



10 soldiers killed, 10 injured as Army vehicle falls into gorge in Doda

PM, HM, Rajnath, LG, CM express grief, assure support to injured

Srinagar, Jan 22: Ten soldiers died and as many were injured after an Army vehicle fell into a deep gorge near the Khannitop on the Bhaderwah-Chamba road in Doda district on Thursday morning, officials said.

An official told news agency—Kashmir News Observer (KNO) that the Army's Casspir vehicle fell into the deep gorge near the Khannitop area after the driver lost control over the vehicle.

He said that the vehicle went down around 400 meters from the road, resulting in the on spot death of four soldiers and injuries to others. "Six soldiers later succumbed to their injuries while being rescued. The injured were shifted to SDH Bhaderwah, where from they have been airlifted to Army's command hospital in Udhampur for specialised treatment," he said.

The official said that the driver of the vehicle lost control due to the slippery condition of the road. "The accident happened when an Army party was coming back from an operational duty," he added.

Meanwhile, Prime Minister Narendra Modi expressed grief over the loss of lives in the accident, saying their service to the nation will be remembered forever.

"Deeply anguished by the mishap in Doda, in which we have lost our brave army personnel. Their service to the nation will be remembered forever. May the injured recover at the earliest. All possible support is being provided to those



affected," he said in a X post.

Home Minister Amit Shah also condoled the death of soldiers in the tragic accident. "I am deeply pained by the road accident in Doda, Jammu and Kashmir. I express my heartfelt condolences to the families of the brave soldiers we have lost in this tragic incident.

Meanwhile, Lt Governor Manoj Sinha expressed grief over the loss of lives, saying that the entire nation stands united with the bereaved families in solidarity and support.

Snowfall, rain expected in J&K, disruptions likely

Valley reels under sub-zero temps | Western Disturbance approaches

Srinagar, Jan 22: Minimum temperatures across Jammu and Kashmir dipped further on Thursday, with most places in the Kashmir Valley recording sub-zero night temperatures, while Ladakh continued to reel under intense cold conditions, officials said.

According to data obtained by the news agency—Kashmir News Observer (KNO), Srinagar recorded a minimum temperature of minus 3.4 degrees Celsius, down from minus 2.4 degrees Celsius the previous day.

Several parts of south Kashmir witnessed sharper drops, with Pulwama emerging as one of the coldest places at minus 5.8 degrees Celsius, compared to minus 4.9 degrees Celsius on Wednesday.



Anantnag settled at minus 5.3 degrees Celsius, while Shopian recorded minus 5.4 degrees Celsius.

Pahalgam, a key tourist destination, recorded a minimum of minus 4.4 degrees Celsius, slightly lower than Wednesday's minus 3.8 degrees Celsius. Sonamarg remained cold

at minus 6.1 degrees Celsius, compared to minus 5.5 degrees a day earlier.

Awantipora and Pampore also saw notable drops, recording minus 5.2 degrees and minus 5.0 degrees, respectively.

M&HED gears up with 300 machines, 26 control rooms for snow clearance across Kashmir

10,000–15,000 km road network to be cleared

All operators, mechanics, field staff on standby across districts

Srinagar, Jan 22: The Mechanical Engineering department Kashmir (M&HED), on Thursday said it has mobilised the entire workforce and machinery to ensure smooth snow clearance operations across Kashmir as the region braces for winter weather.



300 snow clearance machines have been stationed at 26 control rooms across all major districts of Kashmir. The department has set a target of clearing 10,000 to 15,000 kilometres of road network during the upcoming snow spells.

"The Valley has been divided into four major divisions for

better coordination – Srinagar-Budgam, Anantnag, Baramulla-Gulmarg and Ganderbal-Kupwara-Bandipora," an official told the news agency—Kashmir News Observer (KNO).

He said all operators, mechanics and field staff are fully mobilised, with machinery positioned since November 15. "Our mechanical department is also managing essential hospital services like oxygen supply, heating and lift operations at GMCs and district hospitals. We are ready on all fronts," he added.

Srinagar, Jan 22: Students affected by the withdrawal of the letter of permission for the MBBS course at Shri Mata Vaishno Devi Institute of Medical Excellence (SMVDIME) will now be accommodated in seven newly established Government Medical Colleges of Jammu & Kashmir.

According to a notification issued by the Board of Professional Entrance Examination (BOPEE), a copy of which is in possession of news agency—Kashmir News Observer (KNO) 50 supernumerary seats have been created for SMVDIME students

across these colleges. Of these, eight seats have been allotted to GMC Anantnag, while seven seats each have been allotted to GMC Baramulla, GMC Doda, GMC Handwara, GMC Kathua, GMC Rajouri, and GMC Udhampur.

The BOPEE has announced that the physical round of counselling for these students will be conducted on January 24 at 11:00 AM, the notification reads.

Data-driven interventions key to reducing road accidents in J&K: CS

Reviews implementation of SC mandated road safety directives in J&K

JAMMU, JANUARY 22: Chief Secretary, Atal Dulloo Thursday while assessing the implementation of road safety measures as recommended by the Supreme Court underscored the need for extensive use of GIS-based data to identify vulnerable and accident-prone road patches identified for frequent accidents.

Emphasizing deterrence as a key component of road safety, the Chief Secretary directed the authorities to strictly enforce punitive measures against habitual and serious traffic violators. These include cancellation of driving licences, registration certificates, and other statutory actions against offenders involved in rash driving and non-compliance with traffic rules.

The Chief Secretary also took stock of the road accident scenario in Jammu and Kashmir based on data available on the i-RAD portal. He reviewed accident trends with respect to time of day, monthly patterns, district-wise distribution, classification of roads, and the nature of traffic violations leading to such mishaps.

During the meeting, road construction agencies including PWD, NHAI, NHIDCL, BRO and SAMPARK were asked to brief the meeting on steps taken for removal of identified black spots in accordance with the Black Spot Protocol. The Chief Secretary also reviewed measures related to traffic calming, installation of safety signage, and fitting of speed-limiting devices in school buses to ensure student safety.

