Srinagar, Feb 20: Ahead of scheduled Kashmir visit of Vice-President C P Radhakrishnan on February 26, Inspector General of Police Kashmir, V K Birdi, chaired a high-level review meeting at Police Control Room (PCR) in Srinagar, while another meeting was held within the campus of University of Kashmir, officials told the news agency—Kashmir News Observer (KNO) on Friday.

They said that the Vice-President will attend the 21st convocation ceremony of the KU as chief guest. He will distribute awards and gold medals among the meritorious



students. He will also deliver the convocation address.

Lieutenant Governor Manoj Sinha, Chief Minister Omar Abdullah and Minister of Higher Education, Sakina Itoo and others will also attend the convocation slated for next week, officials added.

Earlier in the day IGP Birdi directed officers to maintain heightened alertness and strengthen security measures across Kashmir ahead of Vice-President's upcoming visit.

An official told KNO that while chairing a security review

meeting at the Police Control Room (PCR) here, IGP Birdi asked officers to intensify intelligence gathering and ensure effective coordination among all security agencies to counter potential threats.

He stressed the need to reinforce security at vulnerable locations, secure vital installations and critical infrastructure, and carry out effective area domination, including night patrolling.

The IGP directed that round-the-clock patrolling be intensified in both urban and rural areas, with enhanced surveillance at key entry and exit points. He also instructed officers to ensure the strategic deployment of counter-insurgency teams and quick reaction teams to respond promptly to any emerging situation.

Birdi told officers to brief personnel thoroughly on standard operating procedures and keep close watch on sensitive areas to enable immediate action against suspicious activities.

In a letter, a copy of which is in possession of news agency—Kashmir News Observer (KNO), the ECI has written to Chief Electoral Officers of 17 States and six Union Territories including Jammu & Kashmir Union Territory to complete preparatory work related to the SIR at the earliest.

"Since the Special Intensive Revision (SIR) in the above States/UTs is expected to start from April, 2026, you are



requested to complete preparatory work related to SIR at the earliest," reads the letter.

On June 24, 2025, the poll-body ordered the Special Intensive Revision (SIR) of electoral rolls to be undertaken in States and UTs.

30,000 vacancies to be filled this year: CM Omar

'No power tariff hike since 2023'

Jammu, Feb 20: The Jammu and Kashmir government will fill more than 30,000 vacancies across departments during the current year, Chief Minister Omar Abdullah told the Legislative Assembly on Friday.

Responding to questions during the Budget Session, Abdullah, as reported by the news agency—Kashmir News Observer (KNO), said systems are in place to periodically assess vacant posts and refer them to the appropriate recruiting agencies. The vacancies, he said, have arisen due



to retirements, promotions, resignations and other administrative reasons.

He said the government has taken steps such as advance identification of posts and streamlining of procedures to

IMD plans doppler radars, weather stations for J&K: Omar

'Ramban, Kishtwar selected for focused intervention'

Jammu, Feb 20: Chief Minister Omar Abdullah on Friday informed the Legislative Assembly that the India Meteorological Department (IMD) plans to expand its observational network in Jammu and Kashmir with additional doppler weather radars and automatic weather stations to improve early warning systems.

In a written reply to a question by National Conference MLA Sajad Shaheen, the Chief Minister, according to the news agency—Kashmir News Observer (KNO) said: "The National Disaster

Management Authority has identified seven districts across Himalayan states for focused intervention. Ramban and Kishtwar have been selected from Jammu and Kashmir."

He said the IMD proposes to install four additional Doppler weather radars and 34 automatic weather stations and snow gauges in the Union Territory. At present, three X-band radars are operational at Srinagar, Jammu and Banihal.

The new radars are proposed at Doda, Rajouri, Anantnag and Baramulla. In addition, 26 automatic weather | [More on P6](#)

Jammu, Feb 20: The Jammu and Kashmir Legislative Assembly on Friday passed the grants for key departments through voice vote, after day-long debate by the members in the House.

The approved grants included Rs 7,462.91 Lakh for Information Technology (IT), Rs 54,389.17 Lakh for Food, Civil Supplies & Consumer Affairs (FCS&CA), Rs 3,798.68 Lakh for ARI & Training, Rs 12,646.11 Lakh for Transport,

Rs 68,009.76 Lakh for Youth Services & Sports (YSS) and Rs 18,972.06 Lakh for Science & Technology (S&T) Department. Minister Satish Sharma, who wound up the discussion, thanked legislators for their active participation and valuable inputs. He highlighted that feedback and suggestions would help strengthen policies, improve project implementation, and enhance departmental effectiveness. Sharma stressed that improvement is a collective endeavor, achievable through dialogue



and constructive criticism, and pledged to address departmental issues during his presentation.

He elaborated on the role of the ARI & Training department as a catalyst for administrative reforms and innovation, promoting a "Whole-of-Government" approach. The department has launched digital initiatives like a single-window online portal for Recruitment Rules and an online NDC system, significantly reducing paperwork and increasing transparency.

Regular administrative inspections aim to identify procedural delays and bottlenecks, driving systemic change.

Looking ahead, Sharma emphasized that the department will focus on capacity building, digitization, and re-engineering to improve efficiency and responsiveness. Incharge, Jal Shakti Department, as reported by the news agency—Kashmir News Observer (KNO), said that a three-member core group was constituted by the Ministry of Water Resources (MoWR), RD&GR on September 18, 2014 to prepare a roadmap for flood management of the Kashmir Valley.

The recommendations were categorised into Immediate, Short-term and Long-term measures.

MLA Kulgam, Mohammad Yousuf Tarigami; CEO/Secretary, Building and Other Construction Workers Welfare Board, Munir Ul Islam; Labour Commissioner, Charandeep Singh and other officers also attended the meeting.

