming inequality as the defining economic issue, the data reveals a deep-seated crisis of fairness. A generation is not only worried about finding a job; they are also disillusioned by a system they perceive as rigged, where inflation erodes their

stability while wealth concentrates at the top. Yet, within this narrative of strain lies a powerful counter-narrative of pragmatic ambition. Far from being passive or apathetic, young people are articulating clear, actionable demands: employment opportunities, equal access to quality education, and affordable housing. Their prioritisation of these fundamentals underscores a desire for dignity and economic security above all else. Notably, in regions like Sub-Saharan Africa and South Asia, entrepreneurship is seen

not just as a career path but as a primary force for opportunity, reflecting a powerful shift toward self-determination. This generation's concerns are holistic, seamlessly integrating economic justice with existential threats. PRAGATI (Pro-Active Governance and Timely Implementation) is the Government of India's flagship platform for fast-tracking projects, schemes, and grievance redressal through direct, real-time review by the Prime Minister, in partnership with States and Union Ministries. PRAGATI is a strong example of how digital governance can translate intent into real, visible progress. Launched in 2015 under Prime Minister Narendra Modi, PRAGATI has reshaped how India tracks and drives major infrastructure projects and key social programmes. More than a review forum, it reflects a push to break bureaucratic inertia, strengthen a Team India approach across the Centre and States, and build a culture where decisions are time-bound, follow-through is expected, and outcomes are measured. Several long-pending projects initiated by previous governments were also taken up under the PRAGATI platform and subsequently unlocked or completed. These include the Bogibeel rail-cum-road bridge (conceived in 1997), Navi Mumbai International Airport (conceptualised in 1997), Bhilai Steel Plant modernisation (approved in 2007) among various others.

PRAGATI: What It Is and Why It Was Needed Large time and cost overruns had long been a persistent challenge in India's public projects and schemes. To address this issue across all levels of government, the Prime Minister conceptualized PRAGATI as a comprehensive solution. PRAGATI is a distinctive, integrated, and interactive platform designed to both resolve grievances of and to monitor and review key programmes and projects of the Government of India, along with projects highlighted by State Governments. The PRAGATI platform uniquely brings together three modern technologies—digital data management, video conferencing, and geo-spatial technology. Through this system, the Prime Minister can directly engage with concerned Central and State officials, supported by complete information and up-to-date visual evidence from project sites. This initiative also represents an innovative step in e-governance and exemplifies the principles of good governance.

PRAGATI's Origin and Evolution

PRAGATI draws its inspiration from SWAGAT (State Wide Attention on Grievances by Application of Technology). SWAGAT was then Chief Minister of Gujarat Shri Narendra Modi's brainchild, launched in April 2003, and one of India's early, technology-enabled platforms of its kind for grievance redressal. Aptly named—SWAGAT means "welcome" in many Indian languages—it was designed to make government more accessible and accountable. Citizens could submit complaints online, track their applications, view decisions, and even interact with officials through video conferencing. A structured screening process ensured that serious, high-priority petitions reached the Chief Minister's desk, while monthly public hearings created a direct channel for citizens to place their concerns before the state leadership. Over time, SWAGAT came to be widely recognised for strengthening transparency, responsiveness, and accountability in public service delivery. After taking office as Prime Minister in 2014, PM Modi sought to scale the underlying discipline of SWAGAT to the national level. With PRAGATI, the focus expanded from individual grievances to the larger, more complex challenge of driving delivery across major projects and key programmes – especially where issues were stuck due to multi-agency dependencies or Centre-State coordination. In that sense, PRAGATI was not merely a digital upgrade; it represented a shift in how governance is executed—more time-bound, more outcome-driven, and more collaborative, aligned with the broader principle of "Minimum Government, Maximum Governance."

Structured Review and Follow-up Process PRAGATI is a technology-driven platform for monitoring projects, redressing citizen grievances, and reviewing scheme implementation through coordinated efforts of Central

Ministries and State Governments. It also integrates platforms such as PM GatiShakti, PARIVESH, and the PM Ref Portal.

At the apex level, the Prime Minister chairs PRAGATI review meetings with Chief Secretaries of States and Secretaries of Central Ministries/Departments to resolve issues related to identified projects and schemes.

Following the meetings, a multi-tier follow-up mechanism ensures timely implementation of decisions. Projects are monitored by the Cabinet Secretariat, while schemes and grievances are reviewed at the Ministry level under continuous oversight of the Prime Minister's Office (PMO).

Project & Issue Escalation Mechanism Regular issues are resolved at the Ministry level, while complex and critical issues are escalated for review up to PRAGATI.

Strengthening Cooperative Federalism and Governance

PRAGATI institutionalises cooperative federalism in action. Chief Secretaries of States and Secretaries to the Government of India participate together, answerable in real time, enabling faster resolution of inter-state and Centre-State issues. The platform breaks silos by ensuring:

Direct coordination between multiple ministries and State governments.

