Srinagar, Jan 15: The security measures have been heightened across Jammu and Kashmir ahead of the Republic Day celebrations, with multi-tier arrangements, intensified surveillance, and area domination exercises underway across the Union Territory, officials said.

Officials told the news agency—Kashmir News Observer (KNO), that security arrangements have been strengthened across all 20 districts, with



special focus on border belts.

"Enhanced security measures, including naka checking, frisking of vehicles and pedestrians are in place in both the regions of Kashmir and Jammu ahead of the Republic Day celebrations," they said.

They added that to further bolster security measures, advanced surveillance systems, including drones and high-resolution CCTV cameras, have been set up to monitor the situation at key locations.

Area sanitisation and domination exercises are also being conducted in vulnerable pockets, officials said.

The first few minutes after a cyber fraud are critical, the golden hour. If victims report immediately on helpline 1930, we can freeze the funds before they vanish," Gupta said, calling early reporting "the strongest weapon against cyber frauds."

"The swift reporting by victims has helped us recover Rs 32.64 crore," he added.

Srinagar, Jan 15: In an inspiring demonstration of resilience and determination, seven specially-abled students of Abhinandan Home, Rambagh, here, have cleared the Class 12 examinations with distinction, marking yet another proud moment for the institution dedicated to the education of children with disabilities.

All seven students, who are hearing and speech impaired or visually challenged, secured excellent marks, proving that physical limitations are no barrier to academic excellence when the right support system is in place. Ahmad added that over the years, hundreds of specially-abled students from the institution have successfully completed their Class 12 education. "Many of our students have gone on to live independent and dignified lives despite immense challenges," he added.

The successful candidates include Tanzeela, who scored 454 marks; Abid with 453; Seerat with 450; Mohammad Umar with 438; Burhan with 418; Muskan with 419; and Towheeda with 415 marks.

Sharing their journey, the students said that most of them had initially enrolled in regular schools but were forced to leave due to communication barriers, lack of understanding from peers and teachers, and the absence of appropriate learning tools.

"We struggled a lot in normal schools. It was only after joining Abhinandan Home that we truly felt understood and supported," they said.

The availability of Braille textbooks, large-print study material, sign-language-based teaching, and specially trained teachers played a



crucial role in our academic success, the students said.

"A specially-abled student has to work twice as hard as others. Our success belongs as much to our parents and teachers as to us," they said.

Family members of Abid, who is hearing and speech impaired said that if this institution did not exist, our son might never have been able to continue his studies and this school changed his life.

Tanzeela, who is visually impaired, echoed similar sentiments, saying that crossing the Class 12 milestone would not have been possible without the tireless efforts of her teachers and the unwavering support of her parents.

"Our teachers believed in us even when society doubted our abilities," she said.

The students said their message to others living with disabilities is clear and firm.

"We believe in making disability our strength, not our weakness. We want to show so-called 'normal' people that we can compete with them on equal footing," they said, urging students who had dropped out due to disability to rejoin education

through special schools.

However, amid the celebrations, a serious concern continues to trouble these achievers. The students pointed out that their academic journey now faces uncertainty due to the absence of separate or adequately inclusive college-level institutions for specially-abled students in Jammu and Kashmir.

"Once again, we are at a crossroads. There is no dedicated college for students like us, and we will be forced to join regular colleges that may not have the infrastructure or trained staff to support our needs," one of the students said.

"We fear that the lack of facilities at the higher education level may hinder our progress," they added.

Students collectively appealed to the government to take immediate steps to establish separate colleges for specially-abled students or, at the very least, create fully inclusive and well-equipped sections within existing colleges.

"Education should not stop at school. We request the authorities to intervene at the earliest so that students with disabilities are not pushed back into dependency after coming this far," they said—(KNO)

CS pushes faster housing development

Jammu, Jan 15: In a significant push towards addressing the growing housing requirements of the people of Jammu and Kashmir, the Chief Secretary chaired a meeting on Thursday to assess the progress and future roadmap of housing colonies being developed by the Jammu & Kashmir Housing Board (JKHB), Jammu Development Authority (JDA), and Srinagar Development Authority (SDA).

The review focused on ongoing, proposed, and planned housing projects, with particular emphasis on sustainable development, affordability, and timely execution through innovative models such as Public-Private Partnerships (PPP) and Self-Financing Schemes (SFS) in both Kashmir and Jammu division.

The meeting besides Commissioner Secretary, H&UDD was attended by Vice-Chairmen, JDA/ SDA; MD, J&K Housing Board; CEO, CiTAG and other concerned officers.

The Chief Secretary observed that the rapid shrinkage of available urban land coupled with steadily rising land prices has made housing increasingly unaffordable for large sections of the population. He emphasized that the government must proactively intervene through planned housing colonies to ensure that home ownership remains within reach of the common citizen, particularly middle- and lower-income groups.

Highlighting the strategic importance of public housing projects, he noted that structured, high-density housing developed by government agencies not only



optimizes land use but also significantly reduces per-unit costs, thereby making housing more accessible to a wider cross-section of society.

The Chief Secretary stressed that affordable housing cannot be achieved through isolated efforts and requires a coordinated, multi-agency approach supported by innovative development models. He underlined that leveraging PPP frameworks, self-financing schemes, and vertical development is essential to counter land scarcity while ensuring quality construction, adequate amenities, and long-term sustainability.

Speaking in this meeting the Commissioner Secretary, H&UDD, Mandeep Kaur remarked that the Department is alive to the social dimension that secure and affordable housing is central to social stability and economic well-being. She stated that government-led housing colonies play a vital role in preventing urban sprawl, reducing pressure on infrastructure, and ensuring equitable access to basic services for all segments of society.

He gave out that the efforts made by the Department in the past in providing suitable housing units/

plots to the public and the present projects advancing in both the divisions of the UT. She also apprised the meeting about the future plans of the Department to raise housing projects here in different districts in PPP or self-financing mode to meet the dwelling requirements of all sections of the society.

The MD, Housing Board, Shahbaz Ahmed Mirza apprised the meeting that the Housing Board is actively developing multiple housing colonies across Jammu and Kashmir to cater to diverse income groups.

He revealed that several land parcels have been identified for development under the PPP model at locations including Birpur (Samba), Padgampora (Pulwama), Watapora (Bandipora), Chowadi (Jammu), Changar (Kathua), and Chatterhama (Srinagar). He added that the market and demand assessments are being finalized to ensure commercially viable and people-centric housing solutions are created at these locations.

Additionally, housing colonies at Chak Bhalwal (Jammu), Bakroora (Ganderbal), and Bhalwal (Jammu) have been approved under the Self-Financing Scheme, the development authority said.

A flagship initiative under SDA

is the development of the Satellite Township at Rakhi Gund

Aksha, Bemina, spread over

nearly 2,950 kanals in its initial

phases. The township, launched

in December 2022, has witnessed

overwhelming public response, with thousands of online applications received. It was further given out that NBCC has been engaged as the Project Executing Agency, and the township will be developed in a phased manner over five years.

A key highlight of the review was the government's emphasis on sustainable, net-zero housing colonies, aligned with India's commitments under COP-26. The adoption of PPP models aims to reduce government exposure while creating model townships that integrate energy efficiency, transit-oriented development (TOD) norms, and climate-resilient infrastructure.

Additionally the CEO, CiTAG (Centre for Innovation and Transformation in Governance) gave out that the centre is actively facilitating PPP-based housing and commercial projects by conducting site visits, preparing DPRs, and finalizing Expressions of Interest (EOIs) to attract national-level developers. Multiple land parcels across Jammu and Kashmir are being bundled and structured to ensure financial viability and inclusive development, including mandated EWS housing, he explained.

