Says it'll boost mobility, tourism, preserve cultural legacy

Srinagar, Jan 20: Lieutenant Governor Manoj Sinha on Tuesday inaugurated the redeveloped Amira Kadal Bridge in Srinagar, an iconic wooden structure revitalised under the Srinagar Smart City Project, to integrate the city's rich heritage with modern urban design.

Officials told the news agency-Kashmir News Corner (KNO), that the project, executed at a cost of rupees 7.70 crore, was launched in December 2023 with a strong focus on heritage conservation, structural safety and public convenience.

The redeveloped bridge, now pedestrian, connects Lal Chowk with adjoining markets and is designed as a vibrant cultural and recreational public space along the Jhelum riverfront.

Dedicating the bridge to the people of Srinagar, the Lieutenant Governor said the historically significant project aims to preserve the legacy while improving mobility and



quality of life.

"Our prime objective is to lift the quality of life to a new level with modern technology and inclusive design. We have made it a mission to protect the soul of every city while upgrading infrastructure. By preserving historic lanes, bridges, traditional

markets, lively squares and green spaces, we are weaving amenities into the cultural heartbeat of each city," the LG said.

He added that the renovation and upgradation of a city's infrastructure should serve as a bridge between heritage and

modern needs.

"A true smart city is never just about new infrastructure. It's about sparking a vibrant, efficient and inclusive way of living," Sinha said.

Met warns of landslides, gusty winds, urges caution

Srinagar, Jan 20: Minimum temperatures dropped across most parts of Jammu and Kashmir and Ladakh on Tuesday compared to the previous day, with several areas in the Kashmir Valley recording a sharp fall in night temperatures, according to data.

According to details obtained by the news agency - Kashmir News Observer (KNO), in the Kashmir region, Srinagar recorded a minimum of minus 3.4 degrees Celsius on Tuesday, down from minus 1.2 degrees Celsius on Monday. Srinagar Airport also saw a decline, settling at minus 4.4 degrees Celsius compared to minus 3.8 degrees Celsius a day earlier.

Palahgam registered a notable dip, with the mercury falling to minus 4.0 degrees Celsius from minus 1.8 degrees



Celsius on Monday.

Gulmarg recorded minus 5.5 degrees Celsius on Tuesday, compared to minus 3.5 degrees Celsius the previous day, while Sonamarg, however, showed a marginal improvement, rising to minus 6.2 degrees Celsius from Monday's minus 8.3 degrees Celsius. Anti-terror op in Kishtwar continues on third day

Budgam DLIC approves 1,769 HADP, 1,420 JKCI cases

BUDGAM, JANUARY 20: A meeting of the District Level Implementation Committee (DLIC) was held Tuesday under the chairmanship of Deputy Commissioner Budgam, Dr. Bilal Mohi-ud-din Bhat, to undertake a detailed review and accord approvals to eligible cases under the Holistic Agriculture Development Programme (HADP), Jammu and Kashmir Competitiveness Improvement in Agriculture and Allied Sectors Project (JKCIP), Integrated Sheep Development Scheme (ISDS) and Integrated Dairy Development Scheme (IDDS). During the meeting, the status of applications received, scrutinized and approved under each component was reviewed threadbare.

The DC, as per an official statement, emphasised that the objective of these schemes is to strengthen the rural economy, enhance farm incomes and create sustainable livelihood opportunities, and accordingly directed that approvals be processed with utmost transparency, accountability and adherence to prescribed guidelines.

While reviewing HADP, it was informed that a total of 5,233 applications have been approved under the Animal Husbandry Department so far, including 400 additional eligible cases approved in Tuesday's DLIC. Under the Agriculture Department, 16,803 cases stood approved, including 827 fresh cases approved in the meeting.

J&K Assembly Speaker addresses AIPOC 2026 in Lucknow Terms fairness and responsibility as hallmarks of legislative power

LUCKNOW, JANUARY 20: Speaker, Jammu and Kashmir Legislative Assembly, Abdul Rahim Rather, Tuesday addressed the 86th All India Presiding Officers Conference (AIPOC) 2026 at Lucknow, Uttar Pradesh.

Abdul Rahim Rather spoke on the "Accountability of the Legislature towards the people" to improve mechanisms for the legislature to be more responsive and accountable to citizens.

The Speaker, as per an official statement, while addressing the conference, mentioned verses from Manusmriti and Quran, saying that accountability of the Legislature towards the people had deep roots in ancient Indian democratic traditions, where Dharma guided governance and institutions like Sabha and Samiti ensured public participation.

Referring to Hindu scriptures, he called lawmakers as the servants of dharma, not masters of power. He said that Legislatures are accountable for the welfare and protection of people.

Similarly, in Islam, it is stated that the Legislators must exercise their power with fairness, honesty and responsibility towards the people they serve, the Speaker asserted.

"The Constitution envisions a Legislature that is transparent, responsive and answerable. It entrusts the Legislatures with immense responsibility to frame laws, oversee the Executive, approve public expenditure and provide a forum for debate and dissent" he added.

The Speaker further said that in a democracy, the Legislature is not merely an institution of lawmaking; it is the collective voice, conscience and custodian of the people's will.

Rather asserted that one of the primary ways Legislatures demonstrate accountability is through thoughtful, inclusive and



well-scrutinized legislation. "A House that debates with depth and dignity sends a powerful message that people's issues are being taken seriously and laws passed in haste, without adequate debate or stakeholder consultation, may erode public confidence" he said.

He also highlighted that public concern has grown over disruptions, disorders and declining decorum in Legislative chambers, while passionate disagreement is intrinsic to democracy and persistent disruption undermines public faith.

The Speaker stressed on another vital dimension of Legislative accountability which is effective oversight of the Executive.

"Questions, calling attention motions, committee deliberations and budgetary scrutiny are not procedural formalities; they are instruments through which the Legislature safeguards public interest" he exhorted.

The Speaker said that in the digital age, accountability also demands greater transparency and direct engagement with citizens. Live telecasts, open committee systems, accessible legislative records and use of technology can bridge the gap between the Legislature and the people, he asserted.

Secretary, J&K Legislative Assembly, Manoj Kumar Pandita also accompanied the Speaker at the conference.

Security tightened in Srinagar ahead of R-Day

Srinagar, Jan 20: With Republic Day around the corner, security agencies in Srinagar city have intensified vigilance across the city, conducting searches and a mock drill to ensure seamless and incident-free celebrations.

Officials said that large-scale searches were carried out in several areas including Takanwari, Karnabah, Shallbagh and Bakshipora on the outskirts of Srinagar.

Teams of Srinagar Police assisted by other security forces conducted thorough searches of residential houses, open fields and suspected areas as part of the heightened security measures ahead of January 26," an official said.

He added that the operations are part of routine area domination and preventive exercises aimed at

maintaining peace and thwarting any potential disruption during the national event.

Meanwhile, a mock drill was also held at Srinagar Railway Station to assess coordination and emergency response readiness among multiple agencies. The exercise witnessed participation from police, railway protection personnel and disaster response teams.

Officials said frisking and checking have been intensified at all major entry and exit points of the city, while additional checkpoints have been set up to monitor vehicular movement and maintain strict surveillance.

Security agencies have appealed to the public to extend cooperation during the checks and promptly report any suspicious movement or unattended objects to the nearest police station—(KNO)

Kashmir livestock traders face harassment for 47 days, 'Punjab government silent'

Srinagar, Jan 20: Nearly 47 days after a formal appeal from the Jammu and Kashmir government, allegations of extortion and harassment against livestock transporters at Punjab checkpoints remain unresolved.