Time-bound follow-up monitored by the Cabinet Secretariat.

Shared ownership of outcomes rather than fragmented responsibility.

This model has substantially improved inter-ministerial coordination and reduced procedural bottlenecks that traditionally delayed large public projects.

PRAGATI's Impact Across Key Infrastructure Sectors

PRAGATI has played a pivotal role in accelerating implementation and resolving bottlenecks across major infrastructure sectors. Some key sectoral impacts are highlighted below.

Beyond Infrastructure: Social Sector & Citizen-Centric Governance

While PRAGATI initially focused on large infrastructure projects, its scope has expanded to social sector schemes and public grievances, making it a people-centric governance instrument.

Examples of Long-Pending Projects Unlocked Through PRAGATI

Several projects that had remained stalled for decades were completed or decisively unlocked after being taken up under the PRAGATI platform, demonstrating the impact of sustained high-level monitoring and inter-governmental coordination.

The Bogibeel rail-cum-road bridge in Assam, first conceived in 1997, had remained pending for over two decades due to funding and coordination challenges. Following regular reviews under PRAGATI, inter-agency issues were resolved, and execution was closely monitored, leading to the project's completion and inauguration in 2018, significantly improving connectivity and strategic mobility in the North-East.

The Navi Mumbai International Airport, conceptualised in 1997, remained delayed for around 25 years due to land acquisition, rehabilitation of project-affected families and the involvement of multiple agencies. Following PRAGATI intervention, these long-pending issues were addressed in a time-bound manner through Centre-State coordination, unlocking the project and significantly accelerating construction. Hon'ble Prime Minister inaugurated phase I of the project in October 2025.

The modernisation and expansion of the Bhilai Steel Plant, approved in 2007, faced prolonged delays of nearly 15 years due to contractual disputes, execution challenges and cost overruns. High-level monitoring under PRAGATI helped resolve inter-ministerial and PSU-level bottlenecks, enabling completion of the modernisation programme and enhancement of the plant's capacity and efficiency.

The LARA Super Thermal Power Project (Stage-I) in Chhattisgarh, sanctioned in December 2012, experienced delays for more than 13 years due to land acquisition and contractor-related constraints. Continuous monitoring and issue resolution through PRAGATI helped unblock the project, resulting in the commissioning of the units and the addition to national power generation capacity.

The Gadawara Super Thermal Power Project in Madhya Pradesh, approved in 2008,

had remained delayed for over a decade because of land, fuel linkage and execution-related issues. After being taken up under PRAGATI, outstanding clearances and coordination issues were fast-tracked, leading to the commissioning of the project and strengthening of regional power availability.

Recognised as a critical anchor in India's eastern power generation landscape, the North Karanpura Super Thermal Power Project (NKSTPP) is a flagship pit-head thermal power initiative aimed at strengthening base-load electricity availability and grid reliability in eastern India. The physical progress of the project stood at approximately 60% during FY 2019–20. Following focused reviews and co-ordinated interventions, including a PRAGATI review conducted in September 2021, project execution witnessed a marked acceleration, with physical progress increasing to around 87% by FY 2023–24.

The Nabinagar Super Thermal Power Project (NSTPP) occupies a strategic position in India's energy security architecture. Upon escalation under the PRAGATI mechanism, unresolved land and rehabilitation issues were addressed. This intervention enabled focused monitoring and accountability, leading to progressive resolution of land-related constraints and resumption of project execution.

All India Institute of Medical Sciences (AIIMS), Bibinagar is being established at Bibinagar in Yadadri Bhuvanagiri District, Telangana, under the Pradhan Mantri Swasthya Suraksha Yojana (PMSSY). The project was reviewed under the PRAGATI mechanism on 28.06.2023, following which a clear progress in project execution was observed. As of 14.09.2023, the physical progress stood at 29%, which increased sharply to 57% by the end of FY 2023–24, reflecting the impact of focused monitoring and expedited decision-making under PRAGATI.

Jammu & Kashmir has entered a new era of healthcare accessibility and excellence with the establishment of the All-India Institute of Medical Sciences (AIIMS), Jammu, at Samba. Given the national importance of AIIMS Jammu in strengthening healthcare access in the region, the project and its critical bottlenecks were taken up through the Project Monitoring Group (PMG) and subsequently escalated to the PRAGATI mechanism. The project was reviewed under PRAGATI on 28-06-2023. The PRAGATI intervention proved decisive in altering the project's execution environment. With the issue elevated to the highest level of governance, accountability across departments was sharply reinforced.