The Chief Secretary stressed the need for time-bound execution and quality construction, while ensuring affordability for the common citizen. He underscored that housing remains a key pillar of urban development and social well-being, and directed all agencies to work in coordination to translate these projects into tangible benefits for the people of J&K.

Parents gather outside DC Office, seek student evacuation from Iran

Srinagar, Jan 15: As the situation in Iran grows increasingly tense, anxious parents of Kashmiri students stranded there gathered outside the office of the District Commissioner (DC) Srinagar on Thursday, appealing for urgent government intervention to ensure their children's safety and evacuation.

Families said they have lost contact with their wards for several days due to a communication blackout and disruption in online banking services.

"We are completely cut off," Abdul Hameed, a resident of Parimpura, whose son is studying medicine in Tehran.

He said neither calls go through nor are they able to send money. "The embassy has advised them to leave, but how can they do that without assistance? Their safety, security and even their studies are at stake now," Hameed said.

Another worried parent, Mohammad Sulaiman, echoed similar fears. "We can't even transfer money to our children. The banks are down, and students are frightened. We appeal to the government to please act now as it did during the crises in June and July," said. Parents said they had

gone to meet the DC Srinagar but to no avail. "We were told to leave our representation in the office. No one met us. We just want assurance that our children will be brought back safely," one parent said, fighting back tears.

The protest came hours after Chief Minister Omar Abdullah said he had spoken to External Affairs Minister Dr S. Jaishankar regarding the safety of students and residents from Jammu and Kashmir currently in Iran, assuring that the situation was being closely monitored.

Meanwhile, sources aware of the developments told KNO that the first evacuation flight from Tehran to Delhi is scheduled for Friday morning. Kashmiri students have reportedly been registered, and the first batch has been asked to be ready by 8:00 AM.

"Parents are requested not to worry," the source said, adding that the government is coordinating to ensure the safe return of all students.

Notably, with communication lines down but hope slowly returning, parents in Kashmir wait anxiously, with their prayers fixed on the skies that will soon bring their children home—(KNO)

Remote Tral villages celebrate as students excel in Class 10

Pulwama, Jan 15: Defying geographical isolation, lack of basic infrastructure and everyday hardships, two students from far-flung areas of Tral in south Kashmir's Pulwama district delivered exceptional performances in the Class 10 board examinations.

According to the details, Rayees ul Islam, a tribal boy from the remote village of Zradihard Tral, secured an outstanding 491 marks out of 500, while Mudasir Ahmad Gojar from the highly isolated Nagnaat Tral scored an impressive 496 marks, proving that determination and consistency can overcome even the toughest odds.

Rayees, who studied in a local private school, comes from a modest tribal background where access to quality education and facilities remains



limited. He attributed his success to the unwavering support of his parents and teachers.

"Whatever I have achieved today is because of my parents and teachers. Many students fail

not because they lack ability, but because they don't listen to their parents and teachers," Rayees told KNO.

Rayees plans to opt for the science stream. "My dream is to become a doctor and serve society, especially people living in underdeveloped and marginalised areas. People in far-flung areas suffer due to the lack of medical facilities, and I want to change that," he said.

Sharing his mantra for success, Rayees emphasised the importance of discipline and perseverance. "Determination, consistency and self-motivation are the keys to success. There are no shortcuts," he said.

However, Rayees also raised serious concerns about the neglect of remote tribal areas.

Friday Brief: Piety As A Holistic Way Of Being

In the Islamic tradition, true piety (Taqwa) is a profound, all-encompassing state of the heart that shapes every facet of a believer's life. It is the conscious awareness of God's presence, coupled with a vigilant effort to live in accordance with His will. The Quran offers the most eloquent definition, stating the righteous are those "who believe in the unseen, establish prayer, and spend out of what We have provided for them, and who believe in what has been revealed to you, and what was revealed before

you, and have firm faith in the Hereafter" (2:3-4). This verse seamlessly links faith with actionable deeds—prayer, charity, and belief—establishing piety as a holistic way of being. The Quran repeatedly emphasises that the true measure of a person is not their lineage or appearance, but their piety: "Indeed, the most noble of you in the sight of Allah is the most righteous of you" (49:13). This righteousness is defined by a moral compass oriented toward justice, mercy, and compassion. Piety is thus the inner guard

that prevents transgression, as the believer acts not out of fear of societal judgment, but out of consciousness of the Divine. The Hadith of Prophet Muhammad (Peace Be Upon Him) beautifully illustrate the practical manifestations of this inner state. He taught that piety resides in the heart, and his famous response to a question about the essence of goodness directs one to "consult your heart." He explained that righteousness is that which brings peace to the soul, while sin is that which wavers in the

heart, even if people repeatedly sanction it. This internal moral barometer, calibrated by divine guidance, is the core of Taqwa. The Prophet (Peace Be Upon Him) linked piety directly to ethical conduct towards others. He stated, "Piety is good character," and warned that fasting, prayer, and pilgrimage may not benefit one who fails to guard their tongue and actions from harming others. True piety, therefore, demands honesty in trade, kindness to neighbours, care for parents, and justice in all dealings. In essence, Islamic

piety is the harmonious integration of sincere worship and impeccable social ethics. It is the spiritual discipline that transforms ritual acts into meaningful worship and daily interactions into opportunities for divine pleasure. It is not a cloak worn for appearances, but the very fabric of a believer's character—woven from faith, manifested in good deeds, and dedicated entirely to the contentment of Allah. This is the Taqwa that elevates the human spirit and purifies society.

New Austrian Tunnelling Method (NATM)

Widely adopted in the Himalayas, NATM allows engineers to adapt excavation support in real time, making it ideal for variable and fragile rock formations.

Critical for modern road tunnels, ITCS combines ventilation control, fire detection, communication networks, CCTV, and emergency management into a centralised digital platform, ensuring 24/7 safety.

India's Landmark Tunnels: Defining Modern Infrastructure

India's expanding infrastructure has given rise to a series of remarkable tunnels



that redefine how people and goods move across the country. Each tunnel stands as a testament to innovation and problem-solving on a grand scale.

Atal Tunnel

Tucked beneath the snow-laden peaks of the Pir Panjal ranges, the Atal Tunnel stretches 9.02 km, providing a high-altitude passage that bypasses Rohtang Pass. Its completion has transformed connectivity, enabling seamless, year-round travel between Manali and the remote valleys of Lahaul-Spiti. The tunnel's strategic significance also lies in ensuring safe, reliable access for civilians and defence movement alike under challenging mountain conditions. It is officially recognised as the World's Longest Highway Tunnel above 10,000 feet in 2022 by the World Book of Records UK. The tunnel has cut the Manali-Sarchu distance by 46 km and reduced travel time by four to five hours.

Built in harsh Himalayan conditions where winter temperatures dropped to -25°C and the tunnel interior sometimes reached 45°C, its construction demanded exceptional resilience. Engineers faced fragile geology, Seri Nala seepage that once flooded the tunnel, heavy overburden, and intense snowfall, all of which were successfully overcome by the Border Roads Organisation's (BRO) dedicated Karmyogis.

Z-Morh/Sonamarg Tunnel

The Sonamarg Tunnel, a 12-km engineering feat carved through mountains at an altitude of over 8,650 feet above sea level, is set to transform travel in Jammu & Kashmir. It is built at a cost of 2,700 crore. It includes a 6.4-km main tunnel, an egress tunnel, and modern approach roads creating an all-weather lifeline between Srinagar and the golden meadows of Sonamarg, and further towards Ladakh.