At Shambhu and Madhopur checkpoints, traders report harassment, while the Punjab administration is yet to take any action against the matter.

The letter, sent from the office of J&K's Minister for Food, Civil Supplies, Transport, Science & Technology and ARI Trainings had requested for a government-level meeting between the two states to resolve the crisis affecting the interstate movement of livestock from Punjab to J&K.

General Secretary of the Kashmir Mutton Dealers Association, Mehraj-Ud-Din said, "Despite repeated representations, Punjab's silence demonstrates complete disregard for transporters and traders, who continue to be bled dry by extortionists at the checkpoints."

"Even after a formal government-to-government letter, there's total silence. Trucks carrying livestock are being stopped, bribes demanded and the trade is suffering. Is this how inter-state cooperation works?" he said.

The illegal levies and repeated harassment have driven mutton prices in Kashmir to Rs 750 per kilogram, while locals report the same rates at multiple places across the valley.

"If this continues, prices will rise further," Mehraj said.

The letter, as accessed by KNO, had proposed a meeting in Chandigarh between December 10-13, but no appointment was scheduled, no response was received and repeated reminders have gone unanswered.

Dr. Farooq labels PDP's proposal to split Chenab, Pir Panjal regions a 'Dixon Plan'

Jammu, Jan 20: A day after former Chief Minister and PDP president Mehbooba Mufti floated the idea of creating separate divisions for Chenab and Pir Panjal regions, former Chief Minister Dr. Farooq Abdullah on Tuesday termed it the Dixon Plan.

Talking to reporters the NC president said that the proposal floated by PDP president Mehbooba Mufti is an old plan, known as the Dixon Plan.

"It is the Dixon Plan. You might not know that. The Dixon Plan is an old proposal which envisaged the division of Jammu & Kashmir on the basis of the Chenab River, creating a Greater Kashmir on one side of the river and separating the other part," Farooq said when asked about Mehbooba Mufti's demand for the creation of separate divisions for the Chenab and Pir Panjal regions. The Dixon



Plan was proposed in 1950 by Sir Owen Dixon, an Australian jurist appointed by the United Nations.

The NC president said that they were against the separation of Ladakh from Jammu & Kashmir.

"What benefit did Ladakhis get from separation? Today, Ladakhis are seeking reunification with J&K and are saying that they don't want UT status. One day, Ladakh will reunite with J&K," he said, adding that there are many

people who want to break J&K, but they will never succeed in their designs.

He said the media is suffering from a phobia of Pakistan. "We should remember Vajayee ji and his words—that we can change friends but not neighbours," he said.

Farooq also slammed Mehbooba Mufti for questioning Omar Abdullah's government over unemployment.

"What did she do as Chief Minister? Her father was also Chief Minister. It is easy to point fingers at others, but she should remember that three fingers are also pointing back at her," he said.

On being asked about Leader of Opposition Sunil Sharma's recent remarks that the National Conference and PDP are trying to create disturbances in Kashmir, Farooq Abdullah said that it is they who create disturbances. "We have taken bullets for India," he added—(KNO)

'Dixon Plan' was NC's agenda: Mehbooba

Srinagar, Jan 20: Peoples Democratic Party (PDP) president Mehbooba Mufti on Tuesday clarified that the so-called "Dixon Plan" was never part of her party's vision. She said it was associated with the National Conference (NC) and its founder, Sheikh Mohammad Abdullah, who was jailed over it.

The NC patron, Dr Farooq Abdullah, earlier in the day, termed Mehbooba Mufti's idea of creating separate divisions for the Chenab and Pir Panjal regions as a "Dixon Plan". Addressing a press conference in Jammu, Mufti reminded Dr Abdullah of this history, criticising him for allegedly misrepresenting her remarks. "Farooq Sahab is our tallest leader; we respect him, but he forgot that his father, Sheikh Abdullah, was arrested over the Dixon Plan," Mehbooba said. "That (Dixon Plan) may have been NC's agenda, not ours. This can never be the agenda of Mufti Mohammad Sayeed's party," she said.



The PDP chief said her remarks regarding the creation of divisional administrations for Pir Panjal and Chenab Valley were purely administrative in nature. "Pir Panjal and Chenab are remote, sensitive regions facing environmental fragility, connectivity issues and recurring disasters. Giving them administrative empowerment is justice, not division," she said.

Criticising Dr Abdullah for "misinterpreting" her remarks, Mufti said, "I was expecting Farooq Sahab to speak against the summoning of journalists in Srinagar and them being made to sign bonds. Instead, he accused me of pursuing the Dixon Plan."

She accused the BJP and NC of double standards, saying that neither party raised objections when Jammu and Kashmir was bifurcated in 2019. "BJP already divided the state into two parts. You talk about their leader's trifurcation demand, yet Farooq Sahab remains silent. But when I talk about administrative convenience, it becomes an agenda," she said.

Reiterating her party's core policy, the former Chief Minister said, "The PDP has only one agenda of

Dry Jhelum: Time To Build A Water-Secure Future For Kashmir

The Jhelum River, the historic lifeblood of Kashmir, is sending a distress signal that can no longer be ignored. Recording its second consecutive year of critically low winter levels, with key tributaries like Yeshow Nallah running completely dry, this is a clear symptom of a structural climate crisis. The simultaneous depletion of countless springs across the Valley confirms a terrifying pattern: Kashmir's traditional water security, dependent on winter snowfall and glacial melt, is collapsing.

The reasons are stark. A fundamental shift in winter weather, characterised by a persistent deficit in snowfall and warmer temperatures, is crippling the natural recharge system. Reduced snowpack means less stored water for spring, while accelerated, premature melting offers only a fleeting surge, ultimately depleting the glacial reservoirs that ensure perennial flow. This is a present emergency, crippling drinking water schemes, threatening agriculture, and upending daily life for communities dependent on now-

dry springs. Addressing this crisis demands an immediate, multi-pronged response that moves beyond emergency water tankers. First, we must declare water conservation a state mission. This entails massive investments in watershed management, including the revival of traditional springs through aquifer recharge projects and the construction of small, decentralised check dams to slow runoff and replenish groundwater. Second, a climate-resilient agricultural policy is urgent. Promoting water-efficient crops and

micro-irrigation techniques is no longer optional but essential for food security. Third, robust glacier and hydrological monitoring systems must be established to provide accurate data for predictive planning. Ultimately, this is a call for a fundamental shift in mindset, from treating water as an infinite resource to valuing it as the finite, sacred commodity it is. Every citizen must become a water steward, practising strict conservation. The government must lead by enforcing sustainable usage, protecting wet-

lands that act as natural sponges, and investing in alternative sources like treated wastewater for non-potable uses. The Jhelum's declining flow is a warning written in water. Heeding it requires moving from panic to purposeful, collective action. We must build a water-secure future for Kashmir, not with temporary fixes, but with a comprehensive, science-backed strategy that honours and preserves our most precious lifeline. The time to act is now, before the wells and rivers run silent.

From Himalayan glaciers where oxygen roars, to river valleys where silence burns, the Border Roads Organisation leaves behind a signature of courage etched in asphalt, steel, and stone. To the soldier on the frontline, these are lifelines of defence; to the villager in a remote valley, they are bridges of hope.

Born on 7 May 1960, the Border Roads Organisation carries a simple yet stirring creed: "Shramena Sarvam Sadhyam" means "through hard work, all things are possible". Over six decades, this mantra has guided the BRO beyond the role of a construction agency, shaping it into a silent sentinel of India's frontiers.

