A wreath-laying ceremony was held at Lethpora in South Kashmir's Pulwama district to mark the anniversary of the attack in which 40 CRPF personnel lost their lives when a suicide bomber targeted their convoy on February 14, 2019. Senior officials of the CRPF, civil administration and security forces participated in the ceremony.

Srinagar, Feb 14: As the country marked the seventh anniversary of the 2019 Pulwama terror attack, Union Home Minister Amit Shah on Saturday reiterated that terrorism is the "greatest enemy of humanity" and India remains firmly committed to eliminating the menace.

Paying homage to the 40 CRPF martyrs, who laid down their lives in the line of duty, Shah, according to the news agency-Kashmir News Observer (KNO) said, "The nation will always remain



indebted to the courage and sacrifice of security forces who confront terrorism."

In a post on X, he said the dedication of the security forces continues to inspire the country and reaffirmed the government's resolve to root

out terrorism in all its forms. "Terrorism is the greatest enemy of humanity, and India is firmly determined to eradicate it completely," Shah said, adding that the sacrifices of the personnel would not be forgotten.

Pertinently, the Pulwama attack took place on February 14, 2019, when a suicide bomber affiliated with Pakistan-based terror outfit JeM rammed an explosives-laden vehicle into a bus carrying CRPF personnel on the Srinagar-Jammu National Highway. The attack killed 40 personnel | [More on P6](#)



## Winter carnival in Durban to begin tomorrow

Srinagar, Feb 14: Shopian is all set to host the second edition of the much-anticipated Winter Carnival at Dubjan Meadow on Monday. According to the details available, the event is being organized by the Tourism Department in collaboration with the Shopian administration. ## DM Kathua extends border restrictions to 5 Km zone

Jammu, Feb 14: Amid heightened security concerns along the International Border (IB), the District Magistrate Kathua has issued fresh orders limiting non-essential movement in a 5-kilometre strip adjacent to the border.

According to the details available, District Magistrate Rajesh Sharma invoked Section 163 of the Bharatiya Nagarik Suraksha Sanhita (BNSS) to enforce these preventive measures, aimed at averting risks to public safety, countering potential cross-border shelling, and blocking any anti-national elements.

Pertinently, the order highlights the fragile

security environment in the border region, where sporadic firing from across the border remains a credible threat.

To prioritize the protection of local residents and maintain peace, unnecessary travel has been curtailed in the specified zone under the Border Security Force (BSF)'s jurisdiction, stretching from Border Outpost (BOP) Paharpur to BOP Karol Krishna.

Additionally, the movement of heavy vehicles—such as trucks, tippers, and multi-axle carriers—has been banned on the old Samba-Kathua road from 9 pm to 6 am to further reduce vulnerabilities during nighttime hours.

These curbs took effect immediately on February

14, 2026, and will continue for the next 60 days, or until withdrawn sooner. Violations could lead to legal consequences under Section 223 of the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita. Speaking to reporters, DM Sharma clarified that this is a renewal and update of previous restrictions, which had lapsed on the same day.

The key change involves expanding the restricted belt from the earlier 2 km to the current 5 km, reflecting an assessment of ongoing sensitivities in the area.

The measure underscores the administration's proactive approach to safeguarding border villages amid persistent cross-border tensions—(KNO)

## Sonamarg poised to be next winter tourism hub: Dir Tourism

Srinagar, Feb 14: The Tourism Department has identified Sonamarg as the next major winter tourism hub after Gulmarg, with plans to expand skiing infrastructure and host competitive winter sports events in the coming years.

Director Tourism Kashmir, Syed Qamar Sajad said the department is supporting initiatives to showcase Sonamarg's potential for winter sports, noting that the area's natural slopes and terrain are well-suited for skiing.

Around 180 students from Jammu and Kashmir and as many as 20 other states are taking part in the ongoing programme, which the director described as an encouraging response reflecting growing



interest in winter sports.

Referring to Gulmarg as the country's winter capital, Sajad said nearby destinations, particularly Sonamarg, have the capacity to host competitive winter events in a phased and

structured manner.

He said winter tourism in the Valley has seen improvement this season, with a steady inflow of visitors, and added that the department would intensify efforts within its mandate to

## Littering chokes water bodies in Zainapora

Shopian, Feb 14: Continuous littering along water bodies has choked many streams and drains in the Zainapora area of south Kashmir's Shopian district, with residents and environmentalists expressing serious concern.

People from different villages of the subdivision said that indiscriminate dumping of waste into and along water bodies has become a common practice, resulting in blockages and pollution.

Residents say unchecked dumping has turned many scenic spots into garbage sites, contaminating water sources used for irrigation and daily needs.

"People throw plastic bags and garbage directly into streams. During rains, it spreads everywhere, blocking drains and polluting fields," said a local shopkeeper. "Government action is necessary, but public awareness is equally important."

Environmental activists in Shopian have long raised concerns over the growing plastic menace, warning that polythene waste not only harms soil fertility but also poses serious threats to livestock and aquatic life.

Amid reports of plastic waste, diapers, animal dung, and household refuse increasingly being dumped along roadsides and into streams, the local administration in Zainapora has launched a renewed cleanliness drive, urging residents to take responsibility for protecting the environment.

In a public notice, the Sub-Divisional Magistrate (SDM) of Zainapora called upon people across all villages of the subdivision to immediately remove waste from their neighbourhoods, homes, lanes, roads, drains, and open spaces. The notice



specifically mentioned polythene bags, disposable diapers, sewage waste, animal waste, and other harmful materials often seen scattered in public areas and dumped into water channels, a practice that has led to severe pollution and growing health risks.

"Every conscious citizen must understand their environmental responsibility and cooperate fully in keeping the surroundings clean and healthy," the administration stated, warning that anyone found contributing to environmental pollution would face strict legal action.

Officials said that cleanliness is not just a government duty but a collective responsibility of society. "Without public cooperation, no campaign can succeed. People must stop treating roads and water bodies as dumping sites," an official said.

Authorities added that inspections will be intensified in the coming days, and violators will be penalized under relevant laws to curb pollution and restore environmental hygiene across the region—(KNO)

## Srinagar infra projects to ease traffic congestion: DC

Srinagar, Feb 14: Stating that the Government of India is funding multiple infrastructure projects in Srinagar to improve traffic flow, connectivity and urban facilities, Deputy Commissioner Srinagar Akashay Labroo on Saturday said that work on several key projects, including vehicular underpasses, a foot overbridge, and the city ring road, will begin very soon.

The DC said the vehicular underpasses near Mominabad and Nowgam Railway Station have received approval from the Government of India and the final designs have been finalized.

He said the Government of India has approved the designs and the final plans are ready. "A foot overbridge is also planned at Children's Hospital, Bemina. Surveys and field inspections have started. Work will begin very soon," said.