Rs 10.15 Cr and Rs 15.88 Cr respectively. Major violations included non-wearing of helmets, driving without seat belts, use of mobile phone while driving, over-speeding, and jumping of red lights. In 2025 alone, 1,528 vehicles were seized, 1,641 driving licences suspended, 10,439 vehicles blacklisted, 1,192 registration certificates cancelled, and 300 route permits revoked.

In this meeting the IGP Traffic, M. Suleman apprised about the functioning of surveillance cameras installed under the Integrated Traffic Management System (ITMS) and traffic signal cameras under the Intelligent Light Traffic System (ILTS) at major junctions in Jammu and Srinagar.

He informed that the Traffic Police enforced 12,36,380 e-challans in 2023, 15,03,901 in 2024 and 14,92,591 in 2025, imposing fines of Rs 85.16 Cr, Rs 120.09 Cr and Rs 145.12 Cr respectively. He further added that 15,947 vehicles were seized during 2025 for various violations of the Motor Vehicles Act.

The meeting also reviewed the implementation of the Road Accident Victim Fund, establishment of trauma care facilities along highways, and the functioning of the Institute of Driving Training and Research (IDTR) at Kot Bhalwal and the Inspection and Certification Centre (ICC) at Samba. The performance of the District Infrastructure Quality Control (DIQC) mechanism in conducting road safety audits across districts was also assessed.

The Chief Secretary reiterated the government's commitment to reducing road accidents through coordinated enforcement, engineering solutions, public awareness, and strict adherence to judicial and statutory road safety norms for saving the precious lives of the people here in J&K.

Faith and Tragedy Collide: Pilgrim Son Sees Mother's Brutal Murder on CCTV

Srinagar, Jan 22: What could be more heartbreaking and a nightmare for a son than watching his mother being murdered on CCTV while he is thousands of miles away from home? This is what happened with Rashida Begum (65) of Srinagar's Nowshera area, who was allegedly murdered on Thursday by her domestic help while her son was in Saudi Arabia performing Umrah.

Rashida was alone at her home as her son was in Saudi Arabia for Umrah and her husband was at his shop in Lal Chowk when the domestic help allegedly hit her with a bat and later slit her throat before feeling with her mobile phone. An official



said that the accused domestic help was later arrested after a manhunt was launched to nab him.

Narrating the horrific incident, Rashida's son-in-law, Shafat said that she was in contact with his wife till 11 am during the day. "After lunch, I sent the children and my wife to her house and by the time they arrived, she was lying in a pool of blood with her throat slit," he said.

"I received a call from my wife regarding the incident. When I arrived, I saw the horrific scene and the police reached soon after," he added.

He said that her son was in Saudi Arabia for Umrah. "When he was informed about the incident, he accessed the CCTV footage linked to his phone and helplessly

watched what had happened. My father-in-law was also not present at home at the time as he was at his shop in Lal Chowk. He later returned home after being informed," he said.

Meanwhile, one of her neighbours said that he first heard about the incident around 4 pm and rushed to the house, where cries and chaos filled the area. He said that eyewitnesses had seen the domestic help first hitting Rashida with a bat, leaving her unconscious and then slit her throat.

The police said that the accused was traced with the help of the mobile phone he taken from Rashida after the murder. "The accused has been arrested and further investigation is underway," police said—(KNO)

J&K issues 15 lakh e-challans in 2025

Recovers fine of over Rs 145 crore from violators; impounds 15,947 vehicles

Srinagar, Jan 22: Jammu and Kashmir's traffic police have intensified their drive against rule-breakers. In 2025, the department issued a staggering 14.92 lakh digital fines, collected over Rs 145 crore in penalties, and even seized 15,947 vehicles for serious violations, officials said on Thursday.

The data was revealed in a high-level review chaired by Chief Secretary Atal Dulloo, which assessed compliance with Supreme Court-mandated road safety measures and outlined a roadmap for GIS-based, data-driven interventions to reduce accidents and fatalities.

IGP Traffic, M. Suleman in the meeting informed that fines have increased steadily from Rs 85.16 crore in 2023 to Rs 120.09 crore in 2024 and Rs 145.12 crore in 2025, largely due to the expansion of ITMS and ILTS surveillance systems across Srinagar and Jammu.

Transport Secretary Avny Lavasa also highlighted that enforcement drives have yielded 52,543 challans in 2025, amounting to Rs 15.88 crore in fines.

During the same period, authorities suspended 1,641 driving licences, cancelled 1,192 registration certificates, revoked 300 route permits, and blacklisted 10,439 vehicles for repeated



violations including over-speeding, signal jumping, and use of mobile phones while driving.

Since the operationalisation of the I-RAD portal in June 2022, a total of 20,135 road accidents involving 32,819 persons have been reported in J&K, resulting in 3,688 fatalities and 29,131 injuries.

The figures reveal that most accidents occur on major highways in Jammu, Kathua, Udhampur, and Rajouri, primarily between 3:00 pm and 9:00 pm, with rash driving and over-speeding contributing to nearly half of all incidents.

In the meeting, CS Dulloo stressed on leveraging GIS mapping and traffic data to identify accident-prone black spots, guide engineering corrections, ensure proper deployment of

traffic police and implement targeted safety measures such as traffic calming, speed-limit enforcement and safety signage installation.

He also stressed the need for deterrence through strict punitive actions against habitual violators.

The meeting also reviewed trauma care preparedness along highways, the Road Accident Victim Fund and the functioning of the Institute of Driving Training and Research (IDTR) at Kot Bhalwal and the Inspection and Certification Centre (ICC) at Samba.

"Data-backed interventions, combined with technology, enforcement and engineering, are critical to saving lives and ensuring safer roads across J&K," Dulloo said—(KNO)

Baramulla, Jan 22: Deputy Commissioner Baramulla, Minga Sherpa Thursday said that comprehensive arrangements are in place to ensure the smooth conduct of Republic Day celebrations, despite an adverse weather alert for the region issued by the India Meteorological Department (IMD).

On IMD's weather advisory, Baramulla DC cautioned against unnecessary travel during snowfall.

He said that emergency response centres are fully functional. "Police in Baramulla and Sopore have also issued helpline numbers for public assistance."