Beyond India's borders, the BRO's footprint extends to Bhutan, Myanmar, Afghanistan and Tajikistan, where roads and airfields serve as instruments of regional connectivity and strategic cooperation. Landmarks such as the Delaram-Zaranj Highway in Afghanistan stand not merely as feats of engineering, but as enduring symbols of partnership and trust.

When disaster strikes, be it the 2004 tsunami, the Kashmir earthquake, or flash floods in Ladakh, the BRO is among the first to arrive, restoring broken lifelines and hope itself.

In the years 2024 and 2025, 356 infrastructure projects executed by the Border Roads Organisation (BRO) have been dedicated to the nation, setting a significant benchmark in the development of strategic border infrastructure. In recognition of BRO's vital contribution to national security and regional development, the government has increased its allocation from 6,500 crore in the Union Budget 2024-25 to 7,146 crore in the Union Budget 2025-26. In FY 2024-25, the Border Roads Organisation (BRO) achieved its highest-ever expenditure of 16,690 crore. Continuing this upward trajectory, an expenditure target of 17,900 crore has been set for FY 2025-26.

Today, the BRO stands as a living monument to the belief that the toughest terrains yield to the toughest spirit. It is more than an organisation, it is the quiet, steadfast architect of India's security and development at the nation's edges, where every milestone doubles as a marker of sovereignty.

BRO Panorama: Legacy and Scale
Established in 1960, the BRO is the Government of India's premier border infrastructure agency. It builds and maintains vital connectivity in remote and strategic regions. Since 2015-16, BRO is functioning fully under the Ministry of Defence. Earlier, it was partially under the Ministry of Road Transport and Highways.

At the core of BRO's achievements lies its people- a distinctive fusion of military precision and civilian craftsmanship. The organization is built upon the twin pillars of the General Reserve Engineer Force (GREF) and Indian Army engineer officers, supported by essential civilian personnel and Casual Paid Labourers (CPLs).

From its humble start with just two projects- Vartak in the East and Beacon in the North, BRO now commands 18 dynamic projects:

• 9 in North West India (J&K, Ladakh, Himachal Pradesh, Uttarakhand, Rajasthan)

• 8 in North East and Eastern India (Sikkim, Arunachal Pradesh, Nagaland, Mizoram, Meghalaya)

• One in Bhutan

Strategic Projects in Border States
BRO currently maintains 18 field Projects, each dedicated to engineering and executing strategic infrastructure across 11 States and 3 UTs. Large-scale roads, bridges, tunnels, and airfields, complemented by tele-medicine nodes, reinforcing both national security and socio-economic development under initiatives like Act East and Vibrant Villages Programme.

In Arunachal Pradesh, BRO projects such as Vartak, Arunank, Udayak, and Brahmank tackle some of India's most challenging frontiers, connecting remote villages to the Line of Actual Control (LAC) through critical



infrastructure including Sisseri Bridge, Siyom Bridge, Sela Tunnel, and Nechipu Tunnel.

In Ladakh, projects like Himank, Beacon, Deepak, Vijayak, and Yojak maintain vital lifelines to Kargil, Leh, and the Karakoram region, covering strategic routes such as the Srinagar-Leh highway, Darbuk-Shyok-DBO (DS-DBO) Road, Atal Tunnel, and the ongoing Shinku La Tunnel, ensuring all-weather connectivity.

The Northeast sees projects like Swastik in Sikkim, Pushpak in Mizoram, Setuk in Assam and Meghalaya, and Sewak in Nagaland and Manipur strengthening regional access. On the western borders, Sampark in Jammu and Chetak in Rajasthan enhance strategic connectivity.

Beyond the Himalayas, Shivalik ensures reliable access to the Char Dham Yatra in Uttarakhand, while Hirak extends connectivity into Left-Wing Extremism-affected areas of Chhattisgarh.

Finally, Dantak, BRO's overseas arm in Bhutan, reinforces bilateral ties through extensive road, bridge, and infrastructure development. Together, these initiatives exemplify BRO's unwavering commitment to national security, strategic preparedness, and regional development.

Critical BRO Infrastructure: Roads, Tunnels, Bridges & Airfields

The BRO has significantly accelerated the pace of infrastructure development across border States and Union Territories, delivering strategic assets that serve defence preparedness, socio-economic growth, disaster resilience, and neighborhood integration.

Roads

Over the five-year period from Financial Year 2020-21 to 2024-25, the Ministry of Defence has allocated approximately 23,625 crore to BRO for General Staff (GS) roads. This funding has enabled the construction of around 4,595 km of roads in forward areas. Significant progress has been made in improving connectivity, particularly along the Northern borders. In the FY 2024-25 alone, about 769 km of road construction has been completed.

Blacktopping the remote Hapoli-Sarli-Huri Road and advancing links toward the Line of Actual Control.

Ladakh: Project Vijayak has developed more than 1,000 km of roads and it ensures rapid restoration of critical routes such as Zojila Pass, providing year-round connectivity and enhancing both civilian access and troop mobility in challenging terrain.

Arunachal Pradesh / Tawang region: The Sela Tunnel, located at 13,000 ft, bypasses the high-altitude Sela Pass, ensuring uninterrupted, all-weather access to Tawang for both civilian and military movement.

Sikkim: Project Swastik has developed more than 1,000 km of roads and is planning new highways, including NH-310A/310AG, to ensure year-round connectivity, enhancing both civilian access and troop mobility in challenging terrain.

Arunachal Pradesh: Project Arunank, started in 2008, has constructed and maintained 1.18 km of major bridges in remote valleys and forward areas. The Siyom Bridge and Sisseri River Bridge further strengthens logistics and troop movement along the Line of Actual Control (LAC).

Ladakh: Project Vijayak has delivered and maintained over 80 major bridges across Ladakh, significantly improving year-round movement in high-altitude terrain. Notably, the Zojila Pass was rapidly reopened by BRO on 1 April 2025 after a record winter closure of just 32 days.

Sikkim: Project Swastik has built 80 major bridges, with 26 bridges completed in the last decade, ensuring year-round access despite natural challenges like floods and Glacial Lake Outburst Floods (GLOFs).

Jammu & Kashmir: The 422.9 m Devak Bridge, constructed under BRO's Project Sampark, strengthens a vital road linkage, enhancing troop movement, heavy vehicle transit, and regional connectivity. It was inaugurated as part of 90 BRO projects in September 2023.

North Sikkim: By April 2024, as part of Project Swastik, BRO restored six key bridges damaged by heavy rains and flash floods, re-establishing vital lifelines and ensuring continued civilian and strategic movement in the high-altitude region.

Tunnels

Himachal Pradesh: The Atal Tunnel, a 9.02-km highway tunnel under Rohtang Pass and the world's longest highway tunnel above 10,000 ft, was inaugurated by Prime Minister Narendra Modi, enabling all-weather Leh-Manali connectivity.

Arunachal Pradesh: The 500-metre Nechipu Tunnel bypasses the Nechipu Pass, a fog-prone section on the Balipara-Charduar-Tawang route, ensuring safer, faster, all-weather transit and enhancing both local connectivity and strategic military logistics.

Arunachal Pradesh / Tawang region: The Sela Tunnel, located at 13,000 ft, bypasses the high-altitude Sela Pass, ensuring uninterrupted, all-weather access to Tawang for both civilian and military movement.

Ladakh: The Shyok Tunnel on the Darbuk-Shyok-Daulat Beg Oldi Road, a 920-metre tunnel, delivers reliable year-round access in extremely challenging terrain.