During the meeting, Deputy Chief Minister, as per an official



statement, emphasized on the need to enhance outreach, ensure effective implementation of government welfare schemes for

workers and their families. He directed the concerned officers to expedite cases related to death compensation claims, marriage

assistance, resolution of wage disputes and other welfare assistance to safeguard the interests of workers.

DC Budgam reviews infrastructure, safety issues at NIFT campus

BUDGAM, FEBRUARY 20: Deputy Commissioner (DC) Budgam, Dr. Bilal Mohi-ud-din Bhat, Friday chaired a detailed review meeting to assess the operational and safety-related infrastructure issues of NIFT Budgam at DC office complex Budgam to ensure time-bound completion of all pending works.

The DC, as per an official statement, took stock of the overall physical progress of the campus, which is spread over 132 kanals of land provided by the Government, and comprises 22 planned buildings, of which 19 buildings are substantially complete. He observed that despite significant progress, several critical components remain pending, hindering the full operationalization of the campus.

The DC reviewed agenda-wise issues in detail and issued various directions.

While reviewing HVAC Systems, the chair was informed that HVAC



systems are malfunctioning in the Administrative Block, Academic Block, Girls' Hostel, Guest House, Director's Residence, and Residential Quarters, while installation and commissioning in the Boys' Hostel

remain pending. The DC directed immediate technical inspection of all HVAC installations, rectification of faults, and time-bound commissioning to ensure proper heating and ventilation facilities across all

buildings. He emphasized that given the prevailing climatic conditions, functional HVAC systems are essential for academic functioning and residential comfort.

Regarding the Electrical Sub-Station, the DC was apprised that substation works, including panels, DG sets, and transformers under Packages 2 and 3, are incomplete. The DC directed JK SIDCO and the concerned executing agency to expedite completion of all substation components and ensure reliable and uninterrupted power supply to the campus. He instructed that necessary measures, including utilization of the contractor's security deposits where required, be taken to avoid further delay.

Regarding the Sewage Treatment Plant (STP), the meeting was informed that key components such as the main control panel, sludge drying beds, pumps, and recycled water pipelines are yet to be installed and commissioned.

DDMA Kupwara reviews disaster response preparedness

KUPWARA, FEBRUARY 20: Deputy Commissioner/Chairman District Disaster Management Authority (DDMA) Kupwara, Shrikant Suse, chaired a review meeting to assess the functioning of Incident Response System (IRS).

Detailed discussions held regarding role and responsibilities of different components of IRS including Planning, Logistics, Operation sections, resources mapping as well as functioning of Emergency Operation Centre and Incident Response Teams (IRT).

The IRS, developed by the National Disaster Management Authority (NDMA), provides a standardized disaster response framework. It designates Responsible Officers

and Incident Commanders, supported by Incident Response Teams (IRTs) with specialized operations, planning, and logistics sections, ensuring structured and accountable emergency management.

During the meeting, as per an official statement, it was informed that Incident Response Teams have been notified at District, Sub-Division and Tehsil/Block levels by DDMA.

Stressing the need for preparedness, the Chairman called for the conduct of regular mock drills across the district to strengthen coordination among departments and ensure a robust disaster response mechanism.

The meeting was attended by ADC Kupwara, SE R&B, ASP Kupwara, ACR, Dy. SP DAR Handwara, CPO, CMO, BDO Hq. AO and other concerned officers.

Blessings Abound: Kashmir's First Ramadan Friday

Srinagar, Feb 20: The first Friday of the holy month of Ramadan witnessed thousands of devotees flocking to mosques, shrines and Khanqahas across Kashmir, expressing deep spiritual devotion and communal solidarity.

From the bustling streets of Srinagar to smaller towns in districts such as Budgam, Baramulla, Anantnag, Pulwama and Kupwara, believers offered Jumma prayers, sought divine blessings and prayed for peace and harmony in the Valley.

In Srinagar, the Hazratbal Shrine attracted a massive congregation.

Devotees filled prayer halls and open courtyards, with many standing in streets and walkways around the shrine. The air was filled with the recitation of 'Takbir and Durood-e-Ibrahim,' as people offered prayers for forgiveness, wellbeing and harmony.

National Conference (NC) president Dr Farooq Abdullah, who was among those present at Hazratbal, spoke after the prayers: "May this Ramadan bring blessings, remove hatred that exists in our homeland and fill it with peace and harmony."

He urged the people of Kashmir to embrace unity, tolerance and compassion, stressing that Ramadan is not only a time for individual reflection but also for strengthening community bonds. Meanwhile,

historic spiritual centres such as Khanqah-e-Moula and Jamia Masjid also witnessed large congregations.

At Khanqah-e-Moula, devotees stood shoulder to shoulder, listening to sermons stressing the importance of charity, patience and reconciliation.

A worshipper said, "Ramadan reminds us that faith grows stronger when shared with others, and it teaches us kindness and generosity."

At Jamia Masjid, Mirwaiz-led congregations drew thousands who offered prayers while listening to guidance from religious leaders.

Beyond Srinagar, districts across Kashmir observed similar devotion. In Budgam, mosques were packed as worshippers offered early morning prayers and community Iftar arrangements were organised for local residents.

In Baramulla, volunteers distributed dates, water and refreshments to fasting pedestrians, reflecting the spirit of compassion and solidarity. Similar scenes were reported in Anantnag, Pulwama and Kupwara, where people gathered in large numbers for prayers, maintaining social harmony and spiritual focus.

Srinagar, Feb 20 (KNO): The air at Jamia Masjid Srinagar was fresh, charged with devotion and reverence, as thousands of worshippers poured into the centuries-old mosque on the first Friday of Ramadan, transforming its courtyard into a sea of faith.

Amid soft whispers of prayer, the glow of mobile screens flickered as many followed Quranic recitations digitally, blending tradition with modernity.

Among the crowd, emotions ran high. Tears rolled down from cheeks, hands pressed in prayer and a whisper of hope blended with the solemn rhythm of the azaan.