He added that the administration remains on high alert, prioritizing road clearance across over 4,000 Kilometers, alongside uninterrupted essential services like power and water supply—(KNO)

Sindh Nallah water quality improving, pollution concern remains

Srinagar, Jan 22: The water quality of Sindh Nallah from Wayil to Sonamarg has been found to meet Class-B primary water standards, but the presence of sewage discharges from various drains continues to threaten the river's health.

A report submitted by the Jammu and Kashmir Pollution Control Committee (JKPCC) to the National Green Tribunal (NGT) highlights ongoing pollution sources despite overall acceptable water parameters.

As per the report filed in connection with the case titled "Sindh

intermittent pollution. The JKPCC has assured the NGT that measures are being taken to impose environmental compensation on those responsible for polluting the waterway. The committee has sought four weeks to submit a detailed action plan and further reports.

The Sindh Nallah, stretching from Wayil to Sonamarg, falls under the jurisdiction of the Block Development Officers of Kangan and Gund, as well as the Sonamarg Development Authority. Notices have been issued to these agencies for violations of Solid Waste Management Rules, 2016, and for environmental compensation.

In particular, show cause notices have been served to the Block Development Officers of Kangan and Gund, with references dated October 25, 2025. Both officers are respondents in ongoing legal cases concerning plastic pollution and environmental violations affecting the region's water bodies—(KNO)

Friday Brief: Embracing Simplicity As A Sacred Virtue

In an age defined by relentless consumption and complex desires, the Islamic teachings on Qana'ah (contentment) and simplicity offer a profound antidote to spiritual and societal restlessness. The Quran and Hadith do not merely recommend a simple life; they present it as a conscious, dignified choice that leads to inner peace, gratitude, and closeness to God. This is a liberation from the tyranny of

endless want and the anxiety of worldly competition. The Quran repeatedly redirects the believer's focus from worldly accumulation to eternal success. It reminds us that worldly life is but "play and amusement, adornment and boasting among yourselves, and competition in increase of wealth and children" (57:20), a fleeting distraction. True prosperity is defined not by abundance, but by a heart at peace:

"And whoever is mindful of Allah, He will make a way out for them, and provide for them from sources they could never imagine" (65:2-3). This divine promise places trust in God, not in material stockpiles, at the centre of a believer's livelihood. Prophet Muhammad (Peace Be Upon Him) was the perfect exemplar of this ethos. His life was a model of majestic simplicity; his home was humble, his diet

was modest, and his clothing was plain. He (PBUH) said, "Live in this world as if you are a stranger or a traveller." He (PBUH) warned against luxury and extravagance, teaching that true richness is "richness of the soul". The simplicity cultivates gratitude (shukr), allowing one to find profound joy in blessings, however small. Ultimately, Islamic simplicity is an act of worship. It is a practical affirmation

that our hearts are attached to the Creator, not the creation. By adopting moderation in our possessions, speech, and desires, we align our lives with the divine injunction of balance (wasatiyyah). In a chaotic world, this disciplined simplicity becomes a source of immense spiritual strength, personal dignity, and societal harmony—a direct path to the contentment that God loves.

AI For All - Building An Inclusive Future For Women, Youth, And The Workforce

The power of AI in India will not be measured by the sophistication of its algorithms, but by its capacity to level the playing field

As India gears up to host the India-AI Impact Summit 2026, the most impactful stories are not about algorithms or automation, but about inclusion. The true promise of AI lies in amplifying human potential, especially among women, informal workers, and the youth who have long remained at the periphery of the formal economy.

Guided by the vision of "Making AI in India and Making AI Work for India," the Cabinet approved the IndiaAI Mission in March 2024. Under the leadership of Shri Ashwini Vaishnav, Hon'ble Union Minister for Electronics and Information Technology, the IndiaAI Mission team began work on strategically designing and implementing key initiatives such as IndiaAI Compute Capacity, the IndiaAI Innovation Centre (IAIC), the IndiaAI Datasets Platform, the IndiaAI Application Development Initiative, IndiaAI FutureSkills, IndiaAI Startup Financing, and Safe & Trusted AI.

The Mission's focus on inclusive growth is strongly reflected in the IndiaAI Innovation Centre, which is developing multilingual Large Language Models and domain-specific foundational models tailored to India's diverse socio-economic contexts. These models, trained using the national GPU grid, are being designed to serve women entrepreneurs, farmers, gig workers, and small retailers through vernacular AI assistants, micro-advisory tools, and sector-specific knowledge engines.

While much of the global dialogue around AI has focused on productivity gains and competitiveness, in India, its most powerful impact may be its ability to democratize access to work, to learning, to safety, and to opportunity. This vision of AI as a tool for inclusion will be at the heart of the India-AI Impact Summit 2026, to be held in February.



Bringing together policymakers, innovators and industry leaders, we aim to chart a discourse around how AI can be harnessed for People, Progress, and the Planet.

In India's expanding gig and platform economy, women are increasingly shaping a new digital workforce, one empowered by AI. Whether it is women entrepreneurs leveraging AI-driven marketplaces, or women drivers and delivery partners navigating safely through AI-powered safety systems, the technology is quietly reshaping agency and opportunity. Take, for instance, beauty and wellness platforms that use AI-based matching algorithms to pair customers with service professionals based on proximity, skill, and past performance. A majority of these professionals are women who now enjoy flexible hours, predictable income, and enhanced safety through AI-enabled verification and tracking. Similarly, ride-hailing platforms have integrated intelligent safety systems from real-time location sharing to

voice-activated emergency features allowing women drivers to work with greater confidence and independence. While these systems existed before, AI has increased safety, reliability and efficiency of these platforms.

In rural and semi-urban India, AI-enabled financial tools are promoting digital inclusion. Vernacular AI assistants and voice-based digital payment systems are helping women overcome literacy and language barriers, enabling them to manage finances independently and securely.