In 2025, the Border Roads Organisation (BRO) continued to expand strategic road, bridges and tunnel connectivity across India's frontier regions, enhancing all-weather access crucial for both defence and civilian movement.

Airfields West Bengal: On 12 September 2023, as part of 90 BRO infrastructure projects dedicated to the nation by Raksha Mantri Shri Rajnath Singh, the Bagdogra and Barrackpore airfields were reconstructed.

September 2023: The works, costing over 500 crore, were undertaken to enhance Indian Air Force operational readiness, dual-use civilian connectivity, and strategic capability in the eastern sector.

BRO in Disaster Response

Beyond building roads, the Border Roads Organisation is often India's first line of defence against disasters. From the Himalayas to the North East and the Andaman & Nicobar Islands, its teams restore lifelines when calamity strikes.

Road Opening Parties, avalanche detachments, and bridge units work round the clock to clear landslides, rebuild washed-away bridges, and reopen mountain passes after cloudbursts, flash floods, or earthquakes.

By integrating Humanitarian Assistance and Disaster Relief (HADR) into its operational doctrine, the BRO embodies a dual mandate, safeguarding national security while ensuring civil resilience.

BRO: Enabling Fast and Effective Relief

Road Clearance & Snow Management

Every winter, mountains shut their doors. And every spring, the Border Roads Organisation forces them open. From Zoji La to Rohtang and Sela, its teams cut through towering walls of snow, bringing back lifelines for soldiers, rescue teams, and civilians.

In 2023, BRO made history when Zoji La was cleared on 16 March - just 68 days after closure, the fastest ever. Each pass reopened is more than a road. It is access to safety, supplies, and survival.

Bailey/Modular Bridges & Causeways

When floods wash away connectivity, the Border Roads Organisation builds new ones.

Class-70 Bailey bridges and modular spans built within days, reconnecting villages to hope and help. In 2021, when the Rishiganga floods swept away Reini's bridge, BRO restored access in just 26 days with a 200-foot Bailey bridge, aptly named the Bridge of Compassion. From Uttarakhand to Assam, these instant bridges carry more than supplies. They carry survival itself.

Emergency Air Logistics

BRO by restoring access to Advanced Landing Grounds and helipads, enables the Indian Air Force to fly in relief and fly out the injured. From Pasighat, Along, and Mechuka in the Northeast to Harsil and Gauchar in flood-hit Uttarakhand, BRO has kept the skies open when the ground was broken.

Inter-Agency Coordination

The Border Roads Organisation works with the Army, Air Force, NDRF, and state agencies. Its Road Opening Parties act as the spearhead, clearing paths for troops, relief teams, and supplies.

Regional and Neighborhood Connectivity

The BRO has played a pivotal role in strengthening India's regional outreach through the execution of critical overseas infrastructure projects.

Bhutan: BRO's oldest and most enduring mission, Project DANTAK, launched in 1961, has shaped Bhutan's modern connectivity. Project DANTAK has built bridges, developed key airports such as Paro and Yonphula, and supported telecom networks and hydro-power infrastructure, contributing directly to Bhutan's socio-economic development and symbolizing the deep Indo-Bhutan partnership.

Myanmar / Southeast Asia: BRO has advanced regional integration through projects such as the 160 km India-Myanmar Friendship Road, inaugurated in 2001, connecting Moreh in India to Tamu and Kalewa in Myanmar.

Afghanistan: BRO constructed the 218 km Delaram-Zaranj Highway (Route 606), providing Afghanistan with direct access to Iran and the Port of Chabahar. This project enhanced regional trade options and demonstrated India's commitment to development-led diplomacy.

Tajikistan: BRO undertook strategic reconstruction at the Farkhor and Ayni air bases, including runway expansion, air traffic control systems, hangars, and navigational upgrades, strengthening India's strategic reach and reinforcing its role as a trusted regional partner.

These projects strengthened India's strategic reach and reinforced its role as a trusted partner in regional connectivity and cooperation.

BRO Moving Forward

Under BRO's perspective plan, 470 roads covering about 27,300 km are planned in border areas. The Trans-Kashmir Connectivity project, spanning about 717 km, has been approved for development to NHDL (paved shoulders) standards. The alignment will run from Poonch to Sonamarg, strengthening strategic road infrastructure across key mountain passes. Tunnels are planned at Sadhna Pass, P Gali, Z Gali, and Razdhan Pass to ensure all-weather connectivity. The project will be executed phase-wise by the BRO, with funding from MoD (GS). Once completed, it will significantly enhance forward connectivity, improve inter-sector movement, and strengthen inter-valley linkages. Overall, the project will play a critical role in boosting operational preparedness and long-term regional integration.

Conclusion

For over six decades, the Border Roads Organisation has exemplified resilience, innovation, and nation-building. Operating in some of the world's toughest terrains, from the icy passes of Ladakh to the dense forests of the Northeast, BRO delivers infrastructure that strengthens India's defence preparedness while transforming lives in remote border regions.

As it moves ahead, BRO will continue to build not just roads, but confidence and connectivity, binding the nation's frontiers with its heartland and ensuring security, mobility, and prosperity reach the last mile. True to its ethos, BRO will always find a way or make one.

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J&K Bank Net Profit jumps over 10% YoY for Q3

Our performance underscores our strong fundamentals: MD & CEO

Srinagar, January 20: J&K Bank on Tuesday announced healthy financial results for the October-December quarter (Q3 FY 25-26), with net profit rising by 18.7% Quarter-on-Quarter and 10.4% year-on-year (YoY) to Rs 586.73 Cr when compared to Rs 531.51 Cr recorded during the same period last fiscal.

The Bank's Board of Directors, as per an official statement, approved the numbers for the quarter and nine-months during a meeting held at the Bank's Divisional Office in Jammu.

Meanwhile, the Bank's net profit for the first nine months of current financial year grew 4.5% YoY to Rs 1565.68 Cr as against Rs 1497.92 Cr recorded for the same period last year, reflecting its sustained growth trajectory.

Operating Highlights

The Bank's Net Interest Margin (NIM) for the quarter has improved to 3.62%, up by 6 bps QoQ. Cost-to-Income Ratio of the Bank improved to 55.88% YoY for the quarter from 57.28%, while as Return on Assets (RoA) for nine-months stood at 1.23%.

The Bank's operating metrics

reflected steady growth, as the Net Interest Income (NII) witnessed 3.8% growth QoQ to Rs 1488.88 Cr, while the Other Income for the quarter surged 15.3% YoY to Rs 279.46 Cr from Rs 242.32 Cr recorded last financial year. The Bank's Cost of Deposits also declined to 4.69% QoQ from 4.86%.

Commenting upon operating performance, MD & CEO Amitava Chatterjee said, "Despite rate cut, impairment provisioning for Grameen Bank and challenging conditions - particularly the events of April 22, their subsequent impact, and the floods that disrupted the local economy - the Bank remains firmly on track to deliver record profits for the fourth consecutive year."

"Characterized by robust top-line growth and better asset quality, overall our Q3 performance underscores our strong fundamentals, disciplined execution, and sustained operational efficiency," MD & CEO added.

Asset Quality

The Bank's Gross NPA ratio declined YoY to 3.00%, down by 10 basis points (bps) from 4.08%, while as the Net NPA reduced by 26 bps YoY to 0.68%

from 0.94% and 8 bps QoQ from 0.76%. The Provision Coverage Ratio (PCR) for the quarter is above 90% at 90.46%.