The DC also said these projects will help decongest city traffic and improve connectivity.

He also highlighted the National Clean Air Programme (NCAP), implemented by the Srinagar Municipal Corporation, as a key contributor to urban development. "NCAP funds are supporting major projects across the city. At Sonarcoal, we have proposed an alternate route behind SMHS Hospital to strengthen health infrastructure, including the super-specialty hospital and government medical college."

"Work has started using Government of India funds in convergence with NCAP," he said.

The DC Labroo also urged senior citizens above 70 to avail the Pradhan



Mantri Vaya Vandana Yojana (PMVVY). "Eligible citizens will receive a card like the Ayushman Bharat Golden Card, providing medical coverage of up to Rs 5 lakh. You can go to any BMO office in Srinagar or call the numbers available on our website and social media. The district administration will ensure you receive the benefits," he added.

He further highlighted the Sanat Nagar project, recently completed and opened for vehicular movement, which was also funded by the Government of India.

The Deputy Commissioner said work on the Srinagar Ring Road Phase-1 and Phase-2 is underway.

"Phase-1 will connect districts surrounding Srinagar and South Kashmir. Phase-2 is also being implemented. These projects, funded by the Government of India and the National Highways Authority of India (NHAI), will gradually decongest city traffic and upgrade infrastructure," he said.

## Those holding 'illegal' land cannot label others grabbers: AIP MLA

Srinagar, Feb 14: Taking a jibe at Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP), Awami Ittihad Party (AIP) MLA Sheikh Khursheed on Saturday alleged that those holding illegal land have no right to label others as land grabbers. He also accused the ruling National Conference (NC) of political silence despite a massive mandate.


Khursheed said a BJP legislator who branded Kashmiris as land grabbers must first clarify his own position. "Those who hold illegal land cannot sermon others or give them the tag of land grabbers," he said.

He accused BJP leader Javid Qureshi of illegally occupying a fisheries hut in Handwara. "The government property cannot be occupied in the name of any political party and questioned why authorities have not taken action," the AIP leader said.

Khursheed alleged selective enforcement by the administration. "The poor people are targeted in the name of law, while influential figures escape scrutiny," he claimed. "Lakhs of rupees in revenue could have been generated if such assets were properly outsourced instead of being occupied."

The AIP accused the BJP of sustaining its politics through regional and religious division. He said the party has nothing to offer except attempts to divide Jammu and Kashmir.

"Jammu and Kashmir is one unit, and divisive statements can deepen regional tensions, especially when Jammu holds a



major share in reservation quotas," he warned.

Khursheed claimed that NC and BJP are hand in glove. "Both parties adopt one stance inside the Assembly and another outside," he said. The MLA said the NC failed to raise core political issues in the House despite seeking votes on those commitments during elections. "People are disappointed. The government has stepped back from the political aspirations of the people," he said.

Acknowledging that the government is gradually delivering on developmental measures such as free gas cylinders, 200 units of free electricity and marriage assistance, Khursheed said development alone is not enough.

"The ruling party secured votes on promises related to Article 370, Article 35A, restoration of statehood, release of political prisoners and stopping termination of employees.

If they cannot stop these measures, they should at least speak up," he said—(KNO)

## Chadoora bridge shutdown enters third month, residents suffer

Budgam, Feb 14: The vital Chadoora bridge in Budgam, which connects Srinagar to Charar-i-Sharif and Yousmarg, has remained closed to traffic since November 28, 2025, due to structural damage caused by floods. The prolonged closure has caused severe and ongoing inconvenience for residents, who are now forced to take alternative routes.

Nazir Ahmad, a resident, recounted a recent incident: "An auto tried to cross the river in the evening, as the occupants did not know about the alternative route via the college side. They remained stuck in the

river for hours. We are thankful to the Chadoora police, who helped rescue them and saved their lives."

"The administration has opened an alternative route from the New Bus Adda side, but it remains plagued by traffic jams as the road is narrow. People continue to face hardship. Students reach institutions late, and patients, particularly pregnant women and the elderly, cannot reach hospitals on time," he added.

Another local, Yaqoob Ahmad, said that despite assurances from the administration since the very beginning about installing a Bailey bridge as an alternative route, more than two months have passed and people are still waiting. "On January 27, Deputy Chief Minister Srinagar Choudhary said that the department had assured him the Bailey bridge would be completed soon, yet 17 days later, the work remains unfinished," he said.

## Union Budget 2026-27: Rural Transformation through Decentralization

India's rural development trajectory over the past decade indicates a structural transition from fragmented welfare provision towards an integrated, decentralised, and community-led development paradigm

India's pursuit of inclusive growth under the development framework of Sabka Saath, Sabka Vikas, Sabka Prayas, Sabka Vishwas has produced measurable outcomes in recent years. These outcomes are reflected in sustained poverty reduction, a gradual narrowing of socio-economic inequalities, and improved access to basic services. Rural transformation has been central to this process, as a large share of India's population continues to reside in rural areas and remains dependent on public investment, local institutions, and community-based governance structures for socio-economic advancement.

A combination of expanded public expenditure, infrastructure development, reforms to employment frameworks, the adoption of digital technologies, and stronger participation by local governments and community institutions has increasingly shaped rural development in India. This paradigmatic shift reflects a broader understanding of inclusive development that emphasises fairness, dignity, and equal rights, with a particular focus on empowering vulnerable and marginalised groups.

Union Budget allocations for Rural Development increased from 87,765 crore in 2016-17 to 2,73,108 crore in 2026-27, representing a rise of over 211 per cent during the decade. These figures indicate a sustained fiscal commitment to strengthening rural infrastructure, livelihoods, and local institutional capacity.

## Policy Shift: From Welfare Delivery to Decentralised Partnerships

An essential dimension of this transformation is the gradual shift away from a purely government-led model of development towards more community-driven, decentralised approaches. Local governments and grassroots institutions are increasingly recognised as critical actors in planning, implementation, and monitoring of development initiatives. This transition has enabled local voices to shape development priorities, making growth processes more participatory, context-specific, and sustainable.

The 73rd Constitutional Amendment (1992) institutionalised Panchayati Raj Institutions (PRIs) as vehicles of grassroots democracy, enabling communities to participate directly in the planning, implementation, and monitoring of development initiatives. Building on this foundation, major national programmes such as the Viksit Bharat-Guarantee for Rozgar and Ajeekika Mission (Gramin), formerly MGNREGS, Deendayal Antyodaya Yojana-National Rural Livelihoods Mission, Swachh Bharat Mission, and the Jal Jeevan Mission have embedded participatory mechanisms by working through panchayats, self-help groups (SHGs), and grassroots organisations.