For India's youth, AI is not merely a tool; it is an entry point into a new economy. Across states, government and private sector collaborations are building a pipeline of AI-skilled talent, from basic digital literacy to advanced machine learning. The Government of India has recently launched the YUVA AI for All National AI Literacy Campaign under the IndiaAI Mission. Anchored on National Youth Day, the initiative aims to create foundational AI awareness among lakhs of students

and young learners through a short, self-paced "AI 101" course. By leveraging existing school, higher education, and digital learning ecosystems, YUVA AI for All seeks to democratise access to AI knowledge, positioning AI literacy as a core life skill rather than a specialised privilege, and ensuring that India's youth across regions, languages, and socio-economic backgrounds are prepared to participate meaningfully in the AI-driven economy.

AI's role in inclusion extends beyond employment into public welfare. Startups like MyGate and SafeHouse Tech use AI-driven analytics to strengthen safety for women in residential and workplace settings. AI-powered grievance redressal systems are being integrated into government helplines such as 112 India, enabling quicker response times and data-driven deployment of emergency services.

In the agriculture sector, AI tools such as Kisan AI use machine learning models to predict pest infestations and weather-related risks, empowering women farmers to make informed, resilient decisions. Similarly, fintech innovators like Indifi and Kinara Capital are leveraging AI-driven credit scoring to extend credit to women-led enterprises that have historically lacked access to formal financial systems. This vision is also reflected in NITI Aayog's report, AI for Inclusive Societal Development. The report shows how AI can empower India's 490 million informal workers by expanding access to healthcare, education, skilling, and financial inclusion. It highlights how AI-driven tools can boost productivity and resilience for millions who form the backbone of India's economy.

As AI becomes increasingly integrated into economic and social systems, ensuring its ethical and inclusive use has become a national priority. Anchored on the principle of "AI for All," India's approach focuses on

fairness, transparency, and accountability to ensure that technology amplifies opportunity rather than inequality. By embedding AI into everyday platforms from payments and logistics to education and public services India is building an inclusive digital ecosystem that empowers people at every level. India has also implemented the Digital ShramSetu, a national mission dedicated to integrating cutting-edge technologies into India's informal economy. The implementation model is built on four pillars: identifying key needs by sector or persona, empowering state governments for execution, creating an enabling regulatory environment, and forming partnerships to drive down costs and ensure broad access. It will bring together government, businesses, and NGOs, all operating under a rigorous system for measuring impact. This model of accessibility and equity offers a compelling blueprint for the Global South on how AI can enable large-scale social and economic transformation.

If the first wave of India's digital revolution, led by Digital India and UPI, connected citizens, the next must ensure that AI connects them to opportunity. That means designing systems that are multilingual, gender-sensitive, and accessible, where the rural woman entrepreneur, the data labeler from Nagaland, and the young coder from Bhopal all have a stake in India's AI future.

The power of AI in India will not be measured by the sophistication of its algorithms, but by its capacity to level the playing field. Women, youth, and informal workers are not passive beneficiaries, they are becoming the architects of a more equitable AI economy. As the world looks toward India at the India-AI Impact Summit 2026, it will see a nation proving that inclusion is not a byproduct of technology, it is its greatest innovation.

In An Age Of Vulnerability, Why Is Help So Hard To Ask For?

We talk about feelings more than ever, but belonging means rethinking care

Walk through an airport bookstore, scroll the pod-cast charts, or listen to a leadership keynote, and you'll likely find lessons on boundaries and burnout. Celebrities talk about therapy with a casualness that would have been unthinkable a generation ago. Coaches tell C-suite executives to "lead with vulnerability." And bestselling books like The Gifts of Imperfection, You Should Talk to Someone, and The Body Keeps the Score have given the world a common vocabulary for talking about anxiety, shame, and trauma.

It's easy to conclude that we're living in the Golden Age of Vulnerability. And that's good news. All these developments are positive for a culture that, for too long, encouraged silence around the work of personal healing. Yet—even as our culture embraces vulnerability—many of us are reckoning with a seemingly contradictory trend. It can feel harder than ever to ask for help.

To say, "I'm struggling," takes honesty. To ask, "Can you help me?" is to request time, attention, and follow-through. It risks inconvenience. It risks rejection. It can even feel like a status shift: the helper stays competent while the helped becomes "needy." Psychologists have been describing versions of this for decades. Asking for help can threaten



self-esteem because it can imply inferiority or loss of control. Many people feel a quiet fear that they'll be judged as less capable or more dependent.

All this makes sense in a society that prizes rugged autonomy as

moral virtue.

These days, the aversion to asking for help is often less a fear that other people are cruel than a worry that they're simply tired or over-committed. Research on suicide risk underscores how dangerous this can

become: feeling like a burden is one reason people stop reaching out. Of course, the issue isn't limited to a crisis. Everyday resistance to reaching out can degrade the quality of life and deepen an epidemic of loneliness and social isolation.

Still, here's some welcome news: We are often wrong about how unwilling people are to help.

In a series of studies in the Journal of Personality and Social Psychology, people underestimated—by as much as 50 percent—how likely others were to comply with a direct request for help. At the same time, potential helpers tend to underestimate how uncomfortable asking feels, including the role of embarrassment. People who need support hold back, while people who might help assume they would have been asked.

To address a crisis of belonging in today's world, we need a shift in how we think about asking for help.

In modern life, help is often interpreted through a scorekeeping lens: Who owes whom, who has taken too much, what's fair. There are reasons this mindset takes hold. Much of life runs on transactions. Exchange is explicit, time feels scarce, and many people feel they're barely keeping up. Under stress, the logic of the marketplace leaks into relationships.

The "don't owe anyone" instinct can start to look like an ethical ideal. Behavioural research shows how quickly the frame changes

behaviour. In a famous field experiment in Israeli daycares, when researchers introduced a small fine for late pickups, late pickups increased. The fine turned a moral obligation into a transaction. Parents stopped feeling: "I'm making a teacher wait." They started feeling: "I'm paying for extra time." When you switch the frame—from social to monetary—you change the behaviour.

Transactional scorekeeping turns care and support into a form of accounting.

And all this is anathema to belonging. Belonging requires the opposite premise: that people are allowed to need, and allowed to be temporarily out of balance. This kind of grace makes life humane. The alternative to transaction is reciprocity: a living relationship where people take turns carrying weight over time. Reciprocity isn't a rigid balancing of payments. It's continuity. It's trust built across uneven seasons. The gift keeps moving.