"I felt a wave of peace wash over me as I recited the Quran from my phone, yet felt surrounded by the collective heartbeat of thousands of believers," said Arsalan Rather, a

Kashmir parts record highest February temperatures

Srinagar, Feb 20: Several Kashmir parts recorded unusually high maximum temperatures on Friday, with Gulmarg and Qazigund breaking their all-time February records.

According to data from the India Meteorological Department (IMD), Gulmarg recorded a maximum temperature of 11.6 degrees Celsius, surpassing its previous February record of 11.4 C set on February 11, 1993. The same previous high of 11.4 degrees Celsius was also recorded on February 19 this year, officials said.

Qazigund registered 21.0 degrees Celsius, breaking its earlier all-time February record of 20.7 degrees Celsius set on February 28, 2020.

Kokernag recorded 18.4 degrees Celsius, equalling its highest-ever February maximum logged on February 29, 2016.

In Srinagar, the summer capital of Jammu and Kashmir, the maximum temperature settled at 20.2 degrees Celsius—9.2 degrees above normal—making it the fifth warmest February day in the city's recorded history.

The previous fifth-highest was 20.1 degrees Celsius, recorded on February 26, 2016, and matched on February 19

this year.

Pahalgam recorded 16.5 degrees Celsius, 9 degrees above normal, ranking as its fifth warmest February day. The earlier fifth-highest for the south Kashmir resort town was 16.3 degrees Celsius, recorded on February 26, 2016.

Kupwara in North Kashmir registered 19.8 degrees Celsius, 9.7 degrees above normal, placing it among the top ten warmest February days, officials said. The earlier ninth-highest was 19.5 degrees Celsius, recorded on February 20, 2021.

Other stations in the Valley also reported above-normal temperatures. Kokernag was 9.6 degrees above normal, while Qazigund was 10.9 degrees above the seasonal average.

In the Jammu region, Jammu city recorded a maximum of 26.2 degrees Celsius, 3.9 degrees above normal. Banihal, Batote, Katra and Bhaderwah also reported temperatures several degrees above the seasonal average.

The IMD data indicates a significant positive departure from normal temperatures across most stations in the Union Territory, with some areas witnessing deviations of up to 10 degrees Celsius above average—(KNO)

2025 floods claim 152 lives, damages 12,200 houses: Govt

Srinagar, Feb 20: The Jammu & Kashmir government on Friday said that 152 persons lost their lives and 12,219 houses were damaged in the previous year's floods and heavy rains across the Union Territory, while Rs 289.39 crore has been released under the State Disaster Response Fund (SDRF) during the current financial year 2025-26.

Replying to an unstarred question tabled by MLA Shakti Raj Parihar in the Assembly regarding damage assessment, the Minister Incharge, Disaster Management, Relief, Rehabilitation & Reconstruction Department, said that extensive losses were reported across J&K and compensation as per SDRF norms has already been provided to affected families.

The minister informed the



House that the Ministry of Home Affairs (MHA), Government of India, deputed an Inter-Ministerial Central Team (IMCT) from September 3 to 7, 2025, to assess damages in various affected districts. A Memorandum of Loss and Damages was submitted to MHA on November 6, 2025.

He further said that on the

request of the UT Government, NDMA deputed a team for Post Disaster Need Assessment (PDNA), and a detailed exercise was conducted from November 17 to 25, 2025. The report has been submitted to MHA.

As per official data, Jammu Division reported 151 deaths and 178 injuries, 3,304 fully damaged houses, 1,818 severely

'J&K logs steady tourist footfall for over 3 years'

Srinagar, Feb 20: The government on Friday said that Kashmir Valley has recorded sustained tourist inflow over the past three years, with 96,33,972 visitors in 2023, 98,19,841 in 2024 and 47,78,822 tourists in 2025 so far.

Replying to a starred question tabled by MLA Javid Hassan Baig in the Assembly, the Minister Incharge, Tourism Department said destination-wise data for the last three years and comparison with pre-2019 figures have been placed as Annexure-A.

As per official data, in Baramulla district, Gulmarg received 16,25,732 tourists in 2023, 13,64,821 in 2024 and 11,07,728 in 2025 (till date).

In Anantnag district, Pahalgam recorded 14,54,269 visitors in 2023, 12,60,909 in 2024 and 10,04,236 in 2025, while Verinag saw 4,73,710 in 2023, 8,56,168 in 2024 and 3,52,984 in 2025.

In Ganderbal district, Sonamarg witnessed 5,55,226 tourists in 2023, 8,89,277 in 2024 and 4,87,638 in 2025.

Rs 2,106 crore for J&K ring roads

Srinagar, Feb 20: The Government on Friday informed the House that Rs 2106.7 crore have been awarded as compensation for land acquired for Ring Road projects in Jammu and Kashmir, of which Rs 1695.37 crore stand disbursed to landowners till date.

In response to a query by MLA Devyani Rana, minister I/C said the compensation for Ring Road projects is shared between the Ministry of Road Transport and Highways and the UT government

in the ratio of 90:10.

In Jammu division, where the Ring Road passes through Jammu and Samba districts, a total award amount of Rs 322.21 crore has been determined. Of this, Rs 270.11 crore has been released and Rs 244.43 crore disbursed. An amount of Rs 25.68 crore is yet to be disbursed, while Rs 52.10 crore remains pending to be received. In Kashmir division, covering Srinagar, Baramulla, Pulwama, Budgam, Ganderbal and Bandipora districts, the total awarded amount stands at Rs 1784.49 crore.

Out of this, Rs 1514.34 crore has been released and Rs 1450.94 crore disbursed. An amount of Rs 63.40 crore is yet to be disbursed and Rs 270.15 crore is pending to be received.

The government said litigations, court references and title disputes have stalled part of the payout. It informed the House that Rs 28.20 crore has been deposited before the High Court of Jammu and Kashmir in cases involving title disputes between landowners and the custodian department.