The All India Institute of Medical Sciences (AIIMS), Guwahati, was sanctioned on 24th May 2017 under the Pradhan Mantri Swasthya Suraksha Yojana (PMSSY). PRAGATI served as a critical intervention platform, with reviews in April 2018 and February 2023. PRAGATI's oversight directly enabled resolution of key dependencies, including commissioning of electricity infrastructure, acceleration of stormwater management systems, alignment of water supply readiness, and overall synchronisation necessary for operationalisation.

Mumbai Urja Marg Limited (MUML) is a Ministry of Power, Government of India-envisaged transmission strengthening project in Maharashtra, designed to reinforce the power transmission backbone for the Mumbai Metropolitan Region. The project faced multiple interlinked land, forest, Right of Way (RoW), and administrative bottlenecks. It was sanctioned in October 2024. PRAGATI-driven interventions converted fragmented approvals into synchronized action, enabling progressive achievement of milestones—80 per cent RoW clearance by 2023, 100 per cent foundation, erection, and stringing completion by August 2024, and successful charging of transmission lines in September 2024—thereby restoring execution momentum and ensuring timely commissioning of the MUML project.

The 400 kV D/C Teesta III-Kishanganj Transmission Line (214 km) is an Inter-State Transmission System (ISTS) project designed to evacuate power from Sikkim's commissioned hydro assets. It stands as evidence of how PRAGATI converts high-level directives into field-level delivery by resolving jurisdictional constraints and aligning multi-agency execution, rather than altering engineering design. It remains a reference case of coordinated Centre-State intervention enabling

commissioning in challenging terrain with sustained operational performance.

The UER-II project along NH-344M was conceived as a transformative intervention to augment Delhi's road infrastructure and restore traffic efficiency. Given its strategic importance for Delhi-NCR mobility, the project was taken up for close monitoring under the Project Monitoring Group (PMG) and subsequently reviewed at the national level through the PRAGATI mechanism. The PRAGATI intervention proved pivotal in breaking long-standing inter-departmental bottlenecks as each pending issue was digitally tracked with assigned responsibilities and timelines.

The four-laning of the Sangareddy-Akola-Nanded section of NH-161 spans 426 km from Akola (NH-53) in Maharashtra to Sangareddy in Telangana, passing through Washim, Hingoli, Nanded and Degloor. Forming part of the Indore-Hyderabad Economic Corridor under the Bharatmala Pariyojana, this strategic highway provides seamless connectivity between major urban and economic centres across Central and Southern India. The project was escalated to the PRAGATI portal. The co-ordinated intervention brought all stakeholders—State authorities, district administration and the project proponent—onto a single implementation framework with clear timelines and accountability. The resolution of these long-standing issues within a short span of six months highlights the transformative role of the PRAGATI mechanism in unlocking complex infrastructure bottlenecks and driving time-bound delivery.

Work on the Jammu-Udhampur-Srinagar-Baramulla rail link started in October 1994 while the date of sanction was 31st March 1994 but progress remained slow for nearly 25 years owing to difficult terrain, land acquisition constraints, forest clearances, and security-related challenges. After the project was reviewed under PRAGATI, critical clearances were expedited, and bottlenecks were addressed through coordinated action, resulting in the completion of the project and operational rail connectivity in the Kashmir Valley.

The four-laning of the Khajuri-Wyndhamganj section of NH-75 (Sec-V) represents a strategically important highway upgradation initiative in Jharkhand, aimed at strengthening regional and inter-state road connectivity. The value of PRAGATI-led oversight is reflected in the project's ability to maintain momentum through its more complex later stages. Physical progress had reached 44.4% prior to the PRAGATI review in August 2024, and subsequently advanced to 92.02%, demonstrating sustained execution and effective issue management. At a stage where large infrastructure projects often experience slippages due to land, clearance and coordination challenges, the continued progression underscores how high-level monitoring and coordinated action at the State and district levels helped prevent stagnation and ensured timely consolidation of works.

The Mumbai Trans Harbour Link (MTHL), officially named Atal Bihari Vajpayee Sewri-Nhava Sheva Atal Setu, stands among India's most transformative urban transport infrastructure initiatives. Implemented by the Mumbai Metropolitan Region Development Authority (MMRDA) with financial support from the Government of India, the Government of Maharashtra, and the Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA), project represents India's longest sea bridge, spanning 21.8 kilometres, and a landmark addition to the national transport network. Guided under the PRAGATI mechanism, the project progressed through a disciplined, time-bound governance framework that ensured early institutional alignment and sustained execution momentum.