This policy evolution reflects the principle of Jan Bhagidari, which marks a shift from beneficiary-based participation to active partnership between the state and communities. Participation is increasingly supported through capacity building, technology-enabled engagement, strengthened community institutions, and participatory planning and budgeting processes. Fiscal decentralisation has further reinforced this approach. Direct fiscal transfers to panchayats have been increased from around 2.36 lakh crore under the 15th Finance Commission (2021-2026) to nearly 4.35 lakh crore under the 16th Finance Commission (2026-2031), thereby significantly enhancing local financial autonomy.

## Social Protection Expansion and Poverty Reduction Outcomes in India

India has recorded substantial advances in expanding social protection and reducing poverty, underpinned by sustained public investments in the social sector. Coverage under social protection systems (which includes access to improved drinking water, household electrification, and rural sanitation) increased markedly from 22 percent in 2016 to 64.3 percent in 2025, reflecting a significant broadening of social security reach. This expansion has been supported by a steady rise in social services expenditure (SSE), which has grown consistently since FY22. Between FY22 and FY26 (BE), SSE grew at a compound annual growth rate (CAGR) of 12 percent, with education and health expenditures rising at 11 percent and 8 percent, respectively.

## Assessing Poverty through Multi-Dimensional Indicators

India's Multidimensional Poverty Index (MPI), published by NITI Aayog, indicates Poverty Headcount Ratio declined from 55.3 per cent in 2005-06 to 14.96 percent in 2019-21 and further to 11.28 percent in 2022-23. Estimates based on the Tendulkar Committee methodology similarly indicate a pronounced reduction in poverty over time. Between 2011-12 and 2023-24, poverty incidence is estimated to have declined sharply, with low levels observed across both rural and urban areas and across states. Taken together, these trends suggest that sustained economic growth, in conjunction with targeted social welfare interventions and expanded access to basic services, has contributed to a significant reduction in poverty in India. This progress reflects the combined efforts of central and state governments through a range of welfare programmes

and context-specific policy innovations. Enhancing Rural Living Standards through Basic Services

Public policy in India is oriented towards expanding equal opportunity, reducing absolute poverty, and mitigating the risk of widening inequality. Government initiatives have focused on expanding access to affordable housing, food and social security, financial inclusion, universal basic services, and affordable healthcare. Together, these interventions have played a central role in improving living standards, particularly in rural areas. The scale and outcomes of these interventions are reflected in the Ministry of Statistics and Programme Implementation's (MOSPI's) Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) National Indicator Framework Progress Report, 2025, which documents substantial advances across multiple development indicators.

## Accessibility to Safe Drinking Water

Access to safe drinking water in rural areas has reached near-universal coverage. It has seen transformative progress under the Jal Jeevan Mission (JJM), launched in 2019 to achieve Har Ghar Jal. At inception, only 3.23 crore rural households (17 per cent) had tap water connections.

By November 2025, an additional 12.50 crore households were covered, raising total coverage to about 15.74 crore households. Therefore, the proportion of rural households using improved drinking water sources increased from 94.6 per cent in 2015-16 to 99.6 percent in 2024-25. The Economic Survey 2025-26 reports that independent assessments have identified significant social and health benefits, including substantial time savings for women, increased participation in economic activities, and reduced incidence of waterborne diseases. Significant improvements in sanitation and electricity access have further complemented these gains.

## Accessibility to Sanitation Facilities

The Swachh Bharat Mission (Gramin) was launched in 2014 to achieve Open Defecation Free (ODF) status nationwide by October 2019, and all districts were declared ODF by 2019-20. As of December 31, 2025, over 96 percent of villages under the Swachh Bharat Mission have attained ODF Plus status. An ODF Plus village is defined as one that sustains its ODF Status, ensures solid and liquid waste management, and remains visually clean. As of February 9, 2026, there are 5.68 lakh ODF Plus villages in our country, of which 5.29 lakh have suitable arrangements for solid waste management and 5.46 lakh have suitable arrangements for liquid waste management. So far, 2,331 plastic waste management units, 2.70 lakh community sanitary complexes, and 12.05 crore household toilets have been constructed.

## Ensuring Universal Household Electrification

Pradhan Mantri Sahaj Bijli Har Ghar Yojana (SAUBHAGYA) was launched in 2017 to achieve universal household electrification by providing electricity connections to all willing un-electrified households in rural areas and all willing poor households in urban areas in the country. In 2017, the total number of un-electrified households was estimated at 3 crores, against which 2.86 crore households across the country were electrified by FY 2021-22. As of March 31, 2019, all States have reported 100% electrification of all the willing un-electrified households identified.

## Expanding Access to Safe and Affordable Rural Housing

Housing constitutes a critical determinant of dignity, safety, and economic participation among low-income households. Implemented since April 2016, the Pradhan Mantri Awas Yojana-Gramin (PMAY-G) aims to achieve the objective of Housing for All by 2029 by providing pucca dwellings with basic amenities to eligible rural households. Against an overall target of 4.95 crore houses, 4.14 crore units have been allocated to States and Union Territories, of which 3.86 crore have been sanctioned and 2.93 crore completed to date. In addition, 76.98 lakh dwelling units pending from earlier housing schemes have been completed, bringing the total number of rural houses constructed over the past 11 years to 3.70 crore. Reflecting the heightened policy emphasis on rural housing, budgetary allocations for PMAY-G increased from 15,000 crore in 2016-17 to 54,916.70 crore in 2026-27.

## Ensuring Last-Mile Access through Rural Roads Connectivity

Rural connectivity is a foundational pillar of rural development, directly contributing to poverty reduction by enhancing access to healthcare, education, markets, and employment opportunities. Launched in 2000, the Pradhan Mantri Gram Sadak Yojana (PMGSY-I) was designed to provide all-weather road connectivity to eligible unconnected habitations. As of mid-January 2026, more than 99.6 percent of eligible habitations had been connected. Under PMGSY-I, a total of 1,63,665 roads spanning 6.25 lakh kilometres, along with 7,210 bridges, have been completed.

Launched in 2013, the Pradhan Mantri Gram Sadak Yojana (PMGSY-II) focused on strengthening and upgrading the existing rural road network. As of mid-January 2026, a total of 6,612 roads covering 49,087 kilometres, along with 749 bridges, had been completed under this phase. Subsequently, PMGSY-III, approved in 2019, aims at consolidating 1.25 lakh kilometres of critical

rural routes linking habitations to agricultural markets, educational institutions, and healthcare facilities. Under PMGSY-III, more than 1.02 lakh kilometres of roads and 1,734 bridges have been completed to date. Reflecting sustained policy emphasis on rural connectivity, budgetary allocations for PMGSY increased from 12,581 crore in 2016-17 to 19,000 crore in 2026-27.