District wise data shows that 38 landowners in Samba and 112 in Jammu district are awaiting settlement of their cases. In Kashmir division, 57 cases are pending in Srinagar, seven in Baramulla, none in Pulwama, 247 in Budgam, 905 in Ganderbal and 32 in Bandipora.

The Revenue Department said compensation in dispute free cases is being disbursed through the Bhoomi Rashi portal, while cases under litigation will be settled after court

No World Bank funds for tourism development: Govt

Srinagar, Feb 20: The Jammu and Kashmir government on Friday said that no World Bank-assisted funds have been allocated or received specifically for tourism development in the Union Territory.

Replying to the starred question tabled by MLA Mian Mehar Ali in the Assembly regarding tourism promotion initiatives, the Minister Incharge, Tourism Department stated that no World Bank-assisted funds have been earmarked exclusively for tourism development in Jammu and Kashmir.

The query had sought clarification on whether World Bank funds allocated for tourism development could be utilised for promoting trekking and eco-tourism projects, including the development of the Seven Lakes Trek, and if so, the timeline and prospective benefits of such a project.

In response, the government categorically stated that no such funds have been allocated or received specifically for tourism development in J&K—(KNO)

Time For A Coordinated War On Drugs

The revelation that nearly 70,000 persons, predominantly youth, are trapped in substance abuse in Kashmir, with 50,000 using heroin intravenously, is a chilling portrait of a generation in peril. This is a public health emergency of the highest order, a social catastrophe unfolding silently in our communities, destroying families, and stealing futures. The fact that the majority are intravenous drug users amplifies the horror, exponentially increasing risks of HIV, hepatitis, and fatal overdoses. The government's response, as

outlined in the Assembly, acknowledges the multi-pronged strategy required—awareness, enforcement, treatment, and rehabilitation. The establishment of de-addiction centres and the treatment of nearly 69,000 patients are commendable efforts. Yet, the sheer scale of the problem, with active users far exceeding treatment capacity, reveals a critical gap between intent and impact. We are, at best, containing a wildfire with garden hoses. This crisis demands a war-footing response on multiple fronts simultaneously. First, prevention

must begin in schools and homes. The 'Nasha Mukh Bharat Abhiyan' must be intensified into a permanent, high-visibility campaign, integrating drug education into school curricula and empowering parents with knowledge to recognise early warning signs. The battle begins before the first dose. Second, enforcement must be ruthless and intelligence-driven. The supply chain, from peddlers to kingpins, must be systematically dismantled. Porous borders and local networks require constant, coordinated surveillance by police, narcotics agencies,

and border security forces. Impunity must end. Third, treatment infrastructure must be radically expanded and de-stigmatised. The sanctioned Rs 5 crore for a dedicated de-addiction building at GMC Baramulla is a step, but every district needs accessible, well-equipped, and adequately staffed facilities. Opioid Substitution Therapy (OST) centres must proliferate, and rehabilitation must extend beyond detox to include skill training and livelihood support, ensuring recovered individuals can reintegrate with dignity. Fourth, the community must

be mobilised. Mosques, schools, and civil society organisations must become active partners in creating a social environment where drug use is anathema, not aspirational. Families must be supported, not shamed, in seeking help. The 70,000 number is a warning siren. Behind it are 70,000 human beings – sons, daughters, breadwinners. Their rescue is not just a government responsibility; it is a collective societal imperative. We must act with the urgency this emergency demands, for every day lost is a life lost.

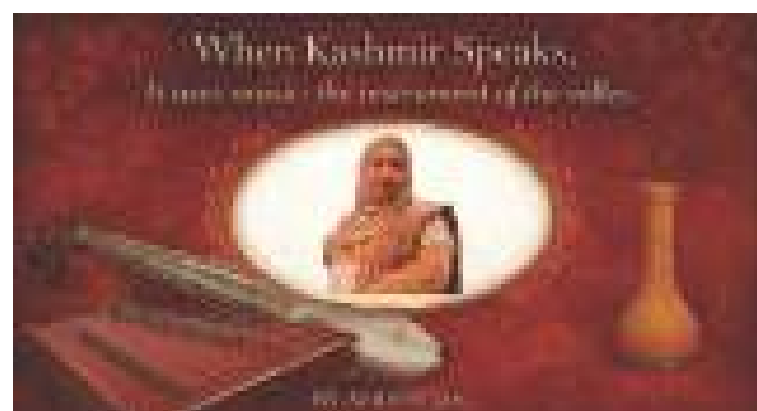
I am Kashmir, and when my mountains grow quiet, my music begins. My stories are not only written in words or woven into shawls. They flow through strings, skins, and reeds shaped by human hands.

The Santoor is my heartbeat. With its hundred strings stretched across walnut wood, it sings like ripples on Dal Lake. When wooden mallets strike it gently, joy and sorrow travel

together, just like life in the valley. Through the Santoor, I remember my seasons.

The Rabaab is my storyteller. Carved from wood and covered with skin, it carries the echoes of Sufi gatherings and folk tales. Its deep, soulful sound once accompanied wandering poets and mystics, turning ordinary evenings into moments of reflection.

The Sarangi, small yet powerful, cries and comforts at the same time.



In folk music, it follows the human voice so closely that it feels alive. It knows how to mourn, how to celebrate, and how to wait patiently during long winters.

The Tumbaknari, my humble drum, keeps time in village songs and traditional celebrations. Its rhythm binds people together. Feet move, hands clap, and hearts listen. Alongside it, the Dhol announces weddings and festivals, making even the mountains pause.

The Nai flute breathes softly through my fields and shrines. Its sound is light, almost shy, yet it carries deep emotion, especially in pastoral and Sufi traditions.

These instruments are not objects to me. They are companions. They have survived change, conflict, and silence. As long as one musician lifts an instrument with care, Kashmir will never be mute.

Because here, music is not performed.