In his comments on asset quality, MD & CEO Amitava Chatterjee remarked, "Even as our core geography has navigated significant challenges extending beyond the banking sector, the Bank's asset quality has continued to improve steadily. Supported by robust risk management practices, Gross NPAs have declined from around 4 percent to 3.00% percent, which is almost in line with our stated annual guidance."

"The sustained improvement in asset quality despite such disturbances speaks volumes about the resilience and commitment of borrowers and the underlying robustness of the local economy", he added.

Business Growth

Maintaining strong business momentum during the third quarter of the current financial year, the Bank recorded a robust YoY growth of 17.3% in gross advances and a healthy YoY growth of 10.6% in deposits. As on December 31, 2025, the Bank's gross Advances surged to



Rs 116248 Cr while total deposits reached Rs 155861 Cr.

Commenting on the business growth, MD & CEO Amitava Chatterjee said, "Delivering over 17% year-on-year growth in advances - well ahead of the guidance we had shared with the market - reflects the strength of our franchise, the effectiveness of our credit strategy and the meticulous execution by our

teams on the ground. Double-digit growth of deposits in a competitive environment also highlights the trust reposed in the Bank by our customers."

"The accelerated advances growth was driven by focused expansion in retail, MSME, agriculture and select corporate portfolios, supported by improved credit appetite and strengthened customer

engagement across both core and emerging geographies. Our consistent focus on deepening relationships within JKL and beyond, improving product penetration and enhancing service delivery continues to support stable balance-sheet expansion", he added.

Capital Adequacy

The Bank's Capital Adequacy Ratio (CAR) under Basel III stood at 15%.

Regarding capital position, MD & CEO remarked, "With our CAR at 15% - which will be further augmented by internal accruals on account of net profit for current fiscal - we are well capitalized to expand our lending operations as per our business plan. Moreover, the board approved capital raise of Rs 1250 Cr will boost our capital adequacy and cushion us comfortably to support calibrated business expansion across key sectors."

"It will enhance our ability to absorb risk, while reinforcing our long-term focus on sustaining asset quality, improving profitability and creating enduring value for our shareholders", he added.

Key Initiatives

Highlighting the Bank's key

initiatives during the CFY so far, MD & CEO Amitava Chatterjee remarked, "During these quarters, we remained steadfast in supporting our customers, particularly through initiatives such as the 2025 Rehabilitation Package for disturbance-affected borrowers, which provided extended repayment timelines and additional credit support. This underscores our role as a responsible institution committed to sustaining livelihoods and economic activity in our core operational geographies."

Terming digital transformation as central to the Bank's strategy, he further added, "Simultaneously, we accelerated our digital transformation with the launch of several customer-focused innovations to strengthen customer experience, improve security and efficiency, and position the Bank for sustained, technology-led growth."

On the occasion, MD & CEO Amitava Chatterjee extended heartfelt gratitude to the customers and stakeholders - especially the promoters - for their unwavering trust and continued support besides entire Bank staff for their steadfast dedication.

DC Kupwara reviews road safety measures

Orders crackdown on traffic violations

KUPWARA, JANUARY 20: Deputy Commissioner Kupwara, Shrikant Suse, Tuesday convened a meeting of the District Road Safety Committee (DRSC) to comprehensively review the implementation of road safety measures and traffic regulation across the district.

The Deputy Commissioner, as per an official statement, underscored that road safety is a matter of paramount importance, directly concerning the protection of human lives. He exhorted all stakeholders to take all necessary measures in ensuring safer roads in addition to cooperation from general public by adhering strictly to traffic rules and regulations. He directed the enforcement agencies to intensify on-ground regulation and adopt stringent measures against violators in order to minimize the occurrence of road accidents.

During the deliberations, discussions held regarding analysis of road accidents and subsequent measures taken for avoiding future occurrence. The DC also directed strong action restricting under-age and



teenage driving. He emphasized the need for timely disbursement of compensation to injured persons and to the next of kin of deceased victims of road accidents.

Directions were also issued for strengthening emergency medical evacuation protocols, including adequate deployment of ambulances across accident-prone stretches to provide immediate medical assistance and readiness of health institutions.

Multi-dimensional committee was directed to conduct a comprehensive audit of school buses to ensure compliance with safety standards and regulations, while the ARTO Kupwara was directed to carry out regular inspections of driving schools to verify adherence to prescribed norms and training standards. The Public Works Department, PMGSY and BEACON authorities were instructed to conduct road safety audit on regular basis

particularly on hilly roads and highways. Progress made on identification of black spots and rectify corrective measures was also discussed.

In addition, ARTO and Traffic Police, in coordination with the Chief Education Officer, will conduct extensive road safety awareness campaigns in schools during upcoming academic sessions.

The Public Works Department was further directed to undertake curve improvements on major roads, particularly in hilly areas and to ensure timely patching and repair of both main and inner roads throughout the district to facilitate smooth movement of vehicles. BEACON authorities were asked to install appropriate signages on their roads especially at blind curves. He also directed Beacon authorities to ensure all safety norms during ongoing NH-701 works to avoid accidents.

Chief Secy assesses progress of ₹7,000 cr NABARD funded RIDF works across depts

Jammu, Jan 20: Chief Secretary, Atal Dulloo, on Tuesday chaired a meeting of the High Powered Committee (HPC) of NABARD to review the progress and achievements under various tranches of the Rural Infrastructure Development Fund (RIDF) and to assess new projects proposed under RIDF XXXI (2025-26) across Jammu and Kashmir.

The meeting was attended by Additional Chief Secretary, Agriculture Production Department; Additional Chief Secretary, Public Works (R&B); Principal Secretary, Finance; Director General, Resources; Chief General Manager, NABARD; and senior officers from Health, Jal Shakti and other concerned departments.

During the meeting, the Chief Secretary undertook a department-wise appraisal of ongoing RIDF projects and emphasized the need for timely completion of works sanctioned under RIDF XXVI and XXVII, which are nearing their final implementation phase. He impressed upon all executing agencies to adhere strictly to stipulated timelines and accord priority to projects showing satisfactory progress.

Stressing the importance of seamless fund flow, the Chief



Secretary directed departments to expeditiously secure the remaining tranches from NABARD to ensure successful completion of ongoing programmes. He cautioned against delays and carrying over of liabilities, noting that such lapses could place an additional burden on the normal Capex budgets of departments.

The Chief Secretary also advised departments to upload RIDF projects on the PM Gati Shakti portal to facilitate effective monitoring and utility analysis. He further enjoined upon the concerned departments to identify and finalize new projects proposed under RIDF XXXI well before the end of February 2026.

Principal Secretary, Finance, Santosh D. Vaidya, briefed the Committee on the overall expenditure and physical

progress of projects under various RIDF tranches. He highlighted the need to further enhance expenditure efficiency to maximize developmental outcomes, pointing out that every department has scope for improvement.

Presenting expenditure trends since 2022-23, the Principal Secretary noted a steady increase in utilization, with overall expenditure rising from about 56% in 2022-23 to 76% in 2024-25. He urged departments to maintain and further improve this momentum during the current financial year. He informed that against an expenditure of 1,024 Cr in 2024-25, an allocation of 1,816 Cr has been made this year for completion of ongoing projects.

Giving a detailed overview, Director General, Resources,

M.Y. Itoo, informed the Committee that a total of 1,426 projects worth 6,981 Cr had been sanctioned under RIDF XXVI to XXX. Of these, about 35% of the loan amount has been expended so far, with 333 projects already completed across the Union Territory.