## Improving Access to Services and Inclusion for Tribal and Vulnerable Communities

Targeted infrastructure interventions have increasingly prioritised tribal and particularly vulnerable communities. Under the PM-Janjati Adivasi Nyaya Maha Abhiyan (PM-JANMAN), which seeks to achieve saturation of government schemes across 28,700 habitations of Particularly Vulnerable Tribal Groups (PVTGs), a total of 2,495 roads spanning 7,324 kilometres and 164 bridges have been sanctioned, with 263 roads completed as of January 15, 2026. Complementing these efforts, the Dharti Abha-Janjati Gram Utkarsh Abhiyan (DA-JGUA) covers more than 63,000 tribal villages and focuses on enhancing access to drinking water, housing, education, healthcare, and livelihood opportunities.

Environmental sustainability and livelihood-linked infrastructure are further advanced through initiatives that strengthen community stewardship of natural resources. The establishment of 4,105 Van Dhan Vikas Kendras has benefited approximately 1.2 million individuals. At the same time, the implementation of the Forest Rights Act, 2006, has resulted in the distribution of over 2.5 million forest titles, thereby reinforcing community control over land and forest resources.

## Digitalisation and Technology-Led Service Delivery in Rural Areas

Digitalisation has emerged as a critical enabler of inclusive and efficient service delivery in rural India. The integration of administrative reforms with technology adoption has enhanced transparency, participation, and accountability in the implementation of rural programmes, while simultaneously expanding access to public services in remote and underserved areas. Aadhaar seeding has developed rapidly. Aadhaar-based payment systems have been widely adopted, and electronic wage disbursements have become nearly universal. Programme monitoring has been strengthened through large-scale geo-tagging of assets, with a growing proportion of assets being created at the individual household level.

The SVAMITVA scheme uses drone-based mapping to formalise rural property rights, reduce disputes, and enhance access to credit and government services. As of December 2025, surveys covered 3.28 lakh villages and generated 2.76 crore property cards across 1.82 lakh villages. Complementing this, the Namo Drone Didi initiative supports women's participation in the digital economy through drone-based agricultural and mapping services, with 1,094 drones distributed to SHG Dronis in 2023-24.

Land governance reforms under the Digital India Land Records Modernisation Programme (DILRMP) have further advanced digitisation, with 99.8 percent of rural Records of Rights digitised, 95.73 percent of Sub-Registration Offices computerised, and Unique Land Parcel Identification Numbers (ULPIN/Bhu-Aadhaar) assigned to 36.67 crore land parcels, strengthening transparency and access to land-related services.

## Community-Led Institutions enabling Inclusive Governance and Livelihoods

India's development experience highlights state capacity as a human system, in which community institutions, frontline workers, and local administrators are central to effective last-mile service delivery across health, education, skills, and livelihoods. Strengthening their capacities enhances local-level responsiveness, accountability, and the overall effectiveness of public service delivery.

## Empowering Youth and Panchayats for Effective Local Governance

The Model Youth Gram Sabha (MYGS) promotes democratic engagement and civic awareness by familiarising students with grassroots governance through simulated Gram Sabha processes in schools. Implemented nationwide through institutions such as Jawahar Navodaya Vidyalayas and Eklavya Model Residential Schools, it builds leadership skills while reinforcing transparency, inclusivity, and accountability in local governance.

Complementing this, the Revamped Rashtriya Gram Swaraj Abhiyan (RGSA) strengthens decentralised governance by enhancing the institutional capacity of Panchayati Raj Institutions through leadership development, e-governance, and deeper constitutional devolution. Implemented during FY 2022-23 to 2025-26 with an outlay of

5.91 crore, RGSA aims to improve the efficiency and participatory quality of local governance. In the recent Union Budget 2026-27, 1,142 crore has been allocated for RGSA, reflecting continued emphasis on strengthening grassroots institutions.

## Women-Led Institutions as Drivers of Rural Transformation

Women-led institutions are central to the Deendayal Antyodaya Yojana-National Rural Livelihoods Mission (DAY-NRLM), positioning

women as key drivers of rural transformation. The programme has been allocated 19,200 crore in the Union Budget 2026-27. Through Self-Help Groups (SHGs) and their federations, the programme provides the rural households with a collective platform for savings, access to credit, and community support. To date, 10.05 crore women have been mobilised into 90.09 lakh SHGs, expanding financial inclusion and collective economic action.

Beyond financial intermediation, the programme supports women farmers through sustainable agriculture and livestock interventions, promotes non-farm micro-enterprises, and facilitates livelihood opportunities for landless women based on local resources. Anchored in the Panchsutra and extended through the Dashsutra framework, Self-Help Groups (SHGs) increasingly contribute to community development across health and nutrition, education, local governance, access to entitlements, and sustainable livelihoods, positioning them as central institutions of community-led rural development and social transformation.

## Women-Led Community Resource Pool for Livelihoods and Service Delivery

Community Resource Persons (CRPs), including Bank Sakhis, Krishi Sakhis, Pashu Sakhis, and Enterprise Promotion CRPs, facilitate the smooth functioning of women-led community institutions. These cadres strengthen women's agency, leadership, and livelihood outcomes; currently, 1.49 lakh Bank Sakhis deliver financial services, while over 9 lakh CRPs support agriculture, banking, insurance, nutrition, and allied activities at the grassroots. Over a 6 to 8-year engagement cycle, SHG households are expected to achieve food security and stable incomes, thereby contributing to sustainable livelihood improvements.

Building on this platform, the National Campaign on Entrepreneurship aims to train 50,000 CRPs and provide enterprise development support to 50 lakh SHG members under the vision of "Har Ghar Udyam, Har Gaon Samridh." Women-led BC Sakhis, supported by digital tools and Point of Sale (Pos) devices in collaboration with India Post, have further expanded access to banking and social security services. At the frontline, convergence between DAY-NRLM CRPs and Anganwadi Workers, ANMs, and ASHAs has strengthened SBCC-based community engagement, improving maternal and child health practices and utilisation of health services.

## Samaveshi Aajeevika Yojana: Ultra-Poor Graduation Approach

The Samaveshi Aajeevika Yojana, launched in April 2023, implemented under DAY-NRLM, adopts the Ultra-Poor Graduation Approach to promote sustainable livelihoods among rural women through integrated support across livelihoods, social protection, and financial inclusion. State-level pilots, such as Bihar's Satat Jeevikoparjan Yojana (SJY), demonstrate the model's effectiveness through asset transfers, coaching, capacity building, and time-bound livelihood support, complemented by access to social security schemes and data-driven monitoring through a community-based MIS.

## Community-Led Approaches to Food, Nutrition, Health, and WASH (FNHW)

India's improvements in health and nutrition outcomes reflect the growing role of community-led delivery systems alongside national programmes. As noted in the Economic Survey 2025-26, India has outperformed global averages since 1990, with maternal mortality declining by 86 per cent, under-five mortality by 78 per cent, and neonatal mortality by 70 per cent. Infant mortality fell from 40 per thousand live births in 2013 to 25 in 2025, underscoring sustained progress in maternal and child health.