Rs 9.84 Cr restoration works taken up in Marh after floods: Deputy CM

Says Rs 8.87 lakh disbursed among affected families

JAMMU, FEBRUARY 20: Nearly, 92 restoration works worth Rs. 9.84 crore were taken up post 2025 floods across Marh Constituency in Jammu.

This was informed by the Deputy Chief Minister, Surinder Choudhary, while replying to a question raised by Surinder Kumar in the Legislative Assembly.

The Deputy Chief Minister, as per an official statement, apprised the House that an amount of Rs. 8,87,000 under SDRF norms was also disbursed among 90 affected families in the Constituency.

He acknowledged the significant losses incurred by Marh Constituency's inhabitants due to last year's floods. He commended the district administration's swift response, undertaking prompt assessment and relief measures as per State Disaster Response Fund (SDRF). He said that relief under the SDRF norms was provided to the affected families on priority.



The Deputy Chief Minister said besides SDRF assistance, the affected families were also provided with ration and other essential items during the flood period under Indian Red Cross Society (IRCS).

He informed the House that about 92 works including roads, bridges, WSSs, power and other vital public infrastructure damaged during floods were taken

up for restoration under PWD, PMGSY, JPDCL, PHE, JMC, BDO offices Mandal Phillian and Marh in the Constituency.

The Deputy Chief Minister said that most of the works taken up for temporary restoration have been completed and various works are under different stages of completion, while few are set to be completed by July and August, 2026.

Sakeena Itoo calls for collective fight against drug abuse

32517 patients registered in ATFs in J&K, 16759 in Kashmir & 15758 in Jammu

JAMMU, FEBRUARY 20: Minister for Health and Medical Education Sakeena Itoo Friday emphasized the crucial and collective role of legislators, senior citizens, intellectuals, community members and religious leaders in combating the menace of drug abuse across Jammu and Kashmir.

The Minister, as per an official statement, said this while replying in the House Friday to a clubbed question of Legislators Pirzada Farooq Ahmad Shah, Surjeet Singh Slathia, Ali Mohammad Sagar (raised by Legislator Mubarik Gul on his behalf) and Ghulam Mohi Ud Din Mir on the issues relating to drug Abuse.

She added that the department has taken various steps like mandatory CCTV installation and computerized billing of medical shops training counsellors at village level as well as CCTV installation in and around schools and colleges. She also said that teachers are being trained in schools to counsel students showing some early signs of drug addiction.

The Minister informed the House that Drug De-addiction services are being strengthened across the Union Territory under



the Health and Medical Education Department and the Nasha Mukta Bharat Abhiyan. She added that Addiction Treatment Facilities (ATFs) are functional in all the districts of Kashmir Division and nine districts of Jammu Division, with dedicated IPD beds and OPD services available to ensure comprehensive treatment and rehabilitation.

The Health Minister said that in Kashmir Division ATFs are functional in SKIMS, GMC Bemina Srinagar, GMC Anantnag, GMC Baramulla, GMC Handwara, District Hospital Kulgam, District Hospital Shopian, District Hospital Pulwama, District Hospital Budgam, District Hospital Ganderbal and District Hospital Bandipora. In Jammu division, ATFs are functional in GMC Doda,

GMC Jammu, GMC Kathua, GMC AH Rajouri, GMC AH Udhampur, District Hospital Kishtwar, District Hospital Poonch, District Hospital Ramban, District Hospital Reasi and DH Samba (functional on OPD Basis), she added.

The Minister said that OPD services are being ensured in all the districts, IPD services in all the GMCs besides the psychiatrists are also available. Efforts are underway to bolster de-addiction counselling and treatment services, particularly in rural and vulnerable areas, by strengthening OPD-based counselling, improving access to essential medicines, and enhancing follow-up and outreach programmes, she added.

"Health and Medical Education Department is regularly organizing awareness campaigns through

field functionaries as well as via print media, encouraging the drug abuse victims to seek treatment and counselling to get rid of this evil addiction", she said.

The Minister said that 32517 patients have been registered in ATFs in J&K, with 16759 in Kashmir division and 15758 in Jammu division. She added that there is no proposal to establish Drug De-addiction and Rehabilitation Centre in Pulwama district of Kashmir division and Samba district of Jammu division, saying that a Drug De-Addiction and Rehabilitation Centre at Village Bajwani, Tral district Pulwama is functional and catering to patients from across the district.

The Health Minister said that an addiction treatment facility has been established at District Hospital Samba since February 2024 sponsored by NDDTC (AIIMS New Delhi) under MoSJE. "The centre is staffed with a psychiatrist and other trained staff to provide treatment and rehabilitation services", she said. She added that the centre is presently working on OPD basis and providing services like OPD by Psychiatric, counseling, Addiction Treatment Facility and de-addiction medicines are also provided free of cost to the patients.

Rs 2,106 Cr compensation awarded for Ring Road land: Javed Rana

JAMMU, FEBRUARY 20: The compensation for land acquired under the Ring Road projects in Jammu and Kashmir is being disbursed as per the prescribed norms, with a sharing ratio of 90:10 between the Ministry of Road Transport & Highways (MoRTH) and the UT government.

Replying to a question, raised by MLA Devyani Rana, Minister for Jal Shakti Javed Ahmed Rana stated that the Ring Road in Jammu passes through the districts of Jammu and Samba the project covers six districts namely Srinagar, Baramulla, Pulwama, Budgam, Ganderbal and Bandipora in Kashmir Division. He was replying on behalf of Chief

Minister, Omar Abdullah in the House.

Providing details of compensation, the Minister, as per an official statement, informed that in Jammu Division, out of total released amount of Rs 270.11 crore for compensation, Rs 244.43 crore have been disbursed. In Kashmir Division, of Rs 1514.34 crore released, Rs 1,450.94 crore have already been disbursed.

Regarding the pending cases, the House was informed that in Jammu Division, 38 cases in Samba and 112 cases in Jammu district are yet to be disposed of. In Kashmir Division, pending cases included 57 in Srinagar, 7 in Baramulla, 247 in Budgam, 905 in Ganderbal and 32 in Bandipora.