The sanctioned projects include 1,145 projects of the Public Works Department (R&B) worth 5,249 Cr; 90 projects of the Jal Shakti Department worth 740 Cr; 104 projects of the Agriculture Department worth 517 Cr; 22 projects of the Horticulture Department worth 145 Cr; 45 projects of the Animal and Sheep Husbandry Department worth 203 Cr; and 20 projects of the Health Department worth 127 Cr.

Regarding RIDF XXXI, it was informed that 139 projects amounting to 381 Cr had already been sanctioned, while another 40 projects worth 227 Cr are under process for sanctioning at NABARD.

The Chief Secretary also underscored the importance of timely submission of Project Completion Certificates (PCCs) and Project Completion Reports (PCRs) for completed works to facilitate the release of additional funds and enable approval of new projects.

Secy RDD reviews SASCI, SNA-SPARSH implementation

Calls for fast-tracking projects to maximise rural impact

Jammu, Jan 20: Secretary, Rural Development Department (RDD) and Panchayati Raj, Mohammad Ajiaz Asad, on Tuesday chaired a review meeting to assess the progress of projects funded under the Special Assistance to States for Capital Investment (SASCI) and implementation of SNA-SPARSH across Jammu and Kashmir.

The Secretary undertook a division-wise and project-wise review, appreciating the efforts of executing agencies while stressing strict adherence to timelines. He underscored that SASCI projects are critical investments aimed at strengthening rural infrastructure, local governance, and community welfare.

"Our priority is timely completion of these projects to unlock their full economic potential. Every rupee must be optimally utilised, and bottlenecks resolved on priority," Secretary said.

While reviewing SASCI, he informed that loan assistance of 21.10 crore has been sanctioned for RDD projects in both divisions. He highlighted Finance Department directives

requiring utilisation of at least 75 percent of the sanctioned amount, with non-viable projects to be surrendered for reallocation. Departments must demonstrate the capacity to incur a minimum expenditure of 2 crore during the financial year, failing which funds may be withdrawn.

In the Kashmir Division, four major infrastructure projects have been sanctioned, including residential accommodation for PRIs/Protected Persons at Bandipora and 2-BHK residential apartments with dormitory for BDC at Pulwama.

The DDC Office Building at Baramulla has completed structural works, with electrical installations underway, and is targeted for completion by March 2026.

In the Jammu Division, six projects have been approved under SASCI, including construction of the DDC Building at Kishtwar and 2-BHK residential accommodation for DDC/PRI members at Jammu, Birwan (Udhampur), Kambal Danga (Reasi), Kathua, and Poonch.

To ensure smooth execution, the Secretary directed concerned agencies to expedite pending works, resolve land

and DPR-related issues, and maintain close coordination with the Finance Department for timely re-appropriation of funds to avoid lapsing of savings.

Reviewing the status of SNA-SPARSH for 2025-26, it was informed that out of 13 CSS/SLS schemes onboarded, mother sanctions have been received for 11 schemes, while two are pending.

The Secretary stressed close monitoring to ensure seamless fund flow and directed officers to expedite pending sanctions, bill processing, system integration, FTO generation, and DSC enrolment.

He emphasised that efficient financial management and real-time expenditure tracking are essential to ensure transparency and effective delivery of development outcomes at the grassroots level.

The meeting was attended by DG Rural Sanitation Anu Malhotra; Directors RDD Kashmir and Jammu; Director Finance; COO Himayat; Joint Director Planning; Additional Secretary RDD&PR; Chief Engineer PW(R&B); Superintending Engineers REW Jammu/Kashmir; and other senior officers.

Greenland, threat of Trump tariffs loom over Davos

Davos, Jan 20: The annual meeting of The World Economic Forum attracts corporate executives, academics, philanthropists and media to the Swiss Alps town of Davos for dialogue, debate and deal-making.

The Geneva-based think tank first hosted the event in 1971 with the goal to improve European management. Beginning Tuesday, 850 CEOs and chairs of the world's top companies are expected to be among 3,000 participants from 130 countries in the Alpine resort through Friday.

US President Donald Trump's third visit to Davos as

president comes as US allies worry about his ambition to take over Greenland, Latin America grapples with his efforts to reap Venezuela's oil and business leaders and lawmakers at home express concerns about his hardball tactics toward Federal Reserve Chair Jerome Powell.

Here is the latest:

Zelenskyy won't travel to Davos unless there's a breakthrough in peace efforts

Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy says he currently has no plans to travel to Davos, as he works with officials to restore power in the country after repeated Russian drone and missile barrages.

But Zelenskyy said Tuesday he

could change his plans if his delegation and US officials make a breakthrough at Davos in peace efforts aimed at ending the war.

"I choose the country over an economic forum. But everything can change at any moment, because it is very important to me, and to Ukrainians, to end this war," he said.

Russia's full-scale invasion reaches its fourth anniversary on Feb 24.

US House speaker seeks to 'calm the waters' over Greenland

US House of Representatives Speaker Mike Johnson says he hopes to "calm the waters" as Trump roils the trans-Atlantic relationship with his desire to take over Greenland.

In a speech to lawmakers at

Parliament, Johnson said the US and the UK "have always been able to work through our differences calmly, as friends. We will continue to do that".

Speaking after Trump also attacked Britain's decision to hand over the Chagos Islands to Mauritius, Johnson said his mission in London is to "calm the waters... continue our dialogue and find a resolution, just as we always have in the past".

Johnson was invited to Parliament by House of Commons Speaker Lindsay Hoyle as part of events marking 250 years of American independence.

Kremlin confirms its envoy will meet with US representatives in Davos

Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov on Tuesday confirmed presidential envoy Kirill Dmitriev "has plans to meet with some representatives of the American delegation" in Davos.

Peskov's remarks followed media reports saying Dmitriev intends to meet with US envoy Steve Witkoff and President Donald Trump's son-in-law Jared Kushner as part of the US-led effort to end the nearly four-year war in Ukraine.

Peskov refused to name specific people Dmitriev is planning to meet in Davos, saying only that it will happen "on the sidelines" of the forum "these days, today, tomorrow".

Dmitriev earlier on Tuesday

said on social media platform X that he arrived in Davos.

Asked about whether ending the war in Ukraine or other issues were on Dmitriev's agenda, Peskov said Dmitriev's main focus is "trade, economic, and investment cooperation," but "at the same time, Kirill Dmitriev is transmitting information to and from both sides regarding the peace process in Ukraine."

Separately, the Kremlin spokesman said Russia has not received an invitation to a meeting in Paris on Thursday, which was referenced in a text message from French President Emmanuel Macron that Trump posted earlier Tuesday.

In the message, Macron suggested a meeting of members of

the Group of Seven industrialised democracies in Paris after the Davos gathering. The message also suggested inviting Denmark, Ukraine and Russia.

treatment centres is increasing, doctors stressed that this represents only a fraction of the actual problem.

"Those who come to us are just the tip of the iceberg," they said, pointing out that social stigma and fear of judgment prevent a large number of addicts from seeking professional help.

"Despite repeated efforts to project addiction as a medical condition rather than a moral failing, stigma continues to dominate societal attitudes," doctors said. "Many families prefer silence over treatment, which often worsens the condition."

They added that although the availability of drugs has shown some decline due to enforcement measures, "much more needs to be done to cut supply chains and address demand through education and awareness."

Health experts emphasised the role of families in the recovery process. "Family support is not optional—it is essential," doctors said. "Patients who receive emotional, psychological and moral backing from their families show far better recovery outcomes."