The Jagdishpur-Haldia & Bokaro-Dhamra Natural Gas Pipeline (JHBDPL), implemented by GAIL (India) Limited is a cross-country pipeline project extending the National Gas Grid into eastern and north-eastern India. Post PRAGATI, commissioning proceeded wherever technically feasible, while unresolved segments were escalated to "high-priority status" through structured monitoring cycles at the Prime Minister's Office, Cabinet Secretariat, and DPIIT, with State Governments instructed to resolve pendencies at the district level. This shift from sequential dependence to modular execution altered the execution trajectory and enabled the project to move from delayed

They appealed to the government to establish at least one specially-abled school at the tehsil level, saying that many children are deprived of education simply because they cannot relocate to Srinagar.

"At present, students from across Kashmir have only two main options—Abhinandan Home in Rambagh and Zaiba Apa School in Bijbehara. Many families cannot afford to send their children so far, especially as such students require constant care from a family member," they said.

They further pointed out that after completing Class 12, specially-abled students have no dedicated higher education institutions. "We are forced to join regular colleges where we struggle to cope due to the absence of sign language interpreters and specialised teaching methods," they added, demanding the establishment of a separate college or dedicated higher education facilities for specially-abled students.

Parents and teachers echoed these concerns, stressing that the students' achievements underline the urgent need to strengthen inclusive education across Jammu and Kashmir.

Notably, Abhinandan Home functions under the Social Welfare Department, which plays a crucial role in running and supporting the institution by providing educational facilities, trained staff and basic infrastructure for children with special needs.

Educationists and parents have urged the department to replicate this successful model by establishing similar residential and day schools at the district and tehsil levels, ensuring that no child is denied education due to distance, poverty or disability.

"The success of these students clearly shows what can be achieved when the state invests in inclusive education. We request the Social Welfare Department to expand such initiatives across districts so that every specially-abled child gets equal opportunities," parents said.

They expressed hope that these achievements would inspire policymakers to prioritise the educational needs of specially-abled children and encourage more students to pursue their dreams without fear or hesitation. (KNO)

Celsius, down from minus 6.1 degrees Celsius, and Avantipora dropped to minus 6.4 degrees Celsius from minus 5.4 degrees Celsius. In North Kashmir, Kupwara recorded minus 6.2 degrees Celsius, lower than Tuesday's minus 5.8 degrees Celsius, while Sopore settled at minus 6.9 degrees Celsius, down from minus 6.5 degrees Celsius. Baramulla also witnessed a marginal dip to minus 1.8 degrees Celsius from minus 1.4 degrees Celsius.

However, a notable rise was recorded at Sonamarg, where the minimum temperature increased significantly to minus 2.2 degrees Celsius from minus 7.0 degrees Celsius recorded a day earlier.

Gulmarg, Kashmir's famous ski resort, recorded minus 3.8 degrees Celsius, slightly lower than Tuesday's minus 3.5 degrees Celsius.

In the Jammu region, minimum temperatures showed mixed trends. Jammu city recorded 4.0 degrees Celsius, marginally higher than 3.8 degrees Celsius on Tuesday.

Banihal saw a sharp rise to 5.3 degrees Celsius from 8.9 degrees Celsius recorded earlier, while Bhaderwah rose above freezing at 0.5 degrees Celsius, compared to minus 0.2 degrees Celsius a day earlier.

Rajouri, however, slipped below freezing, recording minus 0.6 degrees Celsius compared to 0.0 degrees Celsius on Tuesday.

In Ladakh, extreme cold conditions persisted. Leh recorded minus 11.4 degrees Celsius, marginally higher than minus 11.6 degrees Celsius the previous day, while Hanle dropped sharply to minus 11.4 degrees Celsius from minus 9.7 degrees Celsius.

Kargil and Nubra Valley recorded minus 10.0 degrees Celsius and minus 10.4 degrees Celsius, respectively.

SNOWFALL IN KASHMIR PLAINS UNLIKELY UNTIL JANUARY 20

The Meteorological Department said a gradual rise in minimum temperatures is expected at many places from January 15 onwards.

It also warned of moderate fog over the plains of Jammu division, with dense fog at a few locations likely to continue over the next three days.

The weather office said snowfall in the Kashmir plains remains unlikely until January 20, though a series of Western Disturbances is expected to affect Jammu and Kashmir starting January 16.

The first system, it said is expected between January 16 and 18, may bring light snowfall to higher reaches and isolated light rain in the plains. Subsequent weak Western Disturbances are likely between January 19–21, January 22–26, and around January 27, with limited rain and snow activity.

Travellers and transporters have been advised to plan their journeys carefully and follow official traffic advisories. (KNO)

Jammu colder than

maximum ever recorded in Jammu city.

Officials said the day temperature was 10.1 degrees Celsius below normal, against an average maximum of 17.5 degrees Celsius for this time of the year.

Weather records show that a maximum temperature of 7.4 degrees Celsius was also recorded in Jammu in 2016.

The city had earlier witnessed 7.1 degrees Celsius in 2011, 6.7 degrees Celsius in 2013, while the lowest maximum temperature on record remains 5.0 degrees Celsius, logged in 1986.