The Minister clarified that compensation in certain

cases is pending due to reasons including non-deposit of

balance funds by the indenting department, court litigations, title disputes between land owners and custodians besides other land-related issues.

It was further informed that Rs 3.73 crore in respect of district Jammu has been uploaded on the Bhoomi Rashi portal. He added that Rs 28.20 crore have been deposited before the High Court of J&K due to title disputes involving 57 landowners.

The Minister assured that compensation in dispute-free cases is being regularly disbursed through the Bhoomi Rashi Portal and the government is committed to clear the pending liabilities in a time-bound manner.

Around 3,000 CPWs regularized in J&K: Education Minister

JAMMU, FEBRUARY 20: Minister for Education, Sakeena Itoo Friday informed the House that the government has taken a historic decision to regularize around 3000 CPWs across Jammu and Kashmir, fulfilling their long pending demand.

The Minister, as per an official statement, stated this while replying to a question raised by Legislator Shabir Ahmad Kullay.

She informed that the department has complied with the February 12, 2018 judgment, following the Supreme Court's dismissal of the SLP, and considered the petitioners' claims

as a one-time measure, pending review petition and contempt proceedings in the High Court.

Regarding the pensionary benefits to the petitioners, the Minister said that the matter has been referred to the General Administration Department for placing the same before the competent authority for approval which is awaited.

She also informed that the claim projected by 246 CPWs for grant of notional benefits w.e.f 16.10.2008 was examined by the Department and the Director School Education, Kashmir rejected the same being devoid of merit, unsustainable in law and not covered under the provisions of SRO-308 of 2008.

IGP Jammu inaugurates 3-day course on “Cyber Investigation, Mobile Forensics” at DPL Jammu

JAMMU FEBRUARY 20: A three-day training programme on “Cyber Investigation and Mobile Forensics” commenced on Friday at the Conference Hall, District Police Lines (DPL), Jammu. The course, as per an official statement, was inaugurated by the Inspector General of Police, Jammu Zone, Bhim Sen Tuti in the presence of Staff Officer to IGP Jammu, Shamsheer Hussain and trainees drawn from all the districts of Jammu Zone.

While inaugurating the programme, the IGP underscored

the growing importance of cyber investigation in the evolving landscape of crime. He highlighted the rapid rise in cyber-enabled offences and emphasized the necessity of equipping investigating officers with updated technical knowledge and legal expertise to effectively handle digital evidence and ensure successful prosecution.

During the course of the next three days, the programme will focus on critical aspects of cyber investigation, including handling and preservation of



digital evidence, maintaining the chain of custody, adherence to proper legal

and procedural safeguards. Special emphasis will be laid on the preparation of digital seizure memos and the correct method of conducting digital seizures to withstand judicial scrutiny.

Dedicated sessions will also cover the relevant provisions of the Bharatiya Sakshya Adhiniyam (BSA), 2023, particularly those relating to admissibility and evidentiary value of electronic records. Legal and procedural prospects concerning cybercrime investigations will be discussed in detail to enhance the competence of

Investigating Officers.

Expert speakers including experienced officers in the field of cyber investigation and mobile forensics will deliver technical and practical sessions during the programme. The course is structured to include interactive discussions, case studies, and practical demonstrations to ensure effective knowledge transfer. It is expected to strengthen cyber policing capabilities and building institutional capacity to tackle emerging digital threats in a professional and legally sound manner.

Netanyahu says Israel 'tightening alliances' with allies, calls India 'gigantic power'

Jerusalem, Feb 20: Describing India as a "gigantic power", Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu has said that Israel is "tightening alliances" with its allies, as he mentioned Prime Minister Narendra Modi's visit to Jerusalem next week.

Prime Minister Modi is expected to arrive in Israel on February 25 on a two-day visit during which he is likely to address the Knesset (parliament) and meet Netanyahu and President Isaac Herzog.

Netanyahu made the comments while addressing the Israel Defence Forces (IDF) Cadets' Graduation Ceremony in Bahad 1 (IDF Officers School), about 190 kms south of Jerusalem, on Thursday.

After describing valiant efforts by the Israeli army over the years, Netanyahu said how the country goes out and takes "pre-emptive measures" against the evil, and, therefore, will act time and again "to neutralise the risks in the area, as necessary."

"We will also act to tighten



alliances with our allies. Next week, the Prime Minister of India will visit the country – a gigantic power," Netanyahu said.

"And of course, you know that a few days ago I returned from another diplomatic visit, the seventh in number since the election of President (Donald) Trump to a second term, where I met with the greatest friend of the State of Israel – US President Trump," he added.

"In the American security doctrine published recently, Israel is the only country in the world that the US defines as 'the model ally,'" he asserted.

On Sunday, Netanyahu broke

the news of Modi's visit while addressing the Conference of Presidents of Major American Jewish Organisations.

"Parliament address on the anvil. Who's coming here next week? Narendra Modi," Netanyahu told the gathering.

"Tremendous alliance between Israel and India, and we are going to discuss all sorts of cooperation. Now, you know, India is not a small country. It has 1.4 billion people. India is enormously powerful, enormously popular," he said.

This would be Modi's second visit to Israel, the first being in July 2017, which was also the first ever by an Indian Prime Minister to the Jewish state.

Many nations have lauded India's move to mandate AI labelling, says Vaishnaw, as new IT rules take effect

New Delhi, Feb 20: Several countries have lauded India's decision to mandate clear labelling of AI-generated content and are considering similar measures, IT Minister Ashwini Vaishnaw said on Friday, as amended IT rules governing synthetic content came into force.

The new IT rules that took effect on Friday come amid growing misuse of Artificial Intelligence to create and circulate obscene, deceptive and fake content on social media platforms. The new rules require embedding permanent metadata or an identifier with AI content, ban content considered illegal under the law, and shorten user grievance redressal timelines.