What does reciprocity sound like in practice? "I'll cover your kid's pickup today—and I know I can count on you someday when I need it." It looks like coworkers who trade support during intense weeks without turning it into a moral scorecard. It looks like friends who don't keep a ledger of who texted first, who hosted last, or who needed more this year. The point isn't to keep everything balanced in the moment. The point is to keep the relationship

strong over time. It's the long-game of community.

We can all do our part to shift from transaction to reciprocity, one small practice at a time. For parents, it can be as simple as modeling it out loud: "We ask for help in this family—and we help others when we can." For schools, it can be one clear rule teachers repeat and reward: asking for help with an assignment is part of doing well, not a sign you're behind. For workplaces, it can be a standing norm that makes support ordinary: Bring questions, and treat asking as professionalism. And for each of us, it can be a personal discipline: Practice asking for help before you're desperate. Sit with the discomfort. Make the small ask anyway.

Al is making this cultural shift urgent. Chatbots will only get better at offering the frictionless comfort of a "friend" who never gets tired and never says no.

But here's the thing: We need to need other people.

While we should celebrate society's growing embrace of vulnerability, we need to take a step further toward: It's time for a focus on building a culture of mutual care.

Gusty winds sweep

Srinagar and Udhampur for the next two hours.

It warned of thundershowers and lightning with gusty winds of 50-60 kmph and moderate rainfall over these districts. "Srinagar and Jammu airports also reported gusty wind speed of up to 83 kmph and 37 kmph respectively in association with the fresh Western Disturbance," it said.

Meanwhile, an independent Kashmir based weather forecaster said that various areas across Jammu and Kashmir reported strong gusty winds, saying these winds are unusual for this time of the season.

"However, they are not localised or temperature-driven. Instead, they are linked to a unique and dynamically strong Western Disturbance, which carries intense wind fields within the system itself," he said.

He said that the gusty winds may subside in a few areas over the coming hours, but many places are likely to continue experiencing strong winds till the early morning hours tomorrow.

An official said that the Police personnel were engaged in clearing roads and assisting people after strong winds caused the roofs of several houses, complexes and buildings to cave in at various places across the Valley.

"Police teams from the concerned stations are on the ground, ensuring smooth traffic movement and providing timely assistance to affected residents," he said.

In view of the prevailing inclement weather conditions and the adverse weather forecast, the Srinagar District Administration advised people to refrain from venturing outside their homes and avoid unnecessary movement on roads.

It asked the general public to contact the District Emergency Operation Centre Srinagar and Police Control Room Srinagar, in case of any exigency and advised the people to strictly follow the advisory. (KNO)

Over 80% of

restoration work will begin soon. "We will restore the electricity at earliest. As of now, we have received faults on many 33KV and 11 KV lines. Besides, as a safety measure, we have tripped-down feeders in many areas."

"However, electricity is being supplied to the essential departments," he said.

An official said that the 33KV Shadimarg line was down due to the damage of rooftop.

It also said that 33KV line was off from Grid station Lassipora and all 33 KV lines were under fault from grid station Shopian.

The official further informed that the 33KV lines were down of Narkara, Rajbagh, Rakhi

Arth, Bemina-I/II, Karanagar, Bemina JVC line, Wangnpora and Bemina grids, HMT, and Safakadal lines.

It also said that all 33KV lines fed from Badampora, Kangan, Poshah, Nihalpora and Alastang Grid stations were off due to general tripping in 220 KVA line.

The official further said that all feeders were off in Shopian. "All 33kv lines emanating from Awantipora grid are under fault. In Gulmarg, 33 KV was tripped off in Nihalpora-Gulmarg line as heavy winds are blowing in Tangmarg and surrounding areas."

"Sangam tripped on earth fault, 132 KV line went off from MB grid, Dooru line off due to 132kv outage. All 11KV feeders in respect of SSD TANGMARG are either under fault or are off due to non-availability of the 33KV line," the official said.

It also said that all 33KV lines pertaining to STD Bijbehara are down due to faults or grid outages and in respect of ED Bandipora, all 33kv lines are off.

"Due to outages of 33KV lines, all 11kv feeders are off pertains to circle -Ganderbal," the official said. (KNO)

Snowfall, rain expected

Baramulla and Aloosa Bandipora were relatively warmer at minus 0.4 degrees Celsius each.

Gulmarg, the ski resort, recorded a minimum of minus 4.0 degrees Celsius, slightly higher than Wednesday's minus 5.0 degrees.

In the Jammu region, night temperatures remained largely above freezing in the plains. Jammu city recorded a minimum of 7.2 degrees Celsius, unchanged from the previous day, while Jammu Airport logged 7.3 degrees.

However, Banjali recorded minus 2.2 degrees Celsius, marginally higher than Wednesday's minus 2.3 degrees. Bhaderwah and Udhampur recorded minus 1.5 degrees and 1.0 degrees Celsius, respectively.

Ladakh continued to experience severe cold, with Leh recording minus 10.6 degrees Celsius, Hanle minus 11.0 degrees, and Kargil minus 8.4 degrees.

The Meteorological Department forecast widespread rain and snowfall across Jammu and Kashmir, with heavy precipitation likely over parts of the Pir Panjal range and south Kashmir during the night and continuing till Friday evening.

Officials said the plains of the Kashmir Valley may initially receive moderate rain before the precipitation gradually turns to light to moderate snowfall, with moderate to heavy snow expected over the lower and middle reaches.

The department also warned of the possibility of heavy rain or snowfall accompanied by gusty winds and hailstorms in some districts of the Pir Panjal range, Chenab Valley, and south Kashmir.

An advisory has been issued cautioning about the risk of landslides at a few vulnerable locations.

Meanwhile, the independent weather forecaster, Kashmir Weather, said that a strong western disturbance is likely to impact Jammu and Kashmir from Thursday afternoon, bringing widespread rain and snowfall across the region.

The system is expected to first affect the higher reaches of north Kashmir before spreading to most parts of the Union Territory by night. There is a high probability of snowfall across the Kashmir plains and parts of Poonch, Doda, Kishtwar, Ramban and Kathua, while the Jammu plains may receive moderate to heavy rainfall, the update said.