To strengthen grassroots outcomes, DAY-NRLM has institutionalized Food, Nutrition, Health, and WASH (FNHW) interventions to address persistent challenges related to malnutrition, sanitation, and health awareness. Implemented through state-specific strategies with a strong emphasis on Social and Behaviour Change Communication (SBCC), these interventions cover maternal and child health, diet diversity, anaemia reduction, menstrual hygiene, disease prevention, sanitation practices, and waste management, while promoting nutrition-sensitive livelihoods such as nutri-gardens, backyard poultry, small ruminants, and dairy. By 2025, FNHW interventions had been initiated in 6,406 blocks across 683 districts, strengthening community engagement, enhancing awareness of panchayat-level initiatives and government schemes, and supporting behavioural change toward more inclusive and participatory local governance.

## Skill Development, Entrepreneurship, and Employment in Rural Areas

India's rural labour market exhibits a distinct employment structure shaped by high dependence on agriculture and self-employment. According to the Periodic Labour Force Survey (PLFS) (October-December 2025), rural employment is dominated by agricultural workers (58.5 per cent) and self-employment (63.2 per cent), with women showing relatively higher participation in these categories. This underscores the importance of strengthening livelihoods, skills, and enterprise opportunities suited to rural contexts.

**Skilling Pathways for Inclusive Rural Growth**  
Skill development is a critical instrument for promoting productive employment and diversifying livelihood opportunities in rural areas. The Deen Dayal Upadhyaya Grameen Kaushalya Yojana (DDU-GKY) addresses this objective through demand-driven skill training linked to assured placements, with quality and industry relevance ensured through mandatory third-party certification by National Skill Development Corporation (NSDC) Sector Skill Councils. The programme targets poor rural youth aged 15-35 years, with an extended upper age limit of 45 years for women and other vulnerable groups, including persons with disabilities. Particularly Vulnerable Tribal Groups, and transgender persons.

Implemented across 27 States and 4 Union Territories, DDU-GKY operates through 2,369 training centres covering 37 sectors and 816 job roles. As of October 2025, 82,272 candidates had been trained and 37,035 placed during the year, while cumulatively since inception, 17.92 lakh youth have received training and 11.64 lakh have been placed in wage employment. Complementing DDU-GKY, Rural Self Employment Training Institutes (RSETIs) function under a public-private partnership model across 629 institutes in 616 districts in 33 states/UTs, promoting both wage and self-employment through locally relevant skills and entrepreneurship training. Since its inception, RSETIs have trained nearly 59 lakh rural youth, of whom about 43 lakh have been settled in self- or wage employment, under-scoring their role in strengthening rural labour market outcomes and enterprise creation.

## Entrepreneurship Pathways for Women in Rural India

Promoting women's entrepreneurship is integral to raising rural incomes and increasing female labour force participation. Aligning skill development initiatives with emerging sectors such as manufacturing, renewable energy, digital services, and agro-processing broadens economic opportunities for women. Complementary measures, including 'Back to Work' and 'Returnship Programmes', facilitate workforce re-entry. At the same time, integrating Self-Help Groups (SHGs) into the MSME ecosystem supports women's transition from subsistence activities to formal, growth-oriented enterprises.

## SHE-Marts for Rural Women-led Enterprises

Building on the success of the Lakhpati Didi Programme, the Union Budget 2026-27 proposes establishing Self-Help Entrepreneur (SHE) Marts as community-owned retail outlets within Cluster-Level Federations. Supported by enhanced, innovative financing mechanisms, these initiatives aim to shift women's livelihoods from credit-based activities to sustainable enterprise ownership.

## Advancing Employment Pathways in Rural India

The Viksit Bharat Guarantee for Rozgar and Ajeekika Mission (Gramin) Act, 2025, represents a significant reform in India's rural employment policy. With a budgetary allocation of 95,692.31 crore in 2026-27, the Act modernises the employment guarantee regime by strengthening accountability mechanisms and aligning job creation with objectives of infrastructure development and climate resilience. The Act represents a substantive advancement over MGNREGA.

The legislation introduces a legal entitlement of 125 days of unskilled wage employment per rural household annually.

It identifies four priority domains: water security, rural infrastructure, livelihoods, and disaster preparedness.

It enhances rights-based safeguards through provisions for compensation for delayed employment, removal of disentitlement clauses, and reinforced accountability.

# Satish Sharma reviews border infrastructure development

## 'Access to justice can't remain an abstract ideal reserved for legally empowered'

New Delhi, Feb 14: Chief Justice of India Surya Kant on Saturday said access to justice cannot remain an abstract ideal reserved for the legally empowered and must translate into real outcomes for marginalised citizens.

Speaking at the 11th biennial meeting of the Commonwealth Judicial Educators (CJE) here, CJI Kant said judicial leadership cannot be confined to administrative authority or institutional hierarchy and must be understood as an intellectual and ethical orientation.

"Access to justice cannot remain an abstract ideal reserved for the legally empowered. It must translate into real outcomes for the last person standing in the line, the marginalised citizen whose faith in the justice system rests upon its accessibility, responsiveness and humanity," the CJI said.

While placing stress on integration of technology into the justice system, he said that AI must assist, and not replace, judicial reasoning.

CJI Kant said judicial leadership demands not only administrative foresight but deep empathy, and the courts must be vigilant to ensure that procedural complexity does not transform into a barrier for those in need of protection.

The CJI said the convergence of arbitration, mediation and specialised courts reflects an overarching transformation: from a litigation-centric paradigm to a justice-centric ecosystem.

"This transformation acknowledges that justice must be accessible not only in principle but in practice -- timely, efficient and responsive to the needs of litigants," he said.

CJI Kant said courts must continuously earn public trust through clarity of reasoning, transparency, and consistency.

Judges must appreciate not only the doctrinal aspects of constitutional law but the philosophical foundations that give those doctrines meaning. Comparative constitutional dialogue, historical study, and ethical reflection are essential components of this educational process," he said.

He said courts must act as guardians of constitutional identity even as they adapt to changing realities.

"In an increasingly interconnected world, this responsibility also carries an outward dimension, engaging with global judicial communities to share," he added.

The CJI asked Commonwealth judicial platforms to increasingly recognise jurisprudential contributions emerging from India and the wider Asian region, as it would strengthen shared learning and better reflect the Commonwealth's collective commitment to accessible, people-centred justice.

## India wedded to strategic autonomy: EAM Jaishankar

New Delhi, Feb 14: India is very much wedded to its policy of "strategic autonomy" and the country's energy procurement will be driven by factors like costs, risks and availability.

External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar said on Saturday against the backdrop of Washington's claim that New Delhi has agreed to stop importing Russian crude oil.

In an interactive session alongside German Foreign Minister Johann Wadephul at the Munich Security Conference, Jaishankar said the global energy market is "complex" and India's oil companies will take decisions based on what they consider to be in their best interest.