In contrast, several locations in the Kashmir Valley recorded higher day temperatures. Srinagar registered a maximum of 13.3 degrees Celsius, while Pahalgam recorded 10.6 degrees Celsius.

Gulmarg, a popular ski destination located at a higher altitude, recorded a maximum temperature of 8.2 degrees Celsius, higher than Jammu city.

Officials said the sharp drop in Jammu's daytime temperature was influenced by persistent cloud cover and cold weather conditions prevailing across the region.

The unusually low maximum has also led to a cold day scenario in the city, with residents reporting increased use of heating appliances.

The Meteorological Department said that such deviations in maximum temperatures are uncommon for Jammu during this period.

It said weather conditions are being monitored and advised people to take precautions, particularly during early morning and evening hours. (KNO)

Sacrifices made by Indian soldiers during Operation Pawan must be respected: Rajnath

New Delhi, Jan 14: The sacrifices made by Indian soldiers during Operation Pawan in Sri Lanka nearly four decades ago should be honoured, Defence Minister Rajnath Singh said on Wednesday, appearing to criticise the governments in the 1990s for not publicly recognising their contributions.

He said the Modi government is not only acknowledging the contribution of the Indian troops in the operation with an "open heart", but it is also in the process of recognising their contribution at every level. The defence minister made the remarks at an event that was hosted on the occasion of the Armed Forces Veterans' Day.

"Today, when the entire nation is remembering its soldiers, commemorating their contributions, and expressing gratitude, I also want to remember all the veterans who participated in the peacekeeping operation in Sri Lanka nearly 40 years ago as part of the IPKF (Indian Peace Keeping Force)," he said.

"The decision taken by the then government to send Indian forces to Sri Lanka is open to debate. I don't want to get into it. But I believe the sacrifices made by our IPKF soldiers who participated in Operation Pawan should be respected," he said.

India had lost around 1,200 soldiers during the Indian Peacekeeping Force's stay in Sri Lanka between July 1987 and March 1990.

India and Sri Lanka signed a historic peace accord on July 29, 1987 following which New Delhi deployed the IPKF in the island nation to bring peace in Tamil-dominated areas that had witnessed widespread violence and civil strife for years.

However, peace eluded the regions and the IPKF was eventually pulled out.

While the decision to send the IPKF was taken by the Rajiv Gandhi government the troops were pulled out of the island nation when VP Singh-dispensation was in power.

"In Operation Pawan, Indian forces displayed remarkable courage and valor. Many soldiers attained martyrdom in the line of duty. There can be no doubt about their courage and sacrifice," Singh said.

"Our government under the leadership of Prime Minister Narendra Modi is not only accepting the contribution of the peacekeepers who participated in Operation Pawan with an open heart, but it is also in the process of recognising their contribution at every level," he said.

Singh also recalled Modi paying tributes to the Indian soldiers at the IPKF memorial in Colombo during his trip to the island nation in 2015.

"We are also recognising the contribution of the IPKF peacekeepers at the National War Memorial in New Delhi and we are also giving them full respect," he said.

Modi paid tributes to the fallen warriors of the IPKF at the memorial during his trip to Sri Lanka in April last year as well.

Maharashtra tops NITI Aayog's export preparedness index

New Delhi, Jan 14: Maharashtra, Tamil Nadu, and Gujarat have emerged as the top three states in the Niti Aayog's fourth Export Preparedness Index (EPI) 2024.

The index is aimed at assessing the readiness of states in terms of their export potential and performance.

Maharashtra is followed by Tamil Nadu, Gujarat, Uttar Pradesh, Andhra Pradesh, Karnataka, and Punjab, according to the government think tank's report released on Wednesday.

Among smaller states, Uttarakhand has ranked at the top position. It is followed by Jammu and Kashmir, Nagaland, Dadra and Nagar Haveli & Daman and Diu, Goa, and Tripura.

Releasing the report, NITI Aayog CEO B V R Subrahmanyam said that as India expands its network of Free Trade and Economic Partnership Agreements, the importance of strong domestic foundations only grows.

"For states, this means fostering ecosystems that can respond to new opportunities, align with global standards, and build competitiveness across districts," Subrahmanyam said. In recent years, he added, several states have already begun strengthening their export vision through dedicated policies, institutions, and infrastructure — indicating a clear shift towards a more proactive and structured approach. Exports are a key driver of economic growth and play a significant role in helping countries strengthen their position in Global Value Chains (GVCs), earn foreign exchange, and increase global competitiveness.

For India — the fastest growing major economy in the world — exports are crucial for improving economic resilience, reducing trade deficits, and promoting inclusive growth. The Export Preparedness Index (EPI) 2024 uses a consistent, data-driven approach to evaluate multiple factors, including export policies, business environment, quality of infrastructure, and export outcomes. Data is collected from both state and central government sources, and each indicator is assigned a weight based on its importance.