No longer will avalanches, landslides, or heavy snowfall cut the region off. The tunnel keeps the route open improving access to major hospitals and ensuring the availability of essential supplies. Constructed using the New Austrian Tunnelling Method (NATM) for challenging Himalayan geology, the tunnel is a major technological milestone. It features an Integrated Tunnel Management System (ITMS) with advanced systems such as Public Address System, Electrical Fire Signalling System, Radio Re-Broadcast System (FM), Dynamic Road Information Panel (DRIP), etc. It is designed to handle about 1,000 vehicles per hour. Once paired with the upcoming Zojila Tunnel (2028), the journey will shrink from 49 km to 43 km, with speeds rising from 30 km/hr to 70 km/hr, boosting defense logistics, winter tourism, adventure sports, and

the livelihoods of the people who call these mountains home.

Sela Tunnel

The Sela Tunnel, dedicated to the nation during the Viksit Bharat Viksit North East programme in Itanagar, Arunachal Pradesh, is built by the BRO at 13,000 feet on the Tezpur-Tawang route. The tunnel is constructed at a cost of Rs 825 crore. It ensures all-weather connectivity and holds immense strategic value for the Armed Forces while boosting socio-economic growth in the border region. Built using the New Austrian Tunnelling Method (NATM), it stands as a powerful reminder of how perseverance and regional commitment can reshape the future of remote mountain communities.

Banital-Qazigund Road Tunnel

The Banital-Qazigund Road Tunnel, constructed at a cost of over 3,100 crore, is an 8.45-km-long twin-tube tunnel designed to significantly improve connectivity between Jammu and Kashmir. The tunnel has reduced the road distance between Banital and Qazigund by 16 km and has cut travel time by approximately one and a half hours. Built with two separate tubes, one for each direction of traffic, the tunnel is interconnected by cross passages at every 500 metres to facilitate maintenance and emergency evacuation. It has established an all-weather road link, thereby strengthening accessibility and bringing the two regions closer.

Dr Syama Prasad Mookerjee Tunnel

Dr Syama Prasad Mookerjee Tunnel, formerly known as the Chenani-Nashri Tunnel in Jammu & Kashmir is a 9-km-long, twin-tube, all-weather road tunnel connecting Udhampur and Ramban. Built at an elevation of about 1,200 metres in difficult Himalayan terrain, it has reduced travel time between Jammu and Srinagar by nearly two hours while bypassing 41 km of road length. The tunnel features advanced ventilation, safety, and intelligent traffic systems operated through a fully integrated control mechanism with minimal human intervention, along with enhanced security measures. Developed in line with the Make in India and Skill India initiatives, the skill sets of local people were improved, and they were engaged for construction of this tunnel. The project generated employment for over 2,000 local workers, with nearly 94 percent of the workforce drawn from Jammu and Kashmir.

Tunnel T50 under USBRL Project

Tunnel T50, a 12.77-km engineering feat connecting Khardi and Sumber in Jammu & Kashmir, stands as one of India's longest transportation tunnel constructed under the Udhampur-Srinagar-Baramulla Rail Link (USBRL) project, forming a crucial rail lifeline between the Kashmir Valley and the rest of the country. Constructed using the New Austrian Tunnelling Method, it cuts through challenging geology ranging from quartzite and gneiss to phyllite, with engineers overcoming high-water ingress, landslides, shear zones, and jointed volcanic rock. The tunnel features a main tube paired with a parallel escape tunnel, linked every 375 metres for safety. Enhanced with CCTV cameras placed every 50 metres and monitored from a central control room, T50 is designed for secure, seamless rail operations.

Kolkata's Underwater Metro Tunnel

In 2024, India marked a historic breakthrough with the launch of its first underwater metro tunnel in Kolkata, linking Esplanade and Howrah Maidan beneath the Hooghly River. This engineering feat not only showcases the nation's rising technological and infrastructural capabilities but also redefines urban mobility for one of India's busiest metropolitan regions.

India's Next Wave of Tunnel Projects

A new generation of tunnels is preparing to take shape. These forthcoming projects promise to redefine how the nation moves and connects. The following upcoming projects highlight the scale of progress underway.

Zojila Tunnel

The Zojila Tunnel is emerging as a monumental achievement in India's infrastructure landscape, cutting through some of the most formidable Himalayan rock formations to establish a dependable, all-weather link between Ladakh and the rest of the country. With nearly 12 kilometers already completed, the project integrates advanced safety measures and a semi-transverse ventilation system designed to maintain steady airflow deep within the mountains. The project incorporates a Smart Tunnel (SCADA) system constructed using the New Austrian Tunnelling Method. It is equipped with facilities such as CCTV surveillance, radio control, uninterrupted power supply, and ventilation systems. The adoption of modern technology in this project has resulted in savings of over 5,000 crore for the government. Once completed, this ambitious undertaking will become India's longest road tunnel and Asia's longest bi-directional tunnel,

reinforcing its national significance. Rising at an altitude of 11,578 feet and unfolding across over 30 kilometers, the project is on track for a 2028 completion. As a critical component of the Srinagar-Kargil-Leh National Highway, it promises to enhance both civilian and military mobility across the region.

Mumbai-Ahmedabad High-Speed Rail Tunnel

India's Mumbai-Ahmedabad High-Speed Rail corridor has marked a futuristic leap with the breakthrough on its 4.8-km undersea tunnel section. It is a defining feature of the nation's first bullet-train route. Excavated simultaneously from the Ghangoli and Shilphata ends, the tunnel posed extraordinary challenges. The teams advanced through difficult underwater terrain before meeting with precision, an achievement hailed as a landmark in India's engineering history. The project utilizes the advanced New Austrian Tunnelling Method (NATM), supported by comprehensive safety measures. Designed using single-tube technology capable of housing two high-speed trains, this tunnel stands at the forefront of cutting-edge rail construction and reflects the innovation driving India's next-generation transport infrastructure.

Rishikesh-Karnaprayag New Rail Line Project Tunnels

The Rishikesh-Karnaprayag rail line in Uttarakhand is a landmark tunnelling project in the Indian Himalayas. Spanning about 125 km, the alignment passes through some of the most geologically complex and environmentally sensitive Himalayan terrain. This has resulted in the project being predominantly tunnel-based. It comprises 16 main line tunnels with a cumulative length of approximately 105 km and 12 parallel escape tunnels totaling about 98 km. Overall, 199 km of tunnelling has been completed against a total scope of 213 km. A major technological milestone of the project is the deployment of a Tunnel Boring Machine (TBM) in Himalayan geology for the first time in Indian Railways. It is used for the 14.8 km-long Tunnel T-8, where a successful breakthrough has been achieved. Advanced tunnelling techniques and continuous monitoring have been adopted to minimize ecological impact while ensuring safety and long-term stability. This makes the Rishikesh-Karnaprayag tunnels a defining example of high-altitude railway tunnelling in India.

BISAG partnership drives major IT-Led governance transformation in J&K

JAMMU, JANUARY 15: For decades, governance in Jammu & Kashmir was shaped by its geography—mountains, remoteness and access gaps that often made service delivery slow and uneven. Over the past few years, the Union Territory has witnessed not incremental digitisation, but its first comprehensive IT-led governance transformation—one that has unfolded steadily, strategically and with enduring impact.

This transformation, as per an official statement issued on Thursday, is not defined by isolated mobile applications or stand-alone portals. Rather, it marks a systemic shift in the way governance is conceived, delivered and monitored, with technology now embedded into the core architecture of administration.

The Architecture of Change

At the heart of this transformation are 35 pioneering IT interventions implemented across 20 departments, developed in

close partnership with BISAG-N. These initiatives have replaced fragmented, paper-intensive processes with integrated digital platforms that are real-time, transparent and citizen-centric.

What distinguishes Jammu & Kashmir's IT journey is not the scale alone, but the manner in which technology has been deployed—not as an add-on, but as a redesign of governance itself. From agriculture and healthcare to welfare delivery, grievance redressal and industrial planning, departments now function on shared dashboards, live data streams and outcome-based monitoring systems.

This decisive shift—from file movement to field visibility—marks the true inflection point in governance over the last two years.