"The reassurance that they are not alone, that their families believe in them, often becomes the strongest motivation to quit drugs," they added, urging parents to remain vigilant, engage openly with their children and educate them about the dangers of substance abuse.

Doctors appealed to society at large to adopt a more compassionate approach. "Addiction should be viewed through the lens of empathy, not judgment. Only then will affected individuals feel safe enough to seek help without fear of social exclusion," they said.

Experts called for establishing Indoor Patient Department (IPD) facilities in every district, stating that many severe cases require supervised detoxification and round-the-clock medical care, which is currently unavailable in some districts.

"There is also an urgent need to launch large-scale awareness campaigns, especially in schools and colleges," doctors said, stressing that teachers and educational institutions must be actively involved in identifying early signs of substance abuse and guiding students toward counselling and treatment.

"With better infrastructure, manpower and outreach, ATC centres can significantly scale up their impact," experts said.

The gravity of the drug abuse crisis in Jammu and Kashmir can be understood by the report of the Standing Committee on Social Justice and Empowerment, which estimates that there are around 14 lakh drug abusers, with over 5 lakh people in the Union Territory using opioids, including 95,000 children in the 10-17 age group.

According to the report, among 1,68,700 minor drug abusers, around 95,000 use opioids,

46,000 inhalants, 19,000 sedatives, 8,000 cannabis, while smaller numbers use cocaine, amphetamines and hallucinogens.

The report also estimates 11.8 lakh adult drug abusers (18-75 years), with 4.47 lakh opioid users, 3.54 lakh alcohol users, 1.51 lakh sedative users, 1.36 lakh cannabis users, and significant numbers abusing inhalants and other substances.

Despite the grim statistics, doctors believe addiction treatment centres represent a crucial turning point in Kashmir's fight against drugs. "These centres are proof that recovery is possible," they said. "With community cooperation, family involvement and stronger government support, they can truly transform lives and safeguard the future of our youth." (KNO)

In a post on X, the White Knight Corps said, "The #GOC, White Knight Corps and all ranks pay solemn tribute to Havildar Gajendra Singh of the Special Forces, who made the supreme sacrifice while gallantly executing a Counter Terrorism operation in the Singhpura area during the ongoing Operation TRASHI-I on the intervening night of 18-19 Jan 2026."

"We honour his indomitable courage, valour and selfless devotion to duty and stand firmly with the bereaved family in this hour of profound grief," the post further read. (KNO)

Nitin Nabin takes over as BJP president

New Delhi, Jan 20: Nitin Nabin was on Tuesday formally declared as the BJP national president, succeeding J P Nadda and beginning a new chapter for the party as it seeks to tighten its grip on politics in the country.

K Laxman, Returning Officer for BJP organisational polls, declared the results of the organisational elections and handed over the certificate of election to 45-year-old Nabin, the youngest ever to occupy the top party post. Prime Minister Narendra

Modi, Nadda, senior ministers Rajnath Singh, Amit Shah, Nitin Gadkari, among others, were present at the BJP headquarters to witness the leadership transition. Nabin became the 12th president of the BJP, which was founded in 1980, the same year he was born. The low-profile and unassuming Nabin had resigned as the minister for law and justice, urban development and housing in the Bihar government after he was appointed working president of the BJP on December 14.

"This election shows that in

the BJP, leadership rises from hard work and dedication, not from dynastic privilege," Laxman said, announcing the outcome of the elections. "Today is a very historic occasion, when our young, energetic, and talented Nitin Nabin is taking charge as the National President of the world's largest political party, the BJP. I extend my heartfelt congratulations to him on my behalf and on behalf of crores of workers," Nadda said, addressing the gathering.

Celebrations erupt in Bihar

Patna, Jan 20: Celebrations erupted across Bihar on Tuesday upon Nitin Nabin assuming charge as the BJP national president, the first instance of a son of the soil making it to the top party post. Nabin, 45, a fifth-term MLA from Bankipore assembly constituency falling in the state capital, is the youngest leader to head what is described as "the biggest political party in the world".

Gigantic digital boards, for live streaming of the function in Delhi where Nabin took charge, were put up at three places in the state capital, 3 Taylor Road, the government bungalow he was allotted in Bihar while a minister in the state, besides Maurya Lok and New Market, both vantage points in his assembly constituency.

Party workers danced to drum beats, lit earthen lamps and distributed sweets to express their elation.

A female party worker said, "There are no bounds to our happiness. Today is our holi, diwali and dussehra. There could have been no better day for all Biharis."

AI guides to smart parking: Tech-driven traffic plan to steer Republic Day crowd to Kartavya Path

New Delhi, Jan 20: In a first, the traffic police has prepared detailed animated videos with the help of Artificial Intelligence (AI), depicting the arrival, alighting, departure and parking plans for invitees. Officials said the videos are aimed at familiarising visitors with the movement and parking arrangements well in advance.

The help desks will be located at Moti Lal Nehru Place roundabout, Sunehri Masjid roundabout, Man Singh roundabout, Jaswant Singh roundabout, GPO roundabout, Windsor Place roundabout, Mandi House roundabout, Q-point, Teen Murti roundabout, Crossing Janpath/ Dr Rajendra Prasad Road, Gate number 14 of Jawahar Lal Nehru Stadium and Palika Parking, they added.

The videos are available on the Ministry of Defence website and can also be accessed through the QR code-based parking system issued to invitees. They explain in detail how arrival, alighting and parking will be managed on the day of the event, a senior police officer told PTI.

The parking management system covers 22 designated parking lots and has been designed to accommodate around 8,000 vehicles. Every year, nearly 77,000 passes are issued to spectators for the Republic Day parade, of which about 8,000 are earmarked for those arriving by private vehicles, the police said.

Another first this year is the introduction of shuttle services for security personnel deployed for Republic Day arrangements. Shuttles will operate from four locations—Khan Market, Amrita Sher-Gil Marg, Patel Chowk Metro Station and HC Mathur Lane—to ferry personnel to their respective destinations. The shuttles will run at a frequency of 10 minutes, he said.

In August 2025, the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Education presented a report that called on Parliament to pass a law mandating reservations for scheduled caste, scheduled tribe, and other backward classes in private higher educational institutions, he said.

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EU leaders take stage in Davos as Trump rocks global order

Davos, Jan 20: European leaders take the stage on Tuesday ahead of Donald Trump at the gathering of global elites in Davos, as the US president dangles tariff threats in a bid to pressure the EU over Greenland.

Trump is set to dominate the week at the Swiss ski resort, with a US delegation already on the ground to promote an American agenda that has unsettled the global order cherished by the World Economic Forum (WEF).

European Union chief Ursula von der Leyen and French President Emmanuel Macron will address the forum on Tuesday, along with Chinese Vice Premier He Lifeng and Canadian Prime Minister Mark Carney, whose countries have their own disputes with Trump.

Trump will deliver a speech on Wednesday and participate in other events on Thursday.

Europe is weighing countermeasures after Trump threatened to impose tariffs on eight European countries over the Greenland standoff.

The US president said he did not think European leaders would "push back too much"



on his attempt to buy the vast Arctic island, telling reporters on Monday: "They have to have this done. They can't protect it."

Trump has flagged wanting to protect Greenland from perceived Russian and Chinese threats as a key justification for taking over the strategically-located territory, though analysts suggest Beijing is a small player in the region.

US Treasury Secretary Scott Bessent, who is leading the US contingent in Davos, warned that EU retaliation "would be very unwise." Von der Leyen met with

Trump's relations with Macron hit a new low Monday when the US president threatened 200 percent tariffs on French wine over France's intention to decline an invitation to join his "Board of Peace."