Addressing a briefing at the India AI Summit, Vaishnaw said there had been no pushback against the move.

"New regulations on synthetic content have been accepted by everyone. In fact, everyone I met has said this is required. Many nations are also talking



of bringing regulations similar to ours. Many nations congratulated India for taking this initiative, and have indicated that going forward, they may also go for watermarking," the IT Minister said.

The objective, the minister added, is to empower users to determine whether a piece of content is real or synthetically generated. He stressed that any content illegal in the physical world under constitutional and legal frameworks remains illegal in the online domain as well.

"...so users can decide for themselves whether or not to

trust it. The other thing we all need to bear in mind is that whatever is illegal in the physical world and violates the constitutional framework and laws is also illegal in the online universe. It is logical," he said.

It is pertinent to mention here that in the run-up to the rules, authorities had flagged a rise in AI-generated deepfakes, non-consensual intimate imagery and misleading videos that impersonate individuals or fabricate real-world events, often spreading rapidly online.

The amended IT rules aim to curb such abuse by requiring

faster takedowns, mandatory labelling of AI-generated content and stronger accountability from platforms to prevent the promotion and amplification of unlawful synthetic material. It places the onus on both social media platforms and AI tools.

Ministry of Electronics and Information Technology (MeitY) issued a gazette notification, amending the Information Technology (Intermediary Guidelines and Digital Media Ethics Code) Rules, 2021.

The tweaked IT rules came into force on Friday.

30,000 vacancies

there has been no revision in electricity rates since December 2023. He informed the House that billing in metered areas is based on actual consumption, while consumers in non-metered areas are charged on a flat-rate basis linked to the sanctioned load.

Abdullah said tariff determination falls within the jurisdiction of the Joint Electricity Regulatory Commission and is fixed as per its parameters. He added that Aggregate Technical and Commercial (AT&C) losses are not being passed on to consumers. The clarification came while replying to a supplementary question from Dr Bashir Ahmad Shah Veeri.

On tourism infrastructure, CM Omar said three projects have been completed in the Ramgarh constituency, and another is in progress under the Capex Budget at a total cost of Rs 307.12 lakh. He was responding to a query from Dr Devinder Kumar Manyal, raised on his behalf by Surjeet Singh Slathia. He said new proposals for the constituency would be considered in 2026-27, subject to feasibility and availability of funds.

The Chief Minister, who also holds the tourism portfolio, informed the House that works worth Rs 123.41 lakh at Sidh Goria Temple, including beautification, parking and pond development, have been completed. A separate project worth Rs 100 lakh at Baba Chamlyal Shrine has also been finished.

On power infrastructure, Omar said a 6.3 MVA receiving station at Qamar (Dudwagan) is under execution to improve supply in the Upper Kapran belt, with commissioning targeted for June 2026, subject to saturation of smart metering. He said Rs 293.44 lakh has been spent so far against a revised cost of Rs 427.63 lakh, adding that delays were caused mainly due to right-of-way issues in laying transmission lines. (KNO)

SIR of electoral roll

The Commission on October 27, 2025 announced the SIR exercise in 12 State/UTs, which is underway. (KNO)

IMD plans doppler

stations and eight snow gauges are planned in districts including Kishtwar, Doda, Ramban, Rajouri, Udhampur, Kupwara, Bandipora, Baramulla and Shopian.

Abdullah said data on cloudbursts, flash floods and landslides over the past 15 years has been used to classify districts into high, medium and low vulnerability categories based on casualties and damage to infrastructure and agriculture.

In the Jammu division, Kishtwar, Doda,

Ramban, Reasi and Udhampur fall in the high-vulnerability category. Anantnag, Kulgam and Ganderbal are classified as highly vulnerable in the Kashmir division.

He said an inter-ministerial central team deputed by the Union home ministry assessed flood-related damage in September 2025, and a memorandum was submitted in November. An expert committee has also been constituted for Hazard, Vulnerability and Risk Assessment in the Union Territory. (KNO)

DC Kishtwar's charity

said that he had inquired into the matter after allegations surfaced that the government was interfering in religious affairs.

"It came to light that the DC did not issue the order on his own. Ahead of Ramadan, all deputy commissioners were instructed to consult people to begin preparations for the holy month. During that meeting, religious leaders and locals from Kishtwar and surrounding areas met the DC. They expressed concerns that some individuals had established fake NGOs during Ramadan to collect donations, but the use of that money remained unclear. It was also said that sometimes donations were collected in the name of patients, but it was uncertain whether those patients actually existed," he said.

He informed the House that the DC was asked to take measures to protect genuine NGOs from harm caused by such misuse. "The DC was urged to issue an appropriate order to regulate this, and he did so following their request," the CM added.

He further said the order was welcomed by the Imam of Jamia Masjid Kishtwar, other religious leaders, and local residents.

The CM urged members of the House to refrain from politicising the issue. "I request the Hon'ble member and other members that we should not politicise every matter," he said.

The issue was raised by MLA Bandipora, Nizamuddin Bhat on Thursday in the House.

"This is intruding into privacy. Is Sadaqah and Zakat to be subjected to administrative scrutiny? Our Shariah says the left hand should not know what the right hand donates," he had said.

Bhat had called the directive "absolutely unconstitutional, ultra vires, bad in law, and provocative." (KNO)

J&K Govt says over

restored 4,555 breaches and vulnerable spots – including 3,320 temporary and 1,235 permanent spots – using funds from the State Disaster Response Fund (SDRF) and other sources following the September 2014 floods.

Under short-term measures, aimed at mitigating a flood threat of 60,000 cusecs at Sangam, the government submitted a draft plan titled "Comprehensive Flood Management of River Jhelum & its tributaries" amounting to ₹2,083.90 crore in 2009-10. The proposal was sanctioned under PMDP in 2015.

The DPRs were framed in two parts as per CWC instructions.