Although the western disturbance is expected to weaken within 24 hours, snowfall intensity during this period could remain high due to elevated moisture levels. The peak impact is likely from Wednesday night till Thursday late afternoon, with residual rain or snow possible in some areas until the morning of January 24.

Kashmir Weather said the system may trigger a sharp drop in temperatures, leading to a cold wave and prolonged cold conditions across the region for the remainder of the month.

Snow accumulation in the plains will depend on snow density, ranging from a few inches to over a foot in several areas, while higher reaches could receive two to four feet of fresh snowfall.

Strong wind gusts are also likely, and travel disruptions, including to flights, trains and road connectivity, are expected on January 23, it added. (KNO)

EC terms SIR fair, just, reasonable; urges SC to reject pleas against electoral rolls revision

New Delhi, Jan 22: The Election Commission on Thursday termed the decision to undertake Special Intensive Revision (SIR) of electoral rolls "fair, just and reasonable", and urged the Supreme Court to reject pleas challenging the exercise in Bihar.

It argued that a roving and fishing enquiry into the special scrutiny cannot be done at the behest of a few NGOs and politicians.

"None of the 66 lakh persons, whose names were deleted in Bihar SIR, came to this court or high court or filed pleas with the Election Commission. A roving and fishing enquiry cannot be permitted at the instance of ADR (Association for Democratic Reforms) and the PUCL (People's Union for Civil Liberty) and a few parliamentarians," said senior advocate Rakesh Dwivedi on behalf of the poll panel.

The submissions were made by the senior lawyer during the final hearing on a batch of petitions challenging the Election Commission's decision to undertake SIR in different states, including Bihar.

Referring to a judgment in which the top court had refused a plea seeking re-introduction of paper ballot and discarding the EVMs, he said, "In short, we must follow Europe. If they go for EVMs, then we must go for it. And if they go for a paper ballot, then we go for it." He said



one person writes an article in a newspaper, and the other files a petition in the top court referring to that.

Dwivedi urged the bench of Chief Justice Surya Kant and Justice Joymalya Bagchi to dismiss the pleas with cost while defending the SIR as a lawful and transparent exercise of statutory powers under the Representation of the People Act, 1950.

He argued that once the Election Commission invokes its powers under Section 21(3) of the 1950 Act, the manner and procedure of conducting a special revision are left entirely to its discretion.

Dwivedi argued that Section 21(3) operates independently of Section 21(2), which governs routine and periodical revisions. "There is no compulsion under Section 21(3) that every SIR must be identical in nature," he said.

He said the SIR exercise

had not been undertaken for nearly 20 years in Bihar and was conducted in response to changing demographic realities, including urbanisation and population movement.

According to Dwivedi, merely adopting a different methodology or deviating from the manual governing routine revisions could not, by itself, render the exercise suspect or ultra vires.

The CJI, however, observed that if the poll panel's argument that Section 21(3) grants unfettered discretion to SIR provided an appropriate opportunity to take note of the changed legal framework.

Dwivedi placed significant reliance on the Citizenship (Amendment) Act, 2003, which, he said, was enacted after the last SIR and introduced stricter requirements for establishing citizenship, including proof relating to parents' citizenship.

He pointed out that the amendment was passed

during the tenure of then prime minister Atal Bihari Vajpeyi with bipartisan support, demonstrating legislative consensus on the need to examine citizenship due to increasing cross-border migration.

Justice Bagchi questioned whether the amended citizenship framework was a trigger for the present SIR, noting that the Election Commission's order did not explicitly cite trans-border or illegal migration as its basis.

"The word 'migration' ordinarily refers to lawful movement. Inter-state migration is a constitutional right," Justice Bagchi observed, adding that if SIR was being defended solely as a roll revision exercise after two decades, the larger question of citizenship determination might not arise at all.

Dwivedi responded that the amendment had never been operationalised earlier and that the present SIR provided an appropriate opportunity to take note of the changed legal framework.

He clarified that the objective was to examine citizenship within the contours of Article 326 of the Constitution, which guarantees adult suffrage.

Emphasising transparency, Dwivedi said that Booth Level Agents (BLAs) conducted house-to-house verification, over five crore SMS alerts were sent to voters, and the

process strictly followed procedural safeguards.

Nearly 76 per cent of voters did not have to submit any documents, while others were permitted to furnish one of 11 prescribed documents, he highlighted.

Dwivedi said the SIR could not be labelled as "manifestly arbitrary".

Justice Bagchi, however, observed that "manifest arbitrariness" had evolved as a facet of substantive due process and was now applicable even to primary legislation.

Dwivedi cautioned against importing American notions of "due process" into Indian constitutional law, remarking that US courts often re-evaluate policy decisions, a practice the Supreme Court has consistently resisted.

"US court judgments have been cited... Where is the US following due procedure of law? President Trump can just pick the President of Venezuela for trial. Where is the due process, and now he wants Greenland also. Here, the petitioners want to import that," he said.

The CJI said that courts here have occasionally used the phrase "due process" without fully appreciating its American constitutional origins.

The petitioners argue that the SIR's departure from the "prescribed manner" of revision under Section 21(2) lacks transparency and could lead to the arbitrary exclusion of genuine citizens.

Panaji, Jan 22: Prime Minister Narendra Modi will inaugurate via video link the India Energy Week (IEW) 2026 conclave that is scheduled to be held in South Goa between January 27 and 30.

Shouldn't be forced to participate in 'unconstitutional penalty regime' before CCI: Apple to HC

New Delhi, Jan 22: Tech giant Apple Inc, which is facing probe by anti-trust regulator CCI over allegations of abusing its position on its app store, has told the Delhi High Court that it should not be forced to participate in an "unconstitutional penalty regime" that permits penalties based on a company's global turnover for indulging in anti-competitive practices.

In a rejoinder filed in its litigation with the regulator, Apple said permitting it to approach the appellate forum, i.e. the National Company Law Appellate Tribunal, once any such "unjust" penalty is imposed on it by the Competition



Commission of India (CCI) would mean that "constitutional harm" was already done.