Negative RTPCR report not enough to reject COVID-19 compensation: HC

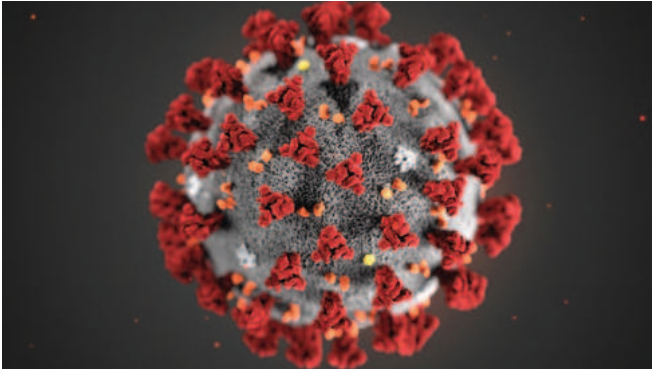
Mumbai, Jan 14: An RTPCR report showing a person as COVID-19 negative cannot be the sole criterion to reject compensation when all other medical reports clearly indicate the infection, the Bombay High Court has said.

The HC's Aurangabad bench directed the Ahilyanagar district collector to process the claim of a man, who lost his health worker wife during the pandemic, to receive the insurance amount of Rs 50 lakh under the Prime Minister's Garib Kalyan Yojna.

The bench of Justices Arun Pednekar and Vaishali Jadhav, in the order passed on January 9, said the collector's previous decision rejecting the man's claim for compensation, on the ground that he had not submitted an RTPCR report showing the victim was COVID-19 positive, cannot be accepted.

It directed the Ahilyanagar collector to process the claim raised by Machindra Gaikwad under the PM Garib Kalyan Yojna, a scheme declared for the family members of COVID-19 warriors, doctors and health workers who died during the pandemic.

The collector is directed to forward the claim of the man to the authority concerned



by holding that his wife was COVID-19 positive at the time of death in view of the overwhelming medical evidence that indicates she succumbed to the coronavirus infection, the HC said.

The bench in its order noted that while the RTPCR report says the deceased was COVID-19 negative, the medical reports submitted clearly indicate otherwise.

The medical reports, including the CT scan and oxygen level and certificate of cause of death, clearly indicate COVID-19 infection and show that the cause of death was a consequence of the same, the court said.

Merely because the petitioner could not submit a report certifying that the deceased tested positive for COVID-19, his compensation claim cannot

be rejected, the HC said.

"Therefore, the RTPCR report indicating that the deceased tested negative for COVID-19 is not the sole criteria to rely upon to decide whether the person was COVID-19 positive or that the death is caused due to COVID-19 infection," it said.

As per the plea, the petitioner's wife was working as a nurse since 1993 in the Ahilyanagar civil hospital and died in May 2021 while performing her duty at the medical facility during the pandemic.

He relied on his wife's medical papers, as per which she died due to cardio-respiratory failure as a consequence of pneumonia and coronavirus infection.

He said his wife was working at a quarantine centre during the pandemic and was in direct contact with COVID-19 patients.

Vance to meet Danish, Greenlandic officials in Washington as locals say Greenland not for sale

Nuuk, Jan 14: Along the narrow, snow-covered main street in Greenland's capital, international journalists and camera crews stop passers-by every few meters (feet) asking them for their thoughts on a crisis which Denmark's prime minister has warned could potentially trigger the end of NATO.

Greenland is at the center of a geopolitical storm as US President Donald Trump is insisting he wants to own the island — and the residents of its capital Nuuk say it is not for sale. Trump said he wants to control Greenland at any cost and the White House has not ruled out taking the island by force.

US Vice President JD Vance will meet Denmark's foreign minister Lars Løkke Rasmussen and his Greenlandic counterpart Vivian Motzfeldt in Washington on Wednesday to discuss the Arctic island, which is a semi-autonomous territory of the United States' NATO ally Denmark.

Tuuta Mikaelsen, a 22-year-old student, told The Associated Press in Nuuk that she hoped American officials would get the message to "back off." Greenland's Prime Minister Jens-Frederik Nielsen told a news conference in the Danish capital Copenhagen on Tuesday that, "if we have to choose between the United States and Denmark here and now, we choose Denmark. We choose NATO. We choose the Kingdom of Denmark. We choose the EU."

Asked later Tuesday about Nielsen's comments, Trump replied: "I disagree with him. I don't know who he is. I don't know anything about him. But, that's going to be a big problem for him." A strategically important territory

Greenland is strategically



important because as climate change causes the ice to melt, it opens up the possibility of shorter trade routes to Asia. That also could make it easier to extract and transport untapped deposits of critical minerals which are needed for computers and phones.