"We are very much wedded to strategic autonomy because it is very much a part of our history and our evolution. And it is something which is very deep, it is something which cuts across the political spectrum as well," he said.

"As far as energy issues are concerned, this is a

complex market today. I think the oil companies in India, as in Europe, as probably in other parts of the world, look at availability, look at costs, look at risks and take decisions that they feel are in their best interest."

The external affairs minister was responding to a question on whether India will stop buying Russian oil under the provisions of a trade deal and if such a move could impact New Delhi's policy of strategic autonomy.

India has not yet confirmed or denied Washington's claim that it has committed to stopping the procurement of Russian crude oil.

Following a recent phone conversation between Prime Minister Narendra Modi and United States President Donald Trump, both sides announced a reduction of the US tariffs on Indian goods to 18 per cent from 50 per cent.

The reduction included the removal of a 25-per cent tariff that Trump had slapped on India in August last year for New Delhi's purchase of Russian oil.

Jaishankar said India keeps the option of making independent decisions, without always agreeing with its partners in the West.

"We would not necessarily agree on everything, but I do believe that by doing that, and if there is an inclination to find common ground and overlaps, that would happen," he said.

"If the bottomline of your question is -- would I remain independent-minded and make my decisions and would I make choices which may not agree with your thinking -- yes, it can happen," he said.

The external affairs minister also strongly called for reforms in the United Nations, especially in view of the profound changes that the world has been witnessing.

These developments also underline the need to reform the UN, especially after the world experienced a series of shocks over the last five years, including the COVID-19 pandemic, the Ukraine conflict, the tensions in the Middle East, and the rise of China and its impact on global systems, he said.

### Rs 40 cr heroin

(KNO) a spokesperson said a significant achievement on Anti-drug trafficking front, Jammu Police along with 165Bn BSF, achieved a major breakthrough, recovering huge quantity of narcotics (Suspected Drone Dropping) worth 40 Crores in R S Pura sector of District Jammu near International border.

He said, as acting promptly on inputs by 165Bn BSF regarding suspicious drone activity near International border, a Cordon and search operation was launched jointly by Jammu Police and 165 Bn BSF during the intervening night of 13/14-02-2026 at Nai Basti Karotana, Baspur area of R S Pura sector near International border.

"During search at first light, two yellow coloured packets of narcotics were recovered from the Wheat fields at Nai Basti Karotana, the area is near international border and it is suspected to be drone dropping from Pakistan in the Indian Territory."

The spokesperson said, each packet appeared to contain heroin-like substance, recovery memo has also been prepared in presence of magistrate, the recovered packets contain appropriately 6.582 kg Heroin-like substance worth rupees 40 Crores in the international market.

"In this regard case FIR No. 36/2026 under section 8/21/22 NDPS Act and investigation of case take up by SHO Police Station R.S Pura, Inspector Ravi Singh Parihar assisted by Incharge BPP Baspura, SI Ranbir Singh under the supervision of SP Headquarters Jammu," said the spokesperson.

He said, further investigation is underway to trace the exact source and destination of the recovered contraband. Police is thoroughly examining both the backward and forward linkages in the case and more breakthroughs are expected.

"Jammu Police urges citizens to come forward with any information regarding illegal drug activities in their localities including those residing near International border. With continued public cooperation, sincere efforts are being made to build a drug-free and crime-free society," the spokesperson said further. (KNO)

The official figures further state that the dropout rates have declined sharply to 1.5 percent at primary, 3.2 percent at upper primary, and 12.9 percent at secondary levels.

Meanwhile, teachers in the schools told KNO that there could be various reasons for the transition rate of students from secondary to senior secondary in Jammu and Kashmir.

One of the teachers said, "There can be various reasons for the dropout rate among the students of elementary and secondary levels. Mostly, the students come from financially unstable families and quit studies midway."

"Nowadays, many students are either seen quitting studies midway either to earn for their families or are setting up their own businesses. Some students don't want to be regular in class but continue their studies simultaneously while working," said another teacher.

"There are a number of Out of School Children (OoSC) in JK. The students from nomadic tribes also give less preference to the studies," the teacher said.

Pertinently, the government in 2025 had said that "about 46,000 Out of School Children (OoSC) have been mainstreamed". (KNO)

## PM Modi inaugurates bridge on Brahmaputra; unveils IIM, data centre in Assam

Guwahati, Feb 14: Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Saturday inaugurated several projects in Assam, including a bridge on the Brahmaputra River, an IIM and a data centre for the northeastern region.

The projects, which were rolled out months ahead of Assam assembly elections, aim to boost connectivity, strengthen digital infrastructure, promote higher education and enhance public transport.

Modi reached the state on a day-long visit to inaugurate an emergency landing facility (ELF) at Moran in Dibrugarh district and launch projects worth over Rs 5,500 crore.

The first project the prime minister inaugurated in the state capital was a six-lane bridge over the Brahmaputra River. He launched the Kumar Bhaskar Varma Setu, built at a cost of around Rs 3,030 crore.

The six-lane extradosed Pre-stressed Concrete (PSC) bridge will connect Guwahati with North Guwahati and is the first extradosed bridge in the Northeast.

After the inauguration, Modi took a walk on the bridge.

Assam Governor Lakshman Prasad Acharya and Chief Minister Himanta Biswa were present on the occasion.

The bridge will cut travel time between Guwahati and North Guwahati to just seven minutes. Presently, only the Saraihat Bridge in Jaliukbari area connects the two banks of the Brahmaputra in the capital region, with travel time taking around 30 minutes.

Considering the high seismicity of the region, the bridge incorporates base isolation technology using friction pendulum bearings, according to a statement issued by the prime minister's office.

High-performance stay cables were used to ensure durability and long-term structural performance, it added.

"A Bridge Health Monitoring System (BHMS) has also been incorporated for real-time condition monitoring, early damage detection and improved safety and service life of the extradosed bridge," the PMO statement said.

Modi had laid the foundation stone for the bridge on February 9, 2019 and construction started on March 1, 2020 by the then Assam chief minister Sarbananda Sonowal.

The initial cost of the bridge was Rs 2,608 crore, which escalated to Rs 3,030 crore, and the project was estimated to be completed within



four years. The length of the bridge is 7.75 km, including approach roads and flyovers on both sides of the Brahmaputra, while the actual bridge over the river is 1.24 km long.

The project was implemented by the Assam Public Works Department with consultancy services from Systra Engenharia Consultoria Ltd of Brazil. The contractor for the bridge was S P Singla Construction Pvt Ltd and the funding agency was the New Development Bank, with 20 per cent of the total project cost borne by the Assam government.

A senior official of the Assam government told PTI that after its formal opening to the public, the bridge will remain open exclusively for pedestrians till February 28.