Agriculture Goes Digital: Farmers at the Centre

The transformation is perhaps most visible in agriculture, a sector that sustains a significant portion of Jammu & Kashmir's population. The Daksh Kisan Portal, India's first Learning Management System (LMS)

dedicated exclusively to farmers, represents a quiet yet path-breaking intervention.

For the first time, farmers have access to structured, certified digital learning modules tailored to local crops, climate conditions and farming practices. Through videos, assessments and progress tracking, Daksh Kisan moves beyond advisories to genuine capacity building—empowering farmers with knowledge rather than instructions and bridging long-standing gaps in extension services.

This initiative is complemented by Kisan Khidmat Ghar (KKG) and the Kisan Sathi 360 Dashboard, which together integrate data from multiple agricultural schemes under the Holistic Agriculture Development Programme (HADP). Administrators and farmers alike now have a unified, real-time view of progress, outputs and outcomes.

Processes that once required multiple visits, registers and follow-ups are now visible on a single screen, making agriculture

governance more predictable, responsive and accountable.

Empowering Youth, Enterprise and Innovation

IT interventions have also reshaped youth engagement with the economy. The digital ecosystem under Mission YUVA goes far beyond online applications. Its AI-based Detailed Project Report (DPR) generator—a national first—enables aspiring entrepreneurs to convert ideas into structured, bankable business plans with minimal procedural friction.

For youth in remote and rural blocks, this translates into seamless access to financial assistance, skill development modules, career counselling and market linkages—without navigating multiple bureaucratic layers. The result is not only ease of doing business, but enhanced confidence to participate in economic activity.

Healthcare, Grievances and Citizen-Centric Governance

In healthcare, JK SEHAT has brought tele-consultation, hospital discovery and service availability directly to citizens'

fingertips, particularly benefiting populations in far-flung areas. Telemedicine services, geo-tagged health facilities and multilingual access have significantly reduced travel, waiting times and uncertainty for patients.

Similarly, JK Samadhan, the unified grievance redressal and monitoring system, has institutionalised accountability across departments. Citizens no longer pursue offices for redressal; grievances are digitally logged, tracked and reviewed through centralized dashboards, enabling senior officers to identify systemic issues rather than isolated complaints.

These platforms signify more than convenience—they represent a shift in governance power dynamics by placing information, visibility and accountability firmly in the hands of citizens.

AI, Geospatial Intelligence and Smart Administration

A defining feature of Jammu & Kashmir's IT transformation is its calibrated adoption of AI-driven governance tools. From AI-based GST fraud detection

systems to intelligent search engines that allow officials to query multiple databases through natural language, technology is increasingly being used to anticipate risks, prevent leakages and support informed decision-making.

Advanced geospatial mapping of industrial assets, healthcare facilities, welfare coverage and infrastructure has introduced a level of planning precision rarely seen at the sub-national level. Policy decisions are now guided by live, location-specific data rather than assumptions.

Several of these interventions are already being recognised as unique in the country and readily replicable by other states and Union Territories.

A Greener Footprint of Governance

Beyond efficiency, the digital shift has also delivered environmental gains. The transition to paperless systems, online surveys, digital certifications, tele-consultations and remote monitoring has led to a substantial reduction in carbon footprints.

Fewer physical visits, reduced paperwork and optimised logistics together represent a quieter yet meaningful contribution to sustainable governance—an outcome seldom associated with administrative reform, but deeply embedded in Jammu & Kashmir's digital transformation.

A Journey Still Unfolding

Officials describe the current phase as only the beginning. With robust foundational platforms now firmly in place, the next phase will focus on deeper AI integration, predictive analytics, enhanced cross-departmental interoperability and more anticipatory governance models.

What Jammu & Kashmir has achieved over the past two years is not a digital makeover, but a structural reset of governance. From being viewed as a late entrant in e-governance, the Union Territory is now advancing on the IT path like never before—setting benchmarks that resonate well beyond its borders. The revolution may be quiet, but its impact is unmistakable.

WMDA bans littering, warns of penalties for waste violations

GANDERBAL, JANUARY 15: In a significant step aimed to safeguard the fragile ecosystem and enhance cleanliness in Manasbal area, the Wular-Manasbal Development Authority (MDA) has appealed people living in catchment areas and stakeholders besides tourists to ensure scientific waste management, prevent littering and promote a clean, hygienic and environmentally sustainable Manasbal.

As per a notification of WMDA, households, commercial establishments and institutions have been directed to hand over their waste only to the designated sanitation staff of WMDA or collection vehicles of the Rural Development Department, Block Safapora, at the notified time and place.

The public has been strictly advised to segregate waste at source, separating wet/biodegradable waste such as kitchen and food waste from dry/non-biodegradable waste

including plastic, paper, glass and metal. Mixing of wet and dry waste has been prohibited.

The Authority has also imposed a complete ban on dumping of garbage, plastic waste or construction debris on roads, open spaces, water bodies, drains and other public places. Burning of waste in open areas has likewise been prohibited. Citizens have been urged to use designated dustbins and collection points and avoid dumping waste at unauthorized locations.

Further, the Authority has cautioned that any violation of these directions shall invite penal action under the J&K Development Act, Solid Waste Management Rules, 2016 and other relevant regulations, including the imposition of fines and other legal proceedings.

Seeking active public participation, the Manasbal Development Authority appealed to residents, traders, visitors and institutions to cooperate in making Manasbal a litter-free, clean and plastic-free destination.

Principals of Government Degree Colleges (GDCs) and Tehsildars participated in the meeting virtually.

During the meeting, the Deputy Commissioner sought detailed feedback from all departments on the progress made on various important

agenda points like functioning of ATF and DDRC, ongoing awareness drive, CCTV surveillance monitoring in hot spot areas, Nasha mukta Panchayat, rehabilitation etc.

SSP Kupwara and SSP Handwara briefed about enforcement action and preventive initiatives undertaken including registration of cases, arrests, seizures, licence suspensions, and attachment of properties related to narcotics offences.

While addressing the meeting, the Deputy Commissioner emphasized the need for sustained and coordinated efforts to eradicate drug abuse and addiction in the district. He directed the concerned departments to work proactively and aggressively, with special focus on the rehabilitation by facilitating self-employment opportunities.

CEO Kupwara and all Principals of GDCs were instructed to submit status of working of CCTV cameras to ensure strict surveillance and deter drug-related activities.

RDD Secretary reviews SBM-G progress, stresses timely completion of sanitation infrastructure

SRINAGAR, JANUARY 15: Secretary, Rural Development Department (RDD) and Panchayati Raj, Mohammad Ajiaz Asad, Thursday chaired a high-level meeting to review the progress of the Swachh Bharat Mission-Gramin (SBM-G) and to deliberate on the formulation of the Annual Implementation Plan (AIP) 2026-27 for Jammu and Kashmir.

The meeting, as per an official statement, was attended by Director General, Rural Sanitation, Anoo Malhotra; Additional District Development Commissioners (ADDCCs); Superintending Engineers and Executive Engineers of REW; Assistant Commissioners Panchayats (ACPs); and other concerned officers.

Reviewing the status of SBM-G assets, it was noted that community-level works such as Community Compost Pits, Community Soak Pits, Community Sanitary Complexes and Segregation Sheds have shown encouraging progress. However, larger infrastructure projects—including Plastic Waste Management Units (PWWUs), Faecal Sludge Treatment Plants (FSTPs), DEWATS and GOBARdhan



plants—continue to lag, primarily due to low levels of tendering and slow execution.

The Secretary stressed that Plastic Waste Management Units must be developed in and around Yatra transit camps to strengthen sanitation arrangements and waste handling mechanisms.

He noted that such facilities would also support revenue generation and improve overall upkeep of Yatra infrastructure, underscoring the need for integrated planning and sustained maintenance.