The US-based company assured that its intention or purpose was not to delay or

stall the ongoing proceedings before the CCI but when the "source" of power itself was under challenge, it could not be compelled to suffer the consequences.

Rebutting CCI's allegations

of delay, Apple also said the record reflected its "continual co-operation and timely engagement" in the investigation process.

In December, Apple had filed a petition challenging the amendment to the Competition Act, 2002, which allows CCI to impose penalties based on a company's global turnover.

It also challenged direction to furnish the firm's audited financial statements for several years.

In its rejoinder, Apple said it "embraced" competition as it pushed it to deliver the best, most innovative products and services for their users, and it always acted in compliance with applicable laws. It asserted that its

"maximum penalty exposure", according to the amended law, could be approximately USD 38 billion, which was "manifestly arbitrary, irrational and grossly disproportionate", rendering the same to be ultra vires the provisions of Article 14 and Article 21 of the Constitution.

"(While the company) believe(s) that there is no basis for the imposition of any penalty against them. However, the petitioners have no choice but to bring this constitutional challenge now to avoid the entirely unjust outcome of the retrospective imposition of penalty against them based on global turnover derived from all products/ services," the rejoinder said.

'Regularly engaging in varied physical activities could extend lifespan'

New Delhi, Jan 22: Regularly engaging in a variety of physical activity could be a good strategy for prolonging one's lifespan, according to a study.

Findings published in the British Medical Journal suggest that mix of physical activity, rather than doing more of the same, could be linked to a lower risk of death, regardless of total quantity -- an active lifestyle is however still important in its own right.

The team, including researchers from the US' Harvard University's school of public health and China's First Affiliated Hospital of Chongqing Medical University, said that while physical activity has been consistently linked with a better physical and mental health, evidence is inconclusive as to how varied kinds of physical activity impacts one's health.

Over 70,700 women and 40,600 men, who reported engaging in physical activity and were free of cardiovascular disease, diabetes and cancer, were looked at.

Physical activity assessments were collected over a follow-up period of 30 years.

Higher levels of physical activity were related with a lower baseline prevalence of hypertension, hypercholesterolemia, body mass index, a higher energy intake, better quality of diet, and more variety in physical activity.

Walking was the most frequent type of leisure physical activity in both groups; men were more likely to jog and run than women.

Walking was also associated with the lowest risk of death at 17 per cent for those who did the most walking, compared with those who did the least, while climbing stairs was associated with a 10 per cent lower risk.

Playing tennis, squash, or racquetball was related with a 15 per cent lower risk for those who played most, compared to those who played least and weight training or resistance exercises with a 13 per cent lower risk.

However, a greater variety of physical activity was associated with a lower risk of death.

India among those absent at signing ceremony of Trump's 'Board of Peace'

New Delhi, Jan 22: India was among the countries not present in Davos on Thursday when US President Donald Trump unveiled his "Board of Peace" that seeks to work towards bringing lasting peace to Gaza and possibly resolve global conflicts.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi was among numerous global leaders that the US President has invited to join the board that was announced under the second phase of a ceasefire agreement between Israel and Hamas in the Gaza strip.

France, the United Kingdom, China, Germany and many other leading nations also skipped the signing ceremony for Trump's "Board of Peace".

Trump hosted the ceremony on the margins of annual World Economic Forum in the Swiss mountain resort.

India is yet to take a call on it, people familiar with the matter said when asked about Trump's invite to PM Modi.

New Delhi is considering various aspects as the initiative involves sensitive issues, it is learnt.

India has been pushing



for a "two-State solution" to the Palestine question with Israel and Palestine living side by side in peace and security within recognised borders.

The countries that joined the Board of Peace included Argentina, Armenia, Azerbaijan, Bahrain, Belarus, Egypt, Hungary, Kazakhstan, Morocco, Pakistan, the United Arab Emirates, Saudi Arabia and Vietnam.

A number of countries including Germany, Italy, Paraguay, Russia, Slovenia, Turkiye, and Ukraine have remained non-committal on the invitation.

Trump's "Board of

Peace" is being projected by Washington as a new international body to usher in peace and stability in Gaza and beyond, triggering speculations that it could throw a challenge to the United Nations.

Originally, the new body was to be tasked to oversee governance and coordinate funding for Gaza's redevelopment as the strip was devastated during the two years of Israeli military offensive.

However, the "charter" of the board says it is "an international organisation that seeks to promote stability, restore dependable and lawful

governance, and secure enduring peace in areas affected or threatened by conflict". It also says durable peace requires pragmatic judgment, common sense solutions, and the courage to depart from approaches and institutions that have too often failed.

The top level of the board will consist of "exclusively" of heads of state under Trump's leadership.

Washington has already announced that the "Board of Peace" will play an essential role in fulfilling Trump's 20-point plan of providing strategic oversight, mobilising

international resources, and ensuring accountability as "Gaza transitions from conflict to peace and development".

The 20-point plan includes making Gaza a deradicalised terror-free zone that does not pose a threat to its neighbours and that it be redeveloped for the benefit of the people of the strip.

The White House last week announced forming a founding executive board to operationalise the Board of Peace's vision.

The members of the executive committee included US Secretary of State Marco Rubio, former British prime minister Tony Blair, US special envoy to the Middle East Steve Winkoff, businessman and Trump's son-in-law Jared Kushner and World Bank president Ajay Banga.

The other two members of the committee are Marc Rowan, the CEO of New York-headquartered private equity firm Apollo Global Management and Robert Gabriel, a US national security adviser.

The executive board will oversee another administrative group called National Committee for the Administration of Gaza.

US Senators introduce bipartisan bill to counter China's dominance in critical minerals

Washington, Jan 22: The Securing Essential and Critical US Resources and Elements (SECURE) Minerals Act, introduced last week by Republican Senator Todd Young of Indiana and Democratic Senator Jeanne Shaheen of New Hampshire, aims at reducing US dependence on China by supporting domestic production, stabilising markets and encouraging long-term investment through policy-backed mechanisms.

The SECURE Act envisages the establishment of a Strategic Resilience Reserve (SRR) in an independent government corporation, run by a seven-member board appointed by the President and confirmed by the Senate.