Later, in nearby Lachit Ghat, Modi unveiled the Indian Institute of Management Guwahati, inaugurated a high-tech data centre that would cater to the entire Northeast, and flagged off 225 electric buses for four cities, including the Assam capital.

Union Minister of Ports, Shipping and Waterways Sarbananda Sonowal, several state ministers, MPs, MLAs and senior government officials were also present along with the CM and governor during inauguration of these projects.

The PM virtually inaugurated the temporary campus of the IIM Guwahati, which is expected to give a major fillip to higher education and management education in the northeastern region.

The main IIM Guwahati project will entail an expenditure of Rs 555 crore. The central government had last year approved the establishment of an IIM in Guwahati. This is the second IIM in the Northeast and the 22nd in the country. The first IIM in the region is in Shillong.

The permanent campus will be developed at Palasbari near Guwahati, while the institute will commence its academic session from a transit campus at Tech City, Bongora. IIM Ahmedabad will monitor the temporary arrangements," the Assam government official said.

The PM also virtually inaugurated the National Data Centre (NDC) for the northeastern region, set up at an investment of Rs 348 crore at Amingaon in Kamrup district of Assam.

The state-of-the-art data centre with a total sanctioned load of 8.5 MW and an average rack capacity of 10 kW per rack will host mission-critical applications of various government departments and also function as a disaster recovery centre for other NDCs.

"This will enable governments in the Northeast to digitally facilitate the delivery of essential citizen-centric services," the PMO said.

Aligned with the vision of Digital India, the NDC for the Northeast has been envisaged as a strategic intervention to strengthen the region's ICT backbone and ensure robust, secure and always-available digital infrastructure.

Modi also flagged off 225 electric buses under the PM-eBus Seva Scheme.

Of these, 100 buses are for Guwahati, 50 each for Nagpur and Bhavnagar, and 25 for Chandigarh.

"With the launch of e-bus operations under the PM-eBus Seva Scheme in these four cities, more than 50 lakh citizens are expected to benefit through access to clean, affordable and reliable public transport services, contributing to improved urban mobility and enhanced quality of life," the PMO statement added.

## India raises its commitment to climate action to 5.6% of GDP: FM Sitharaman

New Delhi, Feb 14: The BJP alleged on Saturday that former Union minister Kapil Sibal received an award funded by convicted American sex offender Jeffrey Epstein at an event in the US in 2010 and demanded a response on the issue from Congress leader Rahul Gandhi. When asked, Sibal dismissed the ruling BJP's claim as "rubbish".

In a post on X, BJP national spokesperson Pradeep Bhandari said, "In 2010, an award reportedly funded by Jeffrey Epstein was received by senior Congress leader Kapil Sibal, a figure long seen as close to the Gandhi family."

Sam Pitroda, Congress's overseas department head, too, was associated with the "same circles", Bhandari alleged.

He posted on X a document,

which purportedly had Sibal's name on the list of awardees,

alongside other dignitaries,

including Pitroda, at the 2010 International Awards Gala that was organised in New York.

"Soon after that period, several policy shifts were witnessed during the then Congress-led government," the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) leader alleged. "Were these coincidences, or did external influence of Epstein attempt to shape decisions of Congress govt. Rahul Gandhi should answer!" he said, adding, "Epstein -- Congress Government's Valentine" Sibal quit the Congress in 2022. He is currently an independent member of the Rajya Sabha, backed by the Samajwadi Party.

## Govt launches PM RAHAT to provide emergency response system for accident victims

New Delhi, Feb 14: The government on Saturday announced the launch of PM RAHAT (Road Accident Victim Hospitalisation and Assured Treatment) Scheme, reflecting a governance approach rooted in Seva - service, compassion and protection for vulnerable citizens," MoRTH said.

India records a significant number of road accident fatalities every year, many of which are preventable with timely medical intervention, the Ministry of Road, Transport and Highways (MoRTH) said in a statement.

The ministry said that studies indicate that nearly 50 per cent of road accident deaths can be averted if victims are admitted to hospital within the first hour.

"In its very first decision after shifting to Seva Teerth, the Prime

Minister approved the launch of the PM RAHAT (Road Accident Victim Hospitalisation and Assured Treatment) Scheme, reflecting a governance approach rooted in Seva - service, compassion and protection for vulnerable citizens," MoRTH said.

The decision underscores the government's commitment to ensuring that no life is lost due to lack of immediate medical assistance after a road accident.

By approving PM RAHAT from Seva Teerth, the Prime Minister has prioritised life-saving intervention, financial certainty for hospitals, and a structured emergency response system for accident victims.

Integration with the Emergency Response Support System (ERS) 112 helpline ensures that accident

victims reach hospitals within the Golden Hour.

Road accident victims, Rah-Veer (Good Samaritans), or any person at the accident site may dial 112 to obtain details of the nearest designated hospital and request ambulance assistance, enabling swift coordination between emergency responders, police authorities and hospitals.

Under the Scheme, every eligible road accident victim in any category of road will be entitled to cashless treatment up to Rs 1.5 lakh per victim, for a period of 7 days from the date of the accident.

Stabilization treatment will be provided for up to 24 hours in non-life-threatening cases and up to 48 hours in life-threatening cases, subject to police authentication on an integrated digital system.

## 'Bangladesh cabinet oath in next four days'

Dhaka, Feb 14: Bangladesh President Mohammed Shahabuddin is expected to administer the oath of office to the new cabinet of BNP chairman Tariq Rahaman within next four days, officials said on Saturday.

Rahman's Bangladesh Nationalist Party (BNP) on Friday secured a sweeping victory with more than two-thirds majority in the landmark parliamentary elections held on Thursday.

The BNP leader is set to become the prime minister, replacing the interim government chief Muhammad Yunus.

"In line with the Constitution, the president will administer the oath at Bangabhaban (presidential palace)," Cabinet Secretary Sheikh Abdur Rashid said without giving any specific date for the oath ceremony.

But a senior BNP policy making leader, preferring anonymity, told PTI that the swearing in ceremony is expected to be held on February 16 or 17.

The Constitution requires the cabinet oath taking ceremony to be followed by the swearing-in of new parliament members while a key aide to Rahman said the existing legal scenario made the issue a little complicated.

"The speaker of the last parliament is supposed to conduct the MPs' oath of office but she resigned and is living in an undisclosed location. The deputy speaker is in jail," he said, wishing not to be named.

In such circumstances, he



said, the president might select someone to conduct the event of administering the lawmakers' oath as "the Constitution has kept a provision" for such an eventuality.

The cabinet secretary, meanwhile, said the Constitution says the MPs-elect must take oath within three days of the gazette notification and then the majority party would elect its parliamentary leader. The gazette notification was issued on Saturday morning.

Asked for the possible date of cabinet's swearing in, Rashid said no date was fixed yet.