He said districts like Rajouri, Jammu, Reasi, Samba, and Udhampur have reported high levels of tender finalisation, early work commencement, and substantial completion of sanitation assets.

Similarly, Bandipora and Kupwara have also recorded steady improvement, signalling better coordination between planning and execution at the district level.

Highlighting environmental concerns, Secretary emphasised the need for a permanent solution for debris management in both rural and semi-urban areas.

Addressing implementation gaps, he directed that tendering for all pending major assets be completed immediately, and works commenced without delay where allotments have already been made. He made ADDCCs directly responsible for resolving land-related issues and ensuring commencement of works, calling for close coordination with line departments and regular district-level

reviews.

The Secretary directed the DG Rural Sanitation to undertake bi-weekly reviews of SBM-G asset progress, while ADDCCs were instructed to continuously monitor implementation in their respective districts. He identified land availability and timely initiation of works as the two most critical factors requiring focused attention. District Commissioners were asked to intervene wherever land issues persist, while Superintending Engineers and Executive Engineers were directed to resolve DPR-related issues on priority and ensure time-bound execution.

Stressing that sanitation infrastructure must translate into functional service delivery, the meeting also reviewed progress under Individual Household Latrines (IHHLs) for 2025-26. The Secretary directed that geotagging be completed on priority and long-pending IHHL cases be cleared within fixed timelines, cautioning that delays adversely impact ODF sustainability and beneficiary confidence.

Under the GOBARdhan initiative, 18 biogas plants are planned across the Union Territory. Secretary emphasised that GOBARdhan projects and FSTPs are central to sustainable

waste management and circular economy objectives, and directed officers to expedite tendering, address contractor response issues and ensure convergence with other schemes.

The status of Operations & Maintenance (O&M) and Faecal Sludge and Septage Management (FSSM) policies was also reviewed. Draft policies, prepared after public consultation and incorporating inputs from the Environment Committee of the J&K Legislative Assembly, have been submitted for legal vetting and are currently under examination by the Law Department. The Secretary stressed that finalisation of these policies is essential for long-term sustainability of SBM-G assets.

Discussions were also initiated on the AIP 2026-27, with emphasis on realistic planning, prioritisation of incomplete works and greater focus on large waste-management infrastructure.

Calling for a results-oriented approach, Secretary Asad directed officers to move beyond target-centric implementation and focus on timely completion, functionality and effective utilisation of sanitation assets to sustain gains achieved under SBM-G in rural Jammu and Kashmir.

KCCI holds key meeting with customs officials to boost export facilitation

Discussions focus on addressing procedural challenges, infra needs, policy support to enhance export competitiveness from J&K

Srinagar, Jan 15: The Kashmir Chamber of Commerce and Industry (KCCI) on Thursday organised an interactive session with senior officials of the Customs Department at the Chamber Office to discuss key issues confronting exporters from Jammu & Kashmir and to explore ways to facilitate smoother export operations from the region.

The interaction was attended by Mr. Sanjay Gupta, Chief Commissioner, Customs Preventive Zone, Delhi; Mr. Alok Srivastava, Commissioner, Customs Preventive Commission, Amritsar; Mr. Buddhi Prakash, Additional Commissioner, Customs Preventive Commission, Amritsar; Mr. Puneet Gunawat, Joint Commissioner, Customs Preventive Commission, Amritsar; and Mr. Purushottam Gupta, Assistant Commissioner, Customs Preventive Division, Jammu.

of Commerce and Industry, Mr. Javid Ahmad Tenga, welcomed the Customs officials and appreciated their willingness to engage directly with exporters and industry stakeholders. The meeting was attended by members of the Executive Committee, past presidents of the Chamber, and a large number of exporter members.

In his address, Mr. Javid Ahmad Tenga highlighted major concerns faced by exporters, including

drawback-related issues, procedural and compliance challenges, and the infrastructure deficit at Srinagar International Airport, particularly with regard to cargo handling facilities and operational constraints during adverse weather conditions. He stressed that these bottlenecks adversely affect the competitiveness of exports from Kashmir.

Outlining KCCI's vision, Mr. Javid Ahmad Tenga emphasised the need to substantially increase

exports from the Kashmir region and said the Chamber aims to work towards doubling exports through improved infrastructure, facilitative Customs procedures, and supportive policy interventions. He underlined the urgent requirement to upgrade export infrastructure on a war-footing basis and reiterated KCCI's long-standing demand for the establishment of an Inland Container Depot (ICD) in the region.

The meeting was also attended by representatives of Jammu and Kashmir Bank, including Mr. Vishal Sharma, Chief Manager (Forex), J&K Bank, and Mr. Shabir Ahmad Reshi. The Bank officials shared the perspective of the banking sector on issues faced by exporters, particularly those relating to issuance of Electronic Bank Realisation Certificates (e-BRCs), timelines and procedural requirements, and requests for extension of export bills.

A dedicated question-and-answer session formed an important part of the interaction, during which exporters directly raised

their operational and procedural concerns and sought clarifications from the Customs officials on issues relating to drawback processing, documentation requirements, cargo movement, and airport-related logistics.

Mr. Sanjay Gupta gave a patient hearing to the issues and queries raised by the exporters and assured that genuine concerns would be examined at appropriate levels.

Mr. Alok Srivastava reiterated the Customs Department's commitment to trade facilitation and constructive engagement with stakeholders while ensuring regulatory compliance.

Mr. Rauf Ahmad Punjabi, Past President, KCCI, presented a vote of thanks and requested the Customs officials to organize an awareness workshop for exporters. The Chief Commissioner, Customs Preventive Zone, Delhi appreciated the suggestion of Mr. Punjabi and assured KCCI that an awareness workshop will be organized in April at Srinagar.

Iran's nationwide protests appear increasingly smothered after crackdown and internet outage

Dubai, Jan 15: The nationwide protests challenging Iran's theocracy appeared increasingly smothered Thursday, a week after authorities shut the country off from the world and escalated a bloody crackdown that activists say has killed at least 2,637 people.

The prospect of US retaliation for the deaths of protesters still hung over the region, though President Donald Trump signalled a possible de-escalation, saying the killing appeared to be

ending.

The US announced new sanctions on Iranian officials accused of suppressing the protests, which began late last month over the country's faltering economy and the collapse of its currency.

In Iran's capital, Tehran, witnesses said recent mornings showed no new signs of bonfires lit the night before or debris in the streets. The sound of gunfire, which had been intense for several nights, has also faded.

Meanwhile, Iranian state media has announced wave after

wave of arrests by authorities, targeting those it calls "terrorists" while also apparently looking for Starlink satellite internet dishes, which offer the only way to get videos and images out to the internet.

"Since January 8, we saw a full-fledged war, and anybody who was in the gathering since then is a criminal," said Justice Minister Amin Hosseini Rahimi, according to a report Wednesday from the judiciary's Mizan news agency.

Iranian state media broadcast a roster of damage from what

it called a "terrorist operation," including damage to hundreds of stores and public buildings, scores of cars and ambulances and several "heritage sites," including mosques and shrines.

China's foreign ministry said Iranian Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi told his Chinese counterpart that the situation in the country was now stable.

But as Iran tries to assert control at home, it has signaled worries about threats from abroad, including the United States, which has threatened military action over the

killing of peaceful demonstrators. Tensions soared after Trump's comment Tuesday that "help is on its way" to Iranian protesters.

The Islamic Republic shut down its airspace for hours early Thursday without explanation, something it has done in previous rounds of attacks between it and Israel, as well as during the 12-day war in June.

The US also took steps to move some personnel from Qatar's Al Udeid Air Base while warning diplomats in Kuwait to stay away from military bases

where American troops are stationed. Britain closed its Tehran embassy and withdrew British staff from Iran.