The SRR would focus on supporting the critical minerals market, including through stable prices, domestic

and allied production (including recycling), stockpiles, competitive markets and supply chain work, with minerals where the US is reliant on China, the bill said.

"China's global dominance of critical minerals supply chains gives it significant leverage and leaves the US vulnerable to economic coercion. This bipartisan legislation is a historic investment in making the US economy more resilient and supporting good-paying jobs in key sectors like aerospace, autos and technology," Senator Shaheen said in a press release.

Delivering much-needed stability to the market, providing targeted investments and stockpiling key inputs will help insulate the US from foreign threats and will provide a significant, and cost-effective, boost to the American economy, he said.

Djokovic one away from 400 Grand Slam match wins

Melbourne, Jan 22: Novak Djokovic and Stan Wawrinka made it a day for the ages at the Australian Open.

Djokovic improved to 399 wins in Grand Slam matches with a 6-3, 6-2, 6-2 victory over Francesco Masetti on Thursday, making the 38-year-old, 24-time major winner just one shy of becoming the first player ever to 400.

He's aiming to win an unprecedented 25th Grand Slam title. And if he does, he'll beat Ken Rosewall's record (aged 37 in 1972) as the oldest man in the Open era to win a major singles championship.

The Rosewall name was prominent on Day 5 at Melbourne Park, where he was among the invited VIPs.

Wawrinka, at 40 years, 310 days, became the first man over 40 to reach the third round of a major since Rosewall in 1978. It took a 4 1/2-hour 4-6, 6-3, 3-6, 7-5, 7-6 (3) comeback victory over 21-year-old qualifier Arthur Geras. That's the longest match of the 2026 tournament so far.

Wawrinka, who is retiring at the end of the year, will next face No. 9 Taylor Fritz. Before then, he told the crowd at

John Cain Arena: "I think I'll pick up a beer. I deserve one!"

His was one of three high-profile matches that finished around the same time, with Jannik Sinner continuing his bid for an Australian Open three-peat after beating James Duckworth 6-1, 6-4, 6-2 on Rod Laver Arena.

The defining feature of Naomi Osaka's first two rounds quickly moved from fashion to friction when her 6-3, 4-6, 6-2 win over Sorana Cirstea ended in tension.

"I think this was her last Australian Open so, OK, sorry she was mad about it," Osaka said.

Day and night With Sinner facing an Australian wild card, he got the prime time night slot and bumped 10-time Australian Open winner Djokovic into the afternoon session.

That didn't bother Djokovic as much as the dropped service game in the third set — his first of the tournament. It stung Djokovic, who broke the Italian qualifier at love in the next game and finished on an eight-point roll.

He said he took extra time out in the off-season and fine-tuned some skills as he chases his biggest goals.

Russia ready to allocate USD 1 billion from frozen assets for rebuilding Gaza: Putin

Moscow, Jan 22: Russian President Vladimir Putin on Thursday said that Moscow is ready to allocate USD 1 billion from its frozen assets for rebuilding Gaza within the framework of the Board of Peace Council initiated by US President Donald Trump.

The White House last week announced forming a founding executive board to operationalise the Board of Peace's vision.

The members of the executive committee included US Secretary of State Marco Rubio, former British prime minister Tony Blair, US special envoy to the Middle East Steve Winkoff, businessman and Trump's son-in-law Jared Kushner and World Bank president Ajay Banga.

His remarks came as a group of leaders and senior officials from 19 countries joined

Trump at a signing ceremony

of the Board of Peace Charter in Davos, Switzerland.

"We believe that the creation and efficient functioning of a sovereign Palestinian state is the only path to a final resolution of the Middle East conflict," Putin said while welcoming Abbas, who arrived here on Wednesday night on a two-day visit for high-level talks.

Putin, who has received an invitation to join the Board of Peace, welcomed Trump's peace efforts and said Moscow is ready to allocate USD 1 billion from Russia's frozen assets in the US to it for rebuilding Gaza. During the



meeting, Abbas said that he considers Russia a great friend of the Palestinian people.

Spokesman Dmitry Peskov said while talking to the media on Thursday afternoon.

"Russia has been a great friend of Palestine for over 50 years. Every time we come to Moscow, we feel a special spiritual connection between our countries. Russia has always taken a strong position in support of the Palestinian people," Abbas said.

Speaking late on Wednesday night at the National Security Council meeting, Putin thanked Trump for inviting him to join the Board of Peace and announced USD 1 billion as a donation from frozen assets, although the decision to join the Board will be taken after consultations with strategic partners.

England selector Luke Wright to step down after 2026 Men's T20 World Cup

London, Jan 22: Luke Wright will step down from his role as England men's selector after the upcoming T20 World Cup, the England and Wales Cricket Board (ECB) said on Thursday.

Wright, who has served in the position for three years after assuming charge in November 2022, informed the board of his decision made with an eye to having less travel and spending more time with his young family. His departure comes in the wake of England's 4-1 Ashes defeat in Australia.

"It has been a true honour and privilege to serve as an England Men's Selector over the past three years. I have fully immersed myself in the role and am incredibly proud of the players we have brought through. "The role demands significant travel and time away from home, and with a young family, the time feels right to pass the baton on to the next person. I now look forward with real interest and enthusiasm to whatever cricketing roles the future may hold."

We won't play in India but still hopeful of justice from ICC: Bangladesh

Dhaka, Jan 22: Bangladesh on Thursday refused to send its national cricket team for the T20 World Cup in India, effectively paving the way for Scotland to take its place in the tournament roster after the ICC dismissed the country's demand for a change of venue.

Bangladesh had been served an ultimatum by the world body on Wednesday to either agree to travel to India or risk being replaced as there was no credible threat to the safety of their players, officials or fans there. The country was given time till Thursday to make its decision.

However, taking a defiant



position Bangladesh's sports advisor Asif Nazrul, after a meeting with national team players, announced that the ICC's position was not acceptable to them.

"While our cricketers have

worked hard to qualify for the World Cup, the security risk regarding playing in India remains unchanged. This concern is not based on abstract analysis," Nazrul said.