Trump also said he wants the island to expand America's security and has cited what he says is the threat from Russian and Chinese ships as a reason to control it.

But both experts and Greenlanders question that claim.

"The only Chinese I see is when I go to the fast food market," Lars Vintner, a heating engineer told AP. He said he frequently goes sailing and hunting and has never seen Russian or Chinese ships.

His friend, Hans Nørgaard, agreed, adding "what has come out of the mouth of Donald Trump about all these ships is just fantasy."

Denmark has said the US — which already has a military presence — can boost its bases on Greenland. For that reason, "security is just a cover," Vintner said, suggesting Trump actually wants to own the island to make

money from its untapped natural resources.

Nørgaard told AP he filed a police complaint in Nuuk against Trump's "aggressive" behavior because, he said, American officials are threatening the people of Greenland and NATO. He suggested Trump was using the ships as a pretext to further American expansion.

"Donald Trump would like to have Greenland, (Russian President Vladimir) Putin would like Ukraine and (Chinese President) Xi Jinping would like to have Taiwan," Nørgaard said. Mikaelsen, the student, said Greenlanders benefit from being part of Denmark, which provides free health care, education and payments during study.

"I don't want the US to take that away from us," she said.

Ahead of Wednesday's meeting, Naaja Nathanielsen, Greenland's minister for business and mineral resources said it's "unfathomable" that the United States is discussing taking over a NATO ally and urged the Trump administration to listen to voices from the Arctic island's people.

France to open consulate in Greenland in February

Paris, Jan 14: France will open a consulate in Greenland on February 6, the foreign minister said Wednesday, calling the move a "political signal" over the strategic Danish territory, which US President Donald Trump has vowed to seize.

The comments came on the day that Denmark's top diplomat is to meet senior US officials at the White House for talks over the future of vast, mineral-rich Arctic island.

Since returning to office nearly a year ago, Trump has repeatedly mused about taking over Greenland from longtime ally and European Union member Denmark.

French Foreign Minister Jean-Noel Barrot told French RTL broadcaster that the decision to open the consulate was taken last summer, when President Emmanuel Macron visited Greenland in a show of support.

"For my part, I went there at the end of August to plan the consulate, which will open on February 6," he said.

"It's a political signal that's associated with a desire to be more present in Greenland, including in the scientific field."

"Greenland does not want to be owned, governed... or integrated into the United States. Greenland has made the choice of Denmark, NATO, (European) Union," he said. Greenland's leader has said that the island would choose to remain an autonomous territory of Denmark over the United States.

Trump has said the United States needs Greenland due to the threat of a takeover by Russia or China.

The two rival powers have both stepped up activity in the Arctic, where ice is melting due to climate change, but neither claims Greenland, where the United States has long had a military base.

Iran's judiciary signals fast trials, executions for detained protesters despite Trump's warning

Dubai, Jan 14: The head of Iran's judiciary signaled Wednesday there would be fast trials and executions ahead for those detained in nationwide protests despite a warning from U.S. President Donald Trump.

The comments from Iran's judiciary chief Gholamhossein Mohseni-Ejei come as activists had warned hangings of those detained could come soon. Already, a bloody security force crackdown on the demonstrations has killed at least 2,571, the U.S.-based Human Rights Activists News Agency reported.

That figure dwarfs the death toll from any other round of protest or unrest in Iran in decades and recalls the chaos surrounding the country's 1979 Islamic Revolution.

Trump repeatedly has warned that the United States

may take military action over the killing of peaceful protesters, just months after it bombed Iranian nuclear sites during a 12-day war launched by Israel against the Islamic Republic in June.

Mohseni-Ejei made the comment in a video shared by Iranian state television online.

"If we want to do a job, we should do it now. If we want to do something, we have to do it quickly," he said. "If it becomes late, two months, three months later, it doesn't have the same effect. If we want to do something, we have to do that fast."

His comments stand as a direct challenge to Trump, who warned Iran about executions an interview with CBS aired Tuesday:

"We will take very strong action," Trump said. "If they do such a thing, we will take very strong action."

Kohli reclaims top spot in ODI rankings

Dubai, Jan 14: India's star cricketer Virat Kohli has reclaimed the top spot in the ICC ODI rankings for batters, replacing Rohit Sharma, after scoring a brilliant half-century against New Zealand in the first match of the three-game series in Vadodara.

At 37, this marks his return to number one position for the first time since July 2021, while former India skipper Rohit has slipped to third spot.

India defeated the Black Caps by four wickets on Sunday with Kohli scoring a 91-ball 93, which also made him the

second-highest run-getter in men's international cricket behind Sachin Tendulkar.