Airspace shut

The airspace closure lasted for over four hours, according to pilot guidance issued by Iran, which lies on a key east-west flight route. International carriers diverted north and south around Iran, but after one extension, the closure appeared to have expired, and several domestic flights were in the air just after 7 am.

Around midday, Iranian state

television carried a statement from the country's Civil Aviation Authority saying that the nation's "skies are hosting incoming and outgoing flights, and airports are providing services to passengers." It did not acknowledge the closure.

The closure immediately rippled through global aviation.

"Several airlines have already reduced or suspended services, and most carriers are avoiding Iranian airspace," said the website SafeAirspace, which provides information on conflict areas and air travel.

He reviewed the prevailing security situation, assessed operational preparedness, and emphasised coordination among security agencies to ensure effective responses to emerging challenges.

The Border Security Force (BSF) has strengthened anti-infiltration measures in north Kashmir's Bandipora sector following intelligence inputs indicating increased attempts of infiltration from across the border.

Speaking with reporter in Bandipora, DIG BSF Sector Headquarters Bandipora, N K Babu said that the BSF has enhanced surveillance and ground deployment to counter any such attempts.

He said that drone surveillance has been increased and foot patrols intensified across vulnerable areas. "The BSF, in coordination with the Army, has deployed multi-layered anti-infiltration grids in successive lines to monitor movement along the border. The vehicle and foot patrols have also been increased along the main road connecting Bandipora to Razdan Pass and Gurez to maintain surveillance and prevent movement of suspicious elements".

He also said the BSF units are deployed at high-altitude locations ranging between 12,000 and 16,000 feet and are continuing operations despite challenging terrain and weather conditions. "The force is prepared to ensure security in the sector and maintain normalcy during the Republic Day celebrations," he said. (KNO)

At Srinagar airport, the mercury settled at minus 5.0 degrees Celsius, compared to minus 6.0 degrees Celsius on Wednesday. Awantipora recorded minus 4.8 degrees Celsius, up from minus 6.4 degrees Celsius, while Budgam recorded minus 4.8 degrees Celsius, compared to minus 5.4 degrees Celsius.

Pulwama and Shopian each recorded minus 6.1 degrees Celsius, compared to minus 7.0 degrees Celsius and minus 7.5 degrees Celsius, respectively, a day earlier. Anantnag recorded minus 5.7 degrees Celsius, up from minus 6.6 degrees Celsius. Baramulla recorded minus 2.2 degrees Celsius, compared to minus 1.8 degrees Celsius on Wednesday, showing a marginal dip.

In the Jammu region, Jammu city recorded a minimum of 4.4 degrees Celsius, slightly higher than 4.0 degrees Celsius the previous day.

Jammu airport recorded 5.4 degrees Celsius, compared to 4.8 degrees Celsius on Wednesday. Katra recorded 6.8 degrees Celsius, up from 5.5 degrees Celsius.

Baderwah recorded minus 0.1 degrees Celsius, compared to 0.5 degrees Celsius on Wednesday, while Udhampur recorded minus 0.4 degrees Celsius, down from 1.0 degrees Celsius.

Rajouri recorded 0.3 degrees Celsius, compared to minus 0.6 degrees Celsius a day earlier. Poonch recorded 4.4 degrees Celsius.

In Ladakh, Leh and Hanle had recorded minus 11.4 degrees Celsius each on Wednesday, while Kargil recorded minus 10.0 degrees Celsius and Nubra Valley minus 10.4 degrees Celsius.

The weather department said there would be no significant weather activity till January 21, with light snow at scattered places during January 16 and January 19-20. From January 22 to 24, there is a possibility of light to moderate rain or snow at most places.

The department also indicated the possibility of moderate to heavy rain or snow over a few districts of the Chenab valley and south Kashmir during January 23 and 24.

Cyber frauds

warned that fraudsters are now misusing technology and psychological manipulation to trap victims through "digital arrest" scams, where callers impersonate police or court officials, falsely claiming that a parcel in the victim's name contains illegal items.

"There is no such term in law. If someone claims you are 'digitally arrested' or demands money to avoid legal action, cut the call immediately, it's a scam," he said, citing cases from Delhi and Srinagar involving senior citizens who lost large sums.

FAKE INVESTMENTS, JOB SCAMS AND MALWARE LINKS

The SSP said fake online investment schemes promising to double or triple money, fraudulent job offers and malicious APK or QR code links remain among the most common traps.

"A hacker doesn't hack your phone; he hacks your mind," Gupta said. "They study people's social media behaviour, target those seeking jobs or investment opportunities and use fear or greed to make them act fast."

He urged citizens to avoid clicking unknown links or installing unverified apps, as these often contain malware that grants criminals access to personal data and bank accounts. He also cautioned against scanning random QR codes, plugging into public charging ports ("juice jacking"), or sharing Aadhaar and PAN details online, which can lead to impersonation and mule account misuse.

TECH VIGILANCE: CHECK YOUR SIMS, LINKED DEVICES

SSP Gupta advised people to regularly verify their mobile connections through the government's 'Sanchar Saathi' portal to ensure no fake SIM cards are issued in their name. He also recommended checking linked WhatsApp devices for unauthorized access and avoiding suspicious friend or job requests online.

"Fraudsters operate across borders using fake identities, spoofed calls and AI-generated videos. Never send money or personal data without verification," he said.

1930: INDIA'S CYBER LIFELINE

Explaining how the cyber helpline 1930 works, SSP Gupta said it is directly integrated with banks and financial intermediaries. "Once a complaint is filed, money trails are instantly flagged and accounts can be frozen within minutes," he said, calling the helpline a 24x7 lifeline for victims.

He also encouraged citizens to report through the national portal <https://cybercrime.gov.in> and spread awareness within communities.

"Cybercrime thrives on fear and hesitation. Awareness, vigilance and prompt action are our strongest tools. Every citizen can help create a safer digital world," he said.

The SSP reaffirmed that CICE's specialised teams are working round the clock with banks, payment gateways, and telecom firms to trace money trails, block mule accounts, and dismantle fraud networks operating across states.

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"Cybercrime thrives on fear and hesitation. Awareness, vigilance and prompt action are our strongest tools. Every citizen can help create a safer digital world," he said.

Report suicide, unnatural death of students to police fast: SC to higher education institutions

New Delhi, Jan 15: The Supreme Court on Thursday directed all higher education institutions (HEIs) across the country to report any suicide or unnatural death of a student to the police authorities as soon as they come to know about the incident.

Issuing a slew of directions, the top court said the HEIs cannot shirk away from their fundamental duty to ensure that their institutions as a whole are safe, equitable, inclusive and conducive spaces of learning.

A bench of Justices J B Pardiwala and R Mahadevan also directed the HEIs to submit an annual report of student suicides or unnatural deaths to the University Grants Commission (UGC) and all other relevant regulatory bodies for professional courses.

"All HEIs must report any incident of suicide or unnatural death of a student, regardless of the location of its occurrence (i.e. on campus, hostels, PG accommodations, or otherwise outside the institutional premises), to the police authorities no sooner than they come to know about the incident. This should cover all students, irrespective of whether they are studying in the classroom, distance or online mode of learning," the bench said.

In case of central universities and institutes of national importance or any HEI that does not fall within the above-mentioned framework, it must be reported to the Department of Higher Education, Ministry of Education, government of India, it said.

The apex court ordered that every residential HEI must have access to qualified medical help round-the-clock, if not on campus, then within a



one-km radius to provide emergency medical health support to students.

"Keeping in mind the faculty shortages which have been reported in several HEIs, both public and private, it must be ensured that all vacant faculty positions

(both teaching and non-teaching) be filled within a period of four months, with priority given to posts reserved for candidates from marginalised and underrepresented communities including those posts reserved for PwDs (persons with disabilities)," the bench said.