Analysts have likened the board aimed at resolving international conflicts to a pay-to-play version of the UN Security Council — and Trump confirmed Monday that Russian President Vladimir Putin was one of various world leaders invited to join.

European Union leaders will hold an emergency summit in Brussels on Thursday to discuss their response to the Greenland crisis, one of the gravest in years to hit transatlantic ties.

At a news conference in Davos, Finland's President Alexander Stubb said "tariff threats at the allied level are unacceptable. They weaken our transatlantic relationship and, in the worst case, can lead to a vicious cycle."

When asked if the United States might use force, Stubb said: "I don't believe that the United States will take control of Greenland militarily."

Denmark has proposed that NATO start surveillance

operations in Greenland to confront security concerns.

Other prominent foreign leaders addressing the WEF on Tuesday include Carney, who has sought to reduce his country's reliance on the United States as Trump has raised tariffs on Canadian products.

As US ties fray, Carney turned the page on years of diplomatic tensions with China during a visit to Beijing last week, securing a preliminary trade agreement to reduce tariffs.

Chinese Vice Premier He Lifeng, whose country has had long-running trade spats with Trump, will also address the WEF.

Other flashpoints on the WEF agenda include the crises in Venezuela, Gaza, Ukraine and Iran.

The United States has sent an unusually large delegation to Davos, in a sign that it wants to make its presence felt at the gathering for global economic and political leaders.

Bessent and other US officials will attend panels at the forum's congress center but also at the "USA House," a venue inside an old church on the glitzy promenade of the mountain retreat.

impose, Frederiksen said a trade war would cost jobs on both sides of the Atlantic. "As much as we must warn against it, we must also prepare for it," she said.

In a social media post over the weekend, Trump said the United States would impose a 10 per cent tariff from Feb 1 on goods from eight European countries opposing his ambition to control Greenland. He warned the tariff rate would rise to 25 per cent on June 1 and remain in place until a deal is reached for the "complete and total purchase" of Greenland.

Sports Ministry showcauses AIU for admin deficiencies, lapses at World University Games



New Delhi, Jan 20: Pointing out administrative deficiencies afflicting university-level sport in the country, the Sports Ministry has issued a show cause notice to the Association of Indian Universities (AIU), saying the body has failed to carry out its duties related to athlete development and planning.

The AIU had drawn severe criticism during last year's World University Games in Rhine-Ruhr, Germany where six of the 12 badminton players in the contingent were barred from participating due to an alleged administrative lapse.

Officials failed to submit all names correctly during the managers' meeting causing a massive furore as the affected players called it "career sabotage due to AIU mismanagement".

"Athlete discomfort will not be tolerated at any level. Sports Minister Mansukh Mandaviya is very clear that such lapses would



have consequences," a well-placed source told PTI.

The AIU, which is the nodal body for university-level sports in the country, formed an inquiry committee which admitted to the botched handling of the Games entries and suspended its joint secretary Baljit Singh Sekhon, who had travelled with the contingent.

AIU secretary Dr Pankaj Mittal later said that the AIU had

managed to secure medals and certificates for the affected athletes from the world governing body (FISU). The badminton team had won a bronze medal at the Games.

Mittal did not respond to PTI's repeated calls on what the AIU's response to the ministry notice, issued on January 8, would be even though a source said it has sought more time after the initial 10-day deadline expired.

The notice issued to AIU mentions the World University Games fiasco and observes that the overall quality of Indian athletes emerging from the university sports system has not been up to the expected level.


India had won two gold, five silver, and five bronze medals, to finish 20th in the World University Games.

The ministry feels there are serious deficiencies in planning, coordination, athlete development and the administrative set-up of the AIU.

Citing the mega-event last year, the ministry said the failure to ensure participation of selected athletes caused avoidable hardship to them and adversely impacted India's image in international university sports forums.

During the embarrassing episode, a ministry source had even hinted that the possibility of a national federation to handle university sport could also be considered.

over 4,000 people, with more feared dead. Since then, there has been minimal access to the outside world, with connectivity in recent days restored only for some domestic websites.

Google also began partially functioning as a search engine, with most search results inaccessible.

Officials have offered no firm timeline for the internet to return, leading to fears by businesses across the country about their future.

One pet shop owner in Tehran, who spoke on the condition

of anonymity like others for fear of reprisals, said his business had fallen by 90% since the protests.

"Before that, I mainly worked on Instagram and Telegram which I don't have access to anymore. The government has proposed two domestic alternatives. The point is our customers are not there — they don't use it."

The internet outage compounds economic pain already suffered by Iranians. The protests, which appear to have halted under a bloody suppression by authorities, began Dec 28 over Iran's rial currency falling to over 1.4 million to \$1.

Ten years ago, the rial traded at 32,000 to \$1. Before the 1979 Islamic Revolution, it traded at 70 to \$1.

The currency's downward spiral pushed up inflation, increasing the cost of food and other daily necessities. The pressure on Iranians' pockets was compounded by changes to gasoline prices that were also introduced in December, further fuelling anger.

Ishan will bat at No. 3, he deserves game time before T20 World Cup: Suryakumar

Nagpur, Jan 20: Ishan Kishan will play ahead of Shreyas Iyer in the series against New Zealand as he is a part of India's T20 World Cup squad and a like-for-like replacement for an injured Tilak Varma being a left-hander, skipper Suryakumar Yadav said on Tuesday.

Tilak, an automatic choice at number three has undergone an abdominal surgery and is ruled out of the first three games, starting here on Wednesday. This has allowed Iyer to make a comeback to the national squad for the first three games.

However, the skipper made it amply clear that Iyer is being looked at as a No. 5.

"Ishan will bat at number 3 because he is a part of our T20 World Cup team and he was picked in the squad first so it's our responsibility to give him a chance," he said in the pre-match press conference.

"He hasn't played for India for past one and half year and in the mean time consistently performed in domestic cricket," the Indian skipper did not leave any room for guess work.

"Since he (Ishan) has been picked for World T20, he deserves to play ahead (of Shreyas). Had it been a question of batting slots Nos 4



or 5, it would have been a different question altogether. Unfortunately, Tilak isn't there so Ishan is our best bet," he added.

The T20 World Cup starts February 7 and will be co-hosted by India and Sri Lanka.

When asked if he himself has any chance of batting at No.3 where he got a lot of success, the skipper indicated that he would like to be flexible.

"I have batted at both positions for India. My stats at No. 4 are slightly better although they are good at No. 3 also. But then we are flexible with that," he said.

"We will see and if the situation demands that we have to send a right-hander

(in case right hander Sanju Samson gets out), then, I will go in, otherwise Tilak (now injured) has been doing really well at number three."

With a strike rate of 113 and an average of less than 15 in 2025, Suryakumar has endured a prolonged rough patch but he intends to change nothing in his batting that has so far given him success.

"I've been out of runs. But I can't change my identity. I have decided to keep doing what I have been doing in the last three or four years so that has given me a lot of success.

"If the performance comes, I'll take it, if it doesn't, it's back to the drawing board. I'm still batting in the nets the way I always have," said


Suryakumar. While most questions predictably were about his form, the skipper very diplomatically spoke about how individual form doesn't matter in the bigger context of the team.

"Had I been playing a single (individual) sport like TT or tennis, I would have worried about my form. But this is team sport and my first responsibility is to ensure that my team does well."

"If team wins, I am happy and if I can contribute in team's success then fine and if not, doesn't matter as it can happen. But I have to look at 14 other players also and there is no place for looking at personal milestones."

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