Kohli's recent performances in ODIs have been nothing short of phenomenal. He scored an unbeaten 74 against Australia, 135, 102 and 65 not out against the visiting South Africans and 93 against New Zealand in his last five outings.

Kohli had gained the top ranking for the first time in October 2013 and it is his 11th different spell in the top spot. As of today, he has been at the top for a total of 825 days -- 10th most by any player, and the most by an Indian batter.

Formulated roadmap after studying best practices of some top leagues: AIFF

New Delhi, Jan 14: The All India Football Federation (AIFF) has "taken references" from the world's top leagues in Spain, Germany, and England, while drawing its roadmap for the next 21 years, including establishing an all-powerful governing council and a management committee.

As part of a new governance structure for the Indian Super League (ISL) and I-League, the AIFF has put in place a governing council and the management committee to oversee the two leagues'



regulatory and operational functioning. The AIFF shared the governing and

managing council policies with the 14 ISL clubs, including the 2025-26 season on Tuesday.

According to the charter, the league will be governed and managed by the two committees, with the potential commercial rights partner having three seats in each of the bodies.

"It's a roadmap for the next 21 years about how the country's top two leagues are going to be managed, administrated, promoted and developed by these two bodies.

"We have taken references from some

of the of top leagues of the world and proposed to implement the global best practices into India's top two football leagues," AIFF President Kalyan Chaubey told PTI.

As per a proposal by stakeholders, the 22-member governing council is likely to be headed by either the president of the AIFF, and it will be the highest supervisor body for the ISL.

The management committee, which will be in charge of ensuing smooth function of the league, will be led by the AIFF's secretary-general.

Pollution forced me to pull out of India Open: World No.3 Antonsen

New Delhi, Jan 14: World No.3 Anders Antonsen on Wednesday said he has withdrawn from the ongoing India Open due to "extreme" air pollution in the national capital and copped a USD 5,000 fine from the Badminton World Federation (BWF) for his decision.

A four-time World Championships medallist, Antonsen's remarks came a day after fellow Dane Mia Blichfeldt criticised the playing conditions at the USD 950,000 event.

"Many are curious why I have pulled out of the India Open for the third consecutive year. Due to the extreme pollution in Delhi at the moment, I don't think it's a place to host a badminton tournament," Antonsen wrote on his Instagram page.

The Danish shuttler also shared a screenshot of Delhi's Air Quality Index reading on Instagram, which showed the AQI at 348 and categorised the conditions as hazardous.

Delhi's air quality drops every year during winter due to varied reasons that include vehicular pollution, stubble burning and road dust. The city is often engulfed in a thick layer of smog that has been described as dangerous by doctors.

The India Open is being held at the Indira Gandhi Indoor Stadium after the Badminton Association of India (BAI) shifted the venue from the KD Jadhav



Indoor Stadium, which hosted the tournament in recent years.

The Indira Gandhi Indoor Stadium is also scheduled to host the BWF World Championships in August, making the India Open a designated test event.

"Crossing my fingers that it will be better in the summer when the World Championships take place in Delhi. As a result, BWF has once again

fined me USD 5,000," Antonsen wrote.

Under the Badminton World Federation Player Commitment Regulations, a top committed player is liable to a USD 5,000 fine (Rs 4.50 lakh) for failing to participate in a BWF World Tour Level 1 to 3 tournaments, over and above the standard withdrawal fees. BWF has declined to make any comments on Antonsen's assertions.

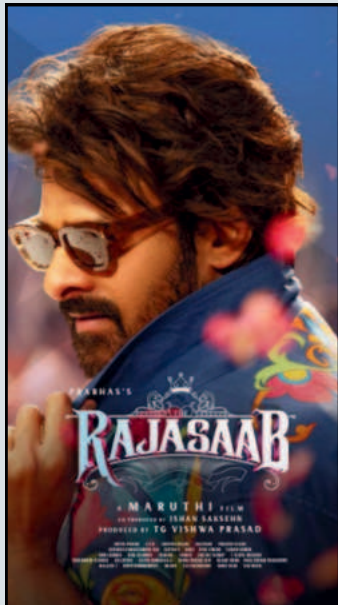

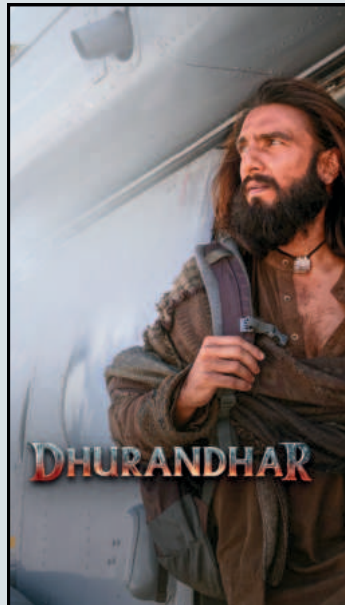