Special recruitment drives may be held for faculty recruitment that come under various forms of reservations according to central and state government rules, it added.

Observing that student suicide represents only the visible tip of a much larger iceberg of student distress and well-being, the top

court said appointment and filling of vacancies of the post of vice chancellors, registrars and other key institutional and administrative positions must also be made within a period of four months.

Moreover, it must be ensured as a matter of practice that these positions are filled within a period of one month from the date on which the vacancy arises in order to ensure the smooth functioning of HEIs, it said.

"All HEIs must report on an annual basis to the central and relevant state governments, as to how many reserved posts are vacant, how many are filled, reasons for non-filling, time taken, etc., so that periodic accountability is ensured.

"The backlog of any and all pending scholarship disbursements must be cleared within a period of four months by the relevant central and

state government authorities," the bench said.

The apex court also said that it must be ensured that the disbursement of all future scholarships are done with clear timelines, without any delay by the relevant central and state government authorities.

"Disbursal of dates and schedules must also be made known to the student recipient. Even in cases of unavoidable administrative delay, HEIs must not, as a policy, make the student recipients accountable for paying or clearing their fees.

"No student should be prevented from appearing in an examination, removed from hostels, barred from attending classes, or have their marksheets and degrees withheld because of delays in disbursal of scholarships. Any such institutional policy may be viewed strictly," the bench said.

It directed all HEIs to remain fully compliant with all the regulations that have a binding effect on them, including inter alia, the UGC Regulation on Curbing the Menace of Ragging in Higher Educational Institutions, 2009 and other related provisions.

The apex court directed that the sample registration system data on suicides, especially those falling within the age group of 15-29 years, must be centrally maintained for better and more accurate estimates of deaths by suicide of students in HEIs.

The apex court had last year constituted a National Task Force (NTF) to address the mental health concerns of students and prevent incidents of suicides and said the duty of colleges was not just to ensure academic excellence of the students but also their mental well-being.

Lawyer should move beyond articulation of grievances: CJI Kant

New Delhi, Jan 15: Chief Justice of India Surya Kant on Thursday called upon lawyers to wholeheartedly engage on the administrative side of the justice delivery system and move beyond "articulation of grievances".

CJI Kant, who was speaking at an event organised by the Delhi High Court Bar Association (DHBCA) to felicitate him, said when the Bar and the bench share the ownership of "administrative innovation", the system is more likely to command trust even during the period of transition.

A Bar that is prepared, ethical and conscious of its duties strengthens the administration of justice, and by encouraging such a Bar and

acknowledging its strength, the foundation for the establishment is reinforced, the CJI said.

"The Bar must extend beyond the articulation of grievances to proactive engagement. It is here that I call upon the members of the Bar to engage wholeheartedly in the administration side of justice by offering practical suggestions, volunteering new systems and participating in consultative processes to ensure that reforms are not only well-intended, but are workable also," CJI Kant said.

During the event, DHBCA president and senior advocate N Hariharan raised some "deep institutional concerns", such as inadequate physical infrastructure and "diminishing elevation" of lawyers from the high court as judges.

"Despite 47,000 advocates, only three have been elevated as judges since August 2024," Hariharan said, adding that he was "not questioning any individual appointments" made to the high court. Hariharan also raised the issue of vacancies in the high court.

With 44 judges against a sanctioned strength of 60, there is a 27 per cent vacancy in the Delhi High Court, he said. In response, CJI Kant said the system would address these issues in due course.

WHO urges govt to strengthen taxes on sugary drinks: Doctors welcome move

New Delhi, Jan 15: Just when everyone was busy preparing New Year health resolutions, the World Health Organisation (WHO) made an announcement urging governments to strengthen taxes on sugary drinks.

"Sugary drinks and alcoholic beverages are getting cheaper, due to consistently low tax rates in most countries, fueling obesity, diabetes, heart disease, cancers and injuries, especially in children and young adults," the WHO said in a news release on Tuesday.

Strategies to Reduce Sugar Intake for Better Health

"Health taxes are one of the strongest tools we have for promoting health and preventing disease," said Dr Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus, WHO Director-General.

"By increasing taxes on products like tobacco, sugary drinks, and alcohol, governments can reduce harmful consumption and unlock funds for vital health services."

What does the UN health agency mean by sugary drinks? This includes sodas, fruit juices, sweetened milks



drinks, and ready-to-drink coffees and teas. It found that "sugary drink taxes are weak and poorly targeted with the median tax accounting for only about 2% of the price of a common sugary soda and often applying only to a subset of beverages, missing large parts of the market."

"With the rise of childhood obesity and early onset diabetes, the WHO's recommendation to increase taxes on sugary drinks is both timely and needed. Sugary drinks are often the largest supplier of 'hidden sugar' in children's diets, providing high calorie counts with low or no nutritional value. When consumed regularly, they create repeated spikes in blood sugar & added

weight gain, often resulting in an increase of early insulin resistance — and are thus a pre-cursor for Type 2 diabetes far earlier than adulthood," Dr. Vivek Jain, Senior Director & Unit Head - Paediatrics, Fortis Hospital, Shalimar Bagh told TOI Health.

"When considering these beverages from a child's perspective, the greatest risk associated with their intake is the long-lasting negative effects they will have on a child's body through metabolic damage. Children who begin consuming high-sugar-content beverages early in their lives will develop a predisposition to consume these high-sugar-laden products throughout their adulthood, which places

Gupta, Consultant, Dept of Cardiology at the CK Birla Hospital, Delhi told TOI Health.

A leap of health
"The promotion of enhanced taxation of sugary products by the WHO is an appropriate, science-driven public health measure. The excessive intake of sugar has been identified to contribute to the growing prevalence of obesity, diabetes, cardiovascular disease, and dental diseases in low- and middle-income countries, which are escalating at an alarming rate. Studies have established that sugar sweetened beverage taxes offer effective remedies in reducing their overall consumption, especially among children, in addition to generating funds for enhanced preventive healthcare measures. Apart from shaping consumer practices, fiscal policies have become important drivers to persuade manufacturers to change, particularly in countries such as India, to contain the escalating cases of non-communicable diseases," Dr. Sanjeeva Kumar

If the taxes on sugary drinks are too high, people might choose healthier drinks like water, milk, and fresh fruit juices that don't have any added sugar. When these taxes are used wisely to make school lunches better and teach kids about health, they start a strong cycle that helps kids eat better, stay healthy, and grow over time," said Dr. Rajiv Chhabra, Chief, Pediatrics Artemis Hospitals Gurgaon.

"Taxation cannot solve the problem alone; it needs to be part of a broader strategy that includes better food labelling, the banning of marketing sugary drinks to children, and making sure parents and schools are aware of the risks. Protecting children from excess sugar is one of the most effective methods of preventing lifestyle related diseases. The introduction of policy based interventions, such as the taxation of sugary drinks, helps to create a healthier generation," says Dr Vivek.

2023 Parl security breach on Dec 13 can't be coincidence: Delhi HC

New Delhi, Jan 15: The Delhi High Court on Thursday said the 2023 Parliament security breach happening on December 13, the anniversary of the 2001 Parliament terror attack, could not be a coincidence. A bench of Justices Prathiba M Singh and Sudha Jain made the remark while dealing with the bail pleas of three accused -- Manoranjan D, Sagar Sharma and Lalit Jha -- in the security breach case.

Even as the counsel for the accused submitted that there was no connection between the two incidents by them as the accused in the present case were merely protesting

unemployment, the bench retorted, "It can't be a coincidence... 13 December can't be a coincidence".

The senior lawyer appearing for the accused said that while the "way of protest" might not have been right, the accused people ought not to be kept in jail indefinitely.

"They had anger, but I totally agree that it was not the way to protest. If we look at history, even the English people did not keep people behind bars for an indefinite period," the counsel said. He emphasised that the charges were yet to be framed and the accused were educated youth with no prior involvement in a criminal case.