PMDP Phase-I, costing ₹399.29 crore, was implemented from 2015-16 and stands substantially completed. The safe flood carrying capacity of River Jhelum in Srinagar has been enhanced from 31,800 cusecs to 41,000 cusecs – an increase of 22 per cent.

Major bottlenecks in the Flood Spill Channel (FSC) were removed at Shariefabad and Naidkhai, and the carrying capacity at the offtake of FSC was doubled from 4,000 to 8,700 cusecs. The total expenditure incurred under Phase-I stands at ₹327.04 crore (Central Assistance: ₹223.96 crore; UT share: ₹103.08 crore).

Under PMDP Phase-II (Part A), costing ₹1,623.43 crore, approval was accorded by MoWR, RD&GR in March 2022. Against the project, 31 bank protection and anti-erosion works worth ₹276.61 crore are under

execution, out of which 16 works have been completed.

Two regulatory gates in Hokersar Wetland have also been completed and commissioned at a cost of ₹28.45 crore. The total expenditure incurred under Phase-II so far is ₹160.563 crore.

The government further informed that under Phase-I, the GoI share was ₹234.44 crore while the UT share was ₹164.85 crore. Funds released amounted to ₹328.02 crore (GoI: ₹224.22 crore; UT: ₹103.80 crore).

Under Phase-II, the GoI share is ₹1,303.06 crore, and the UT share is ₹320.37 crore. Funds released so far stand at ₹220.97 crore (GoI: ₹174.705 crore; UT: ₹46.27 crore).

In reply to another query regarding expenditure incurred since April 2025, the Minister said that while no fresh expenditure has been booked, work-done claims amounting to ₹70 crore are under process for payment following the recent release of ₹60.4125 crore as the GoI share.

The Minister said that the flood management programme is aimed at strengthening embankments, increasing the carrying capacity of rivers and mitigating flood risks across the Kashmir Valley. (KNO)

will guide long-term administrative transformation.

On food security, Sharma reaffirmed that it is a fundamental right and credited Jammu and Kashmir for leading reforms in the Public Distribution System (PDS). The UT has adopted the Government of India's SMART PDS, integrating systems like Ration Card Management and Supply Chain Management, saving approximately Rs 2 crore annually. Currently, 16.4 lakh households, covering over 67 lakh beneficiaries, receive free food grains under schemes like NFSA, PMGKAY, AAY, and PHH, ensuring no deserving family is deprived.

The department has achieved 100% FPS automation, benefiting over 102 lakh citizens. Due to Union government caps on food grain allocations, efforts are ongoing to request additional supplies and lift the embargo. The department is working to integrate Migrant Database with the Ration Card system and upgrade point-of-sale (PoS) machines with biometric and iris scanner technology, making J&K the first UT to shift from L0 to L1 under SMART PDS.

Further, the department plans to provide additional free ration under SAAAY from April 2025, and initiate creation of new ration cards after April 2026, once data cleansing and e-KYC processes are completed. There are also plans to distribute pulses, oils, millets, and other commodities through NAFED and FPOS. Consumer grievance redressal has been modernized with a digital platform, e-Jagriti, launched in January 2025, enabling paperless complaints and case tracking.

The department also aims to enhance energy security through infrastructural projects like the Bajalta common user facility, a new LPG bottling plant at Jablipura, and the extension of LPG coverage under Pradhan Mantri Ujjwala Yojana-2.0, which will provide free LPG connections to eligible women beyond the existing 35 lakh connections.

Plans are underway to establish a State Food Commission to oversee NFSA implementation and improve last-mile delivery with new fair price shops and sales centers. The IT department continues to advance digital governance, focusing on reliable connectivity, data infrastructure, and secure platforms. Initiatives include establishing IT Parks, augmenting State Data Centers, integrating with government cloud platforms, and making web content multilingual through BHASHINI, ensuring accessible and inclusive digital services.

On mobility, J&K has introduced online services for license corrections, transitioned to a faceless service model, and launched

the Institute of Driving Training & Research (IDTR) in Jammu. The department is adopting technology-driven vehicle fitness testing, planning vehicle scrapping centers, and installing electronic enforcement devices for traffic safety.

Transport infrastructure is also expanding, with new buses being added, including 200 more for RTC services, and procurement of 50 trucks to modernize the fleet. The department is working on a comprehensive green mobility plan, replacing diesel vehicles with zero-emission alternatives and promoting electric mobility.

The Science and Technology Department, through JAKEDA and JKSTIC, is focusing on renewable energy, research, and innovation. Significant progress includes solarizing over 7,500 government buildings with a cumulative capacity of 76 MW, and developing solar villages and agricultural pumps under government schemes. Hydropower projects are progressing, with seven projects completed and several under development.

In the field of science and innovation, the department is establishing biotech parks at Kathua and Handwara, with ongoing projects in Srinagar and Jammu, including scholarships and research programs. The department also promotes sports, organizing national and international events, strengthening infrastructure, and nurturing youth talent through initiatives like Khelo India Centers, sports academies, and development of playfields and sports facilities across the UT.

Major sports infrastructure projects include the completion of 216 playfields, the construction of indoor sports complexes, and the establishment of sports academies for cricket, kabaddi, badminton, and other disciplines. The department organized the "Rustam-e-J&K" international wrestling event to promote rural sports and aims to make Jammu & Kashmir a "Sports Capital of the Country" with upcoming projects like indoor halls, sports complexes, and talent identification centers.

The assembly also discussed demands for regularization of sports personnel and welfare schemes. The department is working on regularization processes, and the selection of outstanding sports persons is nearing completion.

The Minister reaffirmed that all issues and demands raised will be examined objectively, and departments will continue working with commitment, innovation, and accountability. He extended gratitude to officers and officials for their efforts.

Following the Minister's assurances, MLAs withdrew their cut motions, concluding the session on a note of consensus and shared commitment to the development agenda of Jammu and Kashmir.