"If we are instructed or indicated that it will be held on a certain date and at a certain time, we will work accordingly. Even if it is tomorrow, we will have to prepare for tomorrow. We will be able to tell you the date once we are informed," the top bureaucrat said.

Law ministry officials said, since the gazette notification was issued on Saturday, the three-day period for the oath taking could

be considered from Sunday covering 15, 16 and 17 February.

The 13th Parliamentary election assumed significance as it was held after a period of tumultuous political vacuum, instability and fragile security situation, including widespread attacks on minorities after the student-led protests brought down the 15-year rule of Sheikh Hasina in August 2024. Hasina fled to India on August 5 that year and three days later, Yunus took over as the Chief Adviser of the Interim government.

According to the Election Commission (EC), the BNP has bagged 209 out of 297 seats, while right-wing Jamaat-e-Islami secured 68 seats. Hasina's Awami League party was barred from contesting the polls, which recorded 59.44 per cent voter turnout.

The EC postponed the announcement of results in two seats - Chattogram-2 and Chattogram-4 while the election in one seat was postponed due to the death of a candidate.

Rubio tells Munich security forum that US, Europe belong together

Munich, Feb 14: US Secretary of State Marco Rubio gave a message of unity to Europeans on Saturday, saying Washington does not intend to abandon the transatlantic alliance, but that Europe's leaders had made a number of policy mistakes and need to change course.

Rubio's overall message of togetherness at the annual Munich Security Conference was relatively well-received by the gathering of European diplomats and security officials.

Even as Rubio at times needled European policymakers, his address contrasted sharply with Vice President JD Vance's address here a year ago, in which he argued that the greatest danger to the continent came from censorship and democratic backsliding - rather than external threats like Russia.

"In a time of headlines heralding the end of the transatlantic era, let it be known and clear to all that this is neither our goal nor our wish, because for us Americans, our home may

be in the western hemisphere, but we will always be a child of Europe," Rubio told the crowd.

The address was notably short on specifics. Rubio did not mention Russia - the continent's main geopolitical foil - during the roughly half-hour address, nor did he even bring up NATO by name, the continent's main security bloc.

## China warns US 'plotting' on Taiwan could lead to 'confrontation'

Munich, Feb 14: Beijing's top diplomat Wang Yi warned the United States on Saturday against "plotting" on Taiwan, saying it could lead to a "confrontation" with China.

Speaking at the Munich Security Conference in Germany, Foreign Minister Wang said that in the future, the United States has long been the democratic island's most important backer and biggest arms provider, and Taiwan would be heavily reliant on US support in a potential conflict with China.

"This could very likely lead to a confrontation between

China and the United States," he said. He added that he hoped Washington would pursue a "positive and pragmatic" approach, "but we are also prepared to deal with various risks."

China claims self-ruled Taiwan as its own territory and has not ruled out the use of force to bring it under its control.

The United States has long been the democratic island's most important backer and biggest arms provider, and Taiwan would be heavily reliant on US support in a potential conflict with China.

During his Saturday

comments, Wang also weighed in on Beijing's current relationship with Tokyo, which has been under heavy strain since Prime Minister Sanae Takaichi took office in October.

"The Japanese people should no longer allow themselves to be manipulated or deceived by those far-right forces, or by those who seek to revive militarism," Wang said.

"All peace-loving countries should send a clear warning to Japan: if it chooses to walk back on this path, it will only be heading toward self-destruction."

## Rashid, Banton guide England to 5-wicket win over Scotland

Kolkata, Feb 14: Veteran leg-spinner Adil Rashid returned with figures of 3/36 before Tom Banton smashed an unbeaten fifty in the middle overs to guide England to a comfortable five-wicket win over Scotland in a T20

World Cup Group C match here on Saturday.

Opting to bowl first, England rode on Rashid's exploits to bowl out Scotland for 152.

Pacer Jofra Archer and left-arm spinner Liam Dawson also chipped in with two wickets apiece. Captain Richie Berrington top-scored for Scotland

with a 32-ball 49 while opener Michael Jones contributed 33.

Chasing, England didn't have the best of starts losing both their openers -- Phil Salt and Jos Buttler -- inside two overs.

But Jacob Bethell (32 off 28 balls) and Banton (63 not out off 41 balls) shared 66 runs for the third wicket to get England's chase back on track.

Sam Curran played a 20-ball 28-run short cameo, while Will Jacks made unbeaten 16 off 10 balls towards the end as England chased down the target of 153 with 10 balls to spare.

## Tariq is different from other spinners but Abhishek can help tackle him: Harbhajan

Colombo, Feb 14: Former India cricketer Harbhajan Singh was relieved to see Abhishek Sharma regaining his fitness, stating that the swashbuckling opener's presence will help India neutralise Pakistan's unorthodox spinner Usman Tariq in their T20 World Cup match here on Sunday.

Off-spinner Tariq's outing against Indian batters at the Premadasa will be keenly watched because of the pause ahead of delivery and sling action.

"See, he's someone that I have seen him bowl in ILT20, where he was a pick of the bowlers. Whenever he got the opportunity to play in the semifinal and the final, he was the man-of-the-match. He is different from the other spinners and has a lot of variations," Harbhajan told PTI.

"People are talking about him for his stand and deliver action. It's not easy. You know, anybody can stand and bowl, but you've got to have different variations, which he's got and he's hard to hit in bigger grounds and slower pitches."

"So, all I want to say is that be a little bit mindful when you're playing against someone whom you have never faced before. India can tackle him and not give him any big wicket. It's good to see Abhishek coming back, who plays spin really well and dominates (spin), throughout his innings," he added.

But what exactly is that Abhishek, who has recovered from a stomach bug that forced him to skip the match against Namibia in New Delhi, brings to the table against spinners?

"Abhishek is a quality player. He is a player who is determined to win the match on his own. I have played a lot of cricket. I know that he is a proper batsman who has all the shots."

"A lot of batsmen do not have all the shots. He (Abhishek) is not like that. He hits the first ball. And as long as he is on the crease, he keeps hitting. So, he is a proper batsman," he noted.

Harbhajan also exhorted the teams to put behind the unsavoury build-up to Sunday's match and concentrate on the game.

"Of course, there were a lot of hurdles before this game, whether this game will happen or not. But all that is done. Now, the focus should be on cricket, which is the main part. Of course, I'm hoping that India will play well in this game."

"Pakistan is also a very strong team, especially in these conditions with their spinners bowling really well. So, I think it's going to be a great game to watch," he said.

The spinner, who has 711 International wickets, also opined that people should not unnecessarily fret over formalities like handshakes at the toss or after the match.

## Europe needs to take on its responsibilities on security: EU chief

## Zelensky feels 'little bit' of pressure from Trump

"Give us a ceasefire. President Trump can do it: push Putin; make a ceasefire. Then our parliament will change the law and we will go to elections."