The counsel for the police said the

prosecution had concluded its arguments on the charge before the trial court.

The court listed the matter for further hearing in February and asked the parties to go through the Supreme Court's judgement in the case of Gulfisha Fatima, who was granted bail recently in a 2020 Delhi riots case under UAPA.

The three accused had moved the high court against the dismissal of their bail pleas by the trial court in December 2024. Accused Neelam Azad and Mahesh Kumawat were granted bail by the high court in July 2025. In a major security breach on the anniversary of the 2001 Parliament terror attack, accused Sagar

Sharma and Manoranjan D allegedly jumped into the Lok Sabha chamber from the public gallery during Zero Hour, released yellow gas from canisters and sloganised before they were overpowered by some MPs.

Around the same time, two other accused -- Amol Shinde and Azad -- allegedly sprayed coloured gas from canisters while shouting "tanashahi nahi chalegi (dictatorship won't work)" outside the Parliament premises.

The Delhi Police had registered the FIR on the next day of the incident, i.e. December 14, 2023, under sections of the Indian Penal Code and Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act (UAPA).

Smartphone exports up 43.7 pc during Apr-Nov: Comm min data

New Delhi, Jan 15: The country's smartphone exports rose 43.7 per cent to USD 18.8 billion during the April-November period this fiscal year, according to the commerce ministry data released on Thursday. It was USD 13.08 billion in April-November 2024-25 and USD 9.07 billion during April-November 2023-24.

The data showed that the US was

the major destination for the shipments. It was followed by the UAE, China, Portugal, and Spain.



Wikipedia inks AI deals with Microsoft, Meta and Perplexity as it marks 25th birthday

London, Jan 15: Wikipedia unveiled new business deals with a slew of artificial intelligence companies on Thursday as it marked its 25th anniversary.

The online crowdsourced encyclopedic revealed that it has signed up AI companies including Amazon, Meta Platforms, Perplexity, Microsoft and France's Mistral AI.

Wikipedia is one of the last bastions of the early internet, but that original vision of a free online space has been clouded by the dominance of Big Tech platforms and the rise of generative AI chatbots trained on content scraped from the web.

Aggressive data collection methods by AI developers, including from Wikipedia's vast repository of free knowledge, has raised questions about who ultimately pays for the artificial intelligence boom.

The Wikimedia Foundation, the nonprofit that runs the site, signed Google as one of its first customers in 2022 and announced other agreements last year with smaller AI players like search engine Ecosia.

The new deals will help one of the world's most popular websites monetize heavy traffic from AI companies. They're paying to access Wikipedia content "at a volume and speed designed specifically for their needs," the foundation said. It did not provide financial or other details.

While AI training has sparked legal battles elsewhere over copyright and other issues, Wikipedia founder Jimmy Wales said he welcomes it.

"I'm very happy personally that AI models are training on Wikipedia data because it's human curated," Wales told The Associated Press



in an interview. "I wouldn't really want to use an AI that's trained only on X, you know, like a very angry AI," Wales said, referring to billionaire Elon Musk's social media platform.

Wales said the site wants to work with AI companies, not block them. But "you should probably chip in and pay for your fair share of the cost that you're putting on us."

The Wikimedia Foundation last year urged AI developers to pay for access through its enterprise platform and said human traffic had fallen 8 per cent. Meanwhile, visits from bots, sometimes disguised to evade detection, were heavily taxing its servers as they scrape masses of content to feed AI large language models.

The findings highlighted shifting online trends as search engine AI overviews and chatbots summarise information instead of sending users to sites by showing them links.

Wikipedia is the ninth most visited site on the internet. It has more than 65 million articles in 300 languages that are edited by some 250,000 volunteers.

The site has become so popular in part because it's free for anyone to use.

"But our infrastructure is not free, right?" Wikimedia Foundation CEO Maryana Iskander said in a separate interview in Johannesburg, South Africa.

It costs money to maintain servers and other infrastructure that allows both individuals and tech companies to "draw data from Wikipedia," said Iskander, who's stepping down on Jan. 20, and will be replaced by Bernadette Meehan.

The bulk of Wikipedia's funding comes from 8 million donors, most of them individuals.

"They're not donating in order to subsidize these huge AI companies," Wales said. They're saying, "You know what, actually you can't just smash our website. You have to sort of come in the right way."

Editors and users could benefit from AI in other ways. The Wikimedia Foundation has outlined an AI strategy that Wales said could result in tools that reduce tedious work for editors.

While AI isn't good enough to write Wikipedia entries from scratch, it could, for example, be used to update dead links by scanning the surrounding text and then searching online to find other sources.

"We don't have that yet but that's the kind of thing that I think we will see in the future."

Artificial intelligence could also improve the Wikipedia search experience, by evolving from the traditional keyword method to more of a chatbot style, Wales said.

"You can imagine a world where you can ask the Wikipedia search box a question and it will quote to you from Wikipedia," he said. It could respond by saying "here's the answer to your question from this article and here's the actual paragraph. That sounds really useful to me and so I think we'll move in that direction as well."

Reflecting on the early days, Wales said it was a thrilling time because many people were motivated to help build Wikipedia after he and co-founder Larry Sanger, who departed long ago, set it up as an experiment.

However, while some might look back wistfully on what seems now to be a more innocent time, Wales said those early days of the internet also had a dark side.

"People were pretty toxic back then as well. We didn't need algorithms to be mean to each other," he said. "But, you know, it was a time of great excitement and a real spirit

of possibility."

Wikipedia has lately found itself under fire from figures on the political right, who have dubbed the site "Wokepedia" and accused it of being biased in favour of the left.

Republican lawmakers in the US Congress are investigating alleged "manipulation efforts" in Wikipedia's editing process that they said could inject bias and undermine neutral points of view on its platform and the AI systems that rely on it.

A notable source of criticism is Musk, who last year launched his own AI-powered rival, Grokikipedia. He has criticized Wikipedia for being filled with "propaganda" and urged people to stop donating to the site.

Wales said he doesn't consider Grokikipedia a "real threat" to Wikipedia because it's based on large language models, which are the troves of online text that AI systems are trained on.

"Large language models aren't good enough to write really quality reference material. So a lot of it is just regurgitated Wikipedia," he said. "It often is quite rambling and sort of talks nonsense. And I think the more obscure topic you look into, the worse it is."

He stressed that he wasn't singling out criticism of Grokikipedia.

"It's just the way large language models work."

Wales say he's known Musk for years but they haven't been in touch since Grokikipedia launched.

"I should probably ping him," Wales said.

What would he say?

"How's your family?" I'm a nice person, I don't really want to pick a fight with anybody."

"At the start of the opening game I was struggling with my rhythm a bit and was lifting short and that allowed him to attack more. But then I started lifting the shuttle longer and focused on defending well and I think that turned the first game," Lakshya told reporters.

"In the second game, I knew I could not give him the



opportunity to keep playing his game, so mixed my speed and it worked."

The 24-year-old from Almora will next face Chinese Taipei's Lin Chun-Yi, who defeated Ireland's Nhat Nguyen 21-16, 21-17.

Earlier, Srikanth fought hard but went down 21-14, 17-21, 21-17 to France's Christo Popov, the reigning World Tour Finals champion. Prannoy also pushed his opponent close before losing 18-21, 21-19, 21-14 to eighth seed Loh Kean Yew of Singapore.

Malvika Bansod also went down 18-21 15-21 to China's fifth seed Han Yue in a women's singles match.

India's challenge in women's doubles also ended when Treasa Jolly and Gayatri Gopichand lost 22-20 22-24 21-23 against seventh seeds Li Yijing and Luo Xumin of China in a marathon match that lasted 84 minutes.



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
